# The Richard Martin School

The Richard Martin School, Manchester's first new school since the Iling Junior High School was completed in 1961, is approaching the final stages of organization and will be ready to open its doors to some 275 children Sept. 5. It is located in a 12-acre tract off the west side of Dartmouth Rd. which was extended and now connects Spring and Fern Sts. Designed by architect Richard Mankey and built by the Annuli Construction Co., both of Manchester, it takes advantage of the beautiful surroundings near Globe Hollow and Camp Kennedy.

Mankey considers the site "one of the most ideal and attractive" he has worked with. The low-profile, one-story building has a dark brown brick exterior with an extensive overhang and a white fascia of light, textured pre-cast concrete.

Mrs. Lillian V. Shenae was appointed principal of Martin School in April and remained as principal of South School on S. Main St. The two were joined as one administrative unit by the Board of Education in January. Mrs. Shenae previously had been teaching principal at South School for four years.

Recalling her first PTA meeting at South in the fall of 1964, Mrs. Shenae said, "I became aware immediately of the need for a new school because of overcrowding at South and of the deep concern of the parents involved."

Nearly seven years ago Globe Hollow District children began transferring to Washington School, then Highland Park. Both schools were also operating under crowded conditions.

The opening of the \$1 million 12-room school, encompassing some 12,600 square feet, marks the end of a "continual campaign to see this school built," Mrs. Shenae said.

Through the years, the new principal added, "The parents have been outstanding. They understood and accepted the situation, realizing it was in the best interest of the most children. Little antagonism marred the harmony of the group, and our efforts rarely met with opposition."

In the spring of 1965, then Superintendent of Schools William Curtis began work on a new school in the Globe Hollow District, warning of split sessions if construction were delayed.

The Board of Education unanimously agreed to the present site that December. Former General Manager Richard Martin, for whom the school is named, had proposed it to save overcrowding at South and of the deep concern of the parents involved.

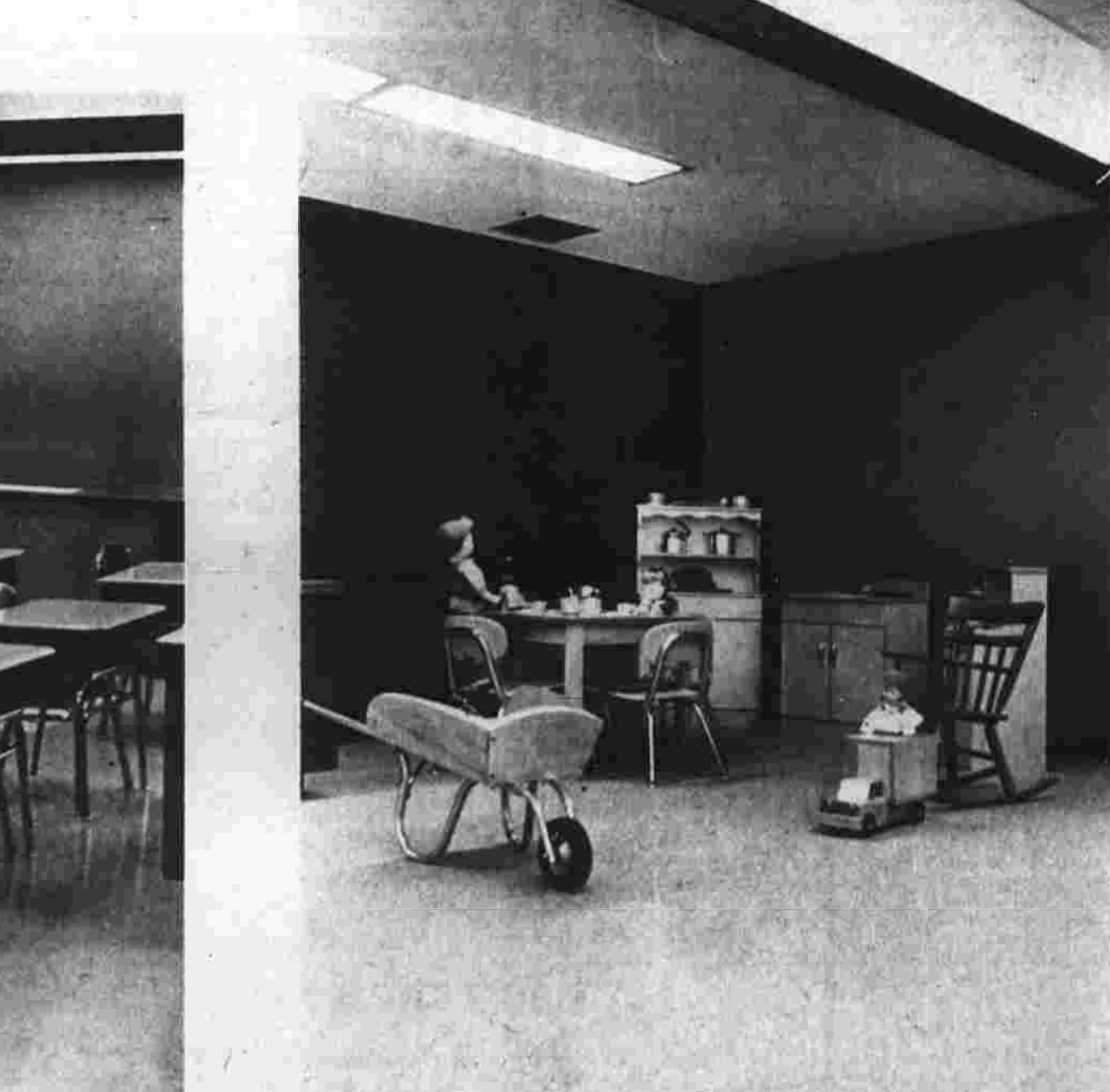

## United Fund \$\$\$ Work For-- Catholic Family Services

A young unmarried girl finds herself pregnant. She is overwhelmed with fear and despair. Her parents are shocked and ashamed.

A husband and wife finally realize that their continuous arguments are robbing their marriage of all joy and harmony so that there seems no point in going on together.

Parents become hopelessly apologetic when their method of discipline fails to correct their child, who is creating trouble day after day.

Relative of an aging person living alone slowly agree she can no longer care for herself, but they don't know what can be done.

A young couple happily decides to adopt a baby and wonder how to go about it.

For all these problems a call to Catholic Family Services will start the process of finding the solution. If the Service cannot provide the necessary answer, a social worker there will refer the people to the proper agency which can help to bring about a happier life for those involved.

From October 1967 to March 1968 Catholic Family Services had an office in Manchester with Mrs. Arnette Baker as the social worker. When the office was opened, the agency had hoped that Mrs. Baker could emphasize marital counseling in this area, and the fact that the first month she had 20 new applications for help with such problems showed the need for this type of service. She received, however, calls for aid in the other kinds of difficulties for which Catholic Family Services offers assistance. Funds were not available to add more social workers so counseling had to be limited.

## Kay Francis Star of 30's Dead at 63

NEW YORK (AP)—Kay Francis, the tall brunette glamour girl who became one of the highest paid Hollywood stars of the 1930's, died Monday following a long illness. She was 63.

She had been a cancer patient at New York Hospital but returned home to her apartment on East 64th Street Saturday. At her request there will be no funeral service.

Her acting career began on Broadway but quickly shifted to Hollywood where she made more than 90 films including "Haffner," "Mandala," "I Found Stella Foster" and "Give Me Your Heart."

She was a popular success in her last years. Her most substantial in 1937 when she received \$27,500 in salary while an industrial executive like the chairman of the Firestone Tire and Rubber Co. earned \$95,000.

In her last years she had long and slinky evening gowns she won a reputation as one of the most beautiful women; she was considered the epitome of glamour and sexiness in her day.

Mrs. Francis was afflicted with a faint lip and sometimes had difficulty pronouncing her just her voice only seemed to add to her popular appeal.

In 1946, after an 18-year absence from the Broadway stage, she returned in "State of the Union," the Pulitzer Prize comedy and she ended her acting career in summer stock.

are, library, and kindergarten floors. Mrs. Shenae said that although the carpeting is experimental, reports indicate it cuts down on noise, and is easier and less costly to maintain. The rest of the school has tile floors.

**Connecticut Yankee**

By A.H.O.

The McCarthy forces at Chicago are under a compulsive push to follow the strategy of the Connecticut Yankee.

The Connecticut Yankee, when it took place last June, was a prearranged political maneuvering place which was relatively comfortable because it was a temporary measure and also because it was equipped with a number of options.

A nearby school auditorium was the meeting place, and the political stance taken there was one which left the McCarthyites still technically within the party, for purposes of larging and dealing, even while actually it was perhaps already in exile.

This Connecticut Yankee without spread to New York a week later. We will be surprised if the tactic does not see repeated, with Connecticut perhaps leading at Chicago this time.

Once again, there will be a physical kind of destination awaiting any such walkout. It will be that prospective place on the Connecticut bank which organizers of the "New Party" began preparing to obtain by petition before the Chicago Convention even opened.

Similarly, while it may be no comfortable half-way house for the exercise of various political options.

The rebels will have to decide, quickly, what they want to do and how they want to do it.

The options on what they can do seem to have been diminished by operations beyond their control. The movements of the Republican Nominee Nixon to deal with the potential rebels among the Republicans, and the apparent decision of Governor Rockefeller to stay well inside the Republican fold, rather than to run on some other ticket, seem to have closed down the widest dreams of the McCarthy people. There would be the white coalition ticket held the fourth party effort.

If they could get something like a Rockefeller-McCarthy or Rockefeller-McGovern ticket, then they would have wide ideas of actually winning the election with a last-starting fourth party.

If that is denied them, they have to decide to take the fourth party lever open to the regular Democrats for not taking their man and their politics, designed to reject "politicians as usual" with a fine disdain for whatever particular candidate among the "politicians as usual" may be helped into the White House by their own separatist voting.

As we have read the McCarthy mood all along, it will accept that prospective destination almost as willingly as it accepted its indeterminate half-way station immediately following the state convention in June. These people didn't get into political action just to go lamely along, in the end, with the forces they were out to challenge.

**Tolland County Election Due Sept. 16 for Farm Panel**

States of nominees for membership on the Agricultural, Stabilization and Conservation Committee are now being established at the County office and elections will be held by Sept. 16.

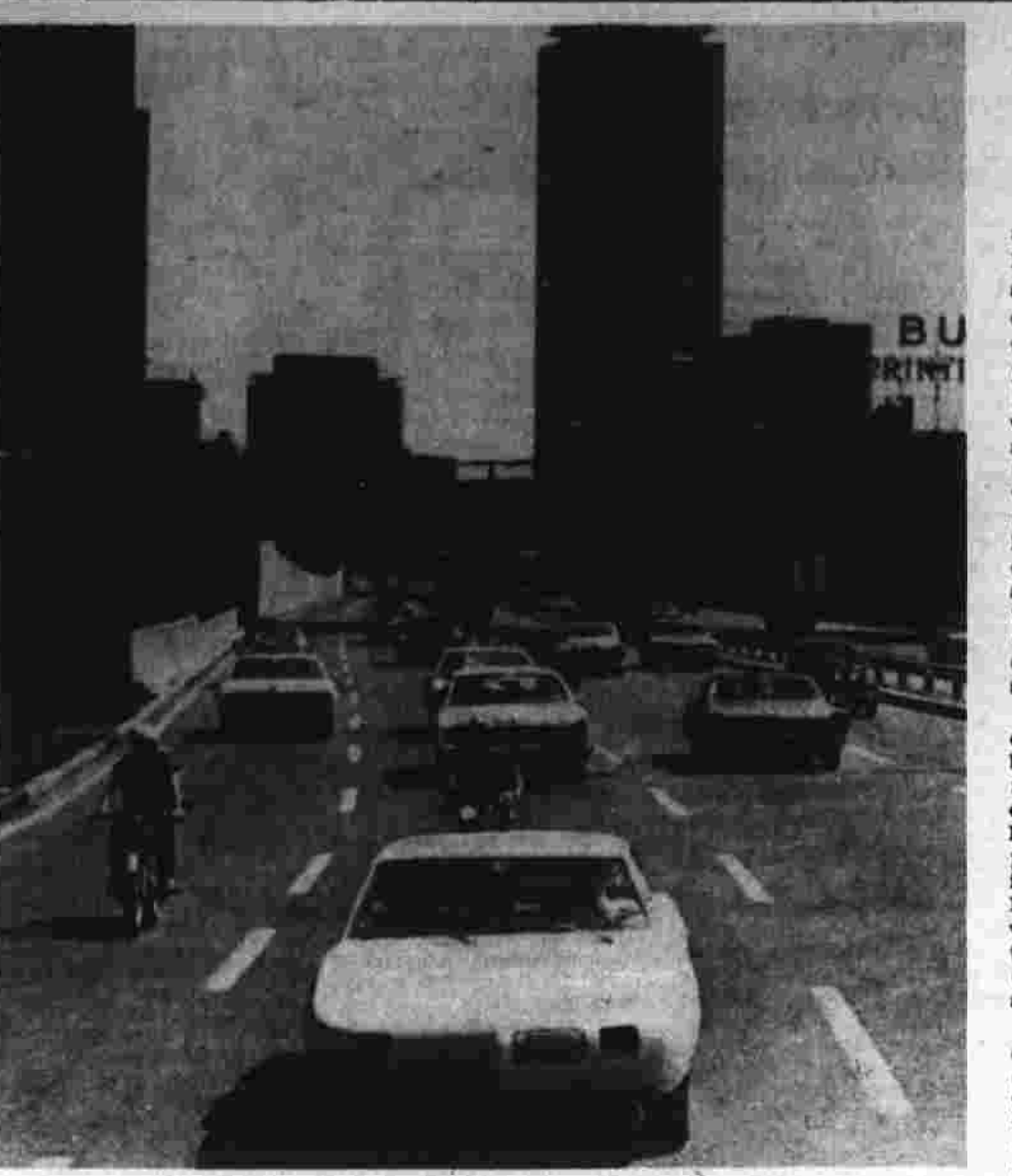

The Tolland County elections will be held by mail with ballots to be returned on or before Sept. 16 to the office on Rt. 10.

Each community election will choose three community committee members and two alternates. The regular members elected will serve as delegates to the county convention, where voters will be elected to fill vacancies on the county committee.

Notices of community boundaries and of the right to nominate by petition appear on committee-election posters displayed at various locations throughout the county.

**Court Orders Bus Drivers To End Walkout**

CHICAGO (AP) — Bus drivers disputing with their union are under court order to end their walkout but a spokesman for the dissident drivers predicted no more buses would roll today than on Monday.

Adding to the transportation curtailment at a time when the city is host to the Democratic National Convention is a continuing strike against Chicago's bus service on the North Side which has held 80 per cent of the city's taxis.

The Chicago Transit Authority

(CTA) obtained a circuit court order directing the dissident bus drivers, calling themselves the Concerned Transit Workers, to return to work.

The dissidents are Negro members of the Amalgamated Transit Workers, Local 341, who they claim have been denied representation in the higher councils of the local. More than half of the city's bus drivers are Negro but there are no Negroes on the union's executive committee.

This results, the dissidents say, from a provision nullifying retired bus drivers, most of whom would vote in elections. This service on the North Side was reported as normal Monday but sharply reduced on the South and West sides where there are large Negro neighborhoods and Negro bus drivers man the buses.

The same union means the elected and subway trains but service on those lines operated normally Monday.

Taxicab service as well as bus service was sharply curtailed. A strike of drivers against Yellow Cab and Checker taxi companies left the city with only a fourth of its normal complement of cabs—those driven by independents.

The drivers are members of a committee of the Beaufort International Union. They are asking a commission of 50 per cent of their fare collections. The companies have offered 48 per cent, but only to drivers with 10 years' seniority.

Party leaders in Midwestern swing states such as Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Iowa, and Kansas may privately that statewide candidates this year would win with McCarthy but lose with Humphrey. Yet, these same leaders—including some statewide candidates themselves—also may privately that McCarthy is too far outside the Roosevelt-Kennedy activist model of the Presidency to be underlined in his reaction to the Czech crisis. By refusing to make the slightest effort to conform to that model, McCarthy has missed his golden opportunity to take control of a party desperately searching for a winner.

This desperate search has now created desperate corridor talk by delegates, including some major names in the party, about dropping Sen. Edward M. (Ted) Kennedy. Indeed, McCarthy's political advisors have sought to invest their candidate with the Kennedy star by attempting, with recent prospect of success, to talk Ted Kennedy into leaving McCarthy's nominating speech.

During such a dramatic event, McCarthy's cause is hopeless. He is the victim of a lonely non-conformity that has had devastating appeal to non-politicians, but has devastatingly repelled delegates and politicians.

In his non-conformity, McCarthy refused to ask politicians, from Senators on down, for help; he ignored, to his misfortune,

Militarily, the Russian rape of Czechoslovakia was swift and efficient. The tanks and trucks got where they were supposed to be in no time at all, with superior firepower everywhere.

Nonetheless, there was no conquest. When the spirit of Czechoslovakian people stood firm and unafraid, the tanks lost part of their presumed authority.

In the world, opinion runs in one almost unbroken torrent of criticism, the wielders of the unlimited military power were forced to retreat and consider before they pressed on to the full use of their power.

What has resulted has been considerable contrast between the efficient act of military invasion and the establishment of military power on the scene and the subsequently almost desperate segments of the policy-makers in the Kremlin to get themselves around to a polite, civilized version of a solution to the problem which made them invade the satellite.

Russia wants agreement, rather than dictation, compromise rather than direct rule.

And one reason Russia wants such softer solutions is that Russia has, like other great powers in our time, come up against the one hopeful trend which is developing in the affairs of mankind — the trend toward the limitation of the power of the great powers.

They still have their formidable military strength. But if they try to depend on it, and on it alone, they find that it is steadily proving less efficient in producing the results they seek and more costly to themselves. For the past week, even the great Russian armed fist plunged deep into the heart of Czechoslovakia has developed its own hesitations, its nervous uncertainties, its hint of paralysis, and has been acting as if it hoped for rescue by some kind of factor and influence different from itself.

There is still the sharp, terrible danger that the unintelligent fist on one hand, the courageous resistance of intellectuals on the other, may between them twist the situation into the tragic spilling of unlimited blood.

But if that can be avoided, then the potential lesson will remain — the lesson that the biggest powers, in the world of today, must calculate for and learn to live with strange limitations on their own power.

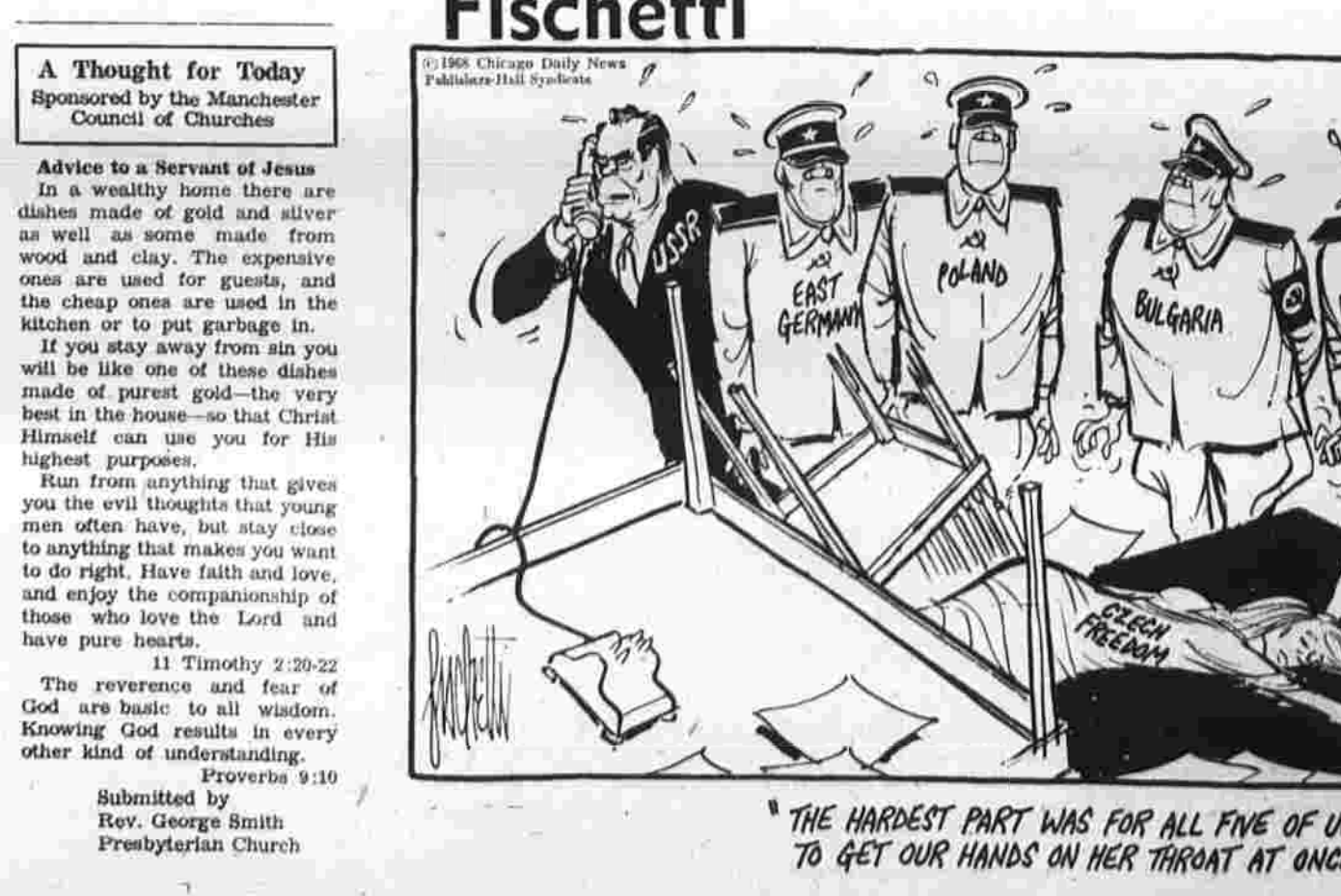

Shortly before the 1,000 of the protesters, youths in the peace movement and Yippies—members of the Youth International Party—broke through several pockets of police security and marched to the downtown Democratic headquarters.

The clash in Lincoln Park which runs several miles along the North Side lakefront, was sparked by the protesters' refusal to obey a police order to clear the park for an 11 p.m. curfew.

The group quickly erected a barricade of picnic tables and trash cans in one corner of the park against some 600 policemen massed in a parking lot opposite them and chanted: "Hell no, we won't go. The parks belong to the people."

"This is the final warning," a police loudspeaker boomed. "We have information that you will take whatever measures are necessary to see that no one gets hurt, including police officers."

Then police lobbed in tear-gas canisters, and the throng streamed through the park and out into a major intersection. Many held handkerchiefs over their eyes when they reached the street.

A police squad car that had attempted to approach the crowd from behind was stoned and its windows and flashing light broken.

Police ordered newsmen to leave the park before the tear gas was used. They warned that no sanction or quarter would be given if they stayed.
