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Herbie Hancock
Musical Score Composer
For Movie 'Blow Up';
Davis Quintet Pianist

WASHINGTON — Herbie Hancock is probably best known to the general public as the composer of "Watermelon Man," the joyfully infectious blues tune that was popular several years ago. But Hancock is also the pianist with the Miles Davis Quintet, composer of the musical score for the film "Blow Up" and one of the brightest young musicians on today's jazz scene.

"Watermelon Man" gave Hancock access to a wider audience than most jazz musicians enjoy. Shortly after recording the song, he expressed a desire to record a rhythm and blues album, which would be an extension of his hit.

Hancock, recently in Washington, said, "I did it (the R&B album) and I didn't like it." I was going to rearrange it, but I kind of abandoned the idea.

"Why didn't he like the album?" "For one thing I had too many solos," he explained. "You've got to have an ensemble sound in rhythm and blues. The instrumental solos in R&B are pretty much incidental — you use the instrument as a release from a vocal." Hancock did not use a vocal on the record that was led by blue note records.

"Will he do another R&B album?" "It's not necessary for me to do a rhythm and blues album to round out my musical conception now," he said. "The direction I want to follow is the only line in the 'Maiden Voyage' album."

"Maiden Voyage" is a quiet, flowing lyrical song with a disarmingly simple melody, but underneath lies a complex chord structure that allows a soloist to build musical skyscrapers.

In speaking of what he tried to achieve in the "Maiden Voyage" album (blue note BLP 4180, BST 84190), Hancock said, "There are certain elements that are appealing to the average listener — a certain kind of simplicity, and a certain kind of complexity, too. That's what I was trying to get in that album." The disc also contains two other graceful melodic pieces, "Latin One" and "Dolphin Dance."

play all single note things (melodies) in my right hand and chords in my left hand," he said. "Now I try to play many things in my left hand."

During his appearance here he would sometimes play long complex counter melodies with counter rhythms in each hand, and at other times thick-voiced chord sequences.

An impressionistic stripe in his work reflects the acknowledged strong influence of composer Maurice Ravel and pianist Bill Evans on him.

"We (the Davis Group) were on our way to the West Coast and while I was talking with (tenor saxophonist) Wayne Shorter, the idea for the rhythm hit me," he recalled. "I wrote it down on a napkin, but misplaced the napkin later on." Hancock scratched the brain trying to recapture the rhythmic idea. Not until he was listening to a tape of the same rhythmic pattern at the end of an entire different song. He wrote it down and "Maiden Voyage" had its second birth.

Hancock has been with Davis since June, 1963. He, drummer Anthony Williams and Bassist Ron Carter, a nonpareil modern rhythm section, all started at about the same time.

Before joining Davis, Hancock played with Donald Byrd's group and made many recording sessions in New York. The 28-year-old pianist came to New York in 1961 following a few months of gigging around his native Chicago. He was graduated from Grinnell College in Iowa in 1960 with a B.A. in music.

Hancock has a full-bodied keyboard approach. "I used to

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Experimenting Nuns To Appeal to Pope

LOS ANGELES—The so-called Immaculate Heart Sisters, cold by Vatican authorities they must roll back on some of their modernization experiments, will appeal their case to Pope Paul VI.

"We've stopped," said Sister Mary Mark, vice president of Immaculate Heart College. "Then we and other orders have been waiting our time to see what the Sacred Congregation for Religious orders to update themselves through experimentation. Normally, the Vatican body would not order an experiment until an order decided to adopt a change."

So far, the Immaculate Heart nuns had only started experiments with changes which were subject to review in June and possible adoption at later meetings.

The nuns were informed recently by the Sacred Congregation that they should adopt a "uniform habit" instead of their traditional work clothes and college and observe rules for collaborating with local bishops.

While the document contained no deadlines for the sisters to meet, the rulings were seen as an initial victory for James Francis Cardinal McIntyre, the 82-year-old archbishop for 1.4 million Roman Catholics in the four-county Los Angeles archdiocese.

Cardinal McIntyre said last fall that the experiments—such as shedding the habit for ordinary clothes—were unacceptable to him.

He said the sisters, who teach in more than 35 archdiocesan schools, could not return until fall unless they gave more freedom their experiments. The cardinal also requested the Sacred Congregation to review the Immaculate Heart programs.

"There's not one thing we've done that is farther out than what other orders have done," said Sister Mary Mark in defending the position of the Holywood-based order.

Therefore, she said, "This (petition to the pope) is not only important for us but also for orders around the country."

The gray-haired sister, who wears ordinary clothes with a pendant cross around her neck, said, "We were judged on one set of documents but we based our renewal on other documents or other sections of the documents."

The document most often cited is *Motu Proprio*, which the order's spokesman said issued directives to religious orders which gave them more freedom, while another section addressed to the bishops gave them more authority over the orders.

"This is why we hope the Holy Father will see our problem," said Sister Mary.

About 500 of the 540 Immaculate Heart sisters, who live and work mainly in California and Arizona, met recently at Immaculate Heart High School auditorium to consider the decisions of the Sacred Congregation which were contained in a letter dated Feb. 29.

The "great majority" of sisters at the meeting voted to petition the pope.

Sister Anita Caspari, head of the order, denied what she called "unfounded reports" that she had resigned her office and that a large percentage of the community was planning to form a "lay federation."

In her address to the sisters, Sister Anita emphasized that what the community desires is a dedication to "those aspects of life to which the Christian mind and heart are drawn: the burning issues of peace, poverty, race relations, the problems of education, communication, the vocation of healing, conferring, counseling, the challenge of expanding the imagination of man; the joy of helping him to celebrate."

"Perhaps dedicated women, free to invest their total energies, sharing their material goods with each other and the poor, engaged in a genuine search for encounter with God—perhaps these women will exercise the painfully prophetic role of arousing the Christian conscience."

"Women thus deeply attracted to community as a mission and as a way of life can constitute a community of faith, living in hope, never doubting the power of love."

"We want to be free to answer need in spontaneous and uniquely personal ways. We will draw strength from our association with each other."

Sister Mary Mark said she believed it is not unprecedented for a religious order to appeal to the pope from decisions by the Sacred Congregation, which the authority over communities of priests, brothers and sisters.

Regarding the directive to adopt a "uniform habit," the sister said some orders of nuns have never worn a habit and other orders in this country have approved the wearing of ordinary clothes by some of their sisters.

VIETNAM REST FLIGHTS TO HAWAII
HONOLULU (AP) — Rest and recreation flights to Hawaii from Vietnam will be increased to 82 flights a month, a new high, effective April 1, the Army announces.

R and R flights have been arriving since last October at the rate of 45 flights a month. The average flight brings about 100 GIs here.

Feasibility studies are under way to see whether 60 R and R flights a month can be handled at the existing airport.
