Unmanned Sputniks Link Up in Space

MOSCOW (AP)—Two unmanned Soviet Sputniks automatically linked up in orbit today, circled together for 3 hours and 50 minutes and then separated.

An official announcement of today's docking and undocking by Cosmos 212 and Cosmos 213 implied that an advance had been made on the automatic coupling since last year.

The duplication of a Soviet feat first accomplished last Oct. 30 came amid indications that the Soviet Union soon will be ready to make its first manned space flight since cosmonaut Vladimir M. Komarov died in

conducted," the announcement said.

"The televised image of the sputniks was transmitted to the earth in the process of undocking by means of satellite television systems."

An earlier announcement of the docking said it also was televised.

The announcement claimed that everything worked normally. After the separation, the two unmanned devices "were switched over to different orbits."

They "are continuing their flight and their studies of outer space," said the announcement.

Experienced observers expected them to be brought down to soft landings, as Cosmos 186 and 188 had been last October—and as the eventual manned docking spaceflights will be.

The two docking exercises apparently carried out automatically what Komarov had been intended to do with men in two satellites. There have been a number of indications to confirm expectations of a manned operation soon.

Cosmos 212, launched Sunday to test new systems and elements of the design of spacecraft, docked in orbit with Cosmos 213, which was blasted aloft later.

Humphrey Counting On Political Debts

WASHINGTON (AP)—Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey is counting on collecting political debts piled up in tireless party fund-raising activities in his expected bid for the Democratic presidential nomination.

It is widely assumed he will announce his candidacy this week. Humphrey's associates believe his extensive traveling on the Democratic dinner circuit will help do for him what it has done for Richard M. Nixon among the Republicans—put

him in the front rank of contenders.

Democratic Governors Meet; Talk Presidential Politics

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Democratic governors talk some presidential politics today, and agents for the party's White House contenders already are at work, hunting support for their men.

But it seemed unlikely that any of the three top prospects for the nomination President Johnson shunned would make much headway at the brief private session.

At least 16 of the 24 Demo-

cratic governors were to attend the party's governor's conference at a downtown hotel, but in general they seemed to have only one thing in common: political caution.

The advance talk was of uncommitted delegations and favorite son candidates.

"I'm going to play this down the middle," said the host governor, Warren E. Hearnes of Missouri. "It's too early to come out for any presidential candidate as far as I'm concerned."

Political strategists representing the camps of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy of New York, Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy of Minnesota and Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, who hasn't yet announced his candidacy, all were on hand to argue the case for their candidates.

But only governors were to be admitted to the conference itself.

Georgia Gov. Lester Maddox, who supports George C. Wallace for president, said in advance he would seek backing for the Alabamian.

Gov. Kenneth M. Curtis of Maine announced he would break into a Florida vacation to attend the meeting as a Kennedy man. A Curtis spokesman said several governors had asked him to come to discuss the reasons he had decided to endorse the New York senator.

Gov. Phillip H. Hoff of Vermont, who was not expected at the session, also backs Kennedy.

But nine of the governors due to attend were from Southern border states. And in some of those states there were signs of Humphrey support.

Hunt Pressed For Man in King's Death

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP)—FBI agents from Virginia to Florida were making an intensive hunt today for the mystery man whose abandoned white Mustang fits descriptions of a car seen leaving the scene of the Martin Luther King Jr. assassination.

The object of the widening search was Eric Starvo Galt, 37, known only as an unemployed seaman from Birmingham, Ala. A car registered in that name was seized by the FBI in Atlanta last Friday, eight days after King was shot to death in Memphis.

The FBI refused to acknowledge the hunt or to say why Galt was wanted. "No comment," was the routine reply. But Associated Press checks disclosed that FBI agents had contacted persons named Galt in several states including Virginia, Alabama and Florida.

An FBI alert for Galt was sent over the Florida police communications network last Friday, but withdrawn four hours later.

FBI agents have continued to inquire about Galt at numerous places including dry cleaners and service stations in Birmingham.

Marines Seize Hill In Easter Day Battle

SAIGON (AP)—U.S. Marines seized a hill northwest of Khe Sanh from its North Vietnamese defenders in an Easter Day battle. An American source said South Vietnamese troops soon will take on a bigger share of the fighting along the northern frontier.

The battle for Hill 881 North, five miles from the Khe Sanh combat base, was one of several sharp fights over Easter. AP correspondent John Lengel reported from Marine headquarters at Da Nang that 108 North Vietnamese were killed on 881 North—most of them by artillery and air strikes that preceded the Marine assault.

Six Marines were reported killed and 12 wounded.

Troops of the 26th Marine Regiment stormed up the slopes. Sporadic shooting continued after the hill was declared secure early in the afternoon.

The hill was the scene of hard fighting in the spring of 1967, and the North Vietnamese hung on to it after the siege of Khe Sanh was lifted this month.

The 26th Marine Regiment had been in Khe Sanh during the 77-day siege. After the encirclement was broken the regiment moved out to sweep the surrounding area.

The U.S. Command is preparing to replace American troops along the demilitarized zone with South Vietnamese forces. It was considered possible that South Vietnamese troops will take over defense of the Marine outpost of Con Thien and of Khe Sanh, now defended by a battalion of air cavalrymen.

The plan to give the 1st South Vietnamese Army Division a bigger slice of the DMZ is still in the mill," the source said.

It was reliably learned that the move will be carried out as soon as the South Vietnamese 1st Division has completed refitting and retraining. The division suffered heavy casualties during the enemy's lunar new year offensive.

The 1st Division, about 12,000 men, is equipped with the modern, rapid-firing M16 rifle, the standard weapon of American infantrymen.

Two battalions from the Division have just completed a two-day sweep around Gio Linh, the allied strongpoint at the eastern end of the DMZ. Government spokesmen said 125 enemy troops and 29 South Vietnamese troops were killed in the two-day operation.

Near Khe Sanh, an enemy company attacked two companies of the U.S. 1st Air Cavalry Division, but the Americans repulsed the assault after 15 minutes. Eight U.S. soldiers were killed and six wounded.

The Khe Sanh airstrip was hit by six mortar and rocket rounds Sunday morning, two minutes after 6,000 Easter eggs arrived by helicopter for the garrison. Three Marines were wounded.

'Faucet' to Be Shut On Columbia River

THE DALLES, Ore. (AP)—The flow of the mighty Columbia River will be shut off Tuesday morning as though a faucet valve were turned.

Massive gates in John Day Dam some 25 miles upriver from here will slide shut under hydraulic control and the waters racing downstream will pile up against the concrete and steel barrier that stretches more than a mile between Oregon and Washington.

Lake Umatilla, the reservoir behind the biggest dam ever built by the Army Corps of Engineers, will fill quickly.

Its level will rise more than a foot an hour. By Wednesday morning it will be at the bottom of the spillway gates. By Friday the lake will be 76 miles long,

running upstream from John Day Dam to McNary Dam. Its level will be some 80 feet above the present river. And under it will be abandoned townsites, abandoned railroads and highways and the mysterious rock carvings of long-vanished Indian tribes.

Navigation will be extended by the new lake, giving a continuous course of 325 miles from the sea to Ice Harbor Dam on the Snake River.

John Day is the 10th dam completed or under construction across the Columbia below Grand Coulee. Its ultimate output will produce a constant supply of nearly 3 million kilowatts, making it one of the world's most powerful—more powerful than Grand Coulee. The power

Riot Cases Swamping Courts

Courts are engaged in processing thousands of arrests made during the looting, arson and violence that followed the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Hundreds are still in jail.

Hundreds have been fined, mostly for curfew violations. Many have received suspended sentences. Others remain free in bail pending trial on charges ranging from looting and arson to first-degree murder.

In Baltimore, about 5,800 persons were arrested. Of 3,466 cases tried, 2,183 convictions resulted, mostly for curfew violations. Fines ranged from \$5 to \$300. Probation cases totaled 889. Many cases involving looting and arson await grand jury action.

Washington reported 5,500 arrests, including 4,400 curfew violations. Persons charged with curfew violations have been told they can avoid trial by posting \$25 bond. The remaining cases deal with looting, arson, and other more serious charges.

Hearing Set Tonight On Budget Requests

Taxpayers will have a chance to learn where their dollars may be going at a public hearing on budget requests tonight at 8 in the high school gym.

Budget requests for the fiscal year 1968-69 total \$1,186,806, which is \$151,122 above the requests for 1967-68.

Requests for the town proper total \$888,120, up \$29,975.

Requests for the Board of Education total \$284,438, up \$122,047.

The Board of Finance has asked that a representative from each board and commission be present to explain their requests, if necessary.

The usual procedure at a hearing is to review the request figures, paying to answer questions along the way.

The Board of Education will be on hand to explain its requests. For the commission, a more detailed list of these requests is included with the mimeographed sheets which are available in the town offices today and will be available at the high school tonight.

Health Officer Increase

In the request for the town, the largest increase is for the town health officer because the town is planning to hire a public health nurse, who will also operate with the Rockville Area Public Health Association. This request is up \$8,000. A portion of the total amount is carried in the school budget, and a portion is reimbursable.

Reserve Fund Contributions

Reserve fund contributions are up \$7,000. Of the total, one-half mill is reserved for Conservation Commission park improvements, one-half for fire department future non-recurring expenses, and one mill for the town for capital and non-recurring expenses.

Conservation Commission

Conservation Commission requests are up \$4,000 because of a request to purchase 21 acres of land across North Pond.

Open-space "reservations"

The Board of Conservation will town's share of the total cost would be \$1,500. The \$4,000 figure is for outright purchases, using no state or federal funds.

Planning Commission

Planning Commission requests are up \$5,000 because the commission hopes to hire a consulting firm (Brown, Donahue and Dunbar) to draw up a new comprehensive plan for the town.

The assessors' requests

The assessors' requests are up \$7,000 because revaluation will begin in 1969.

Requests from the office

Requests from the office of the selectmen are up \$3,000 because of the need for additional clerical help.

The selectmen's budget

The selectmen's budget and the library budget requests are up \$1,000 (the latter in order to qualify for state aid). Zoning is also asking for \$1,000 more than last year.

The fire commissioners'

The fire commissioners' and highway general maintenance budget requests are each up \$2,000.

Interest Down

On the other side of the ledger, interest payment on bonds and newspapers and radio stations will be reduced from \$34,400 to \$25,000.

This land is located off the access road leading to the golf course being built on the Poole property on Rt. 85. The cost of a fire house at this location is estimated at \$15,000.

Hanoi and Hai Phong about three days ago after the military decided it needed to know what the North Vietnamese were doing.

A U.S. Command spokesman asked about the range of reconnaissance flights, said he could not comment.

F111 fighter-bombers raided North Vietnam for the third successive day since they resumed combat missions Friday. The swinging jets had been grounded since March 30 after two of the \$4 million planes were lost during their first week of combat.

The second plane, a B-57C, was bombed by the A-1H. Sunday and early today bombed targets in the central highlands 23 miles west of Kontum.

U.S. sources reported that the first F111 believed to have gone down in Laos or Thailand, but U.S. commanders say they don't believe the North Vietnamese—who have troops in Laos—got hold of the wreckage. The plane is equipped with high-precision advanced, top secret "electronic countermeasures" and radar guidance equipment.

Unofficial reports say the second plane crashed because of trouble in the stabilizer control. The two crewmen ejected and were rescued. Sources in Saigon said a team of experts from the United States has completed a maintenance mission around study of the wreckage.
