SAIGON (AP)—American tanks and armored personnel carriers joined the new battle of Saigon today, cutting off a Viet Cong attack on the southwest in the third day of hard fighting on the city's fringes.

U.S. troops had not been used inside Saigon since they helped smash the Viet Cong's lunar new year offensive in February. In the latest assaults, which began Sunday, the Americans have been outside the capital searching the enemy units which might further threaten the city.

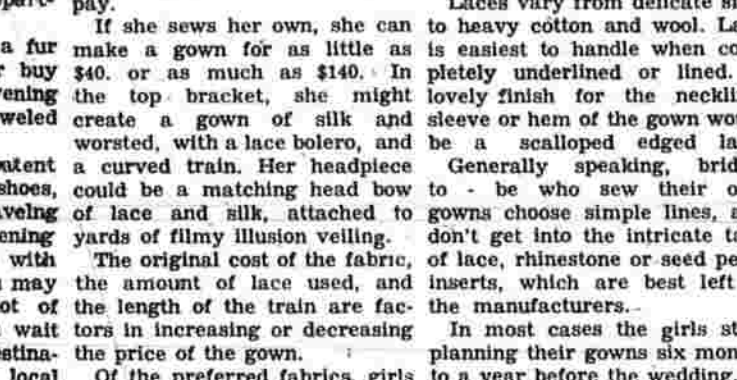

Use Shades For Colors

Apartment dwellers who have a window that looks out on ugliness—whether it's an unappealing blank wall or an air shaft—can help matters by decorating an ordinary window shade.

The list of possibilities is nearly endless. Materials include fringe, braids, gimp and tape in hundreds of colors. For a very modern room, block outlines in strong colors at the top and bottom of the shade offer contrast. If delicacy is desired, outline the bottom edge in a light color, using contrasting color. The edges of the window frame can also be decorated with braid, particularly eye-catching if the window is a small one, as this technique enlarges the window.

In addition to the standard trimmings, ribbons (in grosgrain, velvet or novelty weaves), eyelid edging, rick rack and other details can be used as design.

If you prefer an oval or scalloped edging at the bottom of the shade, order a shade with what is called an unfinished "apron" and cut it to suit your own taste.

A novice decorator might do well to stretch the shade on the floor, and arrange the trim for a trial preview, before applying its adhesive. The preferred adhesive, since it is very difficult to set trim on shades.

Women Told to Help Solve Crisis Facing Nation Today

"An urgency faces our country today," Mrs. Robert B. Gates, vice president of Church Women United (CWU) of Connecticut said Friday at a May Fellowship Day observance at Trinity Covenant Church. "A nationwide call has come for Church Women United to use every neighborhood, in every town, to help solve the crisis facing this nation," she added.

Mrs. Gates, the wife of a Baptist minister in Myrtle, spoke to about 40 women. She quoted from the U.S. Relief Commission Reports that white institutions are responsible for white racism because "they make it, are implicated in it, maintain it, and condone it. Our apathy," she added, "is responsible for the poverty and tension that is part of it. We have legislation to promote social justice, but not the will or courage for implementation of true equality and dignity for all."

She reminded her listeners that CWU is ecumenical and inter-racial, and called upon them to be a movement with a mission, and influence for change in the world, to encourage all church women to come together, to go out together in every neighborhood, in every town as an instrument for his reconciling love. "That," she said, "is our responsibility as Christian women today. We have an choice—we must act."

The offering taken at the service, \$26, will benefit the work of local and state councils of the CWU. Manchester's share will be used to start an organization called FWIB (the ancient symbol for a Christian) which provides Good Samaritans who respond to any emergency without cost.

Nearly \$250,000 Behind UAW Faces Ouster For Tardy Dues

WASHINGTON (AP) — Walter Reuther's United Auto Workers union, currently reeling from threats to quit the 14-million-member AFL-CIO, faces the possibility of being kicked out next week for nonpayment of dues.

The Auto Workers, issuing new attacks on AFL-CIO President George Meany's leadership from its convention in Atlantic City, will be three months and about \$250,000 behind in dues May 15 and face automatic exclusion, informed sources said.

The AFL-CIO Executive Council, meeting next week, may take up the matter and some sources predict a majority of its members may be angered enough to oust Reuther's union if it doesn't pay up.

Sources say AFL-CIO leaders were miffed at Reuther's announcement the Auto Workers may put its per capita AFL-CIO dues in escrow pending settlement of its demands for internal reform of the federation.

The Auto Workers, largest of the AFL-CIO's 128 unions, pays about \$1 million a year into its treasury.

One source, noting Reuther's frequent threats over the past 16 months to secede from the federation, said an ouster would be "going out with a whimper instead of a bang."

This is the second time in its long feud with the AFL-CIO that the Auto Workers has withdrawn dues almost up to the suspension deadline.

Meany previously ignored most of Reuther's actions. But there are new elements in the deepening split between the two men who founded the AFL-CIO 15 years ago by merging Meany's Auto Workers Federation of Labor with the Reuther-led Congress of Industrial Organizations.

They are also now moving apart on presidential politics and the impending Poor People's Campaign in the nation's capital.

Meany, 73, is throwing the AFL-CIO's support behind Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey. The 60-year-old Reuther, re-elected last year, says (See Page Eleven)

French Aide Sees Broad Peace Talks

PARIS (AP) — French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville expressed the view today the United States and North Vietnam will hold broad peace talks in Paris on ending the Vietnam war and not limit their contacts to halting U.S. bombing of the North.

Couve de Murville told the French Cabinet it was his belief that the talks, scheduled tentatively for next week, will consist of both preliminary talks and true negotiations. He said there are no plans to change the conference site of the negotiating teams for the two stages.

Couve de Murville's remarks were reported to newsmen by Information Minister Georges Corne.

When Hanoi proposed Paris as the preliminary talks site it said they should be "to determine with the U.S. side the unconditionality of the U.S. bombing raids and all other acts of war" against North Vietnam.

Then, Hanoi said that the second round of talks would be held "on other problems of concern to the two sides."

Speculation was that the second round of talks would be held somewhere other than Paris.

Officially, the U.S. State Department officials cautiously agreed with Couve de Murville's view that North Vietnam and the United States will telegraph the first diplomatic contacts and preliminary talks to a Vietnam war settlement into a single phase of the opening negotiations.

However, there was a tendency among officials here to be wary of predicting the actions of the North Vietnamese.

"We will have to wait and see how the talks develop," one official said, and his reaction was typical. "It will depend upon how North Vietnam decides to play the negotiations."

The original design for the negotiations, called for three phases—diplomatic contacts, preliminary talks and finally full negotiations.

From a close reading of North Vietnamese agreement to send diplomatic representatives to Paris to meet with the United States, U.S. officials believe that Hanoi by its language has taken the first and second stages.

North Vietnam has made a constant demand that the purpose of the initial diplomatic talks shall be to discuss a halt to the U.S. bombing of North Vietnam and all other acts of war against the North to be followed by other talks of mutual concern.

Couve de Murville's remarks to the Cabinet came as U.S. and French officials, with the French assisting, went ahead with technical arrangements for the meetings.
