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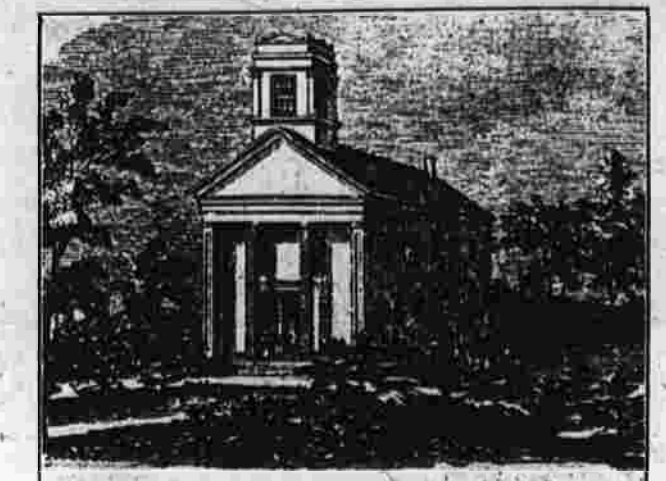

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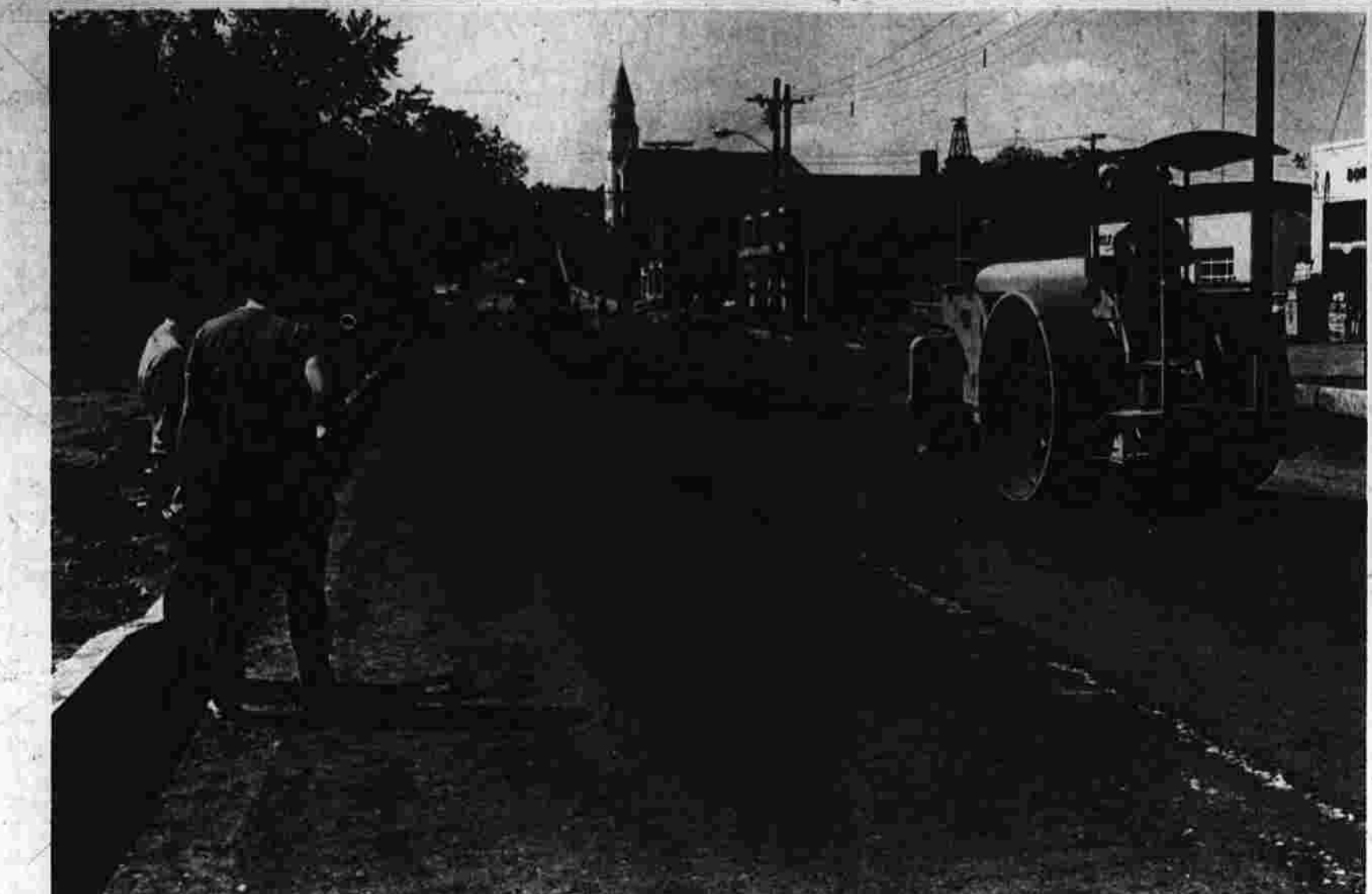
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Building Up Where Once They Tore Down for Renewal

U.S. Will Not Be Defeated While Talks On, LBJ Warns

(Continued from Page One) sidered Thuy's statement a threat. He replied that he didn't take it as "much of a threat," that it seemed to him to mean naturally from other objects they had been discussing. Then Harriman added: "It's always a possibility, you know, that these talks would break down. The talks can just as well break down on the United States side as they (the North Vietnamese) are taking advantage of the restraint in the bombing." Earlier in the day, Harriman had dismissed the Thuy statement of Wednesday as a matter not to be taken seriously. In his second encounter with newsmen at midday, he apparently had given the question further thought and decided to counter the North Vietnamese maneuver with one of his own. This is the suggestion that the talks might fail on the American side, too. Involved in this appeared to be the obvious question of who would be blamed if in fact the talks did eventually collapse. Harriman cautioned against taking his discussion of the problem as any prediction of collapse. "My own judgment," he said, "is that there's here for a long time, that the other side feels they want to have talks and certainly President Johnson has shown every indication of wanting to come to agreement. "You can't keep talking going just as a propaganda medium. We have to move into a period of more productive results." Harriman was asked whether the North Vietnamese were taking advantage of the bombing limitation which President Johnson ordered March 31 in a move which eventually led to the talks here. He replied: "So far, they have not restrained their infiltration. "They have not restrained action. They are still attacking Saigon and the civilian population, which is rather tragic." In his earlier talk with newsmen, Harriman said: "The North Vietnamese are going to have to face up to realities sooner or later." With the conference in recess until Monday, Harriman said he would spend the time until then looking into various aspects of the conference and expected to have some new ideas to talk about by Monday. Harriman and Thuy now have met four times in the past 10 days, and each time they have come away standing rigidly on their original position. U.S. spokesmen have called the North Vietnamese "stubborn." The Vietnamese called the Americans "obstinate." The stumbling block is always the same—North Vietnamese insistence on an unconditional end to U.S. bombing of their country and U.S. withdrawal from their local restraint on Hanoi's part must accompany a halt in the bombing. "The talks are frozen," said one neutral diplomat after Wednesday's three-hour meeting. At that meeting Thuy rejected Harriman's proposal that both delegations stop making their conference statements public. Harriman said this would

Not 'Little Green Men' Scientist Believes Signals Come from Lifeless Object

WASHINGTON (AP) — A British scientist who once worried that "little green men" were sending radio messages to earth from outer space—has concluded the signals came from lifeless objects. Frank Drake, director of the Arecibo Observatory at Puerto Rico, said he and other astronomers working on the signals from an intergalactic civilization, the fact there is more than one known pulsar does not argue against such an admittedly long-shot possibility. At least two of the pulsars are estimated to be about 150 light years—more than a quadrillion miles—from the earth, Smith said. Britain's radio astronomers, he said, now believe the pulsars are somewhat unusual versions of "white dwarf" stars—stars whose nuclear fires have largely burned out. He said he and his colleagues at Cambridge University "were seriously worried" about the "little green men" possibility. "And it was not until early this year that they thought the signals could be interpreted as astronomical objects," rather than as evidence of extraterrestrial life," said Smith. He said he and his colleagues at Jodrell Bank had shared that view. Smith's report left open a possible argument with an American astronomer as to what constitutes proof against the radio waves being signals from an advanced civilization. 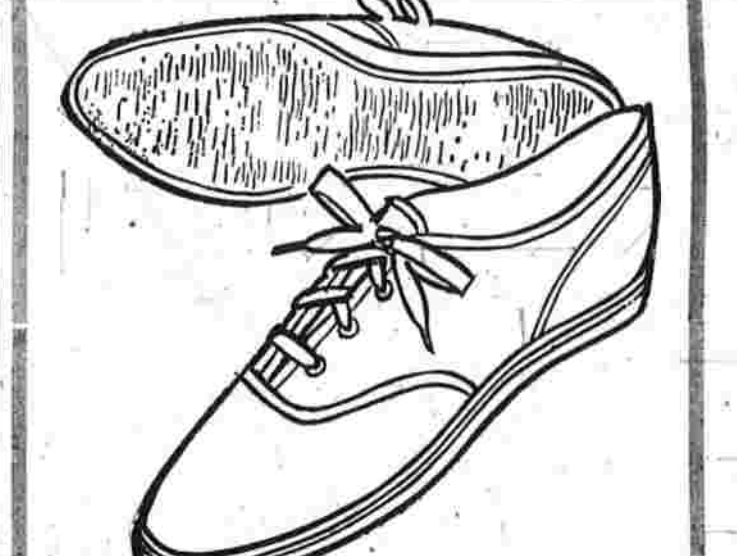

Potholes, Washboard Celebrated in Novel

A Manchester novelist in her book, "The O.B.'s," has an obitician's view of the roads in her fictional Mitchell City. "You don't have to see the city line to know where you are. Pot holes and washboards! There's one by the rotary I hit every day."

The author, Mrs. Virginia Mercer, said, "I used what I knew about Manchester to write the story. The point of that doctor's statement was that such a wealthy city should have such absolutely miserable roads."

Manchester has done little since her book came out in 1964 to change the reputation the town has earned for its roads. W. Middle Tpk. grows more and more rutted and bumpy. Flooding is ruining more and more secondary roads and more front ends are thrown out of alignment each year.

The Public Works Dept. has lists of roads that "could use" major reconstruction now. Almost all outlying roads such as Bush Hill Rd., Line St., Fern St., Gardner St., Birch Hill Rd. and Tolland Tpk. will pose "serious" construction problems within 10 years, according to Highway Supt. Herman Pantalone. Those roads are only tarred, he said.

Listed as "the most critical" of all town roads is W. Middle Tpk. It is the most traveled in town roads and has the "worst" surface, according to William O'Neill, public works director.

Other town roads embarrassing Manchester include a part of Turner St., Woodland St., Hilliard St., Bolton St., N. Elm St., Dover Rd., part of School St., and much of Broad St., according to the lists.

Money, or the lack of it, is the "root" cause of the town's poor roads, according to town officials. This is their answer to irate motorists and the judges when suits for road-caused damage appear in court.

The town's engineers go into more detail and begin by explaining how a "good" road should be built.

"The most critical part of road construction is drainage, they said. Adequate drainage pads, and in swampy areas, perforated pipes are needed under the road."

Water on, under, or in the pavement can freeze in the cold months and crack the road apart. Frost heaves do their part, and in warmer months, a soaked road, slowly weakens.

The engineers claim most of Manchester's critical road problems are caused by poor drainage. Flooding occurs regularly on certain roads due to small drains and poor runoff.

After the pipes are laid in the road site is leveled, a road bed dug out and the earth handed with heavy rollers. Then a foundation of gravel about eight inches deep is put in and smoothed out.

Next comes the "black stuff," the bituminous paving material. The first layer of it is full of small stones and is about two inches thick. The thinner final layer is much smoother.

23 Persons Die in Coast Copter Crash
Continued from Page One
Thirteen federal officials from Washington flew to investigate the crash of a Sikorsky helicopter in Stratford, Conn. The Sikorsky division of United Aircraft Corp., said Ralph Lightfoot, engineering manager, and A. A. Coramato, chief of aircraft design, left today to assist Len Aronson, chief of investigation. Officials worked through the night Wednesday securing wreckage and recovering and identifying the bodies.

Identifying the dead was a laborious, with only sketchy information available, but it was reported the list included persons from throughout the United States.

The crash was the first fatality in the helicopter firm's 21-year history. The S61 carries a crew of three.

As the craft, which normally would have been cruising at 2,000 feet, plunged, mud bags spilled into the air, giving the impression of falling bodies.

Sacks struck roofs of houses and businesses, and sheriff's helicopters searched rooftop to rooftop.

The rotor blade which spun off crashed through the corrugated sheet metal roof of a chair manufacturing plant, injuring no one.

Two sheriff's deputies watching rush-hour traffic near the crash scene said they saw the tail rotor fly off and the craft begin to spin.

"Suddenly the copter disintegrated," said Deputy Charles Asendorf. "Parts and debris exploded.

It disintegrated in the air and came down like a rock," reported Fire Capt. Donald Berry. Bodies of the victims were stacked in tiers in the street nearby.

Congress Sends LBJ Truth-in-Lending Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress has sent President Johnson a major consumer protection bill requiring disclosure of the annual cost of interest on most loans and credit purchases.

The bill also exempts from the interest rate requirement small transactions on this formula. All purchases of \$75 or less so long as the credit charge does not exceed 45, and purchases of more than \$75 where the charge does not exceed \$7.50.

A special provision was worked out to cover open-end or revolving credit plans. Under it, the store would have to state its full annual rate as well as the monthly rate and also could, if it chooses, state when the bill is signed into law.

The Senate and House enacted the bill Wednesday with near unanimous support. The bill will cover about \$100 billion in annual loans and purchases.

The bill would limit federal and state judges grant police applications for wiretapping and electronic eavesdropping.

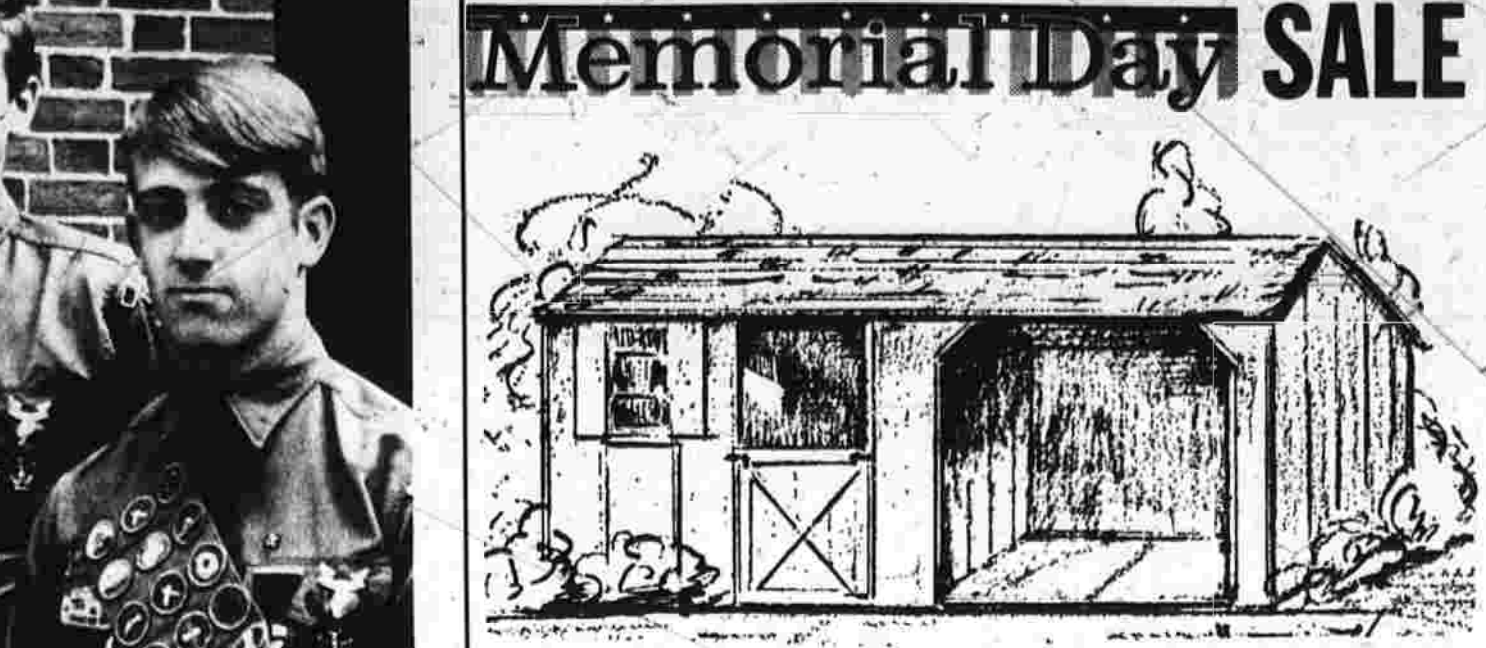

Goddard Resignation Time Seen Critical to Programs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dr. James L. Goddard, often-criticized director of federal food and drug control, is resigning at a time insiders consider critical for a series of innovative new programs he has launched.

One such program is unprecedented tests on humans to see whether generic drugs—those identified by chemical names—perform the same as their more expensive brand-name counterparts.

Sources say the program could lead to requiring manufacturers of generic drugs to prove through such tests that their products match the performance of approved drugs.

Goddard, who in 1964 changed the Food and Drug Administration from a little-known agency to a much-publicized one, is leaving to join EDI Technology Inc., a data processing and information firm, in Atlanta.

The 45-year-old physician, a career Public Health Service officer, is known to have become somewhat exhausted by the demands of the job. And he is said to have liked Atlanta, where he served as head of the health services' Communicable Disease Center before becoming FDA commissioner in January 1968.

In addition, his wife has relatives in Atlanta and two of his three children live there.

Goddard's title will be vice president and he will direct opening of a new Southeast regional office for the firm.

Although Goddard drew frequent criticism for his candid statements on such controversial subjects as marijuana and LSD, sources close to him say such pressure didn't force him out.

Other new and far-reaching policies begun under Goddard's direction include:

—A review of more than 3,000 widely used drugs to see whether they do what they are supposed to do. Goddard predicted it might lead to removal of many

Air Attacks Intensified At Borders

SAIGON (AP)—Waves of America's biggest bombers kept up one of the most concentrated saturation attacks of the war today against North Vietnamese troops reported crossing from Laos into the center of South Vietnam.

The intensified air campaign was aimed at stopping any major offensive that might be launched in 10 million tons Thursday and today, at least 50 Air Force B-52 bombers rained nearly 1,000 tons of explosives along enemy areas near the junction of the borders of South Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia.

White the pressure mounted in the central highlands, U.S. Marine four battalions advanced just below the 20th parallel to reinforce another enemy division along South Vietnam's western border.

It was also reported that two regiments of the North Vietnamese 2nd Division which have been fighting south of Da Nang were "disappeared" after setting out to the southwest in the general direction of Kontum.

The DMZ action, the Marines took on two battalions—4,000 men—of the North Vietnamese 2nd Division, believed to be the 32nd North Vietnamese division. Units from the Communist 3rd Division got into the fray South Vietnam's central plateau before the enemy withdrew.

The Americans threw tanks, artillery and fighter-bombers into the battle, as well as helicopter gunships which were credited with a large percentage of the enemy killed.

Another Marine force launched a new operation, Manohak's thrust, 24 miles southwest of Da Nang to seek out enemy forces in the rolling hills between the highlands and the rice-producing coastal lowlands.

French Union, Firm Heads Called to Seek Strike End

PARIS (AP)—Premier Charles de Gaulle said today that the French Confederation of Labor and Business Leaders should seek to end the strike in the French economy.

More and greater turmoil threatened in Paris as the French Confederation of Labor and Business Leaders met today to discuss the strike.

The 77-year-old president gave no advance indication of what he would say in his first public statement on the two-week-old upheaval that has paralyzed the country's industry and educational life.

Political observers believed he would call a referendum next month to endorse a program of wide reform, including greater participation of the people in government, of the workers in running their factories, and of students in operating their universities and high schools.

Whether this would satisfy workers demanding higher wages, earlier retirement, job security, and a shorter work week, was an unanswered question.

Several hundred people were arrested in the riotous demonstrations today, forcing evacuation of several hundred persons from their homes and cars.

Many highways and secondary roads were blocked. The high water was responsible for one train derailment.

The most serious flooding was at Clermont, Châlons, Lognon and sections of Solignac, Clignacourt, Fayette and Athens Counties. About 60 families were moved from their homes at Clermont into two schools.

State News Man Kidnaps 2 Executives; Gets \$34,000

NEW BRITAIN (AP)—Federal and local investigators are searching today for a man believed to have kidnapped two executives with a \$34,000 ransom.

The man, a young man with dark hair and a mustache, was seen in the vicinity of the kidnapping in the city of New Britain.

The pattern, according to investigators, was similar to two heists earlier this year in Wilton and Hartford.

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Acheson Hits U.S., Britain On Rhodesia

WASHINGTON (AP)—Former Secretary of State Dean Acheson accused Britain and the United States Friday of continuing to overlook the government of Rhodesia.

Acheson, 75, secretary of state from 1953 to 1955, is now in private law practice. He made the accusations in a speech prepared for a section of the American Bar Association.

The victory claims made by Pham Van Dong appeared to some American experts here to be aimed primarily at the North Vietnamese people as a morale booster.

It could exclude decisively any de-escalation by North Vietnam in order to get an end to bombing, but it could also tough talk in general to cover an eventual compromise.

The United States, which speaks a great deal about peace and negotiations for peace, is engaged in a national conspiracy of silence, he said.

Each government is expected to increase its pressure on the other in the meetings about the threat of a breakdown in the talks, a weapon both are already using.
