

## Allied Troops Crush 9-Day Saigon Attack

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. Command says allied troops have crushed the main thrust of the Communist command's nine-day-old attack on Saigon, but it also announced the loss of a Special Forces camp 350 miles to the northeast.

## Pound Sinks to Low Level

LONDON (AP) — The British pound today hit its lowest level since it was devalued last November, \$2.38825.

The slide started last Friday after newspaper tycoon Cecil King, a part-time director of the Bank of England, warned that Britain faced the worst financial crisis in its history.

King made this statement in an attack on Prime Minister Harold Wilson and resigned from the Bank.

The Bank, which supported the pound to steady the market last Friday, did not immediately appear to be intervening today.

Official middle parity level is \$2.40. The previous lowest was \$2.388 in mid-March.

Dealers said there was not a lot of business going on today. "The rate has fallen quite sharply without much business to back up the movement," one dealer said.

Dealers said several factors were affecting the market and there was not much interest in the buying side in advance of British trade figures to be issued Tuesday.

The stock exchange showed some early recovery from Friday's losses. Leading shares regained a few pence in early deals, but the recovery appeared half-hearted and some of the morning rises were trimmed back fairly quickly.

## Operators of Mines Won't Let Men Return

HOMINY FALLS, W.Va. (AP) — Mine operators are refusing to send their men back to work in honeycombed Big Sewell Mountain until rescue workers locate the bodies of 10 men believed to have drowned in a flooded coal shaft here, an official said.

There are at least nine active mines in the mountain, owned by Maust Coal Co. and the Imperial Coal Co. Some are operated by subsidiaries of these large companies and others by independent contractors.

In addition there is a maze of abandoned mine tunnels—and the mine operators have realized that they too might be tunnelling dangerously close to one of these old flooded workings.

Twenty-five men were trapped underground May 6 when a crew of miners working in the Gauley Coal and Coke Co. No. 8 mine—a Maust subsidiary—accidentally broke into a flooded abandoned shaft known as the McKenzie mine, C.E. Richardson, Maust president, said.

## Palomba Quits in Waterbury

WATERBURY (AP) — Mayor Frederick W. Palomba announced his resignation today, effective June 1.

Palomba, 40, is still recuperating from a heart attack suffered in February and said he felt he could not devote the necessary time to mayoral duties.

George F. Harlamon, president of the Board of Aldermen who has been acting mayor, will become mayor June 1. Both Harlamon and Palomba are Republicans. Palomba was elected to his second two-year term in the fall of 1966.

Palomba, who has been recuperating at his home, said doctors have told him he could probably resume an eight-hour work day, but advised him to forego the additional pressure of being mayor. Palomba said he hoped to return to the insurance and real estate business soon.

Harlamon is a Waterbury bank executive. Palomba made his announcement at his home, saying he took the step because he was unable to put in the 12-to-13 hour day required of the city's chief executive without jeopardizing his chances for a complete recovery.

He said he "definitely" was not removing himself from the world of politics. "Due to the critical times faced by the city, I feel it is of the utmost importance to have a full-time mayor who can be available for a lengthy day's work," Palomba said.

This was an apparent reference to financial and racial problems facing Waterbury. He said his decision was the result of another examination Friday by his physician, Dr. Jasper Smith. He said he advised only members of his family, Harlamon and a few of his closest political allies of his decision. He said his resignation was based solely on medical consideration, and that the June 1 effective date was set after a conference with Harlamon.

Between now and June 1, Palomba said he would be briefing Harlamon in order to "insure an orderly turnover of all government business."

# U.S., Hanoi Urge Each Other To Scale Down War Efforts

PARIS (AP) — The United States and North Vietnam challenged each other today to take new steps to scale down the war in Southeast Asia. Both pledged serious efforts to find some basis for a peaceful settlement.

Ambassador Xuan Thuy of North Vietnam, who spoke first at the opening round of substantive talks, called on the United States to end the rest of the bombing and "all other acts of war" against his country, but did so in words softer than expected. He made no threat of breaking off the talks if the demand is not quickly granted.

President Johnson's spokesman, Ambassador W. Averell Harriman, asked for some sign of military restraint by North Vietnam that would meet the President's request for a de-escalation response to his March 31 ban of part of the bombing.

What actually has happened, Harriman charged, is that North Vietnam has moved "substantial and increasing numbers of troops and supplies from the North to the South."

Thuy made the opening statement, a U.S. spokesman said, after Harriman suggested that he lead off. It was Harriman's second initiative in courtesy.

When the two delegations assembled in the International Conference Center, Thuy and his group entered the glittering, gray and gold grand saloon a few seconds ahead of Harriman.

When the American diplomatic trouble shooter caught sight of the slight, smiling Vietnamese Communist official he quickly turned, walked to him with extended hand and said "Mr. Thuy." Thuy smiled and they shook hands.

That was how the talks began after years of violence and long, frustrating months of effort to bring the two governments into direct ambassadorial discussions. After 3 hours and 15 minutes they adjourned to meet again Wednesday.

U.S. officials expected a blast from Thuy and they were not surprised when they got it. He accused the United States of aggression in South Vietnam and said the more it was defeated the more cruelly it responded—increasing attacks and sending in troops. But when he put the often-stated demand that all attacks on North Vietnam must stop before any other subjects can be discussed, he avoided threats and warnings and said his government is "hoping that the problem... will be solved."

## Poor Marchers Erecting Tent

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Poor People's Campaign, officially launched with a Mother's Day march through a riot-ridden Negro slum, now begins erecting the tent city to house some 3,000 demonstrators slowly covering on the city.

The first 450 of the campaign's rank and file reached the nation's capital over the weekend. More are scheduled to arrive by week's end.

Mrs. Martin Luther King Jr., widow of the slain civil rights leader who conceived the campaign as a means of winning more federal help for the poor, led Sunday's march.

The demonstration, soaked by rain for most of its duration, went off without incident. Police Lt. E. J. Prete estimated the

number of marchers at between 2,000 and 3,500.

Today the Rev. Ralph David Abernathy, King's successor as head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, is to drive a stake into parkland near the Lincoln Memorial and thus signal the start of construction of shelters in what campaign leaders call Resurrection City.

The 15-acre site runs parallel to the reflecting pool between the Lincoln Memorial and the Washington Monument.

The Mother's Day march was sponsored by the Nationwide Welfare Rights Organization (NWWRO), which sent delegations from chapters across the nation.

The marchers, including Negroes and whites, American

Indians and Mexican-Americans, assembled at the John F. Kennedy Playground deep in one of the city's poorest Negro neighborhoods.

The marchers passed the ruins of stores looted and burned during three nights of violence that followed the April 4 slaying of King in Memphis.

To get a better view, bystanders clambered onto broken walls, stood on piles of brick and girders, twisted and blackened by the fires.

Campaign marshals wearing black armbands with white letters PPC strove with waving arms and blaring bullhorns to maintain order and discipline.

The marchers strolled arm in arm down the middle of the street, singing songs such as

"We Shall Overcome" that were heard on the many marches led by King.

The rain forced cancellation of a scheduled stop at the Congressional Club, an organization of wives of members of Congress.

March leaders had asked for a meeting with club officers and had been turned down. As an alternative they planned to divert part of the march to the club to leave a Mother's Day card and a list of demands. President of the club is Mrs. Wilbur D. Mills, wife of the Arkansas Democrat who heads the powerful House Ways and Means Committee.

Earlier Sunday, NWWRO members, mostly mothers on wel-

## Humphrey Backers Claim 7 State Wins

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey's backers are claiming seven state convention victories in a row in his bid to pick up enough delegate votes for the Democratic presidential nomination.

They said today Humphrey has a minimum of 169 pledged delegates after victories in Arizona, Alaska, Maryland, Delaware, Nevada, Wyoming—and Hawaii where party officials say he got at least 20 of 28 delegates elected Sunday night.

Humphrey's chief lieutenants—Sens. Walter F. Mondale and Fred Harris—had said earlier they think they have 1,100 of the 1,312 delegate votes needed for nomination at the Democratic National Convention.

The vice president, also is expected to gain delegates Tuesday in the Nebraska primary where he has strong support among delegate candidates whose names are best known in the state.

But the major focus in Nebraska will be on the race between Democratic presidential rival Sens. Robert F. Kennedy and Eugene J. McCarthy, the only major announced Democratic candidates on the ballot.

McCarthy said after Indiana's primary last week that Nebraska would offer the face-to-face contest Indiana did not because of the favorite-son candidacy of Gov. Roger D. Branigin.

thinks Humphrey will get a substantial write-in vote.

Tiemann also said he expects Republican presidential candidate Richard M. Nixon to get 70 per cent of the vote. Rival New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's supporters are seeking write-in votes and California Gov. Ronald Reagan, a favorite-son candidate, will be on the ballot.

The Nebraska primary highlights a week of political activity in which six states will name 95 delegates to the Democratic convention and 55 to the Republican convention.

Aside from primaries in Nebraska and West Virginia, Republican delegates will be selected by party organizations in Rhode Island, Vermont and Louisiana and Democratic delegates will be selected in Maine.

The West Virginia primary—in sharp contrast to the 1960 battle between Humphrey and John F. Kennedy—will have no presidential preference race Tuesday.

The major interest in West Virginia centers on the race for governor. Incumbent Gov. Hulett C. Smith cannot succeed himself.

## Priest in Paris Another Transplant Done

A Paris hospital said today a patient was in excellent condition after a heart transplant Sunday, and medical sources identified him as a 45-year-old Roman Catholic priest who had suffered 30 heart attacks.

At the Houston Tex., hospital where three transplants were performed in one week, one of the two surviving patients was reported in "serious but improving" condition and the other was in excellent shape.

The bulletin from Broussais Hospital in Paris on France's third and the world's 14th human heart transplant said only that the hospital's team had performed the operation "under satisfactory conditions and the state of the patient is excellent."

France's other two heart recipients are dead. Clovis Roblain, 66, died 52 hours after an operation April 27-28 by Dr. Christian Cabrol. Elie Joseph Reynes, 65, died Friday, 59 hours after his operation by Dr. Eric Negres.

Four heart recipients survive in other nations.

John W. Stuckwisch, 62, at St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital in Houston, is the man listed in serious condition. But a spokesman said: "His dramatic recovery from the desperate operation last Tuesday and steady improvement are considered to be encouraging."

### Hebron School Deficit of \$4,700 Seen

Superintendent Aram Demarjan reported to the Board of Education last week that he estimated a deficit in the elementary school budget of \$4,700. In an earlier estimate made in January, he had said the deficit could be \$4,000.

The major areas where additional funds have been needed are: extra staff put on in January, two children who were sent to the perceptually handicapped class in Andover, boiler breakdown at the Hebron Elementary school and rent for the classroom space outside of the school for four months. An amount of \$2,700 of the appropriated salaries was not used but was not enough to offset the deficit.

The board approved the appointment of two teachers for the 1968-69 school year. Mrs. Mary Johnson of Marlborough will assume a grade 2 position. She is a 1966 graduate of Eastern Connecticut State College and has taught for two-and-a-half years in Colchester. She will receive \$4,000 annually.

Mrs. Marianna Stout of New Britain, N. Y., was approved for the position of kindergarten teacher. She received her B.S. from Syracuse College in 1967 and will receive her Masters from the State University of New York in New Paltz in June.

The administration announced that it will meet with Thornton Secor of the State Conservation Dept. on May 15 to discuss the development of the recreational area adjacent to the Gilead Hill School.

Martin Ross reported the results of the hot lunch survey recently taken at the elementary schools last week. The number of families with children in kindergarten through Grade 4 is 328. Of this number, 283 families replied or 86 per cent. Of those that replied, 243 families were in favor of the program or 86 per cent of 243.

The survey also polled interest in the positions of manager-nurse and health policies. These positions will be held on May 13.

Little has said that, should he decide to run, he is confident that he would get the endorsement of the Republican Town Committee.

Another who still is considering whether to seek the 20th District GOP nomination is Herbert Phelan. Also interested is Town Director David Odegard.

The Democrats still being mentioned as possible candidates in the 19th Assembly District are former state representative and now house clerk Paul Grobner, and town director and former mayor Francis Mahoney. Mr. Grobner is expected to run for Mr. O'Brien's seat in the 19th Assembly District.

In the 18th Assembly District, also East-West, Mr. and Mrs. Albert LaPlant, first James P. O'Brien, second William McDougall, and Richard Pasquale and Thomas Landers, Jr.

Also East-West, Mr. and Mrs. Donald Genova is expected to seek reelection, only former town director John Hutchinson appears interested in the Democratic nomination.
