





Street Debate In Prague

Friday's New York Times carried, b a special dispatch from Prague, an account of a conversation between a Russian lieutement colonel and a Czechoslo rakian lieutenant colonel in the streets of Prague, before an audience of Rusdan soldiers holding submachine guns on their laps and a street crowd of Czech civilians.

The debate went like this: CZECH OFFICER: After 45 years of friendship between our countries, you come and shot our people. Why did you come? What is the reason? RUSSIAN OFFICER: We received our orders. We are soldiers. We follow

CZECH: Did you think about order? In the Csech Army we are supposed to think about the orders. You came to occupy us. You came at night, without an invitation. It would not burt so much even then, but you started to shoot our people and children. RUBBIAN: We only got orders to come here. We received no orders to shoot.

The troops were told to behave themselves. We were told we were being sent to combat a counterrevolution, but when we came here we did not see any. CZECH: Even the Germans when they Russians did. You shot at our national monuments - our museums and our castle -Why did you do this? Why did you behave like an occupation army?

RUBSIAN: Our soldiers receive CZECH: You came in 1945 as a liberation army and we welcomed you. Now you come as an occupation army and you are not welcome.

CZECH: If you receive orders to shoot the Russian people would you do it? RUSSIAN: We received our orders and we cannot think about them.

That was the debate, in the streets of Prague the other day. It was a debate which stirs many emotions and sentiments. But beyond emotion and sentiment, it was a debate which winds up posing one

Do we agree that this has to be, and ought to be, so long as it has to be, the kind of world in which the answers the Russian soldier gave would have to be correct for any soldier in any army? Or do we think that this ought to become, because it will have to become such in order to survive, the kind of world in which a soldier can, as the Czech officer claimed his soldiers were supposed to think about orders and per-

haps refuse to follow them? Do we want our own soldiers to be as "good soldiers" as the Russians seem to be? Or do we want them to be debating which orders they shall carry out? Dendur Comes To Manhattan

The temple of Dendur, a surviving wonder of Egyptian antiquity so uniqu and so precious the whole cultured work reacted generously to ward off the posshility that it would be destroyed by the latest mortal manipulation of the waters of the Nile, has now arrived t

This whole temple has come as only part of the cargo of one freighter. It was transported in only 661 wooder

When it is reassembled on the lawn of the Metropolitan Museum of Art it will be only 261/4 feet high. Altogether, it weighs only 640 tons.

The whole process, of dismantlin the Temple of Dendur where it had stoo for 2,000 years on the banks of the Nile f numbering the stones for reconstruction purposes, and of packing them for the long sea journey to America, has ctually proved surprisingly easy much too easy, one is tempted to think, or the removal of one land's native ulture into the dilettantish connoisseur

Does Manhattan have any other structure likely to be considered beautiful enough to save after 2,000 years?

The Highway Loby Scores Again Highway planners, whether on a state or federal level, seem to have a characteristic tendency toward imperiousness which brooks no challenge to their flats on where and how highways are to be built.

This arrogance has been balked, or has encountered heavy opposition not only here in New Haven but throughout Connecticut and the rest of the country when such road plans proposed to eat up park and recreation lands and other open spaces, such as wildlife re

fuges.

This end-around has just been not so-neatly accomplished in the adoption by Congress of the Federal Ald Higtway Act of 1968, a measure which not only exposes the nation's open spaces once again to easy road grabs, but also tortures the highway beautification pro-gram to the point of collapse.

As finally adopted and sent to the President, the act weakens considerably previously-contained restrictions on highway layouts that gobbled up parks and recreation sites. What remained was feeble limitation which applies only cally-owned parks are now outside the act's protective umbrella.

A token \$2 million appropriation for the highway beautification program, which covers administration costs and little else, reduces the effort to a meaningless exercise in aloganeering.

The act is a monument to the "high-way lobby" — loosely, a conglomeration consisting of the Federal Bureau of Public Roads, the various state agencies as represented by the American Association of State Highway Officials, and he road building industry. But it could become a tombstone for

It stems, quite obviously from the fact that the industry knows that it is under sharp observation and has been under sharp attack. The key and the problem is one word: violence. "Collision Course."

Television has gone through through the years been charged with using violence as an enter-tainment device. This time, however, criticism comes in the shocking murders. The industry as a whole, concerned with its image, is reacting, perhaps

image, is reacting, perhaps over-reacting.

The problem is that there are no positive guidelines to follow; no rules about how many blows may be struck, how many shots may be fired. And the difficulty is that conflict, particularly physical conflict, is the basic building block of most programs except situation comedy and variety shows.

Even the summer reruns have been affected by television's sensitive reaction. Programs have been edited to cut down the length of battles. Teasers—usually action-packed bits—to open programs have been watered down if not eliminated.
