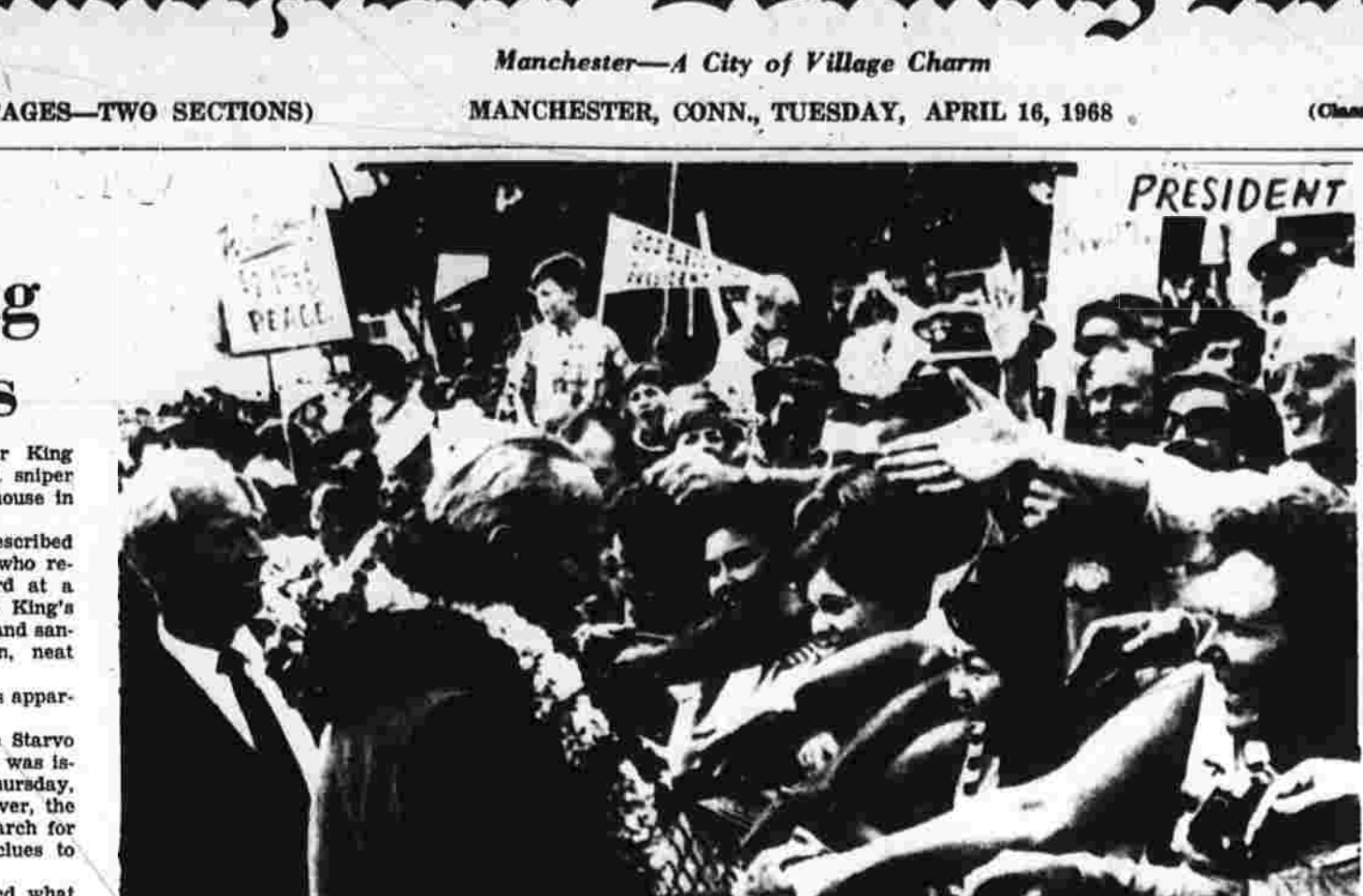

### Vernon Sex Education by 1970 Voted

Action was taken at last night's meeting of the Board of Education which recommended that public schools throughout Connecticut should teach their students about sex and family life from kindergarten through high school.

A committee of educators to be appointed by the superintendent will come up with a new curriculum to include sex education by the summer of 1969. The curriculum will be reviewed by the board of education which will have to be approved by the State Board of Education before acceptance into the school system.

The recommendations were drawn up by the Health and Family Life Study Committee which has been in existence for three years and which has extensively studied the need for sex education in the Vermont schools. The committee was headed by Mrs. Helen Abuzo, it includes representatives from Children's Services, where the need was first recognized, as well as from juvenile court, religious groups, service organizations, the medical profession, parents and educators, number of about 12 members.

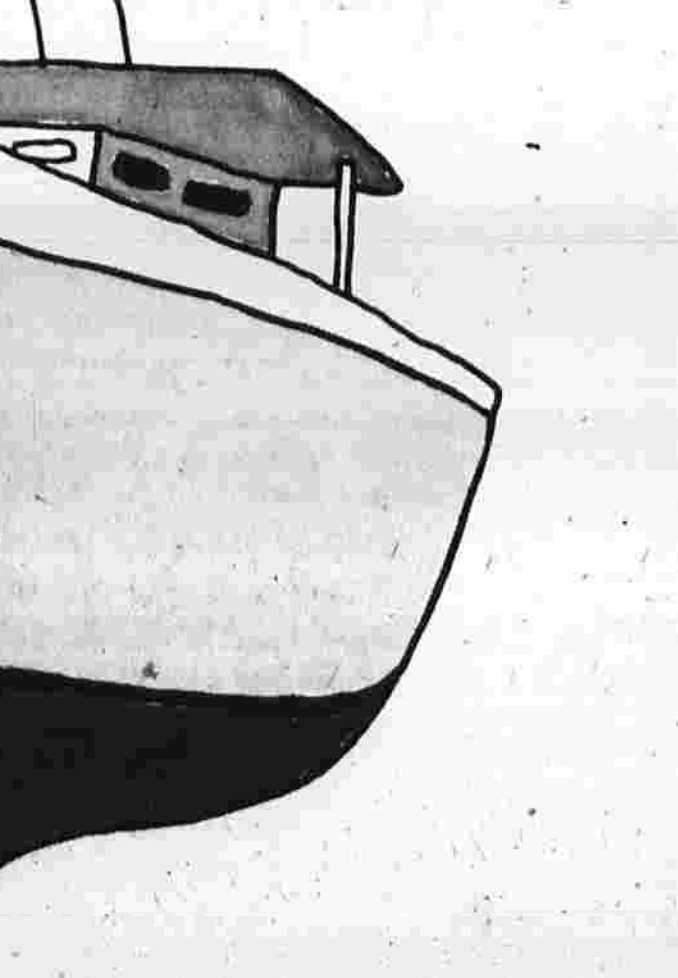

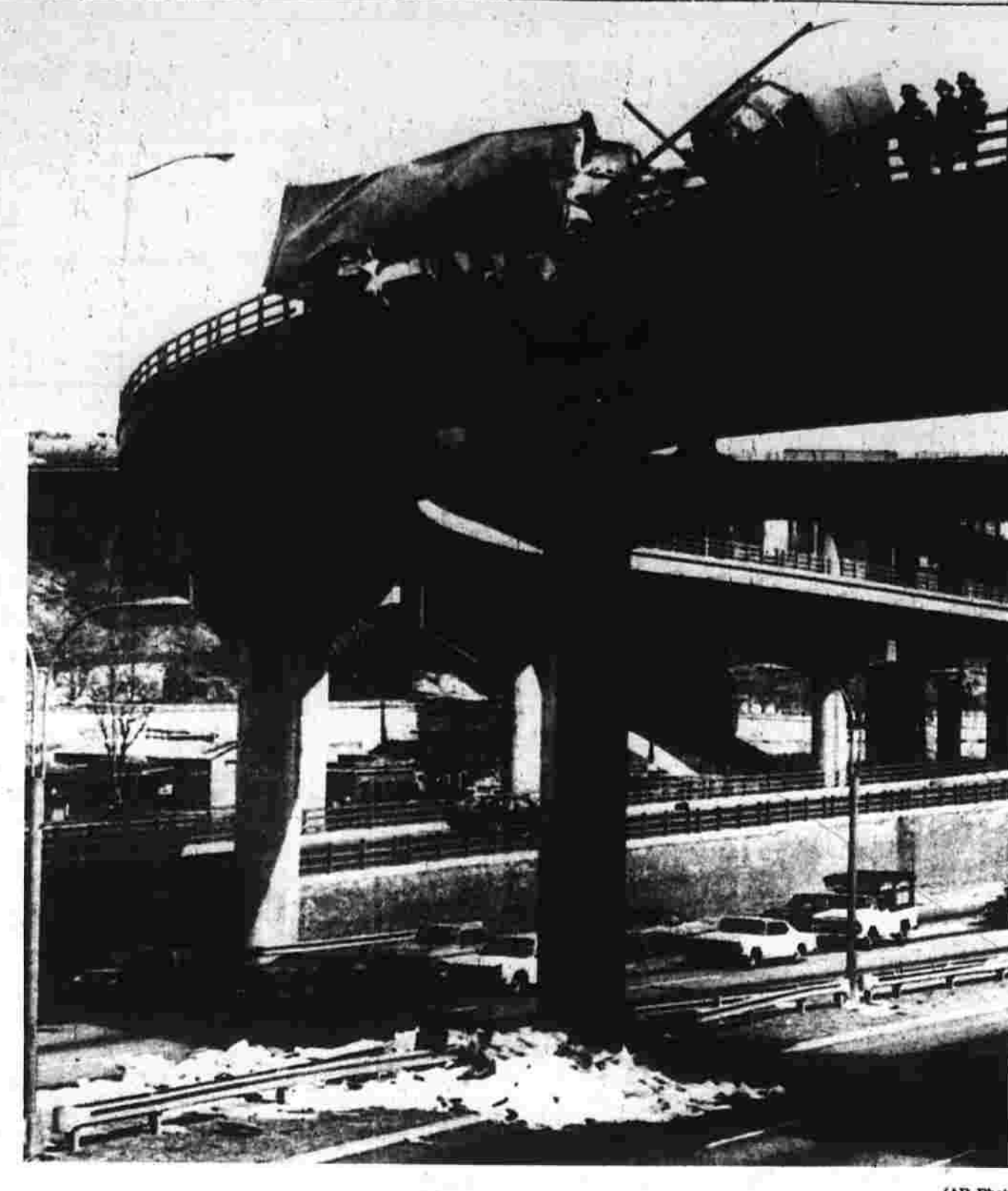

NEW YORK (AP)—Rusty Staub said things started getting pretty funny around the 17th inning.

Roy Hofeinz officially announced the humor of the situation five innings later.

Two innings before the longest night game in major league history ended in the Astrodomes Monday night with Houston a 1-0 victor over the New York Mets—who else?—the following legend appeared on Astrodomes' owner Hofeinz' psychedelic scoreboard:

"The judge says he's ready to go to bed... let's score a run."

"After about the 17th inning, everything sort of got funny,"

stated Staub, who batted nine times in the six-hour game. The fifth inning was the longest night game played previously, a 6-4 American League victory for Washington over Chicago last year.

"That was a three-packer tobacco game, and I've just got one chew left," said catcher-coach Buddy Hackett of the Astros.

The game mercifully came to an end in typical Metastan fashion, with an error letting in the run after eight pitchers had battled valiantly to preserve the lead.

In the only other National League game played, Los Angeles rallied heroically to beat Pittsburgh 3-2 and St. Louis topped Atlanta 4-3 in 10 innings.

# Longest Night Game in History Finds Mets on Short End Again

HOUSTON (AP)—The judge was ready for bed, a coach had only one chew of tobacco left, and the bats weighed more than the trees from which they were hewed.

It was at this critical point in the 24th inning that Houston's Bob Aspromonte stroked one of Les Rohr's pitches toward Ed Wells near second base and the New York Mets' shortstop muffed it to let in the only run in the Astros' 1-0 victory early today.

The error ended the longest night game in major league history.

"The bat felt like 8 1/2 pounds," Aspromonte said. "That was the longest week I ever played. I've just got to let it go."

San Francisco defeated Cincinnati 1-0 in 21 innings.

The longest night game previously played was Washington's 6-5 victory over Chicago on June 12, 1967. The longest National League night game was played Sept. 1, 1967 when the Astros' Ed Wells pitched for 17 1/2 hours, the same as the Mets' Seaver.

At that point Aspromonte hit the grounder that Wells bobbled.

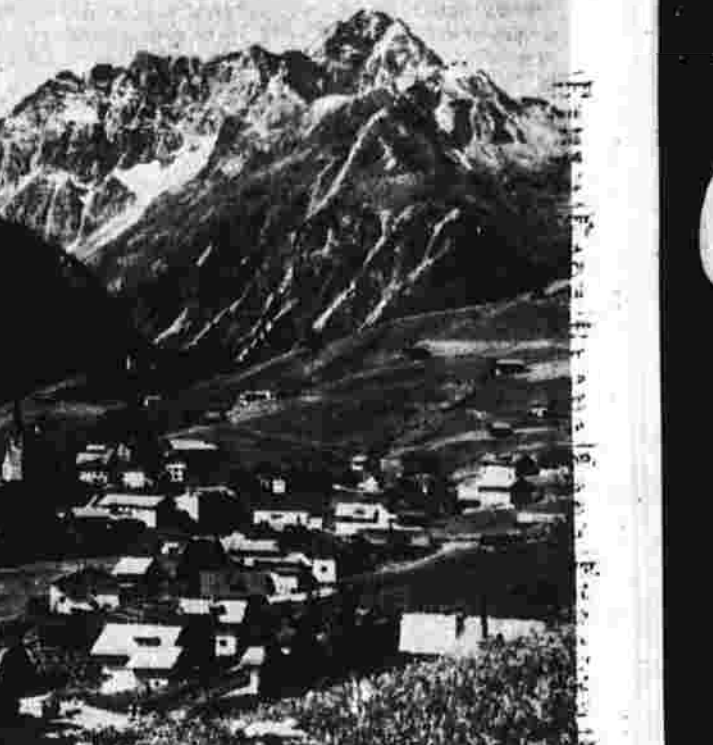

Parents should bring to the registration a birth certificate and proof of vaccination, diptheria immunization, and polio inoculations. Also, under a recent Board of Education ruling, proof is required that a tuberculin test has been completed no more than 12 months prior to school attendance.

Although not compulsory, an occasion for measles is strongly recommended. Children who cannot be immunized because of medical reasons should present documents to this effect at the time of registration.

Parents who may not have received registration forms should call the school manager for them for the materials, which should be filled out before registration.

It is not necessary for children to appear at the registration.

5 Inmates Die In N.C. Riot

RALEIGH, N. C. (AP) — Five prisoners were killed and 80 persons injured early today when guards at North Carolina Central Prison fired on a mob of about 500 demonstrating inmates.

The grievance list included demands for implementation of an incentive pay plan for prison laborers, better food and recreation, a five-man grievance committee to meet with prison officials monthly.

"I talk to inmates daily, but I do not yield to inmate demands that I do anything," Bounds said afterward.

He said the demonstrators were confined to an open yard by custodial officers armed with chemical mace and nightsticks. After the building was set afire, Bounds reported, the prisoners—many of them armed with homemade weapons and torches—began to advance on the guards on the grounds.

They began throwing lighted torches on the unarmored custodial officers, and the armed custodial officers fired a "tear gas opening fire," Bounds said.

Armed guards stationed on the walls of the 75-year-old prison fired tear gas.
