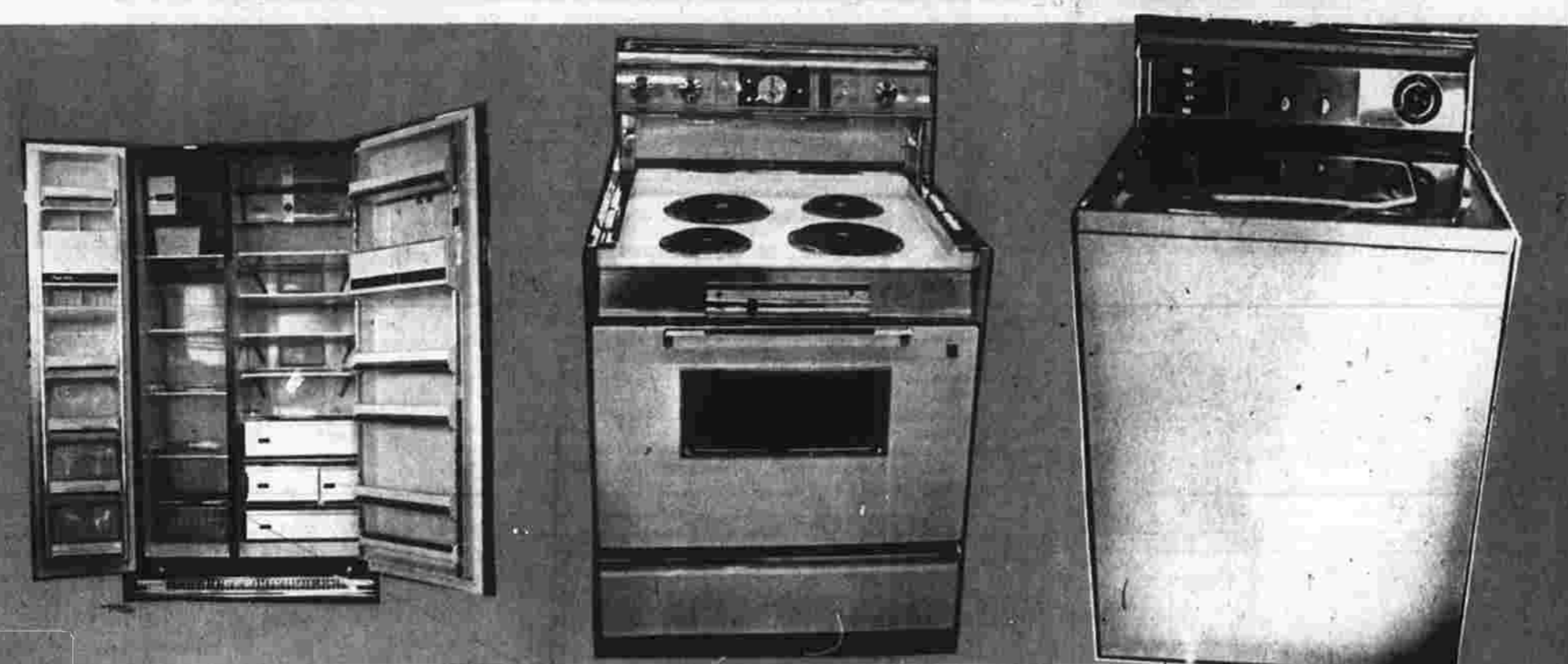

Loud Music Damaged Ear Of Guinea Pig

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Loud music damaged the ear of a guinea pig, a University of Tennessee researcher says.

Dr. David M. Lipscomb, an associate professor in the veterinary school, said a high frequency hearing loss was found in a large number of last year's freshmen.

"We were shocked to find that the hearing of many students had already deteriorated to a level of the average 85-year-old person," Lipscomb said. "Some suggested it might be because teenagers listened to too much loud, noisy music."

Lipscomb conducted a test. Over a three-month period, a guinea pig, with one ear plugged, was exposed to 90 hours of music recorded on a portable cassette player. The sound intensity was 120 decibels.

He said the guinea pig's protected ear was not damaged, and the other ear was almost completely or totally muffled.

From tests that you don't lose a cell every time you listen to five minutes of rock music, Lipscomb said. "Apparently, however, a point is eventually reached where it seems the ear can take no more of the stress and it begins to deteriorate."

Lipscomb said he planned further research in an effort to find that point.

He said tests of 3,000 Knoxville public school pupils showed that about 25 percent had hearing loss. In some cases the hearing loss was quite serious.

Man Does Well After Planting Of New Heart

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — A 56-year-old man yesterday received his second heart transplant in Houston in less than two years, as described in an article after the operation Monday.

Tom Van Baten of Amarillo, Tex., became the world's 33rd human heart recipient in a 200-minute operation performed by a team of Texas Heart Institute surgeons.

The donor was Mrs. Gaspar H. Gossone Jr., 27, a Houston mother of two children. She died as a result of a brain tumor.

Less than 24 hours after surgery, Van Baten was up and walking, according to the institute.

The girl, also listed as asthmatic, played with a color book and complained of being hungry Monday.

Mrs. Gossone was 60 and performed at St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital.

Mrs. Nick A. Glanville, heart of James Dasher Herron II, son of James Dasher Herron, was transferred to the University of Louisville, Ky. She died Sunday after she was flown here.

HARTFORD (AP) — A former University of Connecticut law school honor student and his wife have been arrested on charges of smuggling heroin from the real into Bridgeport, Conn.

Raymond Terian, and his wife Carol, both 28, formerly of Hartford and now of Bridgeport, were arrested Monday after being charged with smuggling heroin into the country through the mail.

They were presented before U.S. Commissioner Carroll W. Brewster in New Haven and released on \$5,000 bond each in the custody of their parents.

The heroin, valued at over \$8,000, was mailed into the country from Tel Aviv, Israel, inside cases that originally contained mixed lobster food, Ass. U.S. Atty. John V. Casidonio said. It was mailed parcel post.

The four pounds of the narcotic, valued at about \$1,000 per pound, were tracked down at Kennedy International Airport in New York by U.S. Customs agents. They were located at the U.S. Post Office there.

The government learned July 27 the package had been mailed by the Terians from Israel according to a sworn affidavit. They returned from their trip earlier this month.

The case was continued for a possible preliminary hearing on probable cause until after Labor Day. The Terians were released in the custody of their parents, and were required to surrender their passports by Asst. U.S. Atty. Casidonio.

State Pilot Dies, 1 Hurt In Skyraneer Crash

STRATFORD (AP) — A pilot employed by the Sikorsky Aircraft division of United Aircraft Corp. has been killed in a helicopter crash in Colombia.

The victim, 25-year-old Robert L. Morris of Manter, was riding in a Skyraneer that was coming in for a landing at an oil drilling site about 200 miles northwest of Bogota. The chopper plunged about 100 feet to the ground, the company said Monday.

The Jakarta Weather Bureau said the quake was recorded at seven on the Richter scale and its epicenter was believed to be about 1,500 miles northeast of Jakarta.

When you bid a slam that sure depends on a finesse you have only an even chance to succeed. In the long run you gain nothing by losing such slams, but you are quite willing to bid a slam that depends on a finesse only after one or two other chances have failed.

Tolland PZC Approves 2 Subdivisions

The Planning and Zoning Commission last night approved two subdivisions totaling ten houses, and set the date for public hearing on three items.

The public hearing will be held Sept. 9 at 8 p.m. in the town hall at 125 Main St. The items are:

- Subdivision of a 1.8-acre lot into two lots.
- Subdivision of a 1.8-acre lot into two lots.
- Subdivision of a 1.8-acre lot into two lots.

The second subdivision approved by the PZC contains seven lots. The applicant is Mrs. Anna Newman of Tolland.

The lots were described as among the "best I've seen in town," by sanitary inspector Leon Devre last night in reply to a PZC inquiry.

Mrs. Newman had requested the town "desist from directing water onto her land by culverts in front of Lot 1 and 9" by plugging the discharge into easement areas she would provide.

The PZC declined to take any action in the request, stating it was not in its province to act on it. The request had raised questions in the minds of PZC members, however, as to the condition of the lots during wet weather.

Devre assured the PZC last night the lots had excellent drainage conditions and the PZC would include some guidelines for cemetery locations in the zoning ordinances.

The town's current cemetery space is becoming low and locally within the rapid growth of the town is about to be exceeded.

A Capital Region Planning Agency report made in April 1967 indicates that only 4.8 acres out of a total cemetery acreage of 14.7 within the town is still unused. The average death rate figure used by CRPA for its 28 member towns is 12 persons per 1,000 residents, or 84 deaths per year for Tolland. Although the PZC felt this was high for Tolland, which has an average younger population than many other towns, it was generally agreed Tolland would average 80 to 82 deaths per year.

The town's three cemeteries are owned and operated by the town. There are no private cemeteries located within the town at this time.

Subdivision Approval

The PZC attached two conditions to the approval of the three lot Rock-Ban subdivision on Mile Hill Rd. near the corner of Gehring Rd. The subdivisions will await the return of First Selectman Bruce Vre from vacation.

To Meet with IDC

The PZC will meet with members of the Industrial Development Commission at the Sept. 9 meeting to decide on specific locations along the Wilbur Cross Highway to be zoned for industrial purposes.

The PZC's findings, after meeting with state officials two weeks ago, would be to cluster these industrial locations in certain areas along the highway.

These areas would be located near existing roads to permit the construction of a little private access roads as necessary, and yet to give highway viewing exposure to any prospective industries.

The PZC also tabled action on calling a public hearing on new road specifications until the highway by the large gravel trucks.

Residents of the area cited the narrowness of the road, which makes it difficult for a gravel truck and a school bus to pass. They also claimed that a blind curve was located just before the point in which the proposed road was to be located. The map of the proposed area drawn for the application does not show a sharp curve, however.

The hearing session will permit the new road superintendent, once hired, to set on the safety factors of the road.

Next night's meeting of the Board of Selectmen is not expected to act on the road superintendent vacancy. The Board will meet next night at 8 p.m. at the town hall.

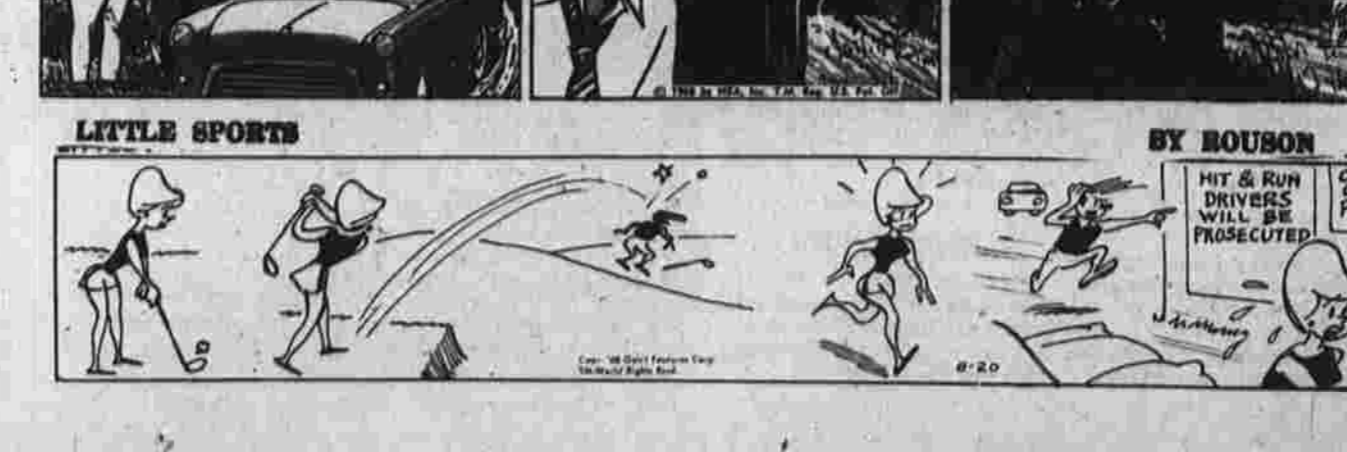
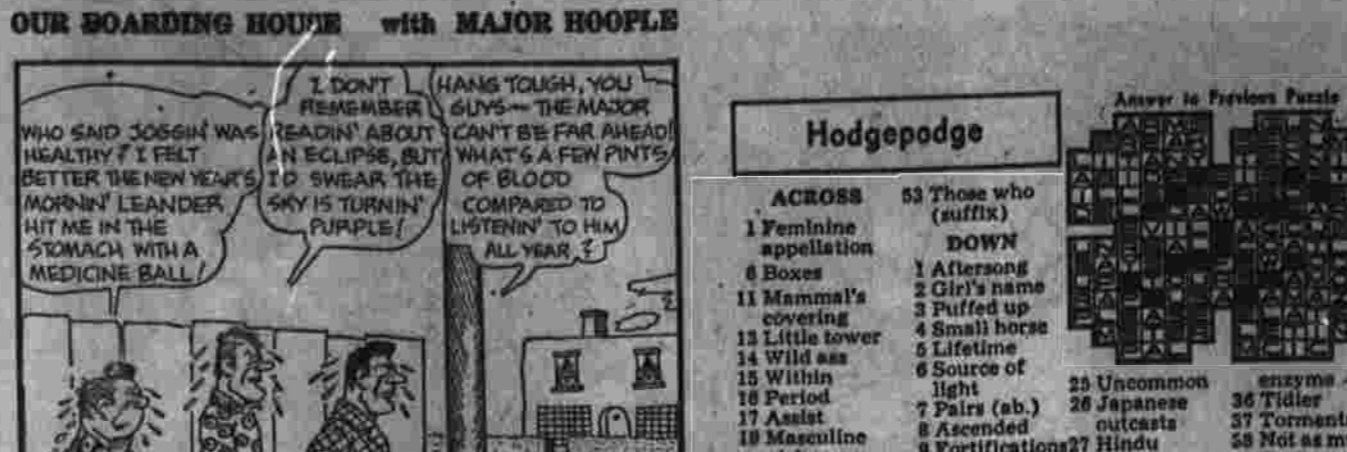
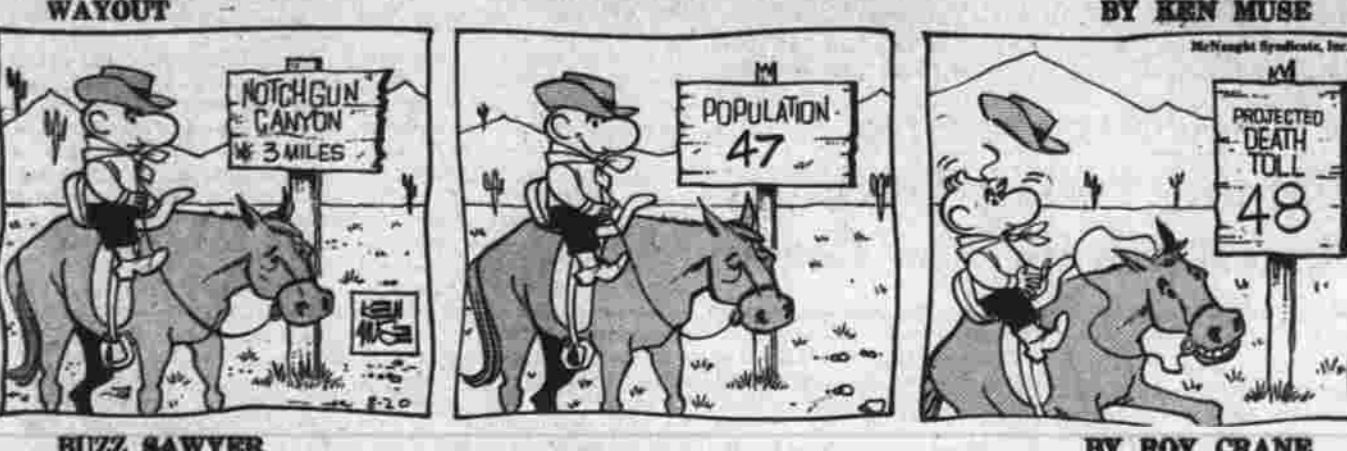
