

Maybe Khesanh Never Was? The story of Khesanh may be, in miniature, the story of our whole Vietnam involvement.

It is the latest determination that Khesanh which gives sharp point to the story.

First, of course, American forces decided to go forward toward the beachhead, we decided to concentrate there a force much heavier than was needed to garrison a frontier watch-tower.

Second, in an effort to show power and determination, we made Khesanh itself more important than it otherwise would have been.

Third, once we had established there a force too large for its natural or logical military importance, we made Khesanh itself more important than it otherwise would have been.

Fourth, our move forward in such force attracted, as such moves usually do, an answering concentration from the enemy. Suddenly the military situation, giving Khesanh an importance it did not really deserve.

Fifth, the military situation developed into one of protracted preparation for semi-desperate defense, by our Marines, of an over-sized outpost which had become semi-isolated.

Sixth, it now became recognized that we couldn't retire from Khesanh even if we wanted to, so matter what kind of trap it might prove to be for us. We had to fight there, to the death, because we were there, and because the combined maneuver of both ourselves and the enemies had made this a showdown.

Seventh, for murky reasons and by movements no one has yet described very clearly, the showdown was dissolved, by movement without words. The enemy besiegers and our own relief columns seemed to recede and soon as if in some union, and soon our Marines were free to leave the field of destiny.

Eighth, it now develops that Khesanh, the site of the great showdown, the focal point of so many anxious days of the war, is going to be treated, from now on, as if it were almost nothing. We will keep a light token force there, truly an outpost watch force and nothing more, and we have no intention of being Khesanh again, as a particular piece of terrain it is vital we fight to the death. In fact, it doesn't seem to make much difference, in terms of military mood, who is there, or whether anybody is there.

Such the origin, evolution, and demise of Khesanh as the small vital piece of Southeast Asia we had to hold if our national honor and our national will in that area were to be defended. Khesanh was what it was when and while we made it so; when the flux of events and attitudes mix into something different, it becomes almost possible to say that Khesanh never was. It may be that, some day, it will matter that Vietnam never was either.

The Dangers of Over-Praise The pity of the statement former Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara has flung about the performances of Senator Robert Kennedy during the administration of his late brother is that the statement ends up enhancing nobody's reputation.

The fulsome, flattering picture of Bob Kennedy actually making the master behind the scenes strokes in the Cuban missile crisis, and the adulatory description of his marvelous motives and reasonings in crisis are so extreme as to suggest that they never came naturally from the father tight pen normally wielded by Mr. McNamara. The thing he said made him look a little ridiculous for saying them, and they actually deflate the object of his praise by making him seem too much too good to be true.

Read, for illustration, a portion of the McNamara hymn of glorification: "And he also opposed a massive surprise attack by a large country on a small country because he believed that

such an attack was inhuman, was contrary to the traditions and ideals of our country, an act of brutality for which the world would never forgive us. He (Robert) Kennedy understood that as now that, above all else, a United States President must, while defending our vital interests, prevent the confrontation between nuclear powers which can lead to nuclear holocaust. His (Robert's) objective was to force the missiles out of Cuba without war, and that objective was accomplished.

"It was accomplished by a strategy which he helped to shape and his brother directed. He (Bobby) showed a shrewd sense of diplomacy. Throughout the entire period of the crisis, a person of the most intense strain I have ever cooperated under, he remained calm and cool, firm but restrained, never nettled and never rattled.

"And he demonstrated them, as I have seen him do on so many occasions both before and since, a most extraordinary combination of energy and courage, compassion and wisdom.

The worst thing suggested by the public release of this state of over-praise is that the subject, when any newspaper or magazine actually has thought it good for his cause to have it published.

By Nightfall, Please This is Arbor Day, and if there is any grace in the weather there will be a token shower at the end of the day, to put a blessing upon whatever wonders the hand of man may have attempted to work during the day.

Who makes a tree, he knows full well. But what a lot of glorious glory, young and old, grows from the tree with each passing year, even until one gets to the stage of planting shade one will never sit in.

To Shoot Or Not To Shoot Now comes the inevitable debate about tactics employed by police in the latest wave of urban rioting. The debate can be unproductive unless important distinctions are made.

First, the discussion should steer clear of the issue of law enforcement. The issue is not one of law enforcement, but of the use of force. The issue is not one of law enforcement, but of the use of force.

Next, it should be noted that so far the most outspoken critics of police operations in the recent disorders have not been the experts on law enforcement. The critics have been politicians, such as Chicago's Mayor Richard J. Daley and Louisiana's Sen. Russell B. Long.

This criticism is understandable. Good politicians are naturally sensitive to the feelings of their voters and people reacted with horror and frustration at the sight of their police seemingly standing idle while looting and burning. They were picked clean of merchandise. Don't the people have a right to expect their police to do their job? And isn't an arsonist, as Mayor Daley correctly observed, a potential murderer?

The issue turns on the best way to do it. And here is where the experts—the professional police and military men—who have been hearing some hard lessons about riot control—should be listened to.

The biggest lesson these men have learned grows from the sad experience of Watts, Newark, Detroit, and elsewhere in recent years. Riotous lawlessness simply cannot be met in the same fashion as individual incidents of lawlessness. It has become apparent that especially in the early hours of major racial disorders, police cannot mobilize fast enough or act with reasonable safety to halt lawlessness. Conditions, in short, are like the conditions of war, and must be met with military tactics rather than conventional police methods.

This is a brutal fact, and one the country has been slow in accepting. But the experts seem to have accepted it. This has led to a strategy of quick deployment of military units—Federal and National Guard troops—and restraint by police. Firing upon rioters, except in self-defense or to protect the lives of others, has been ruled out.

The results need further evaluation but it appears this strategy succeeded reasonably well in the disorders earlier this month. We say reasonably well, because the aftermath has produced the kind of public reaction typified by Mayor Daley's rebuke to Chicago police and by a wave of gun-buying in some metropolitan areas. So one big task ahead is education.

The people need to be educated about the problems police and soldiers face in attempting to halt rioting. The people need to be educated, also, about how much greater will be the cost in lives and property if their law enforcers don't exercise restraint.

So far the debate has produced more education than it has. It would be disastrous if this confusion were allowed to cancel out the real progress that has been made in the rioting.

Rostow's group views Hanoi's acceptance of President Johnson's bid for talks as merely an extension of the war, in the opinion of some State Department officials, it wants to delay the talks while the U. S. position in Vietnam improves.

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Boundaries Changed For School Districts

Changes in the boundary lines of four Manchester elementary school districts—which become effective in September due to the opening of the new Globe Hollow School—were announced by the central administration.

Affected are the Nathan Hale, 410 on Center) McKee to Pine Washington, Verplanck and South School district lines. Globe Hollow is in the south district.

Superintendent of Schools William Curtis said the adjustments resulted from studies by the Board of Education and the administration over the past two years, and were made in line with the board's February vote to continue supporting the concept of neighborhood schools within the limits of available funds.

"In its final study of what changes seemed necessary to follow board policy," the superintendent said, "the administration also took into consideration balance in class sizes, expected growth of individual school districts due to construction of new dwellings, and balancing between schools to alleviate overcrowding to the extent possible."
