Rham District Preliminary Plans for Wing Approved by School Board

The Rham Board of Education voted Monday to approve the preliminary education specifications as guidelines for the architect. The specifications do not include equipment which will be reviewed carefully at a later date.

The specifications were compiled from individual department suggestions. Each department was requested to submit recommendations taking into consideration the schematic plans approved by the district. The specifications are broken down into areas where alterations to the existing building or new building expansion will take place.

Under the biology area, 2,860 square feet is estimated, plus two classroom laboratories, each 1,000 square feet; a greenhouse, animal room, preparation room and storage room. Under each area is a complete description.

The specifications call for 5,790 square feet in the music areas to include rehearsal rooms, music director's office, music library, uniform storage, instrument storage, four practice rooms, ensemble practice room, instrument repair and recording studio. It was stressed that sound insulation and sound-proofing should be specified for these areas.

The guidance department will be relocated in an area of the present library. There will be one guidance director's office, three counselors' rooms, reception and information area, a purpose area for group guidance and small meetings. The existing storage room and work area would be retained.

Library Addition

A junior high art room would take the other 800 square feet of the present library with general arts and crafts and art and painting located in two new rooms across the hall.

The total square footage for these two new art rooms is 2,168. There is also an art storage area planned.

The new library and audio-visual center totals 3,840 square feet and will include carrels to provide individual study areas that are each equipped with electrical outlets, carrels, receptacles to allow the use of A-V materials where appropriate; a general reading room to accommodate 10 students at one time; library instruction area; workroom; periodical storage; librarian's office, and A-V center.

A total area of 3,836 square feet is set aside for business education areas: manual typing room; electric typing room and shorthand laboratory (machine workroom); teacher's storage area and general business, and theory room. It is recommended that a glass partitioned model office be included in the office practice-bookkeeping room.

Physical education areas recommended are: auxiliary gymnasium; storage area for auxiliary gym; boys' locker room adequate for approximately 600 boys; girls' locker room to be provided by joining the present boys and girls locker rooms; outdoor athletic areas including track, four tennis courts, and a six-foot high cyclone fence around the athletic field.

Industrial Art

Hot Line in Los Angeles

Pilot Program for Teen-age Hangup

The Los Angeles Times reports that the teen-ager with a hangup, the whole world may seem cold and alien. Parents are beyond reach. Teachers are the enemy. Even friends can't help; they're teen-agers, too.

Maybe the hangup is crucial—panic over an experience with drugs; pregnancy; a suicidal impulse.

Maybe it's only the blues; a groundless anxiety; a loneliness. "Maybe all they need is somebody to talk to. Somebody who isn't emotionally involved. Somebody who isn't in authority. Somebody who will listen—you know?"

Hot line will listen. Hot line, a listening service for teenagers, is now in the fourth week of a 12-week program at Los Angeles Children's Hospital.

At the moment its facilities consist only of a small room in the hospital's adolescent unit, three telephones, and the 24-hour assistance of a commercial answering service.

Hot line was launched quietly, without public announcement or fanfare.

Small cards were handed out to pupils around the campuses of four high schools selected for the pilot program. There was no other publicity.

On one side, the cards had this message:

"Are you a teen with a hangup? Call 661-1015. We're here to listen. 6 p.m. to 12 p.m. daily, 8 p.m. to 4 a.m. Friday and Saturday."

On the other side, in large letters:

"Hot line triplex 6-1015."

In the first two weeks after the cards were given out, Hot Line received more than 60 calls.

The low-pressure beginning of hot line was deliberate.

"We didn't want it to have the stamp of the establishment," said Dr. Dale Garell, 32, director of the hospital's adolescent unit and one of the group of professionals and private citizens who thought up Hot Line and got it going.

"We didn't want the kids to think, 'Oh, this is a school program.' Or 'This is just another establishment agency.' That might kill call-ins."

"We wanted to make direct contact with the kids. They have to trust somebody. We wanted them to know there were no strings. We stress anonymity. 'When we get a call—our listener answers, 'Hello, this is Hot Line. I'm so and so. We give only a first name.' Can I help you?'"

One of the first things Dr. Garell and his colleagues learned was the reality of the "underground network" over which information travels in the teenage world. Two days after the cards were passed out, Dr. Garell said, students at a fifth high school knew all about Hot Line.

As Hot Line's founders expected, calls have come from teenagers with hangups ranging from drugs and the draft to pregnancy, sexual disease and even racial dilemmas.

But also as expected, "most have simply been in the category of 'I've got a problem—can we talk about it?'"

Working with Dr. Garell on Hot Line at the adolescent unit is Gerald Blasi, staff psychologist, who is evaluating the calls for a report on the 12-week pilot program.

Both Dr. Garell and the psychologist are gratified by the number of calls and the obvious sincerity of most.

"They're not all legitimate," Blasi conceded. "We've had a handful of put-ons. But the people on the phones are pretty sharp. They pick up the put-on but they go along with it."

If nothing else, even those people want to talk to someone. In some cases, underneath the put-on, it turns out they have a serious problem. We don't just shut the door."

An anticipated, perhaps the most frequent hangup involves a conflict with parents.

"They have a friend," they like a lot," Blasi said. "But the mother doesn't approve of the association. The kid doesn't see anything wrong. She's not

getting into trouble. But the anonymity he seeks, the privacy he needs, is a hangup. It's a hangup."

Loneliness, friendlessness, maybe they're new in the neighborhood. They don't know how to make friends. We ask how have they tried? What hasn't worked? We help them explore their feelings about themselves.

"We get calls from others who say, 'I don't know where I am or who I am or where I'm going,'" said Blasi. "They have no idea what field they're going into. Sometimes they think maybe they're crazy. This is what might be called an existential-type anxiety call."

One call was from a Negro teenager who wanted help with his thinking about "Black Power."

"He said he believed in Black Power, but not the use of force. He said he had been approached to join a Black Power Group. But didn't know what to do. How could he find out more about the organization?"

Hot Line does not try to give hard advice or to moralize, but to explore the problem and the possibilities, to help the hangup teenager see and appraise his own alternatives.

Backing up the telephone listeners are 15 expert counselors—physicians, ministers, psychologists, lawyers, public defenders, businessmen.

They are on call for a week at a time, leaving their phone numbers—wherever they may be—with the Hot Line answering service for immediate availability.

Few calls, however, have required the services of a counselor. Mostly, the tension is eased if the caller can talk it out with the listener.

The ability of the listeners is obviously the critical factor in Hot Line's success or failure.

Most of them are graduate students solicited through the employment agencies of UCLA, University of South California and other campuses in the Los Angeles area.

"In one week," said Dr. Garell, "we had 110 applicants. Of these we selected 25. Most were in their 20s. We tested 15 people at a time, taking the call of teen-agers and listeners. Then we selected 25 of the 30."

There are also a few professionals among the listeners—resident physicians, a computer analyst, a county probation officer.

Through the answering service, listeners can hook up their callers with any one of the on-call counselors. But this would be only at the caller's request.

Hot Line was conceived a year ago, not without grave doubts. The ground had been plowed, though, by Help Line, a similar service operated by the Temple Baptist Church for five years.

The Los Angeles County Department of Community Services showed an early interest, and last June a meeting was called and various "interested citizens and professionals were invited to come here and discuss it," Dr. Garell said.

Water Cleaner Than Conscience

Yesterday one-third of Manchester's eligible voters went to the polls in our special referendum and proclaimed to the world several things about Manchester.

They said by voting 601 to 994—an overwhelming margin at the polls for the kind of question anywhere any time—in favor of a \$1,101,000 bond issue for sewer projects that they believed in clean water.

And they said by voting an advisory \$250 million against Project Concern that Manchester had not yet achieved any equal dedication to a clean conscience.

They advertised to the outside world Manchester's concern with clean water, its willingness to deal with the problem of physical pollution.

They also advertised to the outside world the shame of their inability to think thoughts equally clean and wholesome about their fellow human beings.

Let us try to think and henceforth speak so that we can be proud of Project Concern in Manchester yesterday, yet individually uncontrollable fear that we here in Manchester might become part of the stream, demanding, extraordinary experience of our time.

Such fear is not to be waved away by any wind, or even with such a wind as the mayhem of Martin Luther King. It can be diminished and eliminated finally only by time and experience.

But meanwhile one of the great tragedies of the voting in Manchester yesterday can be pointed out.

Those who voted "no" on Project Concern because they were pleased directly into the hands of those who probably frighten them most. Those who voted "no" on Project Concern were, innocently enough, voting precisely the same way Stokely Carmichael, the symbol of the kind of revolution they want to keep far, far away from Manchester, would have voted if he had been in Manchester yesterday. To such as Carmichael, Project Concern is one of those subtle, but devastating, political programs which threatens the revolution because it tries to solve our problem short of revolution.

The only saving thing about Manchester's performance on Project Concern yesterday was that the vote was relatively light, and unrepresentative, and that it was divided so evenly that it constituted no real mandate of any kind for Board of Education decision on the actual continuation of the Project here. All we really got out of it was a bad name across this country, and a reminder that if we are to begin solving the world, Manchester is truly a place to begin.

As for the other results of the referendum, the votes on bonding issues should constitute an all-around referendum on any disposition on the part of any Manchester administration to go by the people for authority to issue bonds for vast amounts to revitalize neighborhoods and repair and renovate expenditures.

Of course Mary Cheney Library should have anti-conditioning, not by forwarding the bill for it to our children, but by having ourselves are willing to pay for it.

Fortunately, the proposed charter change which would have provided for election of the total Board of Education membership every two years seems to have failed to split the narrow victory on the machine, to have secured the necessary 15 per cent of the electorate affirmative vote, and so, apparently, falls of treatment. It is doubtful that three other silly and mischievous proposals for the compulsory residency in Manchester of certain town officials, did not likewise fall below the required percentage.

In summary, it was a great day in Manchester yesterday, for a clean water.

If the talks in Hanoi about a site for talks about talks thus seem to be about three times removed from real progress, there is this reassurance about them. As against a period when it could be complained that the two would-be negotiators were not even answering each other's messages, there is now a condition where they are meeting and answering one another as swiftly as they can report on each meeting and receive, from Hanoi and Washington, instructions for the next.

This is a thing which, from one point of view, is pitifully small. But when it is contrasted with what has gone before—with what existed before March 31—it is so much more than seemed possible or likely then that there is hope and encouragement from it.

There has now been established, in Hanoi, a site for talks about a site for talks about talks.

This is the state of the world, that a thing is slight and small and nevertheless seem such a big deal.

The Twin Roles Of Law

Once again, in a new, good, and healthy custom, this country celebrates May 1 as "Law Day."

Inevitably, in the particular context of our times, rather special definition or interpretation of the word law forces its way into our thoughts.

We tend, at this moment in our history at home and abroad, to think of law in terms of its role in relation to violence.

It has two such roles.

The first role of law with regard to violence is that it offers an alternative to violence as a solution to problems.

The role and procedure of law in it itself is a way for people to accomplish necessary and desirable things, to reach for justifiable objectives.

The second role of law with regard to violence is to control and restrain it when it does occur.

These two relationships of law to violence apply both at home and abroad.

There should be a way, through law, to resolve the problems of the American ghetto. But when this way is not taken and violence takes to the streets, the role of law becomes one of controlling the violence so it cannot injure the innocent.

There should be an instrumentality of law—the legislative, administrative, and constitutional functions of a world organization, a limited world government—to resolve the issues between nations and ideologies.

When, through failure to use such processes, violence erupts in the world, there should be law which has the clear authority and the routine police force to step in and maintain order, halt violence, and enforce a law against war.

Civilization is the growth of the rule of law.

Of the two uses of law, the use of law as the instrument of progress and justice needs a constant priority.

But, until human beings, individually and collectively, learn the use of law, it is also mandatory that the law be able to keep them from trying to settle their problems by acts of violence.

Until human nature, in its individual and its collective functioning, becomes more perfect, law is the only safety there is.

To make it grow, in prestige and, as the route toward progress, as the restraint of the methods which must be accepted as evil no matter how exorbitant their aims, is the kind of loyalty to law which must find continued growth inside all of us.

Coventry's Budget Hearing

To the Editor, The conduct of Coventry's annual budget hearing April 22, 1968, was pathetic and regrettable.

In recent years, the chairman of the board, commissions, and committees were given the opportunity to defend their budget requests prior to questions from the floor. In this manner, misconceptions concerning appropriations were clarified, and the minds of residents about how and where their tax dollars will be spent.

I fully appreciate the Board of Finance Chairman's penchant for hearing the entire budget in one night. But I feel his statement regarding my hearing was totally unnecessary. The scolding remarks reflected his own lack of understanding of the seven man finance board.

It was the Chairman's duty to merely conduct the hearing. His obvious disapproval of sections of the Board of Education's and Selectmen's budgets were apparent by his quickness in calling for brief answers, and in two instances, cutting the defense.

The ground rule of one comment per section of the budget was valid, but he did not adhere to it. Some citizens were permitted to speak more than once per section while others were reminded of the established ground rule.

The resulting confusion about some sections of the budget would have arisen if proper justification was permitted. Only through studying the individual itemized budgets of each department—which were not readily available to the public—could residents know why monies were requested.

The abbreviated form of the budget given to residents as they entered the hearing is usually sufficient since it is supplemented with adequate explanation. This year, it was not.

The proposed budget represents a 14 million increase for Coventry citizens, and the hearing should have been of vital importance to the Board of Finance.

The Finance Board has the authority and duty to cut in areas it deems necessary. Its judgment should be respected. It is unfortunate that the chairman, vested with this authority through his office, was indiscreet in his comments and actions.

His ideas do not represent those of all residents. This was not Peter Van Dine's budget hearing, but the budget hearing of the residents of Coventry. It might be wise for Mr. Van Dine to hear this in mind.

Rockefeller Urges Reversal Of Americanization in Viet

Rockefeller declared that "above all, a Vietnam settlement must be achieved in the wide context of world relations. So doing, we can seize the opportunity as a time of rare opportunity."

"We can turn a time of political crisis into a time of political creation," he said. "We can and we must take this narrow road of war and make it lead into the wide highway toward world peace and progress."

To accomplish this task, he said, "we must, at home, re-establish an atmosphere of candor, of trust, and of confidence. In a free society, the government and the people must believe in each other."

The United States must foster the same atmosphere of trust in the world at large, he said, basing our "hopes for peace and our relations with all peoples on cooperation—not compulsion."

"Over the last 20 years, our sense of our own military and economic power has seduced us too far from the principle and practice of consultation."

Examining the United States role and leadership in the world of nations he said "our concepts and our actions seem to have become increasingly less relevant to the realities and problems of a rapidly-changing world."

"Both at home and abroad, events are overruling us, often threatening to overwhelm us," he said. "Now, for the first time in decades, we seem to be losing faith in ourselves and in our constitutional and democratic institutions."

Rockefeller said, however, that he is convinced the problems "are not the result of a failure of our institutions. They are failures in human judgment. Our institutions are sound, and they have unique flexibility to meet changing conditions."

"We and the world have fallen out of touch—and out of step—with each other. Neither our ideas nor our goals nor our policies have kept pace with the speed of a revolutionary age—nor with the answers to its challenges," he said.

"We have in many ways reached the end of the road of the world relations—while still working with concepts and policies which were made for the start of this era," he said.

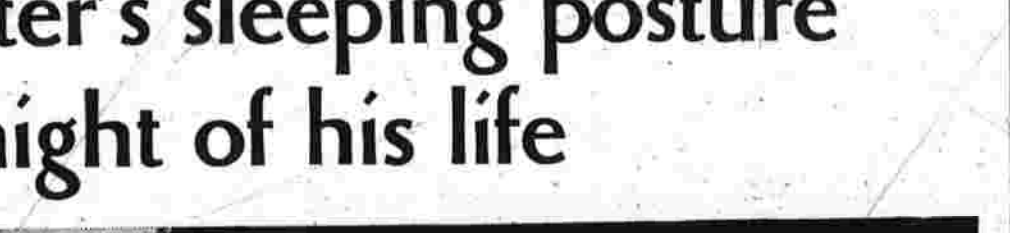

7-11 Mill Tax Rise Predicted at Hearing

The revised proposed budget for the 1969 fiscal year will raise the mill rate increase of seven to eleven mills, depending on the amount of income in the form of grants and surpluses. The present mill rate in 68 mills, but one back in charging an escrow on mortgaged property.

The seven mills was predicted by Board of Education Chairman David Cook, in answer to a question at last night's town board meeting to turn back a surplus of \$22,000.

Board of Finance Chairman Howard Wolfanger declined to speculate on the mill rate. "We cannot make any forecasts," he stated.

Charles Mayer of Cider Mill Rd. appeared to express the view of many present when he said, "For seven or eight mills the town affords the best value for the money. The items are needed." More than 200 residents attended the hearing.

The finance board's release of an 11-mill increase figure was sharply criticized at the end of the meeting by Cook and others attending.

"The leadership ever tells us what the town's income is," David Muffland of Virginia Lane said. "We come in here and hear to listen to a budget presented based only on anticipated expenditures. The people get excited," he added.

Wolfanger promised to have the revised figures available at the annual town meeting. The 11-mill figure merely translated the dollar difference between the proposed budget compared to the present one, he explained.

Meeting Room 204 was packed with a partial list of estimated revenue was included in the work sheet budgets passed out at the meeting last night. They were released prior to the meeting.

The hearing was lengthy since Wolfanger permitted everyone to voice their comments on all the individual budget items.

Several votes were taken on two controversial items, resulting in overwhelming approval for the purchase of a new ambulance, and for a two-way radio and monitor for the fire department. Plotted aerial maps of the town won by a 50-27 vote.

Accord Seen Near In Phone Strike

 Negotiations were under way in New York, Washington, Chicago, Omaha, Kansas, Indianapolis, Los Angeles, Boston, Cleveland, Milwaukee, Newark, Detroit, Cincinnati, Seattle, Baltimore and Charleston, W.Va.

Broken the previous impasse in the 2-week-old nationwide telephone strike reportedly have virtually wrapped up a wage settlement and are close to an overall contract agreement that could come as early as today.

"We see the light now and I am hopeful we will soon be at the point where a total package is worked out," said President Joseph A. Beirne of the striking A.F.L.-C.I.O. Communications Workers of America.

"We are now seeing eye to eye on wage levels that the union can live with," the CWA chief added.

Beirne said negotiators for some 200,000 workers involved in the strike resumed formal bargaining Tuesday with Bell Telephone System representatives for the first time since the walkout.

A union spokesman in Washington denied meanwhile a statement by Phil Padgett, president of CWA Local 250 in Atlanta, that a settlement already had been reached.

Any contract settlement is expected to set a pattern for all the approximately 600,000 workers in the Bell System.

But President Gordon Freeman of the AFL-CIO International Union of Electrical Workers said the IUEW, representing some 80,000 telephone workers, wouldn't be bound by the results of what he called "secret" company negotiations with the Communications Workers.

Before the strike, the Communications Workers rejected a wage increase offer estimated by the company as worth 3.4 percent a year. Bell spokesmen said the union was demanding 7.8 percent.

Telephone installers, who set the pattern for wage hikes in the industry, averaged \$3.27 per hour before the strike. The installers, employed by the Bell subsidiary Western Electric Co., are striking in about 40 states.

Approximately 140,000 Bell System workers are striking in 18 states, and thousands of others are refusing to cross installers' picket lines in all 40 states. These workers average \$2.76 per hour.

More than 18,000 members of the Independent International Brotherhood of Telephone Workers, who usually follow the wage pattern negotiated by the Communications Workers, are striking in New England.

And a Bell contract covering 4,600 Virginia workers is scheduled to expire at midnight tonight.

"Despite the industry's first nationwide strike in 21 years, most telephone service has been little disrupted."

Eleven enemy soldiers were reported in the valley.

In Da Nang, about 50 miles south of Hue, South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu said a May Day labor rally "the government is determined to take care of the people living in the northern provinces, the area of hardest fighting."

Then reiterated that his government never will negotiate with the Viet Cong and said it will not cede "even one centimeter" of land to North Vietnam.

'Poor' Campaign Set To Gather Troops
 WASHINGTON (AP)—The first stage of the Poor People's Campaign prepares to leave the nation's capital, bent on gathering troops for a massive second-wave assault on government.

Oral Sore Might Be Cancerous

LOS ANGELES—Mouth cancers are less common than those that usually begin as painless sores that, unluckily, don't seem to be anything to worry about, a Boston surgeon and research investigator said Saturday.

They are neglected, Dr. Blake Cady of the Leaky Clinic Foundation said in an interview. He said the painless sores are especially dangerous for pipe and cigar smokers, who are used to having sores in their mouths.

Some sores are not innocent even though relatively painless. Dr. Cady said about 10 per cent of more than 600 cases of mouth cancer studies by him and Dr. Daniel Catin were found in the mouths of men who smoked tobacco.

He said 30 percent of mouth cancer patients are pipe or cigar smokers, compared with the 10 per cent of the entire population that smokes pipes or cigars.

Dr. Cady said he thinks there is a link between the many mouth cancers caused by the chemical products of burning or chewing tobacco rather than by the smoke itself or the frequently-blamed, pressure of pipe or cigar on the tongue.

In India people who chew betel nuts unsmoked with tobacco do not have higher than average chance of developing mouth cancer. But people who do chew tobacco mixed with betel nuts have a high incidence of mouth cancer.

With certain African peoples there is a higher rate of cancer of the nose and pharynx than of the mouth and lung, probably because they spend a lot of time in tiny, smoke-filled huts, collecting the cancer-causing chemicals on the membranes of their noses and throats as they breathe.

The highest percentage of mouth cancer begin low on the inside of the cheeks on both sides of the tongue, probably because that is where saliva "pools," Dr. Cady said. The smoker's saliva, of course, is copious and is a solution of the chemical products of burned tobacco, some of which have been proved to cause cancer.

Despite recent efforts to warn the public of the potential dangers of persistent mouth sores, a third of the 600 cases Dr. Cady and Catin reviewed had already spread to lymph nodes in the neck or jaw when first brought to a doctor's attention.

"As recently as 1960 more than 10 per cent of mouth cancers that had already spread had not been suspected to be cancer, even by the patients' dentists," Dr. Cady said.

"Every dentist ought to be able to recognize mouth cancer," he said.

Even though there is still neglect, the survival rate of mouth cancer victims has improved from 50 per cent in 1940 to 64 per cent in 1967 among the 600 cases studied.

Dr. Cady was a speaker at the 21st annual meeting of the James Ewing Society, an organization of specialists in the diagnosis and treatment of cancer. The society's meeting at the Huntington Sheraton ended Saturday.

Bathing Rats, Drunken Fish Under Study

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—Rats that take showers, drunken goldfish and perspicacious pigeons engaged the attention of psychologists here Saturday.

The creatures were subjects of laboratory experiments reported here during the 98th annual meeting of the Eastern Psychological Association.

Alan N. Epstein and Earnest Milstone of the University of Pennsylvania told of their success in training rats to take showers.

They explained that rats, being unable physically to sweat or pant, normally keep cool by covering themselves with their own saliva.

Through surgery, the researchers cut off the animal's flow of saliva. The rats were then placed in training cases, where they quickly learned that pressing a bar would bring a cooling spray of water. Thereafter, they took showers whenever it appeared that they felt warm.

"Behavior adaptation to alcohol in the goldfish" was the title of a paper presented by Dr. Ralph S. Hyback of Boston City Hospital.

Eight large goldfish were placed in a tank of water and taught to swim through a maze. Wrong turns being punished with light electric shocks.

They then were put in a maze containing part alcohol. The fish showed poorer performances at first, but after three days appeared to have adapted to the new environment.

Ronald K. Siegel of Dalhousie University, Halifax, Nova Scotia, reported on "attentional factors in pigeon concept formation."

Twelve homing pigeons learned to recognize the human form in a series of slides presented to them. If a slide showed a human figure, the pigeon responded to this by pressing a key, he was rewarded with food.

The birds eventually learned to recognize both human beings and Barbie dolls, and were of ten correct even when the slides were shown somewhat out of focus.
