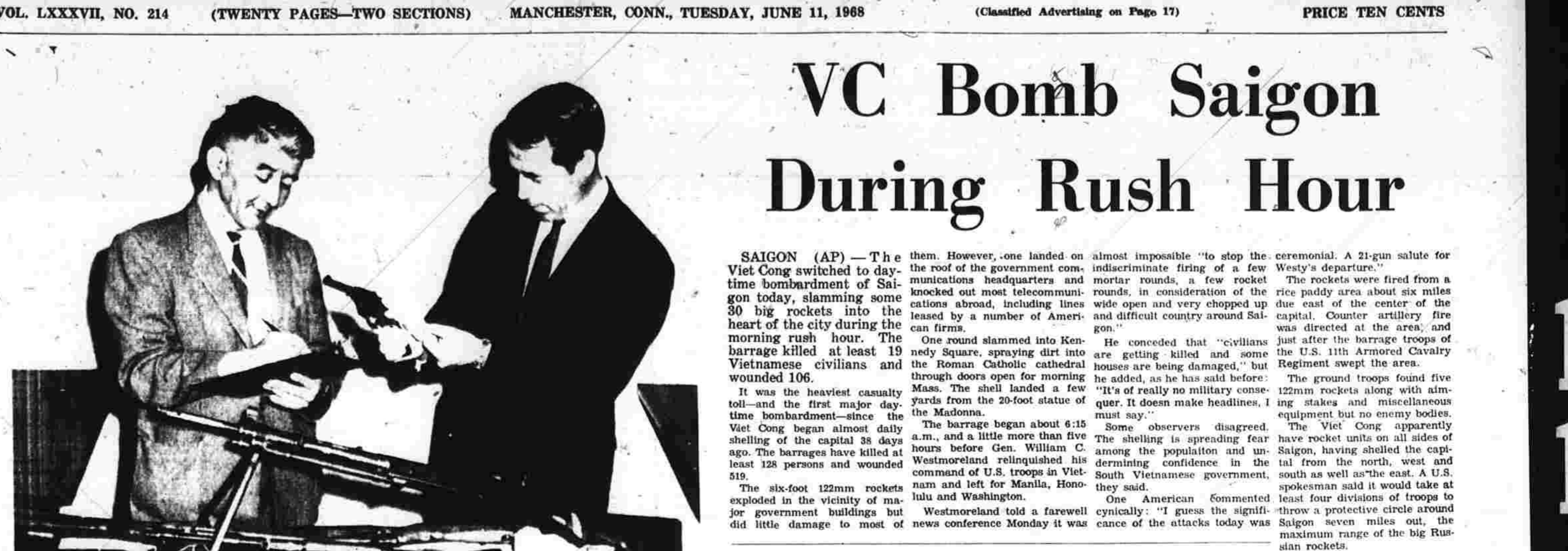

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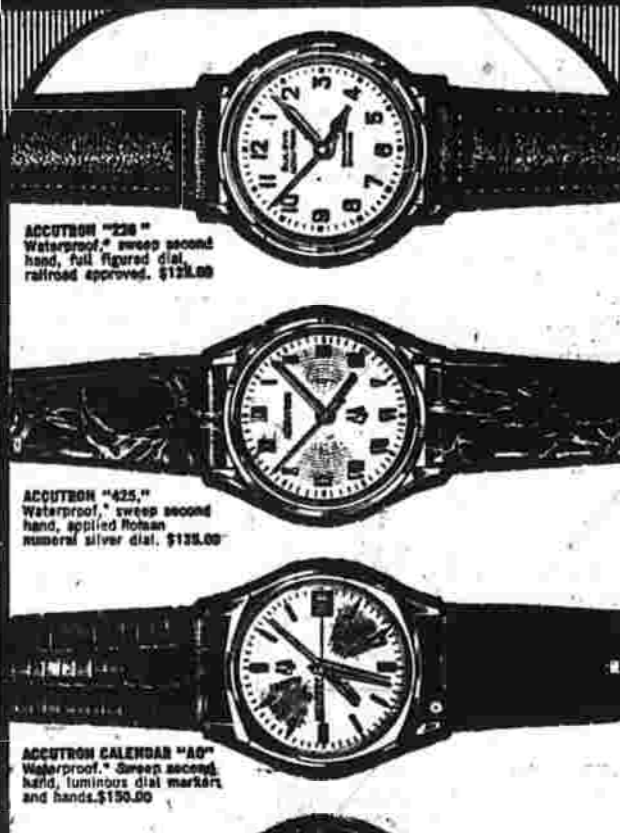

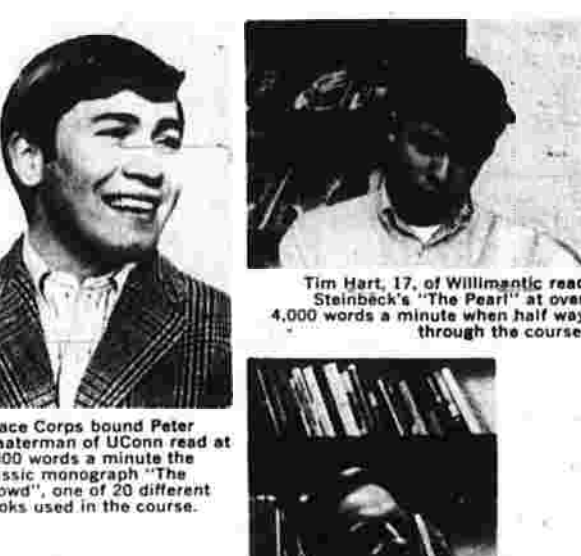

An Unhappy Certainty?

The harsh practical political fact seems to be that the assassination of Senator Kennedy has had the ironic effect of guaranteeing the nomination of Vice President Humphrey, whose candidacy and policies the dead Senator hoped to oppose.

There was not a very high chance of defeating Humphrey in any case. But now the release of Kennedy delegates, by the fact of his death, is said to make Humphrey a certain choice at Chicago.

One remembers, as one discusses such prognostication made with such certainty, that this is 1968, and that some other certainties have been upset this year already. There may be no surprise in store for the American people, the pollsters, the political bosses. But it may be too that we have not had a year of such prognostication made with such certainty.

Suppose, then, there is this certainty for Vice President Humphrey as the nominee a certainty which is hard and realistic even though, as has been pointed out, approximately two-thirds of the voters in every Democratic primary after New Hampshire voted against the candidate and many of the states in which Humphrey is Vice President.

One can feel, once this certainty is conceded, the pressure to elevate such an appraisal of Vice President Humphrey. If he is going to be a nominee for President, he must have some worthiness. He must not have got where he is without having some qualities measuring up to high office. We owe it to ourselves and to our faith and pride in our own processes and institutions to assume a certain degree of stature in the prospective nominee. We cannot tear him down without, at the same time and to some extent, tearing ourselves and America down too. He is ours, he is a prospective major party candidate, so he must have something on the ball. He may be our next President; we must, therefore, preserve and protect our own eventual capacities to give him a decent respect, tender him a measure of support, in his efforts to deal with the vast burdens of that office. He has indeed risen through the American political process. How can anybody conclude that that process, which has worked so far, has suddenly turned especially and spectacularly deficient?

Perhaps the answer to all, or the summary of, all these observations is that whatever he may be, the prospective nominee is precisely and exactly what we deserve to have before us as a choice for the White House.

How, when the American people and their political systems and institutions have tolerated the rise of any individual to the point where his next logical step is into the White House, can anyone suddenly contend that the American people and their processes really deserve something better?

These are the conclusions to which elemental logic might lead us. There will be a condition, a feeling which will remain in spite of such logic. It will be a feeling that this threatens to be a national election in which the voters of the country are being disenfranchised not by any power or regulation which prevents them from entering the voting booth, but by the limitations of the choice that may confront them there. Furthermore, to shift back toward the practical, the American people and their processes really deserve something better.

Even Tito Bows To Student Power
President Tito of Yugoslavia, surely not one of the least powerful rulers of our time, has, like President de Gaulle of France, responded to troubles started by students with a promise to achieve certain reforms or give up his claim to national leadership.

And even while President Tito thus concedes a measure of respectability and righteousness to his particular student revolt, at Belgrade University, there was being formulated, at that University, by collaboration between administrators, professors, and organizations of the students themselves, a tough set of de-

mands for President Tito to meet, quite apart from any eventual long range reforms.

These demands asked the immediate removal of riot police around the university buildings, and the immediate release of students arrested in clashes with the police, plus guarantees there would be no reprisals against them. Another demand was for the speedy publication of the report of a government commission on the violence at the university, together with punishment of the officials blamed by the students for provoking the original troubles.

And the fourth demand at Belgrade was for guarantees that the press, radio and television will provide complete and objective reports of the student movement.

In Belgrade, as in Paris, as in New York City, then, the display of student power has been so phenomenal as to bring high authority to admission and concession. And the nature of the student demands — amnesty for their own acts is always the first thing they want — prosecutors of the police the second — 'objective' reporting of their own actions in the news media the third — seems fairly constant from one 'revolution' to another.

We sometimes wonder, witnessing all this suddenly materializing student power, before which the most traditional restraints seem to tremble and fall, whether some of the leaders of these revolutions are themselves not dismayed by the unexpected ease of their triumph, the meekness of the official opposition, the striking humility of the 'establishment', and the fact that they themselves are suddenly in possession of some of the responsibility they claimed to be seeking. Suppose we elders did suddenly yield to the temptation to acknowledge our own bad job and turn the future directly over to student power, would they really be over and do a better job, and that all the students find this a frightening and dismaying predicament?

The eternal truth about generations is that the older has always been waiting for the younger to come along and take over and do a better job, and that all the students find this a frightening and dismaying predicament.

There will be at least a few hundred armies in the skies of the future who were on the ground at the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs on the day the nose boom struck there.

It was an impressive nose boom, as the nose boom of a jet fighter. That such a change could lengthen still further the long odds against his taking the nomination from Vice President Huber, Humphrey bothers McCarthy not at all.

But garbled reports of McCarthy's agony have been poured out in the Washington rumor mill and emerged with this erroneous product: McCarthy, say the rumors, feels a sense of guilt that his waspish, personal attacks on Kennedy in Oregon and California contributed to the murder; therefore, McCarthy will drop out of the presidential race.

In fact, since the shooting, McCarthy has not lost a single vote in the race. The day that Kennedy died, McCarthy retired with a dose of aspirin to a retreat in the Maryland countryside just outside Washington to talk a little with his wife, a bit.

But nobody close to him believes he will quit. McCarthy is a philosopher-poet preferring contemplation to action. He is not a publicist, a self-doubting Hamlet. Rather, based on his conversations with his inner circle in the 24 hours after Kennedy was shot, this seems the nature of McCarthy's thinking.

Back in snow-covered New Hampshire last winter, McCarthy feels, the campaign was squarely on the issues—Vietnam, domestic unrest, President Johnson's leadership. Lacking any reputation there, McCarthy nevertheless scored a moral victory.

But, McCarthy feels, this issue-oriented victory disappeared into the politics of personality when Kennedy entered the contest after New Hampshire. Although McCarthy believes he has trounced Mr. Johnson in the issues, he feels that the President's dropping out of the race obscured that outcome and further personalized the campaign.

Since then, in McCarthy's view, there has been endless talk among press and political delegates counts, media spinning and leading to Kennedy in Indiana and Nebraska, he also joined the game.

Through still amply by conventional standards, McCarthy's campaign looks on a more professional gloss (including a new strong man, the shrewd and competent Washington lawyer, Tom Feltus). McCarthy does far more in personality, using his stinging wit freely against Kennedy. Thus, in McCarthy's mind, he now shared in the general culpability for the insane state of American politics.

The effort succeeded brilliantly with a win in Oregon and a close second in California, more than 18 percentage points higher on his showing in mid-May polls. But to McCarthy the result was escalation of the super-heated, irrational atmosphere conducive to a mad young man in Los Angeles firing point-blank at Robert Kennedy.

Thus, although McCarthy's most political associates are sure he will continue his campaign, they have been informed unequivocally that things will be different. The cotton-candy atmosphere of Oregon and California where McCarthy, the poet-philosopher, gazed at Bob by Kennedy's dog, Freddie, will not reappear.

It is doubtful if McCarthy will engage in political horse-trading with party pros who backed Kennedy and now wonder whether to jump to McCarthy or to Humphrey.

Town Hall--Modern Yet 'Rustic'--Going Up

The construction of the new 10.4 acre site at the intersection of Ellington Rd. and Sullivan Avs. continues to move along on schedule with occupancy planned for late this year or early next year. The structure is located on a roof and slate spandrel panels.

Architecturally it is a contemporary building, but with some modern mechanical equipment. All offices in the Town Hall have vinyl asbestos tile floors, vinyl covered movable partitions, and acoustic ceiling tile. The chamber where the Town Council will meet has carpeted floors, red brick and plastic walls, and stucco plaster ceiling. The corridors and lobby on the main and upper floors have carpeted and slate floors, brick walls, and acoustic tile ceilings.

Richard W. Quinn, project architect for the Town Hall, who is with the firm of Russell, Gibson, von Dolan and West Hartford, calls the structure a "contemporary building sympathetic to traditional details."

The lower level contains the police facilities, probate judge's office and hearing room, public health and welfare offices, and various mechanical equipment spaces as well as general storage facilities.

WASHINGTON — Sen. Eugene McCarthy, tormented and anguished over the culpability of the American campaign process in the death of Robert F. Kennedy, will radically dilute his quest for the Presidency.

In the first hours after Kennedy was struck down, McCarthy told confidants of his unshakable resolve to campaign the way he wanted to in the first place: Without hoopla, without dealing in personalities, and—as much as possible—without organization.

That such a change could lengthen still further the long odds against his taking the nomination from Vice President Huber, Humphrey bothers McCarthy not at all.

But garbled reports of McCarthy's agony have been poured out in the Washington rumor mill and emerged with this erroneous product: McCarthy, say the rumors, feels a sense of guilt that his waspish, personal attacks on Kennedy in Oregon and California contributed to the murder; therefore, McCarthy will drop out of the presidential race.

In fact, since the shooting, McCarthy has not lost a single vote in the race. The day that Kennedy died, McCarthy retired with a dose of aspirin to a retreat in the Maryland countryside just outside Washington to talk a little with his wife, a bit.

But nobody close to him believes he will quit. McCarthy is a philosopher-poet preferring contemplation to action. He is not a publicist, a self-doubting Hamlet. Rather, based on his conversations with his inner circle in the 24 hours after Kennedy was shot, this seems the nature of McCarthy's thinking.

Back in snow-covered New Hampshire last winter, McCarthy feels, the campaign was squarely on the issues—Vietnam, domestic unrest, President Johnson's leadership. Lacking any reputation there, McCarthy nevertheless scored a moral victory.

But, McCarthy feels, this issue-oriented victory disappeared into the politics of personality when Kennedy entered the contest after New Hampshire. Although McCarthy believes he has trounced Mr. Johnson in the issues, he feels that the President's dropping out of the race obscured that outcome and further personalized the campaign.

Since then, in McCarthy's view, there has been endless talk among press and political delegates counts, media spinning and leading to Kennedy in Indiana and Nebraska, he also joined the game.

Through still amply by conventional standards, McCarthy's campaign looks on a more professional gloss (including a new strong man, the shrewd and competent Washington lawyer, Tom Feltus). McCarthy does far more in personality, using his stinging wit freely against Kennedy. Thus, in McCarthy's mind, he now shared in the general culpability for the insane state of American politics.

The effort succeeded brilliantly with a win in Oregon and a close second in California, more than 18 percentage points higher on his showing in mid-May polls. But to McCarthy the result was escalation of the super-heated, irrational atmosphere conducive to a mad young man in Los Angeles firing point-blank at Robert Kennedy.

Thus, although McCarthy's most political associates are sure he will continue his campaign, they have been informed unequivocally that things will be different. The cotton-candy atmosphere of Oregon and California where McCarthy, the poet-philosopher, gazed at Bob by Kennedy's dog, Freddie, will not reappear.

It is doubtful if McCarthy will engage in political horse-trading with party pros who backed Kennedy and now wonder whether to jump to McCarthy or to Humphrey.

Assault Case Is Dropped Against Ex-Football Star

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Authorities have dropped an assault case against former professional football star Jimmy Brown in connection with a high-fashion model found injured beneath his second-floor balcony. But he still may face a charge of battery against a police officer. Deputy Dist. Atty. Phillip Mueller said his office would not issue a complaint because of insufficient evidence. After his arrest Brown had been booked on suspicion of assault with intent to commit murder. "There was no sufficient evidence to convict," Mueller said Monday. "This is aside from the fact that the woman would not sign the complaint." He added, however, that a complaint could be issued if "some evidence turns up in the future." The German-born model, Eva Marie Bohm-Chin, 22, hospitalized in fair condition, wasn't available for comment. Mueller said his office will file a complaint charging Brown with battery against a police officer, a felony. Brown was arrested Sunday night after neighbors in a West Hollywood apartment reported a fight. Deputies discovered Miss Bohm-Chin senseless on a concrete patio about 20 feet below Brown's balcony. Brown was freed Monday on \$12,500 bond. Doctors said Miss Bohm-Chin had a dislocated shoulder and bruises on her head, mouth and cheeks. Deputy John Texeira, 165 pounds, said the 228-pound Brown knocked him seven feet with a swing of his left arm when the officer attempted to enter the apartment. Officers would not comment on the progress of their investigation to determine what happened in the apartment. They did report finding blood on the bed, the rug, the walls and a towel in the apartment. Brown was quoted in the sheriff's report as saying: "You big white cops and your God damn system. Everything is against the Negroes. In order to get in, you are going to have to shoot me first."

Schoolyard Fall Results in Suit

The Town of Manchester, the principal of Buckley School, Vincent Ramani, a teacher's aide at the school, Clara Swanson and its three custodians, Joseph Wright, Michael Minicucci and Roger Luce, are being sued for \$85,000 by the parents of a Buckley School pupil.
