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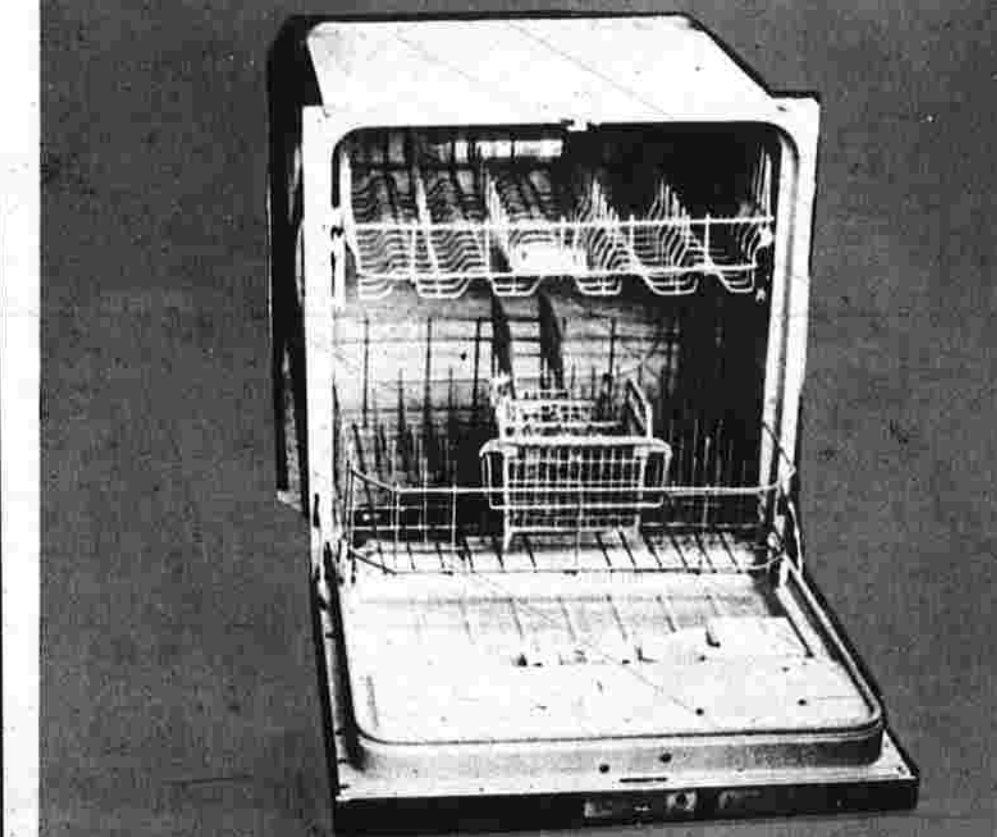
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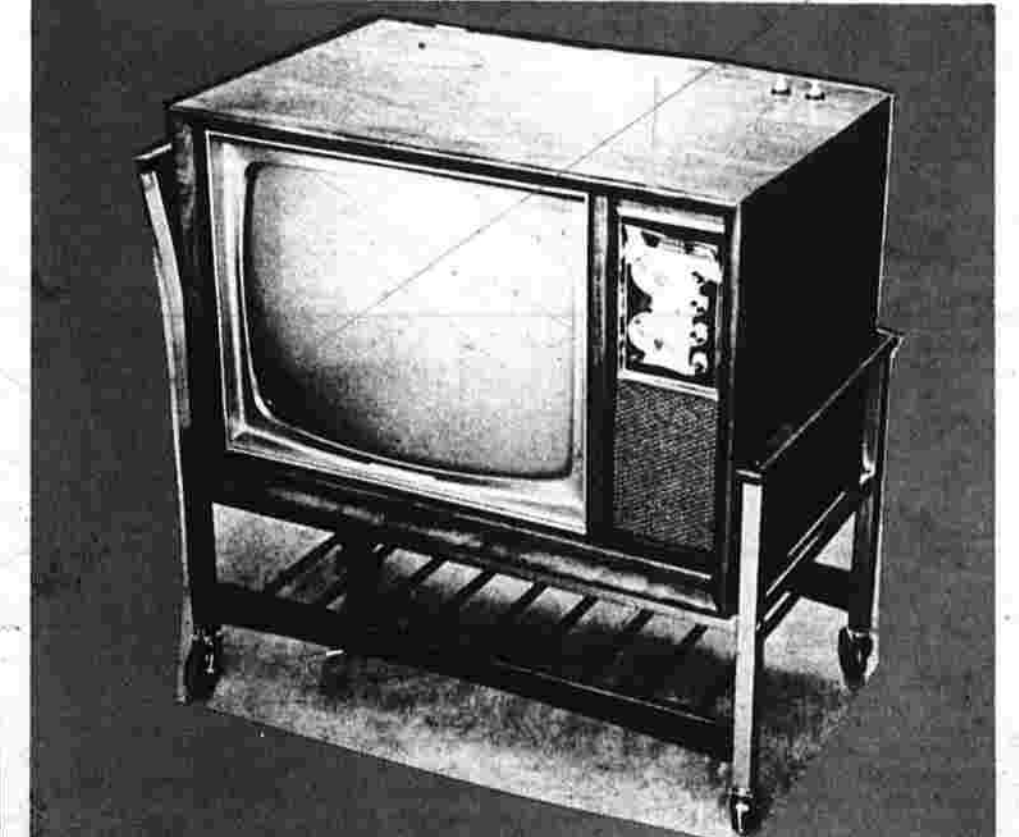

When you execute an end
play, the subject of this week's
articles, an opponent will suc-
cessfully force an opponent to
lead up to your ace-queen. It's just
as effective to entangle the oppo-
nents so that they cannot take
all of their tricks.
Opening lead — jack of dia-
monds.
South is in danger of losing
three clubs as well as a spade.
It happens to lead the first

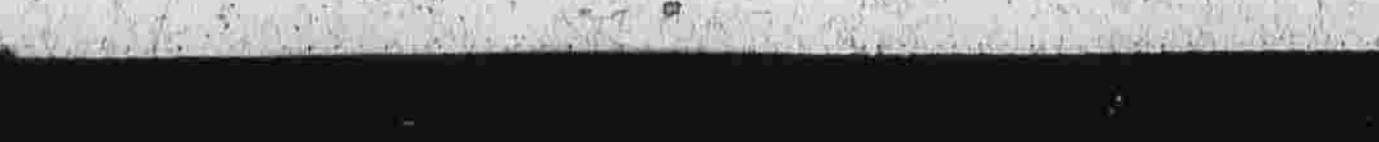

### Off Mexico Isolated Cozumel Island Is Now 'In' for Tourists

Cozumel Island, Mex.—There is a beach here called San Francisco, with tall coconut palms and great bursts of scarlet poinsettias—a place where morning glories and sea grape trees toward the water, and the sea itself is a turquoise mirror reflecting the scene.

It is how Gauguin must have found Tahiti and how I imagine Hawaii was before the first tourist. This beach, San Francisco, is less than a mile from the water, and the sea itself is a turquoise mirror reflecting the scene.

The island was without telephones until a little over a year ago. Now there is service to the mainland. A duty-free gift shop was opened with beaded handicrafts from Spain and perfumes from Paris.

This is what I mean about paradise lost.

Ten years ago practically no one came to Cozumel. It was merely a sleepy little island some 20 miles off Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula. In contrast, last year more than 15,000 tourists climbed off Mexico's jets from Los Angeles, Miami and Mexico City—or from the fact that he spent the present Cozumel was discovered as an inexpensive retreat 10 years ago by a Columbia University professor.

John R. Humphreys should have kept his secret to himself for a long time. He was a tourist, and he returned to the U.S. mainland and spread the word. He'd found an island where the stereotyped picture every one dreams of with long stretches of white sand beach, palms and heavy with coconuts, a bouquet of tropical flowers, soft nights with the milky way flowing overhead.

It was a place where it mattered little if it was Monday or Saturday, or any other day of the week.

Best, a man could live luxuriously on pennies a day. So the tourists started arriving. Small hotels rose. The once peaceful pace quickened.

It never will be quite the same again.

Still, Cozumel is probably the most comfortably pretentious island you will find in the world today. There is but one night club and only five hotels on an island 20 miles long and 10 miles wide.

No longer, though, can one live next to nothing; prices along with tourists have increased until today island collectors are seeking peace along with comfort—will pay 40 dollars a day in season, the Atlantic hurricane season, the Sanguinista with meals for two persons at Day, when special prayers are offered. And on October 25, 24 to 32 dollars double at Cabanas Del Caribe.

Deluxe new suites were added to the Playa Azul—each of them tagged at 48 dollars a day.

Until 1967 there were only two hotels on the island, and they were practically no roads. Today there are more than 150 registered vehicles, including a fleet of taxis, but still little paved highway—only about 15 miles in all.

### Coventry Huge Housing Complex Weighed

The Planning and Zoning Commission is giving "serious consideration" to a proposal by a firm of land developers for an apartment complex in the town of Coventry.

The project would be a 200-unit single family complex on 184 acres of land in the area between already-existing housing in the lake area, and the RT-40 zone.

The preliminary proposal was presented to the PZC Monday night by land developers Joseph Vinick, Morton Schimmelman and Herman Maskell, together with their engineer Mevyn Straus representing Morton Fine Associates.

While still very preliminary, some details of the proposal are rather definite: The developers want to use 70 acres of the site for low-density multi-family dwellings, leaving nearly 115 acres as a recreation area.

The apartments would be at a density of seven units per acre, and would contain approximately 20 per cent efficiency apartments, 60 per cent one bedroom, and 20 per cent two bedroom units. There would be 40-48 single family homes. The developers estimate the rental at about the \$150 a month class, with 2 bedroom apartments slightly higher.

Such problems as water supply and sewage disposal have not definitely been decided, but the men indicated they lean toward a central water supply and sewage disposal in centralized areas.

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# Manchester in Days Gone By

Probably the first formal organization of students in the South Manchester High School was Boethia, founded late in December of 1896 or early early in January of 1897. Its principal, Arthur Peterson. The name Boethia was suggested by Mr. Peterson. It derives from the Greek word boethia, which, in classical Greek, meant help or aid, or in military usage, an auxiliary force. Its appropriateness as a name for the new organization is evident. It is possible that the full Greek spelling was originally used, but simpler form Boethia was soon adopted. The first meeting of which there is any record was held on Jan. 6, 1897. Clearly, a previous meeting had been held, since the minutes of the January 6th meeting state that it was called to order by the president, and that the reports of the secretary and treasurer were read and approved.

This is Arthur Peterson, as he appeared at about the time of the founding of Boethia.

Book I of the secretary's reports opens with a copy of the constitution. The object of the organization is stated as "to promote among the students of Parliamentary Rule, faculty in debate and interest in literary pursuits." All reports especially in the earlier years, and the questions discussed indicate that the students were interested in international affairs as well as national and local problems.

The first debate held Jan. 20, 1898 discussed the question "Resolved that the United States should turn its immediate attention to the man atrocities rather than the Venemese controversy." It was in session, but payment was to be voluntary. Funds were to be raised by the organization and for the "adornment of the school room along literary lines."

The program for the January 6, 1898 meeting was reported as follows: Piano Solo—Mabel Wolcott; Paper on Duarner Control—J. Couch; Editorial on the New Year—H. Montgomery; Scene from Homer—Mr. Fryer; Mr. Spencer, Mrs. Cheney, Mr. A. Cheney; Piano Solo—Miss E. Craig; Piano Solo—Miss Hutchinson, Miss Slinner.

Barely whoever planned this program was dedicated to the purpose of the organization. The record of the meeting also reports that the resignation of a Miss Noyes as a member of the executive committee was accepted, but that Miss Maud Rogers' resignation as vice president and chairman of the executive committee was not accepted. She must have persisted for it was accepted in the next meeting. Miss Mabel Wolcott was the secretary who reported this meeting. No record exists as to who might have been the first president.

The first constitution also provided that "The president shall appoint at the beginning of each meeting a person who shall criticize said meeting at the following meeting." This procedure was followed for a number of years and then discontinued except for next meeting, and it was thought that the practice was discontinued for debate. It is interesting to note that although the minutes record that the appointment of the critic and the records indicate the fact that the critic reported, it is not on the outcome.

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of three he appointed by the chair to report concerning the Boethia at the South Manchester meeting. The meeting adjourned at 3:30. (The records do not state what parliamentary rules were being followed, what happened to a rather arbitrary chairman, or what motion important to the school year.) Attention was still given to this purpose of Boethia for the purpose of Jan. 18, 1907 the sole purpose was "instructing the pupils in the principles of parliamentary law."

In the earlier years of Boethia special programs marked such occasions as Lincoln's death, Christmas and some times Memorial Day. The first sample program marking Washington's Birthday included a Song-Red, White and Blue (the school motto); Recitation of Washington; Recitation "Maxims of Washington"; Patriotic Selections by four young ladies; Song-American Hymn by School Reading—Character of Washington and finally, Recitation—Monument to Washington.

Through the year's programs in Boethia meetings covered a wide variety of subjects and were presented in a variety of ways. In the earlier years it would appear a greater effort was made to present the stated purpose of the organization. Entire programs were organized around the life and works of an author, an artist, or a musician. Some of the subjects covered in these categories included Whittier, Dickens, Chaucer, Corset, Millet, Richard Wagner, Lowell, Coleridge and Gordon Thomson were participants. The latter spoke on "The Dawn."

Mr. Sherwood Bowers recalls that he enjoyed the meetings. He stated that some of the speakers were of "amateur afternoon," and that all enjoyed "had fun."

While in high school and later as an alumnus, Mr. C. E. Moore Watkins was an active participant in Boethia meetings both in and out of school. On the occasion of one program presented by alumnus, he sang two numbers and recited once. He recalls that Boethia was "quite important to the students."

At the meeting of June 13, 1898 the committee on decorations reported and discussed in the articles, or suggestions for topics for later treatment. Communications should be addressed to the following: William E. Buckley, 569 E. Center St., or Arthur H. King 183 Porter St.

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The country was engaged in two wars during the existence of the Boethia—the Spanish American War and World War I. The Spanish American War received little attention in the Boethia programs. On one occasion Mr. Verplanck spoke on the various causes of the war. At another meeting he talked about the Red Cross. After the war, Admiral Dewey was the topic of one meeting.

World War I, which was of longer duration and involved many more loyal men, received more attention in Boethia programs. Patriotic songs, poems and recitations were included in the programs. The principal of the Meriden High School was a guest speaker at one of the meetings on the topic "Why We Are Fighting." "Won't You Say a Prayer for the Boys Out There" was a popular musical number.

Another feature in the meetings of the earlier years was the reading of "Speeches of Men" by Washington and finally, Recitation—Monument to Washington.

Carrier recall "enjoying the meetings and looking forward to them." Mrs. Harry Straw remembers looking forward to the meetings and welcoming them as different from the usual school routine.

Miss Elizabeth Olson, former vice principal of Manchester High School, suggests that this was the last meeting of the year, and the Boethia had ceased to exist before school reopened in the fall.

Like many other organizations, Boethia had served its purpose. When the school was small and there were not enough students interested in any one activity to form a special club, Boethia furnished an outlet for students to engage in a variety of extra-curricular activities.

It seems to be a perverse part of every victory democracy wins that its own militarists, and some of its own would-be statesmen, have an instinct to spy some of the customs and institutions and even adopt some of the values they have just defeated.

But now politicians from both sides of the fence are attacking our selective service system, and nobody is accusing them of being un-American, or cowardly pacifists, or flimsy idealists, or of seeking to undermine the American way of life...

As The Memories Driveline: Tuesday was its 50th anniversary, a sad but effective guarantee that not many more personal reminiscences are to be forthcoming.

The New Haven lady's "Blizzard Baby" story came in as close to a second hand first hand memory as can be hoped, from now on.

What will last longer than living memories, however, is the demonstration of how much people like to tell and retell, and hear told and retold, the story of an unusual fact on the part of the weather.

One reason for this has to be that, until the days of the hydrogen bomb at least, the weather has really been into only one thing that could happen to very large numbers of people all at once.

The bomb, especially the one that exploded in the fringes of our survival could see it on television, might prove a comparable experience. But until then, at least, the blizzard of '48, more than any great battle, or great dramatic moment concerning kings or presidents, remains the one thing that actually happened directly to more people than any other event in the history of man.

Dissect Through Political Action: In just about any undertaking one might want to attempt, it does seem there is a right and a wrong way to do it.

So it goes, we would say, with the dissent to the Vietnam war. We can understand the troubled state of mind and conscience of those who sincerely believe the war is wrong.

Conscription Under Criticism: Such opposite sides of the political picture as former Vice President Richard Nixon and Senator Edward Kennedy have now united in a common recommendation that this country shift from its present selective service system to one in which we maintain an army of volunteers - well-paid volunteers highly skilled in the techniques of modern warfare.

We do not quite understand just how such a proposal has come to have such respectable bi-partisan sponsorship, perhaps it results from the continued spotlight on the unfairness, injustices and inconsistencies of the present draft system...

But, although it is a risky business to be pleased with some development whose origins you do not understand, we cannot but cheer the growing talk about abolishing peace-time conscription (the system we are using now for North Vietnam) from the life of this country.

It was in order to be able to live a life free of peace-time conscription that many of America's families came here in the first place.

WASHINGTON - In a candid remark the other day to a high U.S. official in Saigon, President Nguyen Van Thieu put his finger on the agonizing decision which may determine the fate of the war.

He knew, he said, that he must start moving his maneuver battalions out from the towns and cities to resume offensive action against the Communists, but did he dare move them into the country-side and risk another enemy assault on urban centers?

Thieu's dilemma - which is the U.S. dilemma - stems from what happened in the first wave of the winter-spring offensive starting in late January. Since then huge areas in the southern delta and north of Saigon have been simply ceded to the Vietcong.

Reports reaching here indicate that within three months the Vietcong could recapture this newly gained territory most of the 40,000 men they lost in that initial phase of the new offensive.

In fact, neither the U.S. nor Thieu's own government knows fully what is going on in the recaptured districts. But there have been two well-documented reports of the enemy's moving into the districts, and marching and marching to jungle training camps.

The reason for the enemy's ability to move with impunity is that the President's battalions have shown an unwillingness to leave relatively safe bases in town, where they live with their families, for unknown dangers of the countryside.

Only in the past week have some army units been ordered out of their bases and sent on offensive operations against the Vietcong, even though the Communists were severely weakened in the February fighting and should be ripe for attack.

The statistics, based on reports from the field, are revealing. Of some 31 South Vietnamese battalions assigned to pacification work in the countryside - that is, to provide security for the pacification teams to do their work in the hamlets - at least 20 rushed back to protect the towns when the enemy struck in late January.

What has happened, in short, is that the South Vietnamese army is over-reacting to the enemy's attack on the cities and is unwilling to move out for fear that a second wave against district and provincial capitals is imminent.

This fear may be quite plausible, but U.S. experts are warning Thieu that, if part of his army does not return to the countryside and carry out the Saigon pledge to protect villagers who resist the Vietcong, these villagers will be lost forever to the Saigon government.

Pueblo Talks Deadlock

REQUO (AP) — Foreign Minister Chou Kyu-shan says that U.S.-North Korean talks on the release of the Pueblo crew have come to a deadlock, informed Korean sources said today.

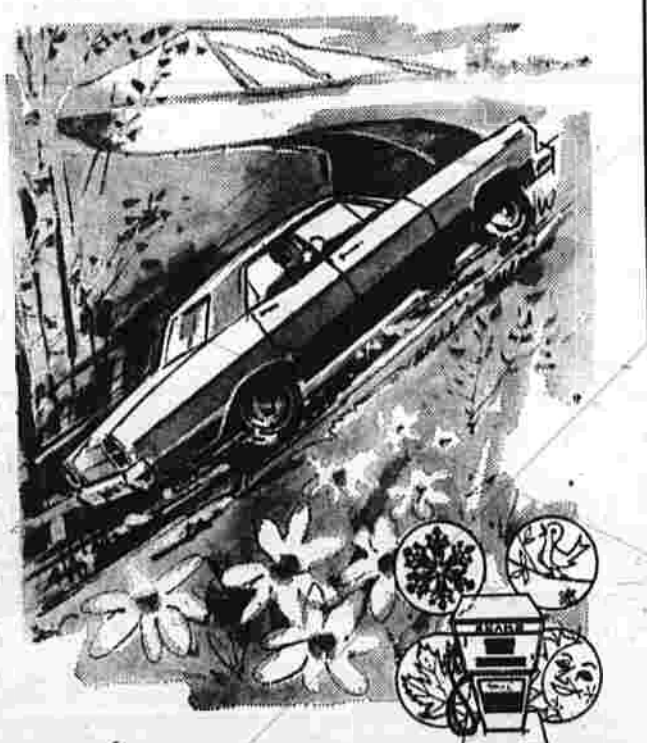

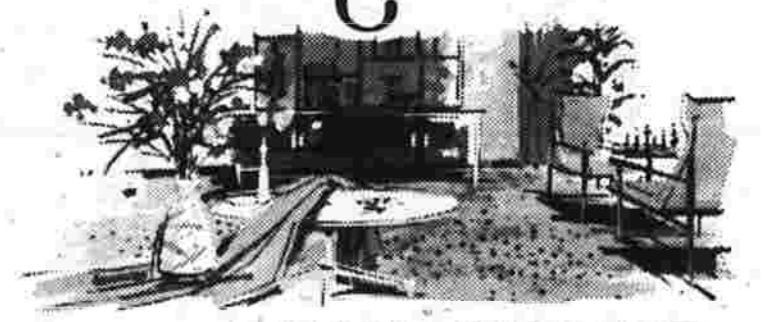

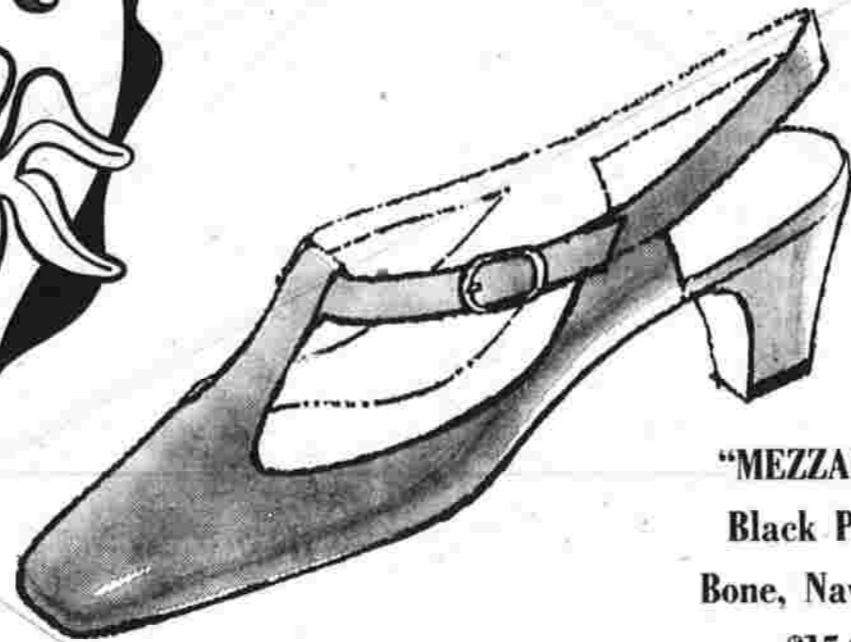

### Bolton Teacher Pay Pact Adds \$34,900 to Budget

The Board of Education and the Bolton Teachers Association will agree to accept a 20-minute duty-free lunch period until such time as class scheduling or space will make it possible to provide a 30-minute duty-free lunch period. Teacher aides will be provided to supervise both the elementary school cafeteria (one in three this year) and the double classroom used as a dining area by high school students.

As for class size, both the board and the association agree to a goal of 25-30 as maximum class size at the elementary school level; that at the high school level be the maximum class size at the secondary level.

"When class size reaches the upper limits in each category," the agreement continues, "contingents will be given by the board to alleviate oversize classes by such measures as: 1. Providing for teacher rotation to assist the classroom teacher. 2. Providing for additional classrooms or sections to house the overload or any other such educationally acceptable methods."

The BEA has requested more specific agreements on sabbatical leave. The agreement reached is, "Request for sabbatical leave will be granted by the superintendent with board approval for advanced graduate studies and other worthwhile programs. Remuneration and other conditions relative to sabbatical leave will be determined on an individual basis at the time the request is made and granted."

Secretaries and Custodians

Britain Now Standardizes Undershorts

LONDON (AP) — Britain's guardians of trade standards today came to the rescue of the poor slob whose underpants are always falling down.

The British Standards Institution, after a considerable survey, issued an 11-page set of rules for putting life into the old man's shorts.

The regulations are highly technical but they demand the right kind of natural rubber, the right quantity, the proper size and cut for that elastic band that is supposed to hold up underpants but often doesn't after a washing or two.

The institution was moved by complaints, some reaching the Women's Advisory Council, that certain brands of elastic-band shorts were a source of considerable frustration, if not downright embarrassment.

Why the Women's Advisory Council? The man in Britain might think he's wearing the pants but it's the average housewife who often buys them, has to deal with the laundry and sometimes gets the blame from her spouse for the way she washes them.

GRAD SCHOOL AT MUSEUM

CHICAGO (AP) — A center for graduate studies in systematic zoology and paleontology is being set up at the Field Museum of Natural History. Dr. Robert F. Inger, a member of a seven-man advisory board to the center, said the role of the center will be to provide staff members "to help guide students doing doctoral research, to furnish lab space and specimens and to give students access to nationwide collections through museum affiliations."

The museum has 10 million specimens on man and nature in its collections on natural history.

The center is being operated in cooperation with the University of Chicago and Northwestern University.

### Grim Tasks Confronting Army Branch

 WASHINGTON — In building an aging temporary structure here, are 123 Army employees who hope and pray for the time their jobs can be abolished.

But their work schedules in direct relation to the Vietnam War and presently they are over-burdened. As the war has become bloodier, the staff has been increased and increased again. It works round-the-clock shifts seven days a week. In addition, long hours of overtime are required.

These employees are in the casualty branch of the Army's Adjutant General's Office. They numbered only 28 in 1965 when the Vietnam War was escalated after the Tonkin Bay encounter. There is the grim and exacting task of identifying through official records the Army deaths which includes 11,000 of the 18,000 service personnel killed up to now in Vietnam, and also the Army wounded. Further, they perform these depressing chores.

In death cases, they phone the Army installation close to the next of kin to have an officer or senior non-commissioned officer break the news to the kin between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10 p.m. Visits are prohibited during the late night hours.

The branch here follows up the visits with an official wire confirming the death of Maj. Gen. Kenneth G. Wickham, the adjutant general, and later it sends the kin a letter of condolence on White House stationery which is signed by President John F. Kennedy.

It sends the kin ample supplies of death certificates and certifies the death to insurance companies.

Up until the recent Communistic offensive, the branch's goal was to start the notification process in case of a pending action cases within two hours after the names reached from Saigon. In the past, it required employees to work with speed and accuracy. In wounded cases, the next of kin are notified by wire except in some of the more severe cases when it does not precede.

The branch uses the medical terms it gets from Saigon to describe the cases. "Killed severely wounded," means life is in danger; "severely wounded," means life is in danger; "wounded," means life is in danger; "wounded," means life is in danger.

Many soldiers who are "slightly injured" prefer not to have their families notified and the Army Abbots by their wish.

Interestingly, the cases of two wounded GIs were handled at the branch by civilian employees who had trained with them.

Employees who man the branches phones must be compassionate and tactful as diplomats. The branch gets a steady stream of calls from heart-broken and worried-alek parents, wives and sweethearts who are in search of additional information. The employees are instructed to do everything possible to accommodate the caller.

The most difficult cases are those from relatives who oppose our nation's participation in the war. Such callers can hardly restrain themselves from taking out their bitterness on branch employees who must take it, and try to console them at the same time.

Several enlisted men asked for and were given other assignments because they felt they weren't temperamentally suited to handle such calls.

Only 57 of the 123 employees are civilians under the day shift. The 73 military personnel work the second and third shifts and holidays. Civilian overtime averages over 5 hours weekly. Workweeks for enlisted personnel range from 50 to 60 hours, and to 60 to 70 hours for officers.

The lack of transportation and eating facilities in the isolated section of building B makes it next to impossible to staff the office with civilians for night and weekend shifts.

Despite the many problems, Col. Herbert Trullinger, director of the branch, pays high tribute to the staff which he says is imbued with the objective of getting all the available facts to the right people as quickly and completely as possible.

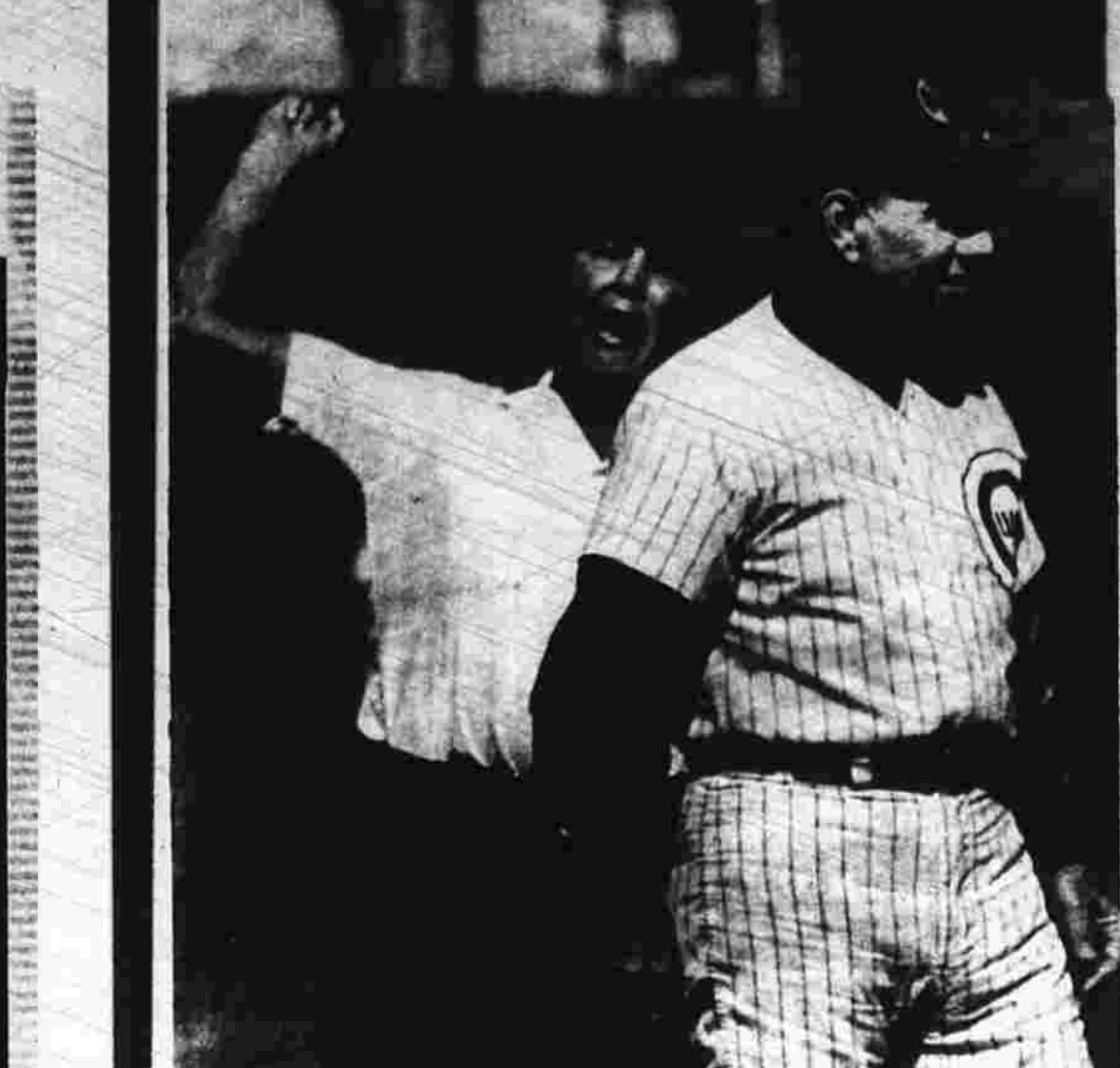

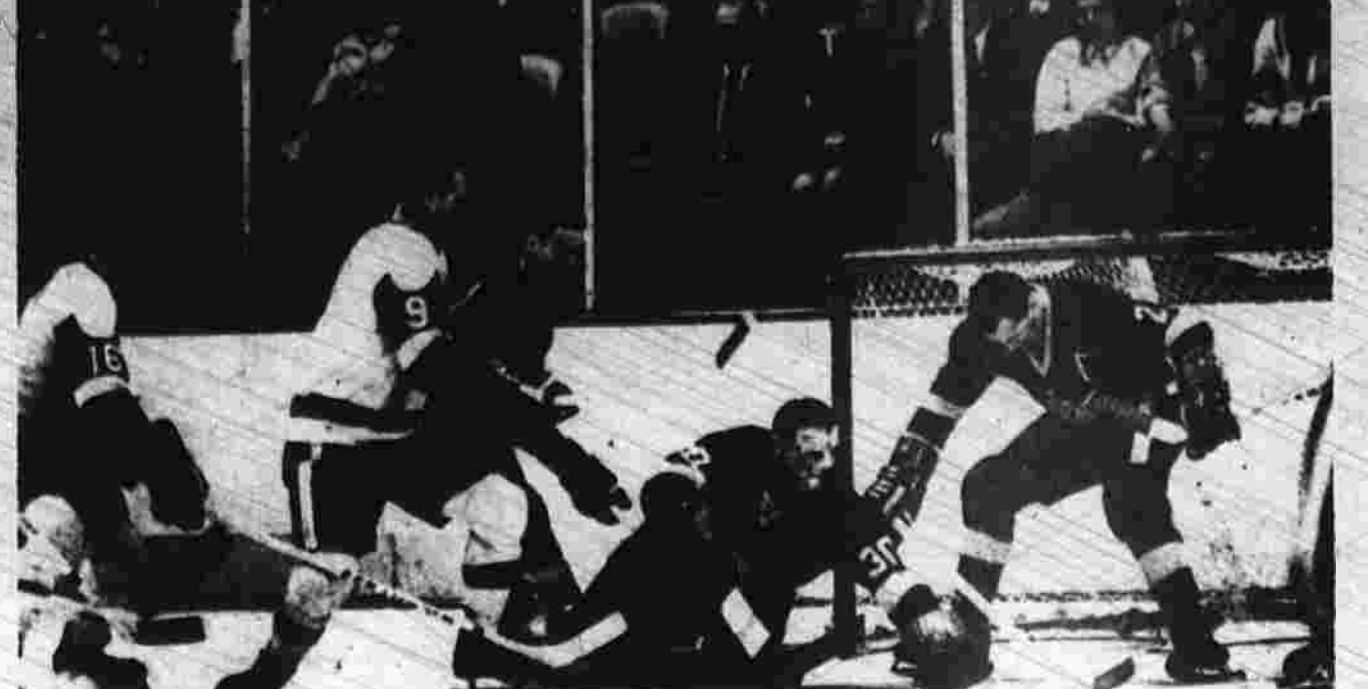
