THE WAY I HEARD IT

Last week I told you about a natural, and one for charge. It is the flat position, the string is open. The natural position twists a fork to shorten the string. A rather more pretentious one is rather sponsored by Hart College of Music. This is the First International Harp Competition of Hartford, and is open to young people of all nationalities.

The age limit is 34; that is, the contestant may not be more than 34 years old on the opening day of the contest. The prizes are quite worthwhile. First prize is \$25,000, second prize \$10,000, and third prize \$5,000. In addition, three gold medals, three silver medals, and three diplomas will be awarded.

Assembled with the harp, it is not too difficult to achieve. It is essentially a diatonic instrument. All scales and arpeggios finger alike, regardless of key signature, since the change of key signature is accomplished by the feet.

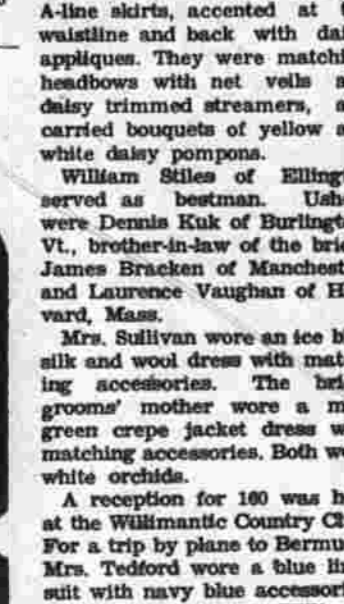

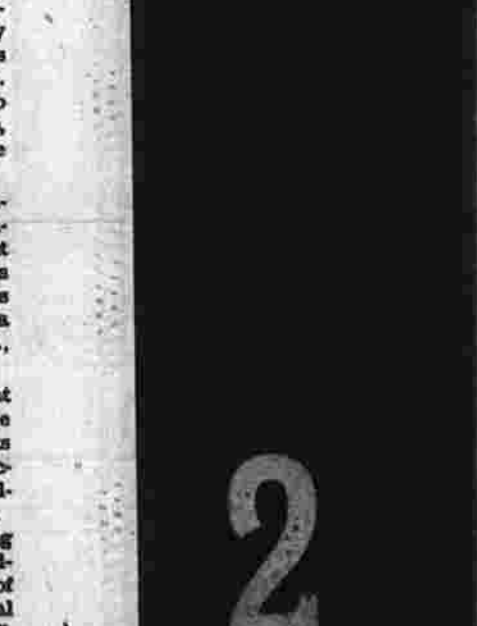

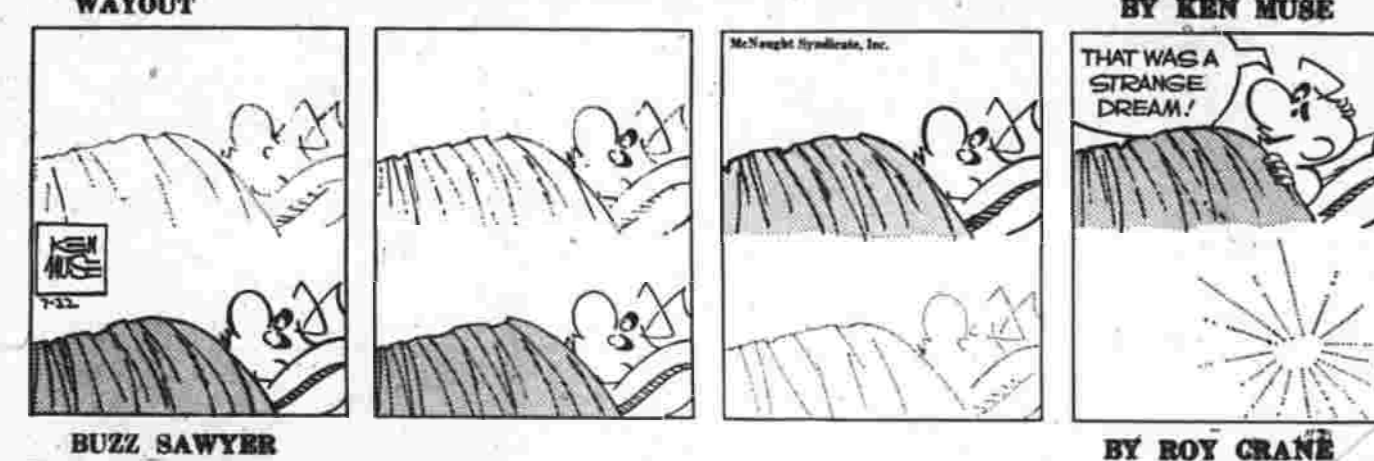
