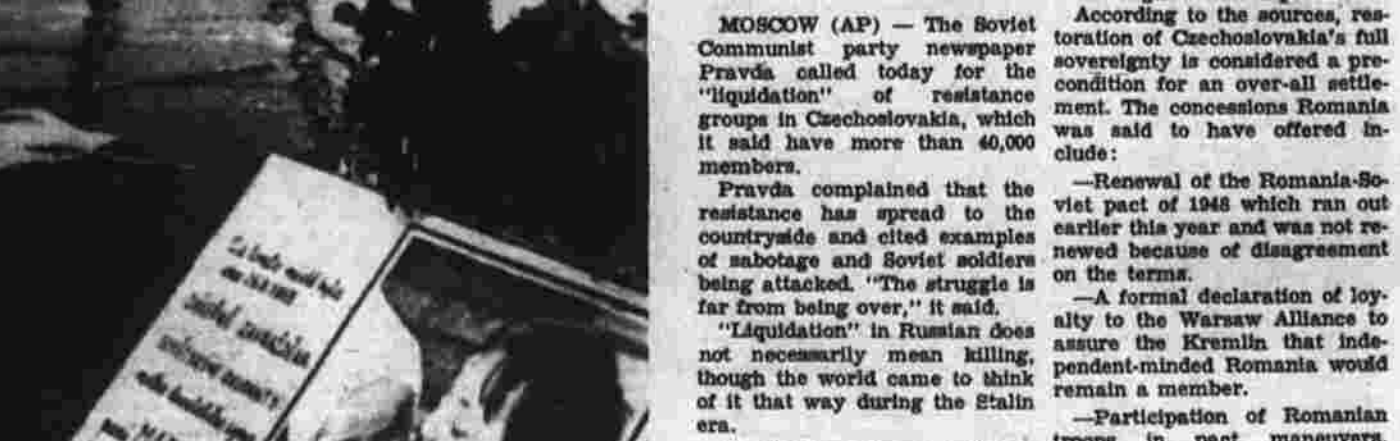

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Vodka Sales Zooming New Longer Weekends Driving Soviets to Drink?

MOSCOW (AP)—Vodka, a joy and curse of Russia for centuries, is getting a boost this year as Russian workers face a new challenge—how to use their new long weekends.

The five-day work week, introduced last winter in most Soviet factories, appears to be driving the workers to drink.

Other unforeseen problems also have arisen, but drunkenness draws the harshest rebukes in the official press.

The humor magazine Krokodil summed it up in a cover cartoon recently: "Now I have two days off," the reeling husband tells his wife so he can come home brandishing two empties.

To the Russian reader, it was instantly clear that he had emptied two quarts of vodka by the end of his two days off, probably because he could find nothing better to do.

The cartoon was painfully close to reality.

Vodka sales jumped more than 20 per cent when workers were given two consecutive days off. Industrial production, which was expected to benefit from the new schedule, dropped in many plants because people often were in no shape to work Monday morning.

The Russian laborer seemed to be making up for years of long hours and hard work.

The wartime 60-hour week was cut to 48 hours in the mid-1940s, then to 41 hours in 1960 under Nikita S. Khrushchev.

But the 41-hour week was spread over six days, giving most people only Sunday as leisure.

After years of promises, the last of 77 million factory and office workers finally got the extended weekend at the beginning of 1968. Their working hours were redistributed so that they still work 41 hours a week.

This is not the 36-hour week Khrushchev promised them, but the novelty of two days off seems to please the average man in many respects.

Trips to the countryside are now possible on any summer weekend. The typical Russian might indulge his passion for hunting mushrooms, camping, or just hiking in the woods.

Except for the motor people, there is now nothing to prevent families from traveling to nearby lakes on Saturday, returning home Sunday evening.

All this is new and heartening for the Soviet population.

Sleuthing Device Will Tape Sound From Noisy Cars

HARTFORD (AP)—Noisy vehicles on the highways won't stand a chance if a new electronic listening device is put into use in Connecticut.

Under a \$69,476 contract announced Thursday between the Connecticut Research Council and the CBS Laboratories in Stamford, an electronic listening device will be developed.

The device contains a miniature camera with split lens that records offending vehicles, with a chart to measure the noise level. It is about the size of a suitcase.

The device can be operated remotely on the highways, and will be controlled automatically by a sound-activated device developed by CBS Laboratories for the federal government.

"Ordinances for controlling noise have been handicapped in the past by a lack of suitable instrumentation to analyze excessive noise levels to produce proper data for law enforcement," said Benjamin B. Bauer, vice president of acoustics and magnetic research for CBS.

The little listening box will be an invaluable tool to policemen, the commission said, and will "provide unobtainable technical and legal evidence that a car, truck or motorcycle is making excessive noise."

The targets of the device will be "such noise polluters as defective or nonoperative mufflers and loose mechanical equipment," Bauer said.

RESTORING THE ENEMY IS SECOND-BEST PLAN

The average bridge player resists his opponent. If they try to rig, he will try to nag. This is better than having no plan at all, but it isn't as good as thinking for yourself.

Opening lead—four of spades. East won the first trick with the ace of spades and returned a low trump. South won with the king of hearts and saw on by that the opponents were aiming to deprive him of a spade ruff. Reacting to this threat, South took the king of spades and ruffed his last spade in dummy.

Now there was the problem of getting out of dummy. Declarer took two top clubs, on hearts and jack of clubs. If East also held the ace of diamonds, he would not have passed as a dealer. So South should play a dealer. So South should play a dealer. So South should play a dealer.

Needless Ruff
There was no need to ruff a spade in dummy. After taking the king of hearts, South should continue with the queen of hearts to force out the ace.

East then returns the jack of spades to South's king. Declarer draws the last missing trump and tries the club. If the suit happens to break favorably, South would have the rest of the tricks.

When the clubs break badly, South ruffs a club and leads a diamond. By this time South knows that East started with

Willimantic Man Pleads Innocent On Raid Charge

NORWICH (AP)—Alphonse Macha, 29, of Willimantic has pleaded innocent to charges stemming from his alleged role in a raid on a pacifist camp in Voluntown by so-called Minutemen.

Macha entered his plea Monday to W. W. Bacon Hospital here. He had been under treatment for arm and leg gunshot wounds received in the raid and was about to be released. Instead, he was taken on a pick-up on Monday to the Norwich Correction Center in lieu of \$20,000 bond.

State police, tipped in advance by the FBI of a planned attack on the New England headquarters of the Committee for Non-Violent Action, arrested Macha and loaded into a van with other defendants after the shoot-out a week ago.

All were charged with conspiracy to commit arson. Five of them, including Macha, were also charged with assault with a dangerous weapon.

Bonds for four of the others were set Monday, and their cases were continued to Sept. 29, as was Macha's. A sixth defendant is still hospitalized.

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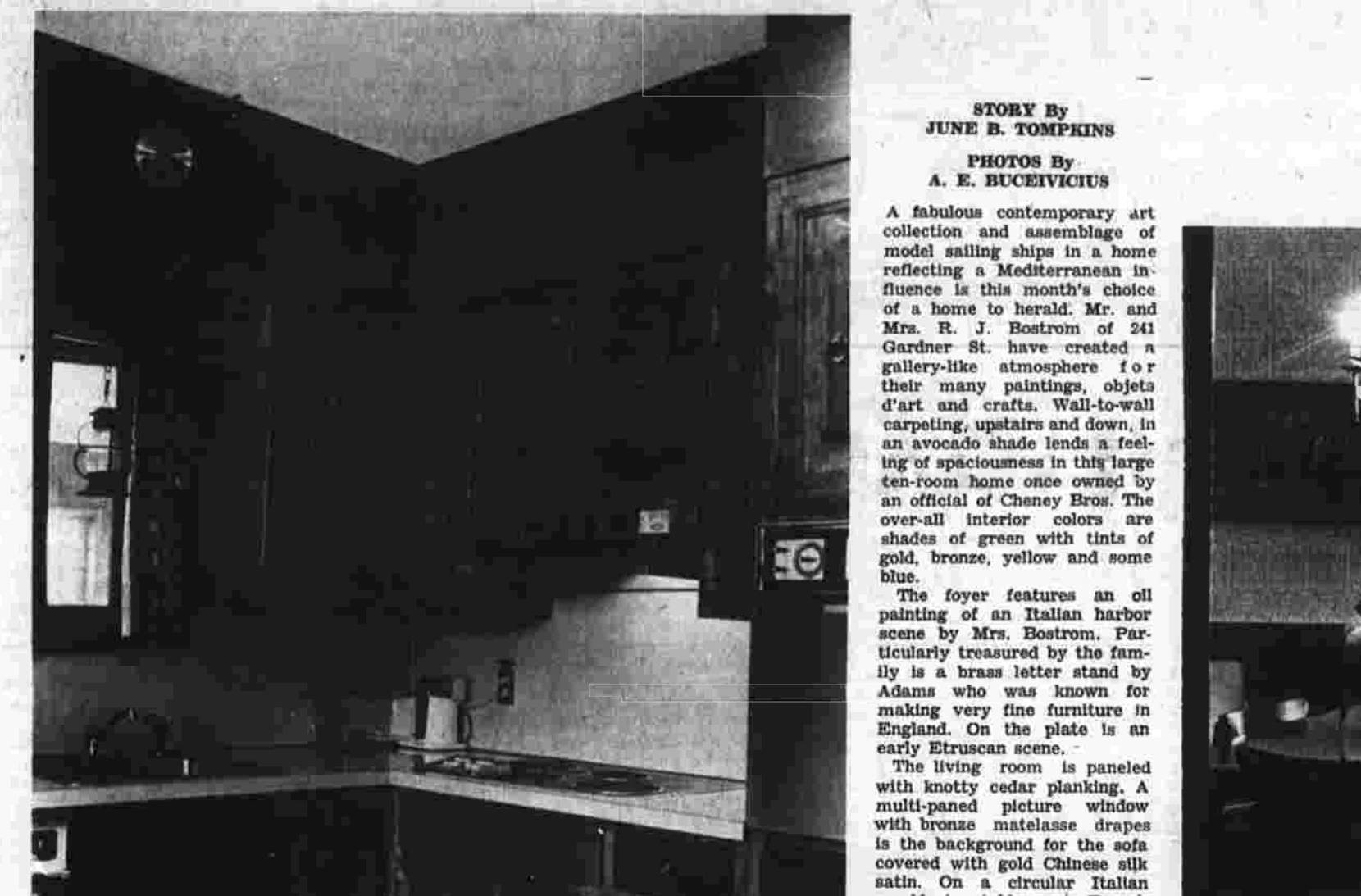

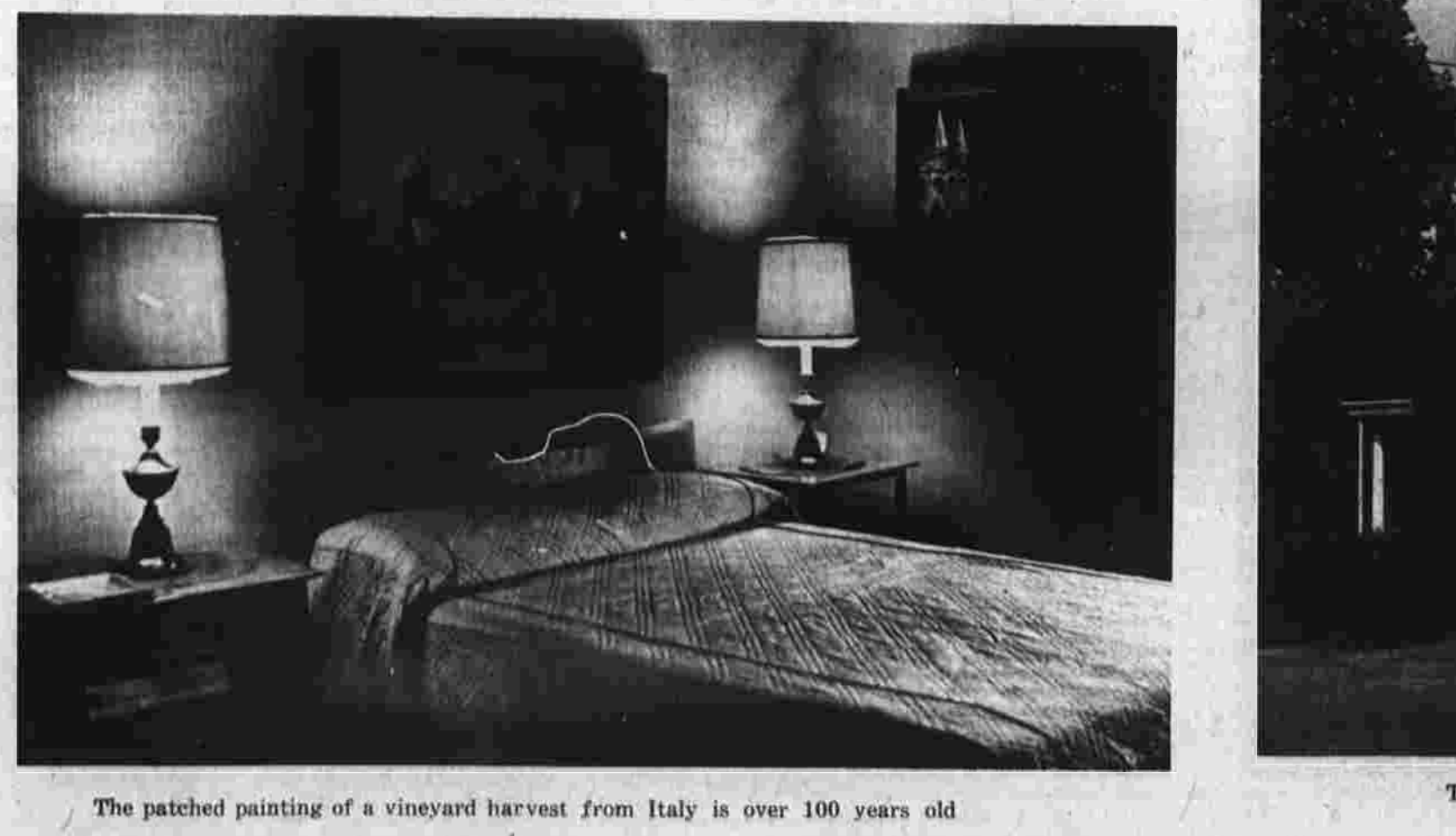
A fabulous contemporary art collection and assemblage of model sailing ships in a home reflecting a Mediterranean influence is this month's choice of a home to herald. Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Bostrom of 241 Gardner St. have created a gallery-like atmosphere for their many paintings, objets d'art and crafts. Wall-to-wall carpeting, updated and down, in an avocado shade lends a feeling of spaciousness in this large ten-room home once owned by an official of Cheney Bros. The over-all interior colors are shades of green with tints of gold, bronze, yellow and some blue.

The foyer features an oil painting of an Italian harbor scene by Mrs. Bostrom. Particularly treasured by the family is a brass letter stand by Adams who was known for making very fine furniture in England. On the plate is an early Etruscan scene.

The living room is paneled with knotty cedar planking. A multi-paned picture window with bronze mistletoe drapes is the background for the sofa covered with gold Chinese silk satin. On a circular Italian marble top table are a French clock and a pair of bisque children figurines. Above the table is an elaborate Italian scene in gold leaf with seven carved candles.

The first evidence of Mr. Bostrom's hobby appears in a painting, over the fireplace, of a sailing ship. His pride and joy is a five foot scale model of the three-masted schooner, Ida Batic, which rests on a low cabinet in the living room. One arresting item on the wall is a fifty-inch macabre sculpture appropriately entitled Cadaver. It is the Archbishop of Canterbury in a burlesque covered casting. Both

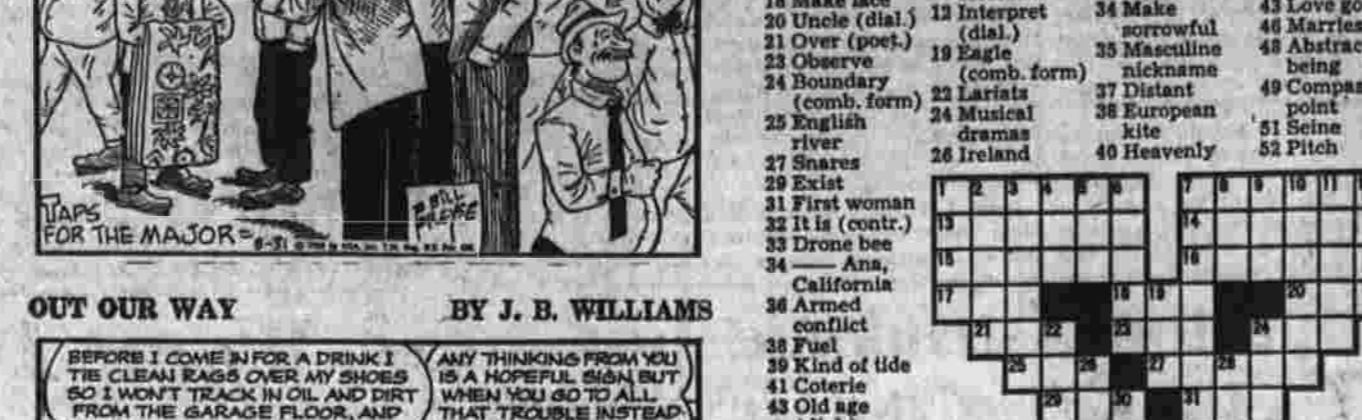
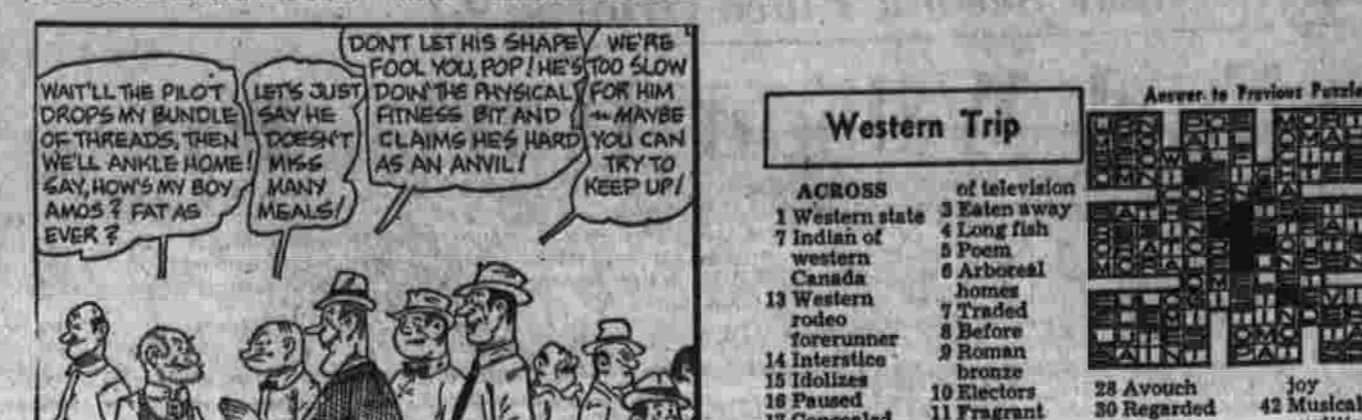

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Foe Storms Camps, Kills 15 Civilians

The U.S. Command says allied forces have killed upwards of 7,500 enemy troops since Aug. 18. But one senior U.S. officer said that the enemy "certainly couldn't have used all the forces available" when they launched a series of ground attacks and shelling 15 days ago that shattered a two-month lull in the war.

If enemy troops, as the U.S. Command claims, have been bloodied badly in every ground attack they've launched, their strategy now may be holding back ground troops and using rockets and mortars to inflict damage and casualties on allied installations and South Vietnamese cities. Such attacks bring far fewer casualties to the attacker.

The enemy launched five such attacks today, including three on American airfields and another on Pleiku City, a provincial capital in the central highlands.

Military casualties and damage were reported light. Two Vietnamese civilians were killed and 14 wounded along with two government troops killed and one wounded when enemy gunners sent 17 rounds of 100-pound rockets into the northeast section of Pleiku.

Among the airfields hit were Bien Hoa, 15 miles northeast of Saigon, and Da Nang, 360 miles northeast. They are two of the biggest fighter-bomber bases in Vietnam.

(Continued from Page One) work immediately on Czechoslovak newspapers and broadcasts. Journalists and broadcasters have been operating clandestinely to put out uncensored news.

One informant said Cernik is not even guaranteed the government's safety," the informant quoted Cernik as replying.

Some underground newspapers reported that the National Assembly would soon discuss an amendment to passport legislation, presumably to curb travel to the west. This was one of the Kremlin demands at the Moscow talks.

Other uncensored press reports said the Moscow-organized central committee of the Czechoslovak Communist party was meeting to elect a new presidium sprinkled with conservatives acceptable to the Kremlin.

Such a new policy-making presidium could have only caretaker functions, however, since a new session of the full party congress tentatively scheduled for the first half of next month would have authority to make

another reshuffle in the supreme party bodies. Censorship in most newspapers was not as rigid as expected. There were no large blank spaces in the censored newspapers published today, and the regional Communist party newspaper Svoboda was even permitted to frontpage a denunciation of the occupation as an "illegal act."

Svoboda also carried an open letter to a Soviet colonel, saying: "You crossed into this country uninvited with a huge armed might. You have cruelly hurt the feelings and the heart of this people."

The Bucharest regime withdrew comment on President Johnson's statement which quoted rumors of another Soviet invasion in southeast Europe.

Government-controlled news media did not report the speech, but many Romanians heard about it from Western radio stations.

The official silence was part of the strategy of avoiding moves the Kremlin could take as provocation. In private conversations, officials welcomed Johnson's words as a sign of encouragement.

"The United States will not go to war to defend us, but surely the Russians will listen to Johnson."

Western diplomats and Romanian travelers had reported a growing number of Soviet and Bulgarian troops near Romania borders Friday.

In his San Antonio, Tex., speech, President Johnson did not mention Romania by name but reports of a threat to this country have been circulating widely.

"We don't know what to make of it," said one Western diplomat. "It might be the real thing or it might be just another move in a war of nerves."

A group of Romanians returning from a visit to the Ukraine, said they had seen Soviet troops headed toward Romania.

NEWTOWN (AP) —Thieves have broken into the home of George Jurdy while he and his family were on vacation and "cleaned" the house of furnishings valued at \$30,000.

The break at the Shelly Road house was discovered Friday night by a neighbor.

A state police trooper at the Ridgfield barracks said the missing furnishings included a valuable antique carpet. He said the thieves "cleaned out the house."

Investigators reported the burglars gained entry by breaking a rear window. They forced a rear door in order to carry out the haul.

Vernon George Trapp Quits As Chief of Police

Vernon's Chief of Police George A. Trapp resigned in a letter received by Mayor John E. Grant yesterday afternoon. The letter was sent from New Hampshire where Chief Trapp has been vacationing, and the reason for resigning was given as "personal reasons only."

He was appointed chief of the Rockville Police Department in 1955 to replace retiring Peter Downey. When the city of Rockville government consolidated with the Town of Vernon in 1965, Trapp was appointed the town's new chief and Edmund Dwyer, former town chief, was made deputy chief.

Trapp joined the police department as an officer just after his discharge from the Army after WW II in which he served with the Military Police. He had left the department at two different times to take on other jobs but both times returned.

He rose from sergeant to detective sergeant and then Rockville chief.

Mayor Grant said today he has accepted Chief Trapp's resignation and he has instructed Dwyer to remain in charge of the department as acting chief until a permanent replacement has been appointed.

Mayor Grant said he will recommend to the Board of Representatives that the position of deputy chief be vacated when the new chief is appointed. He noted that this would cancel out what he believes to be an undue burden on the taxpayers of Vernon.

Explaining this, he said he meant the supporting of two chiefs in the \$5,000 to \$10,000 bracket.

Mayor Grant further said he will recommend the immediate creation of a new lieutenant to fill the supervisory void created by the chief's resignation and suggest a possible captaincy in the next budget.

It is expected these matters will be considered at the next meeting of the board Sept. 15.

And there were as many critical signs, such as one reading "The choice of the party bosses not the people," as the pro-Humphrey signs reading, "Go, go Horatio," a reference to Humphrey's middle name.

"Let no one unleash the dogs of war," Johnson told the 3,500 dairymen.

Let no would-be aggressor misjudge American policy during this administration. I express the hope and the belief that there will be no condoning of aggressors and no appeasement.

Even while speaking of possible Soviet military moves, Johnson expressed hope that world leaders would resolve problems "around a conference table instead of on the battlefield."

"Such will be my purpose in the remaining days of my public service," he said.

Turning to the Czechoslovakian situation, he said "I tell you that it was with a heavy heart that I have closely followed and observed the events in Czechoslovakia over the past several days. It is clear to me that the leaders in Moscow have felt that their interests were threatened by the emergency of even modest degrees of national independence and human liberty in Eastern Europe."

Private Eyes Still at It

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Characters change, faces change and fashions change, but in one form or another, there are always a lot of cops-and-robberies series in television.

The giant wheel of television, which rolls slowly, seems now to have come full circle. The old-fashioned private eye who solved a case a week and usually got beaten up a couple of times an episode is returning.

TV old-timers will remember the early Philip Marlowes, Michael Shaynes, Richard Diamonds and Mike Hammers. After going through a period of tongue-in-cheek superagents like the men from U.N.C.L.E. and campy crime-fighters like millionaire Bruce Wayne, this sea on television is getting back to the old model with shows like "The Outsider."

"The heroes can be lawyers, district attorneys, ranch foremen, avengers, private investigators or whatever," said Dar-

ren McGavin, the actor in the title role of the new NBC series, "but they all function as cops."

McGavin, as a matter of fact, played one of those earlier characters—Mike Hammer—for a while. This time out, he is David Ross, a shabby private eye whose problem of making a slummy living is complicated by his prison record.

The character—a man with personal problems that shadow his professional life—is typical of Roy Huggins, who dreamed up the series and is its executive producer. Huggins had a hand in "The Fugitive," a fellow trying to solve a murder while himself being pursued, and "Run for Your Life," about a man who cleaned up a different mess each week while a medical death sentence hung over him.

McGavin, who can play tough private eyes with the necessary swagger, is a former student of Sanford Meisner, played in Tyrone Guthrie's all-star stage "Dinner at Eight." Now—with a comfortable headstart on the season's output of "Outsider" episodes—he will fill a short break in its production schedule playing with Greer Garson in a Los Angeles revival of Shaw's "Captain Brassbound's Conversion."

Like so many performers McGavin is as interested in directing as he is in acting.

"The director really has to play all the roles," he said. "He's the one who works with all the actors, forming and creating."

"The Outsider" is, among the action series being closely watched for evidence of "excessive violence"—nobody knows exactly what that means but everybody is against it. However, there will be plenty of unavoidable blows struck.

The set where all the action took place was loaded with rifles, handguns and even a machine gun, all rendered harm-

less, plus some nonlethal hand grenades and empty boxes labeled ammunition.

In spite of the fakery of some items and the lack of firing pins in the weapons, the set was guarded constantly by a uniformed member of the studio police force.

NEW ENGINEER

Byron Foulger, who once had a job as secretary to the superintendent of the Union Pacific Railroad, is back in the railroad business. He has been signed to play the recurring role of the engineer of the Hooterville Cannonball on "Petticoat Junction" Saturday nights on CBS.

IN DRAMA

Lloyd Bridges, Kim Hunter, Fritz Weaver and Phyllis Newman have been signed for starring roles in "The People Next Door," an original drama which will be presented on "CBS Playhouse" Oct. 15.

Robert Conrad, The Ex-Stuntman

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The star's chair on the "Wild, Wild West" set bears an unusual identifying inscription: "Robert Conrad, ex-stuntman, retired by CBS Jan. 24, 1968."

Conrad, who was darn near retired from this world on that date, is reminded of his luck every time he sees the chair, which is kept just beyond camera range. For a while it appeared that the series would end abruptly before the completion of its third year.

It was one of the little-publicized mishaps of the season, although the show's fans may have concluded that they were getting fewer shows than usual. There were, 23 instead of 26. Conrad's accident came in the middle of the 24th show which could not be completed.

The actor, who enjoys doing his own stunts, leaped from a balcony, grabbed a big chandelier and from there was to land on a villain below. The timing was off and Conrad slipped and landed on his head some 15 feet below the lighting fixture. The result was a double skull fracture, weeks in the hospital and a long convalescence slowed by constant dizziness.

The series is now in full production for its fourth season and Conrad is back—healthy and in physical trim. One corner of the building housing the show's permanent sets is a gymnasium, complete with a boxing ring.

 Conrad, who keeps himself in shape like a professional athlete, runs three miles a day in the studio back lot and between takes goes a few rounds in the ring.
 "Wild, Wild West," of course, is an imaginative Western spoof and certainly no one beyond tender years ever takes seriously its bizarre situations, co-star Rosa Martin's elaborate disguises or the anachronistic scientific and mechanical inventions of the assorted bad guys. Nevertheless, it is one of the action series being watched by network censors for scenes of excessive violence, even if the violence is all in fun.
 In past seasons the two secret agents have encountered evil geniuses who have invented—and are using for foul purposes—such modern miracles as electricity, anesthetics, lethal rays and gas, telephones, radio and television. In the episode currently in production, the 1874 heroes have "invented" scuba gear with which to foil villains who beat Jacques Yves Cousteau by about 100 years in dressing up a way to plan an underwater community—conceived under an enormous plastic—which they also invented—octopus.
 Conrad has become, since his early TV days as a co-star in "Hawaiian Eye," an established star and a millionaire.
 "I think the show is good for at least a fifth season—once after this, anyway," he said. "Then I'd like to get involved in producing and directing films."

CBS
BLONDIE — Dagwood and his sandwiches and his wife and Mr. Dithers, his boss, are all back in a second TV incarnation. Will Hutchins, Patricia Harty, and Jim and Henry Backus head the cast.

THE DORIS DAY SHOW — Filmdom's constant virgin comes to TV as a widow who brings her two children back to the old homestead to live. Denver Pyle plays Doris' father and Fran Ryan is her housekeeper. An attempt is being made to instill some values in this series, which makes it fairly unique.

THE GOOD GUYS — Herb Edelman and Bob Denver team up as the owner of a diner and a taxi driver. The "restaurant" has a wife, played by Joyce Van Patten. It's a wild, slapstick show which benefits from being filmed in front of an audience.

HAWAII FIVE-O — CBS has been the only network which has refused to show pilots, so you can only judge this by the fact that industry sources say the pilot was extremely violent, but producer Leonard Freeman says "it was cerebral,

not violent." Anyway, Jack Lord stars as the head of a Hawaiian police unit with James MacArthur as his assistant and Richard Denning as the governor of the 50th state. It's filmed entirely in Hawaii.

LANCER — The season's second western, this stars Andrew Duggan as a patriarch in Monterey, Calif., with two sons by two different wives. One, Wayne Maunder, is a bit dandified. The other, James Stacy, is a bit outlawed. There is a girl, Elizabeth Baur, the daughter of the dead ranch foreman, adopted by Duggan.

MAYBERRY R.F.D. — With the personable and talented Ken Berry as star, this show takes up where The Andy Griffith Show left off, literally. The premiere has Andy marrying his school teacher sweetheart, and all the regulars are present. When they leave, they leave behind Mayberryites like Francis Bavier, George Lindsey, Jack Dodson and Paul Hartman. New are Ariens Golonka as widower Berry's girl friend and Buddy Foster as his little son.

ADAM-12 — A new series about radio car policeman in Los Angeles, this is produced by Jack Webb and stars Martin Milner as a veteran and Kent McCord as a rookie. Each week they will be involved in several cases. The pilot features an exciting chase scene culminating in the "dry bed" of the Los Angeles River and one of the greatest automobile stunts the camera has ever caught.

THE BEAUTIFUL PHYLLIS DILLER SHOW — Irrepressible Phyllis in a potpourri of skits, music, monologues and a weekly salute to a little-known American like James Polk.

THE GHOST AND MRS. MUIR — Based on the movie which starred Rex Harrison and Gene Tierney, this has Edward Mulhare as the sea captain, dead because of his quick temper, and the lovely widow with two children who moves into the home he haunts. Reta Shaw is the "chaperone" for this spiritual love story and a dog named Scruffy is a great scene stealer.

JULIA — It's by far the brightest pilot of the season, warm, funny significant and produced occasionally directed and mostly written by Hal Kanter, one of the genuine wits in the business. Diahann Carroll stars as a Vietnam widow trying to raise her six-year-old son, winningly played by Marc Copage. Lloyd Nolan is the doctor from whom Miss Carroll, a nurse, gets a job in the plot. Redheaded Michael Link plays Marc's friend, Earl J. Waggoner.

THE NAME OF THE GAME — You mustn't call this a TV series. It is a movie series that happens to be on the TV screen. Each episode is 90 minutes, and has its own star and producer. Gene Barry plays the head of a publishing empire. Robert Stack is a former FBI man who ferrets out crime stories for the magazine. Tony Franciosa is a flip investigative reporter. Susan Saint James shows up from time to time as a Girl Friday.

THE NEW ADVENTURES OF HUCK FINN — Huck, Becky and Tom Sawyer (Michael Shea, Lu Ann Haslam and Kevin Schultz) meet Injun Joe (Ted Cassidy) in adventures set against an animated background.

THE OUTSIDER — Darren McGavin does his best to erase the image of the glamorous private eye with this series. He has a seedy office and no beautiful secretary, although beautiful women show up in the cases. The show is as good as the case he works on each week.
