BHT in Diet Adds to Life Span of Mice

LONDON — The life span of mice has been increased by almost a half by simply adding to their diets one half per cent of a chemical called butylated hydroxytoluene (BHT), which is widely used in the food industry to prevent fats from going bad.

The actual increase in life span was 44 per cent. In human terms this means raising the normal three score years and ten to over a hundred.

Details of the experiments are to be published soon in the Journal of Gerontology by Dr. D. Harman, professor of biochemistry at the University of Nebraska.

"This could be really important," said Dr. Alex Comfort of University College, London, one of Britain's leading authorities on ageing. He is now testing the effects of BHT himself on fish and other animals.

But before BHT is hailed as the elixir of life, an important question will have to be settled: does it actually slow down ageing in mice, or does it prevent them from dying prematurely from causes other than old age? Either way its effects are of great scientific interest, but only in the first case would it be true to say that the chemical kept the mice young.

Professor Harman fed BHT to his mice to test a theory that ageing is caused by free radicals — chemical entities which occur naturally in the living cell but which are so reactive that they could have a disruptive effect. BHT neutralizes them and this is why it is used as an antioxidant in the food industry.

Professor Harman has found that another antioxidant — a derivative of quinine — is almost as effective in increasing the life span as BHT. Since their anti-oxidant effect is about the only property the two chemicals have in common this is powerful evidence in support of the theory. "It is 90 per cent certain it's correct," Professor Harman said in a telephone interview.

About 1200 mice were used in the experiments with BHT. "We've got a long way to go before we can try it on humans," said Professor Har-

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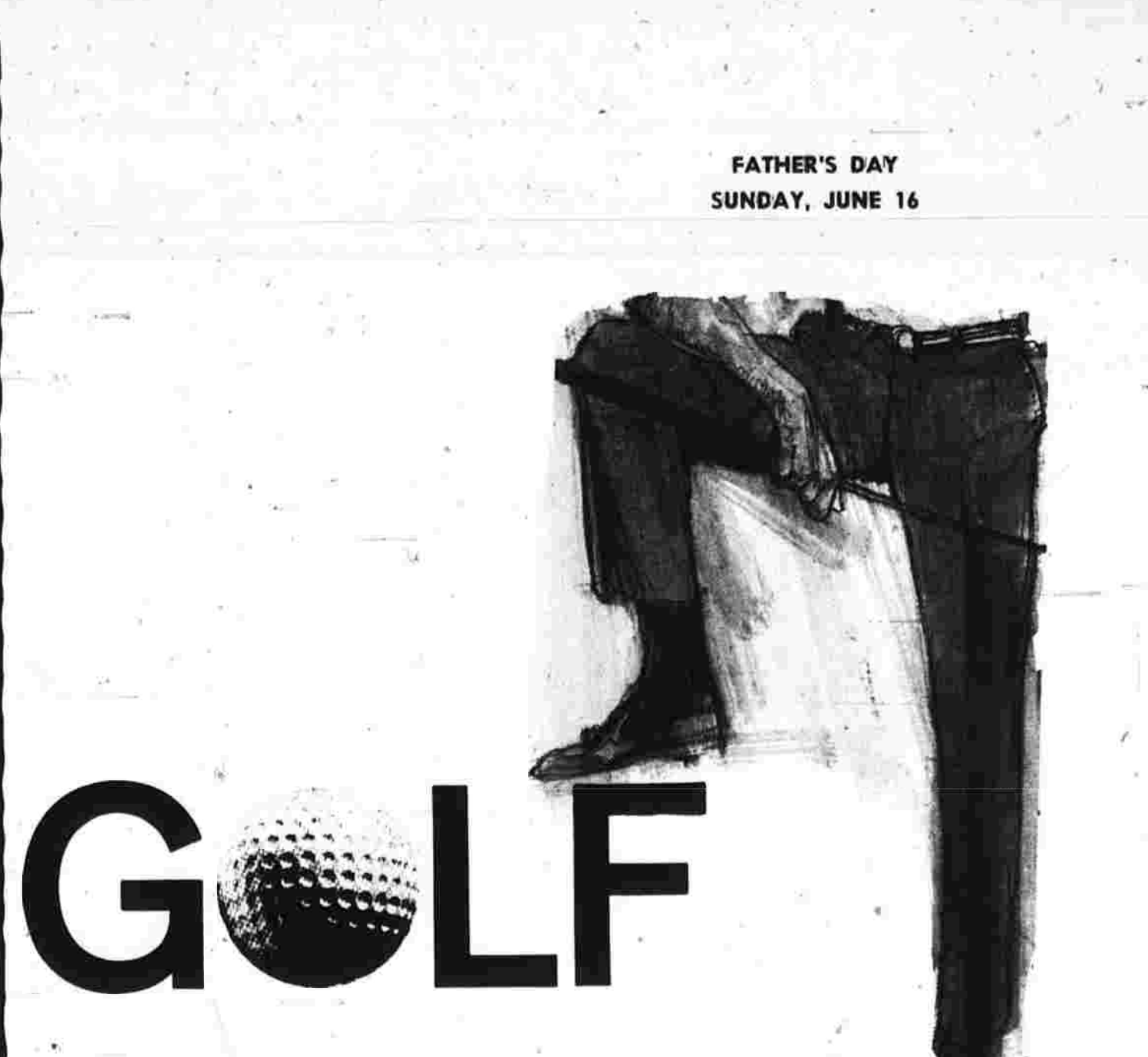
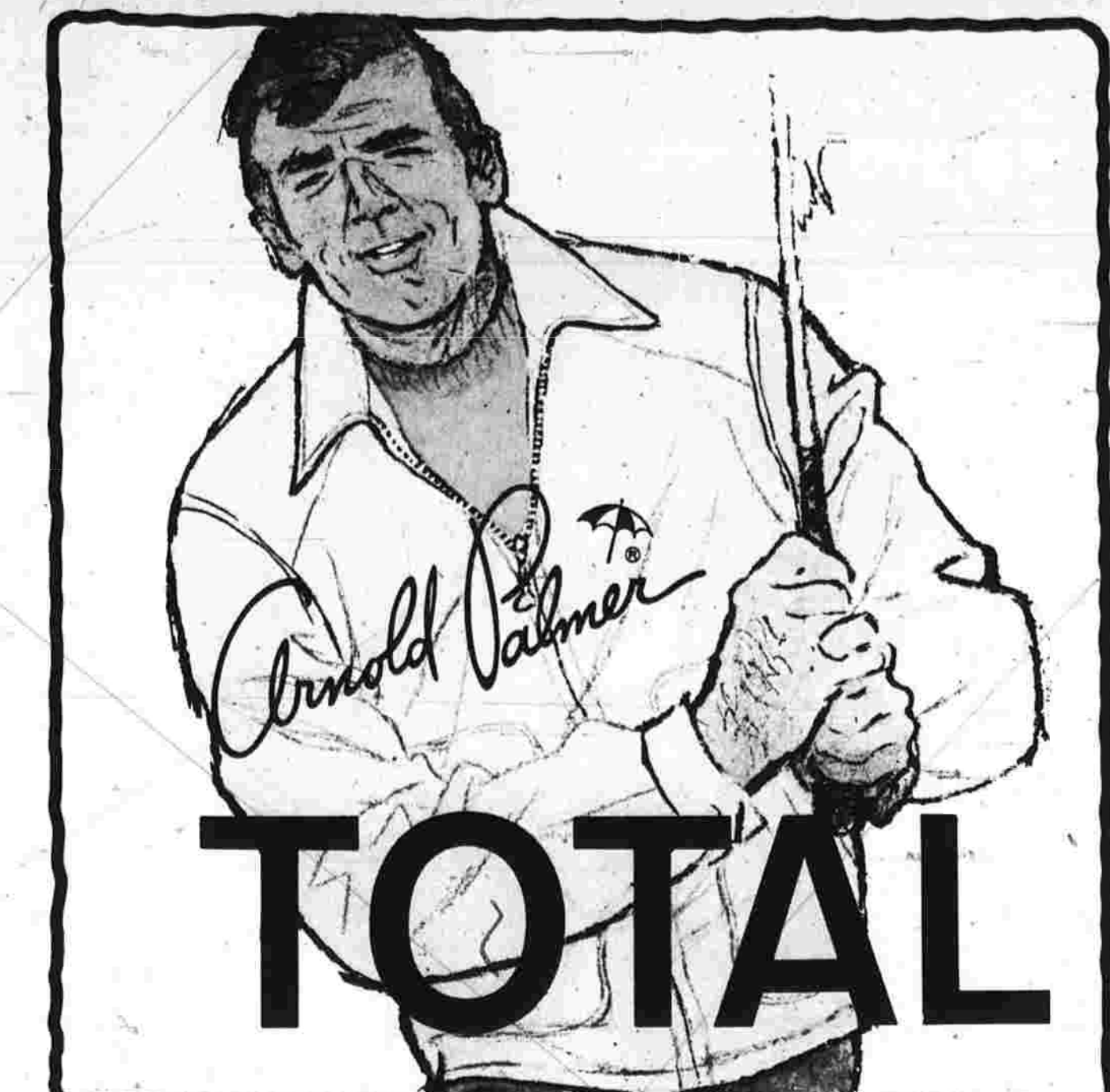

At least 30 civilians were killed over the city during a Viet Cong bombing of the Saigon air base...

The fighting along the demilitarized zone was near the Binh in South Vietnam's northwestern corner, and near Gio Linh, in the northeastern corner...

A government spokesman said South Vietnamese infantrymen killed 63 infiltrating North Vietnamese soldiers near Gio Linh. He said 11 government soldiers were killed and 33 wounded.

U.S. Marines reported killing at least 28 of an estimated 400 North Vietnamese troops who attacked a fire support base seven miles southeast of the Sanh village. Fourteen Americans were killed and 15 wounded in the attack and a mortar barrage which preceded it.

The Marines had just arrived at the base and were digging in when the attack began. They called in artillery, fighter-bombers and helicopter gunships, and the attackers pulled out after 90 minutes.

Manchester in Days Gone By

The typical house of the colonial and federal periods in the United States was built with its long side to the street. The front door was in the center, and opened into a hall with a room on either side. In the older houses this hall was very small, occupying the space between the great central chimney and the front wall of the house. A narrow stair, broken into three short flights, led to the upper rooms.

In the later 18th and early 19th centuries the huge center chimney was not used. Instead, two or more chimneys were built at the ends of the house. Now the center hallway usually ran the whole depth of the main house with doorways at both ends of it. A wide stair ran to the upper floor in one flight, or occasionally in two, with a landing crossing the hall above the rear entrance. Wings or

els, if any, were built at the back of the house. The gambrel roof (lower section sloping steeply, upper part almost flat) was widely used, with or without dormer windows. A high gable roof was common usually without dormers. Some of these gable roofs were so high that the attic had two stories. For the larger houses, particularly the square city houses of the federal period, a low hip roof (sloping up from all four sides), was the usual type. With the Greek revival came many changes. Now the houses were usually placed with one end to the street. Often a row of Greek columns stretched across the front, supporting a low pediment which continued the main line of the roof thus projecting a narrow front veranda. The doorway was moved to one side of the narrow facade. It

opened into a narrow hall with the stair running up one side. This hallway and the parlor occupied the entire frontage of the building. A low wing at one side of the main structure provided additional space on the lower floor. Occasionally there were wings on both sides. Roofs were low gabled, as in Greek temples. A few large houses had a columned front with a center doorway. Such houses usually had an almost flat hip roof.

A peculiar type of small house, developed in the Greek revival, was only a story and a half in height. The front of these houses of this type usually had four stout Doric columns. The door, at one side of the front, opened into a narrow hall, but the state ran across the hall behind the front porch. Upstairs the rooms were low, with sloping ceilings and were lighted only by windows in the front and rear gables. An adult could stand upright only in the middle of the room. There was, of course, no attic. Sometimes the low spaces near the eaves were partitioned off as long closets into which one crawled on hands and knees.

The rest of the story of Greek revival houses in Manchester can best be shown in the pictures.

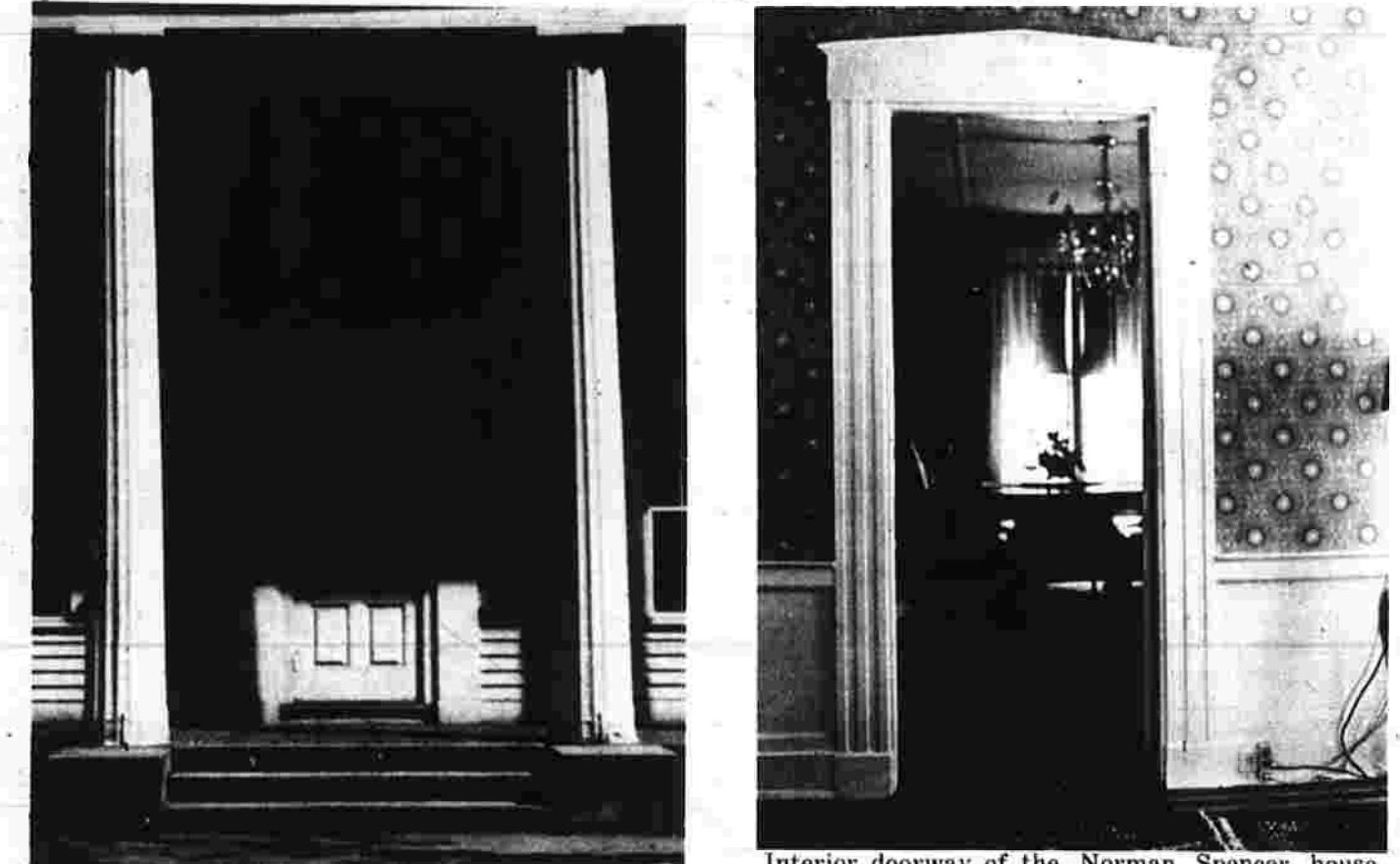
Columned house on North Main St., with a balcony at the second floor level. Such balconies were more common in the South than in New England.

This building, once a Woodbridge house, now serves as a office for the Community Baptist Church on East Center St. It was originally a story-and-a-half Greek revival dwelling, with Doric columns at the front and a wing at one side. The front colonnade has now been extended to the left to enlarge the veranda and a dormer has been added upstairs (left edge of the roof).

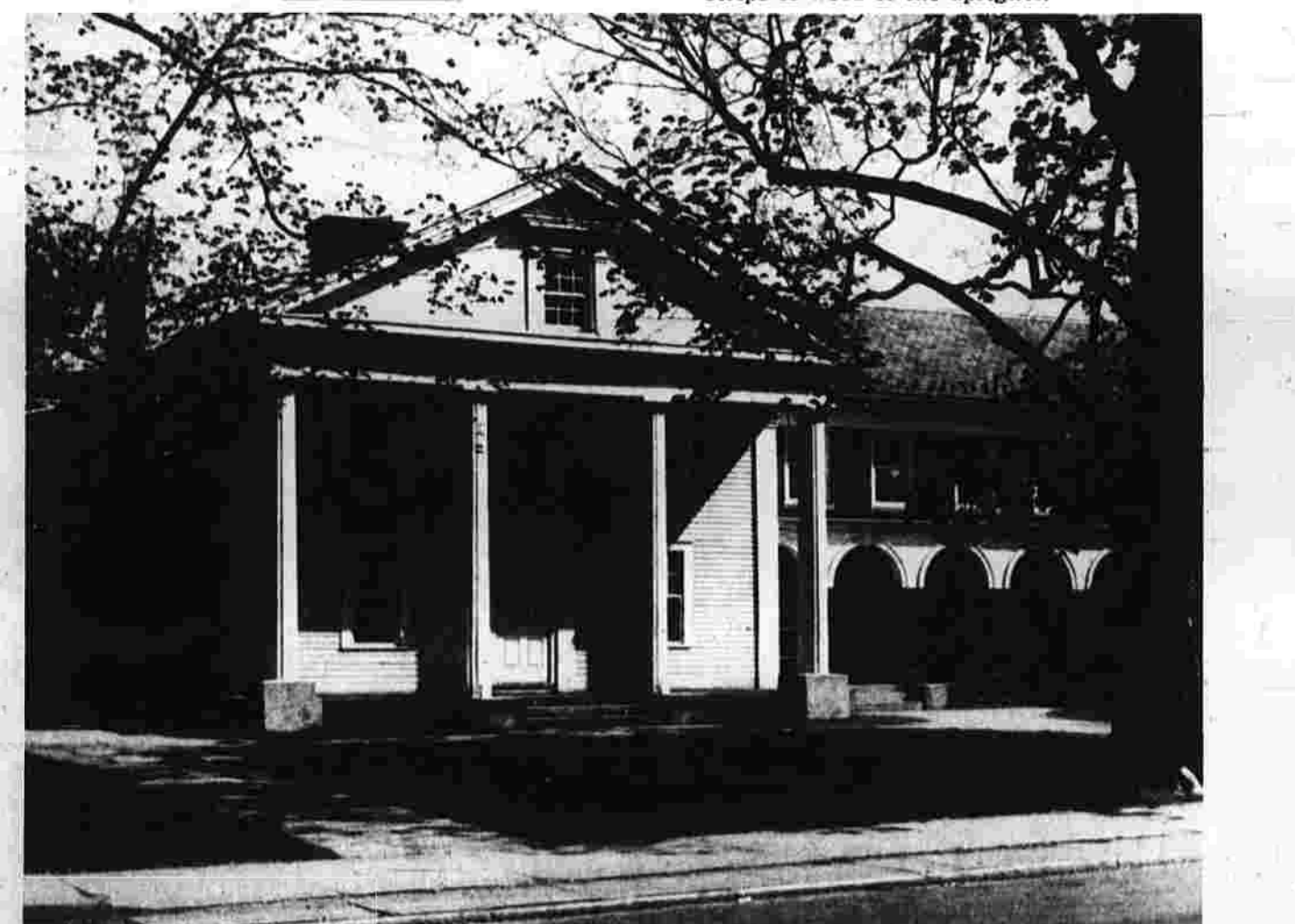


The doorway of the White house. This is a typical doorway of the Greek revival period, with a heavy overdoor and simple pilasters (flat columns) at the sides.

The present Woodbridge house on E. Middle Tpk. Many Greek revival houses were of this type, two stories in height, with a lower wing at one side. The front has no columns, but there are pilasters at the corners of the main building and of the wing, also at the sides of the front doorway. The long narrow windows at the sides of both doorways are typical of the period. Here the beauty of the building lies in its simplicity and its excellent proportions.

Obstacles Blocking Efforts To Curb Spending Abroad

NEW YORK (AP) — Administration efforts to keep dollars at home by curtailing overseas spending for pleasure are running head on into obstacles that seem likely never to reduce chances for any dramatic success.

The objective is to reduce by \$500 million the annual travel deficit, which in 1967 soared to \$2 billion, the net result of Americans spending nearly \$4 billion abroad while foreigners spent \$2 billion here.

Lessening the prospects for substantial help in balancing the travel outgo and income are these factors:

—Measures that would impose taxes on foreign travel and limit spending abroad are still being argued in the Senate and may not, therefore, be signed into law in time to have much effect on summer travel.

The peak travel season, the time when students, educators and sightseeing secretaries head for Europe, began in late May and will extend to Sept. 28. A good part of the season will have passed before any bill.

—Americans have plenty of money to spend on travel regardless of whether a travel tax is passed, and they seem also to have the desire to use this money.

—The ease and glamor of air-line travel is making trips to foreign lands, particularly to Europe, an almost irresistible attraction to people of moderate incomes.

These people also are getting some encouragement from the airlines. As one of them puts it: "We can still wrap you up any one of hundreds of complete tour packages. Say the word. We'll give you the Europe you always wanted—starting as soon as tomorrow."

Whatever the motivation, new and renewed passport applications for the first two months of 1968 rose sharply over a year earlier, with the great majority of them coming from persons intending to travel primarily for reasons of pleasure.

A study by the National Industrial Conference Board, and reported in the Conference Board Record, a monthly publication of the nonprofit organization, showed passports were being handed out early this at a rate 30 per cent higher than a year ago. Less than 10 per cent were obtained for business.

Perhaps the most encouraging aspect of the travel payments situation is the cooperation received from business in promoting travel of foreigners to the United States through reductions in transportation fares and hotel rates.

The Board of Education last night voted to appoint two new school administrators. Vincent F. Brennan will be associate principal of the high school and Orville Rowley Jr. will be supervising principal of the Ellsworth Union School.

Brennan has been a teacher at South Windsor High School for eight years, and chairman of the Social Studies Department for four years. He is a graduate of Holy Cross College and received his Master's Degree from the University of Massachusetts in 1960.

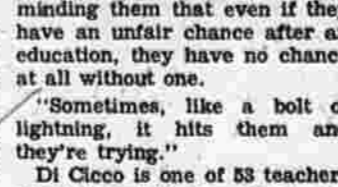

Strife-Torn Junior High Seems Almost Happy Now

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (AP) — "We remember the good things rather than the bad." That was the sentiment of one of the 148 pupils listed as candidates for certificates of completion of junior high school work this school year, swept by a national tide of Negro discontent. The class of 1968 was saying farewell to a school year that was a time of tears, ceremony and fact. The long protest against what some Negro pupils consider a blackboard barrier to their education had run its course, at least for now. It was time for formal advancement to high school.

So the pupils gathered in their white dresses and Sunday best and streamed into the assembly. There no one mentioned the shattered windows, still mangled outside; the rash of small fires; the assaults on teachers. But the wood-covered windows of the predominantly Negro school spoke of the violence that erupted five times this year. Five times police were called to subdue rock-throwing students who smashed the windows and set the fires. In all nearly three dozen pupils were arrested and 200 temporarily suspended in protests over a lack of "sou' food," chicken, black-eyed peas and corn bread, in school lunches; three times student demonstrations left the cafeteria piled with the wreckage of broken tables and smashed chairs, with its walls splattered with thrown food. "We are passing an important milestone in our lives," said pupil Henry Fitzgerald in welcoming parents to the assembly.

'Poor' Heads Issue List of Priorities

WASHINGTON (AP) — In an attempt to sharpen the focus of the "Poor People's Campaign," leaders have issued a list of priorities demands and said most could be met by the government without new legislation.

In addition, the Rev. Ralph David Abernathy named six legislative priorities which if won, he said, would permit the demonstrators to think about going home.

While the list touches on many areas Abernathy made it clear in a three-hour news briefing Tuesday night he considers the feeding of the hungry a key issue.

His list of priorities includes food programs in all 1,000 counties, emergency food supplementary food distribution in the 26 "hunger counties" and the Citizens Board of Inquiry, free food stamps for those who can't afford to buy them, and more free lunches for school children.

The demands concentrated on getting more citizen participation in anti-poverty programs, more money for summer jobs, and better health care.

Freedom of choice school desegregation plans should be abolished by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Douglas said, and the department should abolish dual school systems in the South by fall.

The secretary of labor should endorse and fight for passage of a job bill this session of Congress, Abernathy said, while the Justice Department should increase its school desegregation suits in the North and its suits to end discrimination in employment.

He asked the Department of Housing and Urban Development to fight for passage of the housing bill now pending before Congress.

Other priority demands called on the State Department to set up a committee with representatives from the poor, and the departments of Justice and Interior to study the question of who owns land claimed by Mexican-Americans in the Southwest.

Protestant and Catholic Youths To Study from Same Textbooks

NEW YORK — For the first time in American religious history, some quarter of a million Protestant and Roman Catholic teenagers this autumn will be studying about the Bible and Christian beliefs from the same textbooks.

The development, described by both Protestant and Catholic educators as a "great ecumenical breakthrough," will be made possible by a joint publishing venture of the United Church Press, the United Church of Christ, located in Philadelphia and Boston, and Herder and Herder, New York.

The United Church of Christ is a two million member Protestant denomination formed 11 years ago by a union of the Congregational Christian Churches and the Evangelical and Reformed Church.

Herder and Herder was also formed 11 years ago as a Catholic publisher of ecumenical books. The United Church of Christ and Herder are publishing the new books jointly.

"Aside from the fact that this is the first time that the United Church and a great Catholic publisher have collaborated on such a project, these books are so important because of what they say about the Christian faith," Dr. Douglas said.

"The books were written by Christian scholars, not sectarian writers. They are usable by all Christians. No major doctrinal changes were necessary. Here is proof that the Christian faith is one faith. All followers of Jesus Christ believe one doctrine — that Christ is Lord of all. The basic truths of Christianity are a substituting 'mass' for 'worship service' and 'priest' for 'minister'."

This Catholic version will bear the imprimatur of the Bishop of Vermont and will be published as the "Christian Commitment Series." The Protestant edition will be called "Confirmation Education Series."

Usually the books incorporate modern design, including six pages of Blaise Cendrars' best-selling "Footnotes and Headlines," also published jointly by Herder and Herder and United Church Press.

The Rev. Dr. Truman B. Douglas, executive vice president of the United Church of Christ, said the books are being published by a union of the Congregational Christian Churches and the Evangelical and Reformed Church.

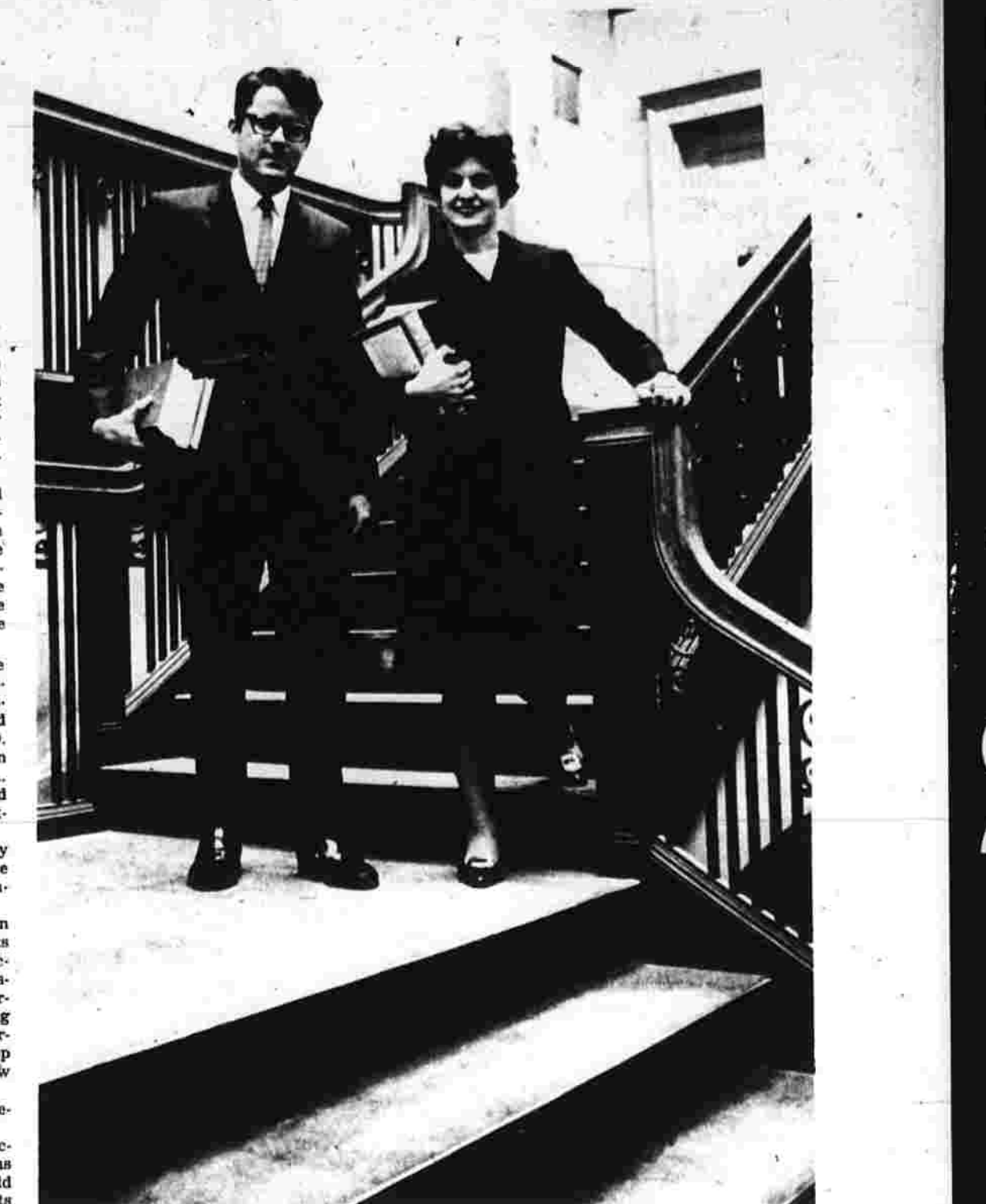

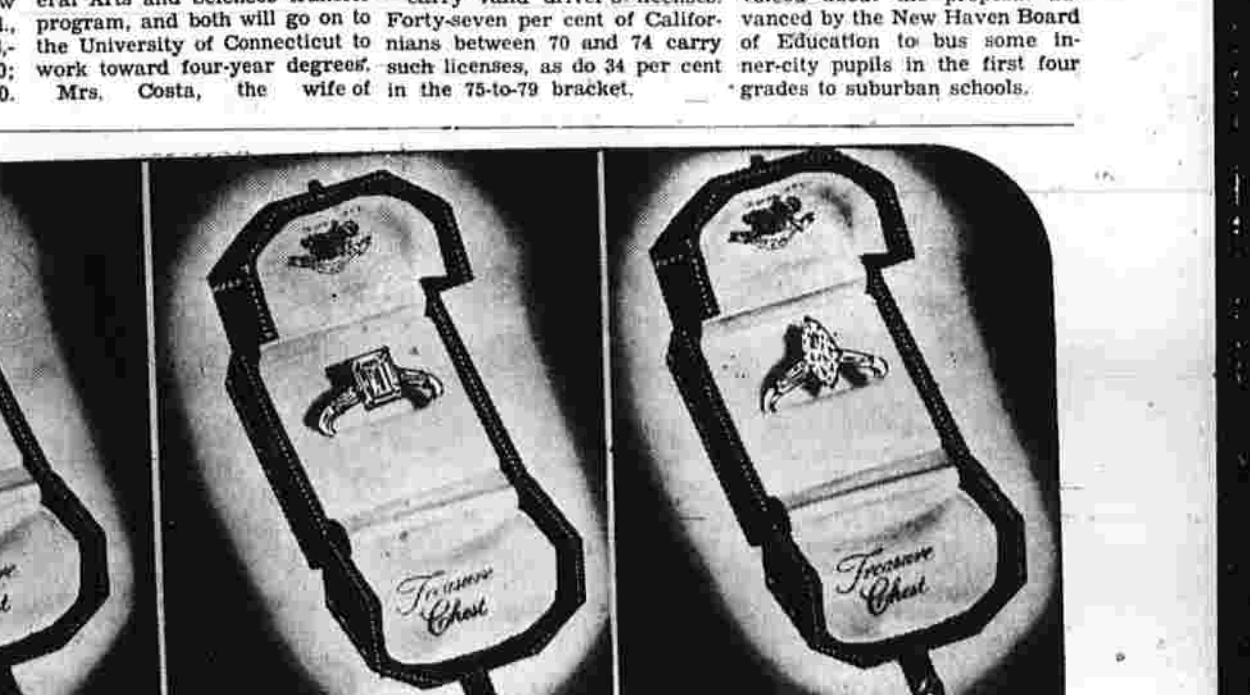

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Book Review

THE NEWS MEDIA: A JOURNALIST LOOKS AT HIS PROFESSION

By John Hohenberg, Holt, Rinehart and Winston, \$6.95.

The professional reader, if he wants to pick and choose, can find backing for almost any common preconception about the news media.

The term is used by Hohenberg to include radio, television, news services and news magazines but he focuses mainly on newspapers.

Do you think advertisers influence news columns on some newspapers? That most editorial pages have little influence? That "herd" coverage is sometimes excessive and may affect such things as race riots?

If you do, you can find some support in these pages. But if you read thoroughly—and it is a well-documented book—you will find Hohenberg pointing out in all cases that there are shining examples of good coverage, honest and courageous publishers and reasons why some things are done.

On the subject of "herd" coverage, for example, Hohenberg agrees there were some "excitable" radio reports and "television coverage" but he writes:

"Without doubts, there are serious risks to the continued coverage of civil rights disturbances by the news media with out major limitations; yet, these risks are unavoidable in a democratic society that is committed to the principle of free press.

"Self-regulation is necessary—even imperative—when there is danger that an important incident may be magnified into a widespread sensational manner. But since a riot is raging out of control, there is no point whatever to a miserably attempt to keep it secret from the very people who are in the middle of a horrifying experience."

Hohenberg, a professor at Columbia University and a newsman since 1923, makes no major disclosures but summarizes very well problems familiar to his fellow journalists.

He advises them to abandon the roles of the detached observer and to "concentrate on the practice of journalism as the public service. Merely saying that the public interest does not make it journalism does not make it so."

A WHISTLE IN THE WIND

By John H. Culp, Holt, Rinehart, \$6.95.

Culp's novel manages to magnify a small aspect of the history of the American West into a panoramic view of the taming of the Plains Indians.

Using the full span of a lifetime for his major characters, he begins the tale well before the Civil War and ends it long after.

The setting is a little camp on the edge of the territory of Texas, used as a way station by bands of Indians who raid the white settlements for cattle, horses and white captives.

In charge of the camp is Chief, a white man who had been captured by a band of Comanches led by Sun Eagle. Chief's life had been spared on condition that he work for the Indian chief, and Chief has become a renegade white, living only for the sake of his son Frederick.

Manuel also raises an abandoned white girl, Cece, and eventually Frederick and Cece are married, but tragedy strikes once again.

The historical part of the story is that the advance of settlers, soldiers and rangers gradually dooms the Indians to a retreat into the reservations.

This is no hang-bang stereotypical Western. Instead it is a well-told tale of hard life on the frontier, depicted with historical perspective and dramatic flair.

STRAIGHT UP:

The Life and Death of John Harlin. By James Ramsey Ullman. Doubleday, \$6.95.

John Harlin died in 1966 when a rope broke 4,000 feet up the notorious North face of the Eiger in Switzerland's Bernese Oberland. Had he lived beyond his 30 years, he would have written his own story. It most certainly would have been different from the usual mountaineering autobiography. He would have philosophical and sometimes almost mystical observations about the nature of climbing and his drive to tackle the most difficult routes.

In Yosemite Valley and the Alps, Harlin was not content to follow the old routes up the jagged peaks and faces. Instead, he believed the most aesthetic experience—the most arduous and dangerous—was the direct-ice-straight up.

Harlin's death and Ullman has written. But Ullman has written about more than just the happy days on the rock and the Harlin's philosophy of mountaineering. Here also are other sides of Harlin's character: the dark, brooding periods; the flashes of pride and arrogance; his occasional extramarital adventures.

Here, too, is the story of why John Harlin climbed mountains. The answer is far more complex than because they are there.

Sirhan Is Seen Satisfied With Custody Treatment

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Sirhan Baharra Sirhan, 24, charged with murdering Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, seems satisfied with his treatment in custody, says an American Civil Liberties Union attorney.

A. L. Wirin, counsel for the ACLU's Southern California chapter, commented on Sirhan's condition at a news conference Tuesday. Wirin has visited the Jordanian immigrant in his 12-by-12 foot cell several times since his arrest June 5.

Meanwhile, Los Angeles Mayor Sam Yorty, who was criticized after he disclosed information about Sirhan's background, defended his actions as being in the public interest.

Wirin said Sirhan had requested two private attorneys. The attorney added that several lawyers had volunteered to take the case without pay.

Colombia in Crisis Lleras Says He'll Resign If Reforms Not Approved

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — President Carlos Lleras Restrepo told the Colombian Senate Tuesday night to accept his reform program or his resignation, plunging the South American nation into its deepest governmental crisis in recent years.

If Congress refuses to accept the resignation, Lleras said it will mean it is ready to approve his program, which the Senate rejected last week.

An earlier announcement that Lleras would resign set off anti-government riots at the University of Bogota Tuesday night and clashes in the city between supporters of Lleras and of excelsior Gustavo Rojas Pinilla.

Under the constitution, the presidency alternates between a Liberal and a Conservative every four years, the result of a 1957 agreement which ended a decade of 200,000 headless Colombians.

Wallace Gets Big Reception, Opens Southern Campaign MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — George C. Wallace raised money and roused cheers for his third party presidential bid when he opened a Southern campaign tour.

The former Alabama governor began the 11-city swing here Tuesday and had a similar reception in Chattanooga today.

Wallace got a rousing reception at a rally here as he fired away at Republicans, Democrats, bureaucrats, the Supreme Court, militants, activists, Communists and the press.

And his aides passed buckets to collect money at the South Coliseum rally, which followed a \$25-a-plate dinner attended by 10,000.

"I'll tell you who's sick," Wallace shouted. "It's some of the leadership of this country!"

Wallace asked voters to reject both major political parties. "Let's put 'em both out," he said.

The crowd, which had warmed up to country music, singers, yelled and applauded. But Wallace got perhaps his biggest ovation when he came out strong against communism.

Wallace said the U.S. Supreme Court had ruled that Communists could work in defense plants.

"If you elect me president," he said, "I'll tell you what I'm going to do. I'm going to take every Communist out of every defense plant in Tennessee."

Vernon Tricarico Issues Collection Rules

The director of Public Works, Andrew P. Tricarico, has issued a number of regulations on trash collections. They are as follows:

Place trash containers at the curb the evening before regular collection. During the hot summer months collections start at 6 a.m. Trash containers should not be set in front of rural mail boxes. Trash must be cut and tied into three-foot long bundles. The same should be done with wood.

If there are large household items such as stoves or refrigerators in quantity, no more than one at a time should be put out for collection in any one week.

Containers are required, regulation size of not more than 22 gallons.

Paper bagging of trash and loose trash will not be picked up after July 1.

Construction material where a contractor has been hired to make alterations and repairs must be disposed of by the contractor. This also includes materials for plumbing and heat-
ing contractors.

All medical supplies, medicines and devices are not to be placed with regular trash. The Department of Public Works should be called for special disposal.

Do not jam rosebushes or cuttings of thorny plants into barrels or containers unless the container is disposable.

Grass cuttings can be put out in containers of heavy duty bags or boxes.

Cardboard boxes used for shipping stoves, refrigerators or washers must be broken up.

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McCarthy Is Eyeing Delegates

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, resuming his campaign for president, is eyeing delegate prospects at Democratic state conventions.

In his first campaigning activity since Sen. Robert F. Kennedy's assassination the Minnesota senator scheduled a Washington news conference for today.

With the primaries over, except for contests next week for 123 district delegates from New York, McCarthy is turning his attention to state Democratic conventions and to delegates already selected.

His aim will be to convince them he would be a stronger standard-bearer than Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey.

After a New York City appearance and a speech Thursday night McCarthy heads west for weekend appearances in Idaho and Montana, where Democratic conventions are taking place, and in Arizona, where the Western States Democratic Conference.

Aides indicated McCarthy would continue to stress the need for a change from the policies of the Johnson administration, which he claims would be carried on by Humphrey, his front-running rival for the Democratic nomination.

At the same time, aides say, McCarthy is banking on indications from public opinion polls that Humphrey would have difficulty defeating the likely GOP nominee, former Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

For the next three weeks, McCarthy is likely to have the field pretty much to himself on the Democratic side, Humphrey, at his lakeside home in Waverly, Minn., does not plan to return to Washington for a week and has no scheduled appearances before July 4, aides said.

McCarthy spent much of Tuesday in his Senate office, conferring with supporters who filed in and out of the office under the watchful eyes of two Secret Service men. McCarthy is one of the candidates given Secret Service protection following the Kennedy shooting.

Later, he went to the White House for a briefing on domestic and international matters from President Johnson. New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, seeking the Republican presidential nomination, had a similar briefing Monday.

Johnson and McCarthy discussed the Vietnam war, Paris peace talks, the economy, taxes and other issues.

"The conversations were pleasant," said White House aide Tom Johnson.

The news conference was suggested to McCarthy by campaign advisers who felt he should make use of a national forum to present his views on returning to the campaign.

CHEVY CHASE, Md.—Mental illness cost each American an average of \$48 in 1966, according to the National Institute of Mental Health, which put the total economic loss at \$20 billion. In 1967, hospitals reported the sharpest decrease in resident patients since a downward trend began 12 years ago.

Gun Bill Passage Predicted

WASHINGTON (AP) — Crackers appearing in the solid wall of resistance Congress has thrown up against efforts to write a tougher gun-control law.

In the House, Chairman Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., of the House Judiciary Committee predicts the committee will approve a gun bill at its next meeting June 20. The panel rejected such a bill by a tie vote Tuesday.

However, that 16 to 16 vote was the closest this stringent a gun-control bill has come to winning the committee's approval.

And the Senate, an indication of the mounting pressure for stiffer controls over gun purchases was reflected in the plea of Sen. George McGovern, D-S.D., for the people of his state to review this long-held position against such legislation—which McGovern also has opposed.

He said South Dakota sportsmen should consider whether they would be willing to undergo "a certain amount of inconvenience" in order to help slow the use of guns in violent crime.

President Johnson, who has repeatedly urged Congress to pass a law restricting sales of all firearms, called Tuesday's tie vote in the House Judiciary Committee "a shocking blow at the safety of every citizen in the country."

Celler expressed confidence he can pick up at least one more vote to break the tie when the committee reconsiders its action June 20.

At the committee considered the issue, several hundred pickets circled the downtown offices of the National Rifle Association, bearing placards demanding strong gun control. The NRA has opposed the tougher bill, contending Americans have the constitutional right to own arms.

With a heavy load of mail urging a stiffer law now re-charged Congress in the aftermath of the shooting death of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, the pressure will be on committee Republicans, who voted almost solidly against the bill.

Rep. William M. McCulloch, R-Ohio, senior GOP member of the committee and a member of the new violence commission, made the motion to reconsider the tie vote. He was one of 12 Republicans who voted against the bill. Two Republicans voted for it.

The vote came on a bill sent to Congress Monday by Johnson. It would prohibit mail-order sales of rifles, shotguns and ammunition, and also over-see the courier sales to residents of another state.

Johnson has on his desk a bill that would place similar restrictions on pistols. It is part of an omnibus crime-control bill that Johnson has not yet signed into law.

Congress did not provide restrictions against the sale of rifles and shotguns, a decision which led to the new administration proposal.

A move in the House to include some gun-control legislation in an emergency supplemental appropriation bill was defeated. Rep. Sidney R. Yates, D-Ill., sought a ban on issuance of licenses for importation of surplus military weapons by private citizens or nongovernment groups or firms.

He also unsuccessfully tried to include the requirement that all imported weapons be registered.

"What's so sacred about a gun that it shouldn't be registered?" Yates asked. "Why must a dog be registered? Because he might bite."

With approximately 300,000 eligible Connecticut people still unregistered as voters, Secretary of State Ella T. Grasso has issued an urgent request for all Democratic voters to register, so that they may vote in the November presidential elections.

Eligible citizens may enroll as voters between now and Oct. 12, to be able to vote Nov. 5. After that, only those whose rights mature between Oct. 13 and Nov. 4 will be admitted as voters for that election under state law.

To be eligible, an applicant must be at least 21 years of age, a resident of Manchester for at least six months and must be a U.S. citizen.

The Manchester registrars of voters will conduct an enrollment session Friday, from 1 to 4 p.m. It is for voters already on the lists, to permit a change-over from one party to another and to permit unaffiliated voters to register with a party.

For those unaffiliated who register with a party, the changeover will be effective immediately.

For those who transfer from one party to another, there will be a six-month waiting period, with the changeover to be effective in December.

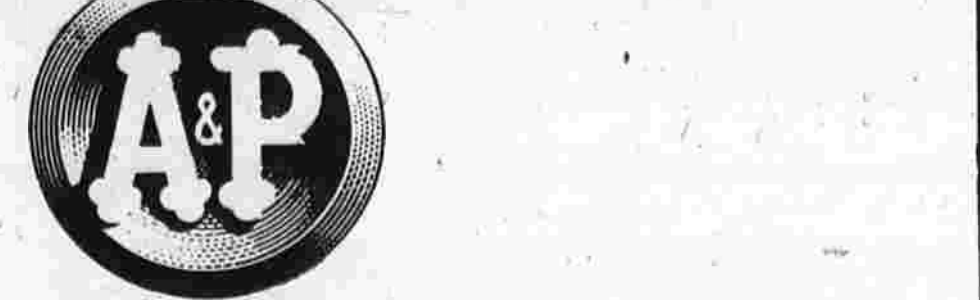

Heart Ailment In Children To Be Discussed

The 20th annual meeting of the Heart Association of Greater Hartford Inc. will be held at the Hartford Convention Center on June 27, at 4 p.m. at the Town Hall.

Dr. Milton Markowitz, associate professor of pediatrics at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, will be the featured speaker. He is the newly appointed chairman of the Department of Pediatrics at the University of Connecticut School of Medicine in Farmington. The occasion was the 50th anniversary of the RAF. Armies also took over sentry duties at St. James's Palace, the Tower of London and the Bank of England until July 10, when the guards return.

Water Needs Measured DAVIS, Calif. (AP) — An electronic recording process that will determine when plants need water has been devised at the Davis campus of the University of California. Researchers float a tiny, electrically charged probe on the surface of a leaf, which measures microscopic changes in the thickness of the growing leaf as cells fill with or empty themselves of water. As the plant rises and falls in response to the leaf's changes in thickness, the movement is recorded on a line graph.

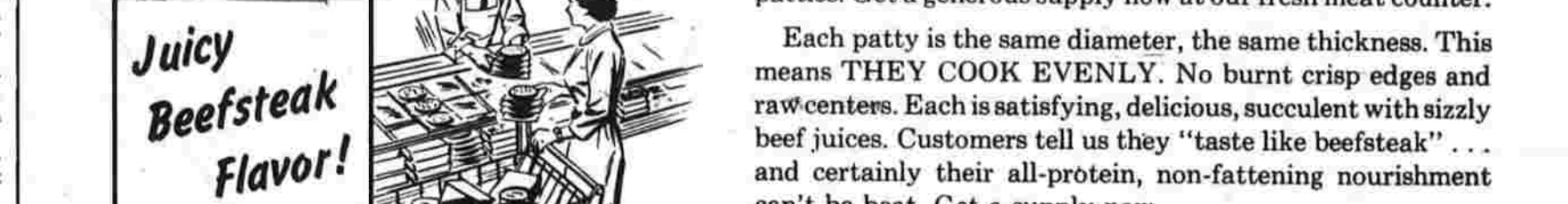
