

Watts Hit Again by Riots, Toll Is 3 Dead, 35 Hurt

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A series of heavy gun battles between police and Negroes swept the riot-ravaged Watts district Sunday night and early today, leaving 3 dead and 35 wounded or injured on the anniversary of the 1965 riots.

The predominantly Negro area appeared relatively calm as dawn ended a night in which police said they were once almost over-run in an exchange of fire in a park. Later, in a brief stage, police estimated 1,000

shots were fired at a police station.

The three dead were listed as Negroes.

Six policemen were hurt, including five by gunshot.

The disturbance broke out as a festival commemorating the third anniversary of the 1965 Watts riot in which 34 died—

some have held the celebration annually since 1966, saying it is proof that something constructive could come from the devastation of 1965. The closing day of this year's festival featured a three-mile-long daytime parade witnessed by perhaps 25,000.

Police called a tactical alert shortly after midnight Sunday placing 2,000 officers on duty throughout the nation's third largest city.

Some 200 officers were rushed into an area around Will Rogers Park, a few blocks from the area that was scorched by the 1965 rioting that caused \$40 million in property damage.

Police Lt. Lew Ritter said the trouble started about 10:30 p.m. when two officers, directing traffic at the Watts Summer Festival, arrested a woman on suspicion of drunkenness.

Bystanders hurled rocks and bottles at the officers, who called for reinforcements. Sixty policemen were sent to the scene and an exchange of gunfire began.

Police Chief Thomas Reddin said the firing at police was heavier than in the early stages of the 1965 rioting.

"Then we had scattered reports of snipers," he said. "This time there was concentrated firing."

Sgt. David McGuff, one of the officers who moved in after the first shooting, said, "We saw a lot of people being hit. They shot into their own crowd."

Ulbricht Arrives, Czech Talks Begin

KARLOVY VARY, Czechoslovakia (AP) — Walter Ulbricht, East German Communist party chief, arrived in this spa today and began talks with Prague's reformist leaders on political and economic relations.

Ulbricht, arriving at the head of an East German delegation, was greeted by Alexander Dubcek, the Czechoslovak party leader and the man Ulbricht tried to get the Kremlin to unseat. Ulbricht was a chief critic of Prague's liberalization drive.

The Czechoslovak and East German delegations were meeting at the Jaworina Hotel. No details of the discussions were disclosed.

Ulbricht and his hosts were expected to give much attention to economic issues and relations with Comecon, the Communist common market. On the political side, Ulbricht was expected to ask the Prague men for assurances that their dealings with West Germany would not harm the position of the Communist regime in East Germany.

Both Czechoslovakia and East Germany, the two most industrialized of the lesser European Communist nations, have large surpluses in their trading ac-

count with the Soviet Union and would like some changes made to benefit from the surpluses.

Ulbricht is the second East European Communist leader to journey to Czechoslovakia since party chief Alexander Dubcek and his colleagues weathered the showdown with the Soviet Union over Prague's liberalization policies.

President Tito returned to Yugoslavia Sunday after a visit to underline his full support for Czechoslovakia's reformist regime. The Romanian president and party chief, Nicolae Ceausescu, arrives Aug. 15 to sign a treaty of friendship, cooperation and mutual assistance.

Romania, Yugoslavia and Czechoslovakia, the three most independent nations in the Eastern bloc, have been drawn closer together by the Prague-Moscow showdown. The East German and Polish Communists, fearful that reform in Czechoslovakia would spawn a similar movement in their countries, were the Kremlin's strongest supporters in the dispute.

A government spokesman said that as one result of Tito's

Group Hopes to Find, Raise Sunken Civil War 'Ironclad'

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — While the proud and mighty battleship New Jersey steams through the Pacific, the antecedent of all battleships rests at the bottom of the ocean just off Cape Hatteras, N.C.

But if a group of men, working in secrecy since last April meet with success, that tiny ship, the USS Monitor, will be found, raised, and exhibited to the public.

The 127-foot "cheesebox on a raft" is famous for three achievements: Saving the Union blockade from the ironclad threat of the Confederate ship Merrimack at the battle of Hampton Roads on Mar. 9, 1862; demonstrating the obsolescence of the wooden warship; and making the movable turret a prime feature of most warships.

The original Monitor, built by Swedish-born inventor John Ericsson at the Greenpoint Navy Yard, Brooklyn, N.Y., in the first two months of 1862, was not a seaworthy vessel.

In the night of Dec. 30, 1862 she foundered in one of the frequent storms off Cape Hatteras

—"graveyard of the Atlantic"—and sank with the loss of 4 officers and 12 men out of her crew of 63.

The location of the "tin can on a shingle" has been a mystery ever since. Accounts of her sinking place her location from 1 to 25 miles offshore.

The group now exploring off Hatteras is a partnership between the state of North Carolina, which claims ownership under a 1967 law, and the North Carolina Tidewater Services, Inc., a salvage company.

Nixon's Plan To Stress TV

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) —Richard M. Nixon is mapping a Republican presidential campaign that will stress television instead of hectic rounds of vote-seeking rallies.

And Nixon seeks also to make the most of his vice presidential running mate, Maryland Gov. Spiro T. Agnew, in dealing with campaign issues and in covering territory for the ticket.

Those themes emerged from the strategy sessions under way during Nixon's working vacation at Mission Bay, a San Diego resort. A new round of talks was set today, while Agnew planned his first independent campaign trip and Mrs. Nixon, with daughter Tricia, sets out for three days of appearances from Seattle to Los Angeles.

Sen. John Tower of Texas, a Nixon ally in the campaign for the GOP presidential nomination and the chairman of its key issues committee, was due in San Diego to sit in on the talks shaping the autumn program.

Herbert G. Klein, Nixon's chief spokesman, said the nominee and his men already had decided to continue the television emphasis they considered a key weapon during the presidential primaries.

"It's our opinion that it would make up a good part of the campaign," Klein said Sunday, "frequently on a regional rather than a national basis."

Klein said television is an excellent medium for Nixon appearances. "He comes across strongly."

He said the emphasis will be on television campaigning with an informal format, in which the nominee would answer unheeded questions.

Along with this emphasis, Klein said, will come a comeback in the round of personal appearances which has characterized past presidential campaigns. Klein said the Nixon forces realize that when the nominee is going to face a massive television audience, he must have time to rest and prepare.

"This time, there will be adequate preparation," Klein said. That evidently is a lesson learned from the physically exhausting campaign Nixon ran eight years ago. The problem was evident, he said, when a tired and haggard Nixon faced John F. Kennedy in the first of their televised debates.

As for teamwork between the two GOP nominees, Klein said Nixon wants to fashion "the most closely coordinated dual campaign in history."

Klein said the staffs of the presidential and the vice presidential nominee will be tied closely together, and their travels—as well as the things they say on issues—will be carefully coordinated.

This, too, apparently stems from a lesson learned in the narrow defeat of 1960. Henry Cabot Lodge was the vice pres-

GIs Try to Encircle Cong In Fighting Near Saigon

SAIGON (AP) —U.S. troops guarding the southern approaches to Saigon battled the Viet Cong today at two points as they tried to encircle the city.

Helicopters landed more than 1,000 men from the 9th Division in rice fields 24 miles south of Saigon in an attempt to encircle an enemy force estimated at more than 100 troops.

Nine miles farther north and only 15 miles below Saigon, another 300 men from the 9th Division virtually wiped out an enemy platoon of 40 or so men, according to initial field reports. Only three Americans were reported wounded.

McGovern Nets Two Delegates
WASHINGTON (AP) — Net gain for Sen. George S. McGovern after two days in the Democratic presidential race appears to be endorsement by several former Kennedy aides, approving nods from some former Kennedy supporters and two delegate votes.

But, the South Dakotan said Sunday, he has at least a "fighting chance" to beat out the other two announced candidates, Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy and Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey.

McGovern commented on a radio-television program 24 hours after he entered the race. He intends to use the medium as the chief vehicle for his 11th hour drive before the Democratic National Convention opening in Chicago two weeks from today.

Lester Maddox May Enter Race
ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) —Gov. Lester Maddox, a Democrat who supported Barry Goldwater in 1964 and says he likes Alabama's George C. Wallace this year, has announced he may make a bid for his party's presidential nomination.

Maddox said his candidacy would offer a choice among one conservative and three candidates he called Socialists.

"I have no intention of running as a favorite son," he added.

Maddox said Sunday he had not discussed the idea with national or state Democratic party officials, and had no idea what their reaction would be.

"My reaction," said state party executive director Joe Sports, "is to wonder how he's going to get 'This is Maddox country' signs pasted up all over the state."

McGovern: Breaker of Rules

WASHINGTON—Sen. George Stanley McGovern, a thoroughly "nice guy," has once again entered a tough game despite the warning that "nice guys finish last."

The 46 year old son of a Methodist minister, who declared himself a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination Saturday, has demonstrated repeatedly in his political career that he is willing to fight the good fight regardless of the political consequences.

He started out that way in Congress in 1957 by voting against the right of Education Committee Chairman—Rep. Graham A. Barden (D.-N.C.) to control subcommittee chairmanships and name staff members.

That was hardly the way for a freshman Congressman to get ahead in the House of Representatives. But McGovern—the first Democrat sent to Congress by South Dakota in 20 years—continued breaking the rules of the establishment. South Da-

ko voters did not seem to mind.

The former Army bomber pilot won re-election to the House in 1958 in a race against Marine fighter pilot Joe Foss. He did lose his first bid for the Senate, however, to the veteran Karl E. Mundt (R) in 1960 by 14,993 votes.

McGovern, in a charge likely to be sounded again in this campaign, said then that the election of Richard M. Nixon would doom the family farm and replace it with "corporate agriculture."

President Kennedy rewarded McGovern's efforts by naming him director of the Food for Peace program in 1961. He put his sense of compassion into the program, finding new ways of using U.S. food surpluses to feed the hungry of the world.

He could never forget, he once said, waking to the sound of Italian women scraping through American Air Force garbage dumps for food during World War II.

"We have cheapened our finest acts," McGovern said in 1961 when talking about the distribution of American surplus foods, "with all this prattle about 'enlightened self interest.' The basic reason for sharing our surpluses is simply that we have food to spare and other people are hungry."

After his stint as Food for Peace administrator in 1961-62, in which time he explained the distribution of American food markedly, McGovern made an

Sudden Deaths Pose Mystery

FORT MYERS, Fla. (AP) — Five men unloading a cargo of fish toppled one-by-one Sunday into the hold of their boat where they were found dead.

Lee County sheriff's investigator James Loeffler said, "We don't know what killed them or where it came from. They either got a whiff of a toxic gas or some sort of chemical poison."

Back from a successful trip, the crew of the 125-foot trawler Novelty and dockworkers were preparing to flood the ship's hold to enable huge pumps to pull out both water and fish.

"When the water was turned on," Loeffler said, "the man holding the hose immediately collapsed and fell into the hold."

The first man to react, Francis L. Winter, 53, of Punta Gorda, Fla., jumped through the hatch and reached the body when he, too, looked over.

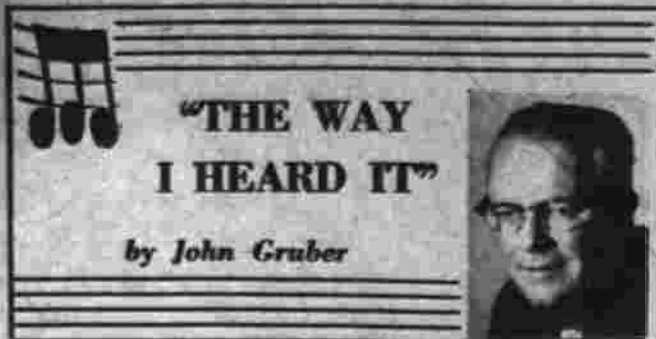
As he slumped into the hold, his brother, Joseph, 55, also of Punta Gorda, raced to the hatchway. He got his feet on the ladder and his hand on the rail when the poles hit him and he fell the rest of the way, Loeffler said.

"The other two men never fell the deck," the investigator said. "They just looked into the hold and collapsed through the hatch."

He said a sixth man was felled by the incredibly fast-acting poison, but was rescued by the ship's one-armed cook, Clyde Parrish, and dock worker Roy McNeely.

"All of this transpired in less than two minutes," Loeffler said. McGovern descended with a rope while holding his breath and raised the last man to be
