WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court upheld today the power of states to keep sexy magazines from children.

At the same time, however, the court struck down a Dallas scheme to shield children from violent or sexy movies, on a finding that the particular scheme was unconstitutionally vague.

The two rulings provided the first test of laws that serve to control what children—but not adults—may see and read.

Clifford Sees GI Reduction

New York (AP) — Secretary of Defense Clark M. Clifford said today South Vietnam's increased fighting effectiveness will permit a leveling off of U.S. efforts in the war and "in due time" permit gradual troop reduction.

Clifford said his assessment was based on results of a comprehensive review of American policies and programs in Vietnam, ordered by the President after the setbacks of the Communists' Tet offensive.

Clifford made that assessment in a speech prepared for the annual membership meeting of the Associated Press.

It was his first public address since he became defense chief seven weeks ago.

"The results were clear and the results were encouraging," Clifford declared. "They disclosed that Hanoi could not bend South Vietnam to its will by military force.

"We concluded that Americans will not need always to do more and more, but rather that the increased effectiveness of the South Vietnamese government and its fighting forces will now permit us to level off our effort—and in due time to begin the gradual process of reduction."

Clifford offered no timetable on possible American troop withdrawals but top military officials including Gen. William C. Westmoreland, U.S. commander in Vietnam, and Gen. Harold K. Johnson, Army chief of staff, have raised the possibility this could begin in 1969.

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The ruling on magazines involved a 1965 New York state law, the movie case a 1965 city ordinance.

Speaking for a 6-3 court, Justice William J. Brennan Jr. said in the magazines case: "The well-being of its children is of course a subject within the state's constitutional power to regulate."

State legislatures, he said, are permitted by the Constitution to help parents assess "sex related" material.

Besides, he said for the majority, the state has an interest all its own in the well-being of its youth.

With Brennan in the majority were Chief Justice Earl Warren and Associate Justices John M. Harlan, Potter Stewart, Byron R. White and Thurgood Marshall.

The dissenters were Justices Hugo L. Black, William O. Douglas and Abe Fortas.

Harlan was the lone dissenter in the 8-1 ruling on the Texas case. That decision struck down an ordinance allowing a board of censors to classify movies as "not suitable for young persons."

Douglas, with Black agreeing in his remarks, said in the magazine case dissent: "As I read the First Amendment, it was designed to keep the state and the hands of all state officials off the printing presses of America and off the distribution systems for all printed literature."

To do otherwise, Douglas said, would require a constitutional amendment.

Phone Union Defies Two Injunctions

WASHINGTON (AP) — The A.F.L.-C.I.O. Communications Workers defied back-to-work court orders today in two states in the fifth day of the nationwide telephone strike, and said the injunctions blocked chances for an early settlement.

Last October federal judge Warren J. Ferguson of California decided the Times Mirror Company's purchase of the Sun Co., in San Bernardino violated the Clayton antitrust law.

The Times appealed raising several contentions. The court made no comment on these and said simply Ferguson's decision had been affirmed.

The terse ruling added only that Justice John M. Harlan voted to hear the appeal. However, four justices have to consent before such action is taken.

Among other things, the Times said it and the San Bernardino Co. in Alabama and Kentucky as "preposterous" and "anti-union."

Beirne said the injunctions indicated the Bell Telephone System, and its parent American Telephone and Telegraph Co., want "to go on fighting" the strike of nearly 200,000 union members in some 40 states, instead of settling the wage dispute at the bargaining table.

Beirne called his 13-man union executive board into session Sunday to consider Gilmer's offer to explore a union proposal. But the meeting ended after eight hours "without any prospect for an immediate settlement," Beirne said.

No formal company-union talks are scheduled, he said.

Beirne, who issued his blast at the court orders in the midst of the top-level union meeting, said the injunctions "directly impede any possible progress" in the nationwide strike.

The injunctions order Bell System employees whose contracts have not expired to go back to work despite picket lines of their fellow union members—telephone installers employed around the nation by the Bell subsidiary, Western Electric Co.

Some 23,000 Western Electric telephone installers in about 40 states are on strike, in addition to Bell System operators, linemen, repairmen, clerks and other workers in 15 states. Western Electric manufacturing employees in Buffalo, N.Y., also have walked out.

Where Bell System contracts have not expired, such as in Alabama and Kentucky, many telephone workers are refusing to cross the picket lines of the Western Electric installers.

Some Bell workers in Alabama, however, had set up their own picket lines to protest what they called attempts by the Southern Bell Telephone Co. to intimidate them from respecting installers' picket lines.

Viet Troops On Alert in Saigon Area

SAIGON (AP) — South Vietnam's army in Saigon and 11 surrounding provinces were placed on full alert today because intelligence reports indicate a big attack on the capital is near, Vietnamese sources reported.

A U.S. mission spokesman said, however, that "no alert or any warning has been issued to American personnel" in connection with the Vietnamese intelligence reports.

A U.S. military spokesman said American troops were on the same alert they've been since the big enemy lunar new year offensive in February that ravaged Saigon and other major South Vietnamese cities. He added: "We're just normal."

Another source reported U.S. military police in Saigon had been told to be more cautious in the next few days and that Marine guards at the American Embassy were briefed on the Vietnamese reports. The embassy was attacked at the start of the Tet offensive.

The informant said the briefings were normal procedure that did not indicate U.S. officials were particularly worried.

Vietnamese officials at Cho Ray Hospital in Cholon, the Chinese section of Saigon hard hit in the previous offensive, told U.S. nurses there to go home. One nurse said the officials told them an enemy attack was expected late Monday or early Tuesday.

Vietnamese troops had been on a 50 per cent alert since the February offensive, with half of them allowed overnight passes. Now all troops are restricted to their bases.

The intelligence reports said the Communist attacks would be on the scale of those during the February offensive, when thousands of Viet Cong and North Vietnamese troops infiltrated into Saigon and attacked all over the city.

Officials reported Sunday that a North Vietnamese colonel had surrendered and turned over plans for another assault on Saigon by 10,000 enemy troops.

The colonel, the highest ranking Viet Cong leader to fall into allied hands, said the assault had been planned for today but some unknown circumstance had resulted in a delay.

Allied forces reported killing at least 135 enemy soldiers Sunday.

Fire Probed At Sub Base Escape Tank

GROTON (AP) — Navy and fire officials are investigating a blaze that caused about \$500,000 damage Sunday to the escape training tank facility at the U.S. Submarine Base here.

The fire, discovered early Sunday morning by a sailor on duty in the diving locker, heavily damaged the elevator shaft that runs parallel to the 138-foot-tall diving tank and the wood control shed atop the tank.

One diver said he thought the fire, believed to have started in the locker, was fueled by an exploding high-pressure air line.

When the line exploded, he said, flammable insulating material surrounding the shaft went up in smoke.

The tower and its support system has been used to train submariners in escape and rescue operations since 1950. It is somewhat of a landmark in southeastern Connecticut and is the symbol of the Navy training base.

Shiffs and walkways leading to escape locks alongside the tank were badly burned and firemen had to break windows to fight the blaze.

Three firemen suffered minor injuries fighting the blaze. It was brought under control at 6 a. m. Sunday, about three hours after it was discovered.

The base commander, Capt. Walter A. McGuinness, released the damage estimate for the wood shaft structure. He said

Assassin Descriptions Conflict, Says Officer

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — A ranking Memphis police officer acknowledges there are "a whole lot of discrepancies" in official descriptions of the man sought as the sniper slayer of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Asst. Chief Bill Price referred to statements that James Earl Ray, 40, an escaped Missouri convict, and Eric Starvo Galt, first sought for King's April 4 assassination in Memphis, are the same person.

"You don't know what to look for," Price said Sunday as officers here and elsewhere continued their investigation of the slaying. The nationwide manhunt continues.

The FBI issued a conspiracy warrant Wednesday for Galt, then updated their case Friday by saying a fingerprint comparison showed Galt was really Ray.

The naming of Ray in the case caused confusion, primarily because earlier official statements indicate that Galt and Ray were in different places at the same time.

When Galt was charged as a conspirator in King's death by rifle bullet, the FBI said the man had taken dancing lessons in New Orleans in 1964-65. The FBI said later the earlier description should have said Galt reportedly took dancing lessons rather than stating it flatly.

During that time, Ray was in the Missouri State Prison at Jefferson City, serving a 20-year sentence for a 1955 supermarket robbery.

The age of the man also was in conflict.

Witnesses who saw a man in a Memphis rooming house from where the fatal bullet was fired estimated his age as in the late 20s. The FBI, in issuing its warrant.

122 Killed

U.S. Diplomatic Courier Survives Jetliner Crash

WINDHOEK, South-West Africa (AP) — "My God, how could I have been so lucky?" American diplomatic courier Thomas Taylor asked rescuers who found him beside the wreckage of a plane crash that killed 122 persons.

Taylor, 36, of Tahlequah, Okla., was one of six survivors of the crash of a South African Airways Boeing 707 jetliner Saturday night. Three other Americans were reported aboard the plane, which was bound from Johannesburg, South Africa, to London, and at least one was known dead.

The U.S. Embassy in Pretoria, South Africa, confirmed today that the American diplomatic pouch Taylor took aboard in Johannesburg was recovered intact Sunday.

First reports said the plane carried \$700,000 worth of diamonds and these had not been found, but officials said no diamonds were in the cargo.

Taylor said today he was "much better than I should be. . . I'm able to move around without much pain. I didn't sleep much last night, but I slept most of yesterday."

The big jet had just taken off from Windhoek when it wobbled and plummeted out of sight. Watchers at the airport heard a crash and saw flames spurt into the sky.

Frankfurt, Germany, was reported to have a cracked rib, a minor leg injury and an injured thumb.

Taylor said he "wasn't able to do much because of the severe pain in my chest. I recall assisting two passengers from their seat belts and got some seats off them and got an obstacle off one man's legs. It was piling him down. I made him comfortable."

"I heard a woman crying outside the aircraft and I climbed out to see if I could assist, but it was dark and I couldn't see where she was. I saw lights approaching and I shouted toward them."

Final Steps Taken For Church Merger

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Final steps were being taken today for America's biggest church merger amid tensions underscored by a walkout of some Negro Methodists from a vast, solemn service of holy communion.

They staged the action to dramatize their charge that racism remains in plans for the new denomination—the United Methodist Church.

To be formally inaugurated Tuesday, it will join the 10.3-million-member Methodist Church and the 746,000-member Evangelical United Brethren Church into a single body.

"In sorrow we perceive a United Methodist Church still divided by the infamy of segregation and discrimination," said a statement by the protesting group, Black Methodists for Church Renewal.

Their walkout occurred in a hushed interlude of a mass celebration of the Lord's Supper Sunday night in the Dallas Memorial Auditorium.

About 40 Negroes, joined by more than a score of sympathetic whites, quietly filed out as the bread and cup were being distributed to a throng of about 10,000 church delegates and visitors.

The Rev. Cecil Williams of San Francisco spokesman for the demonstrators, said they refrained from taking communion to symbolize "the brokenness in the fellowship."

Their statement said they found no indication that the united church "intends to take immediate steps to deal with

A prison pal described Ray as virtually a nondrinker. The FBI describes Galt as a fancier of beer and vodka. There were other differences: Ray's neat appearance; Ray's careless appearance. Galt: neat accent; Ray: born in Alton, Ill. No Southern accent. Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark, when he came to Memphis after King was slain, at first ruled out a conspiracy, but then the FBI issued its warrant for Galt on a conspiracy charge. Police here have their own investigation of the slaying under way, and officials say detectives are working hard on the case. One theory within the Memphis department is that Eric Starvo Galt is a myth, painstakingly created by the conspirators as a smoke screen. "Somebody has muddied the waters," Price said.
