Agnew. The image of Nixon as a reflective statesman is a good one for the GOP, but his campaign could falter from sheer dullness.

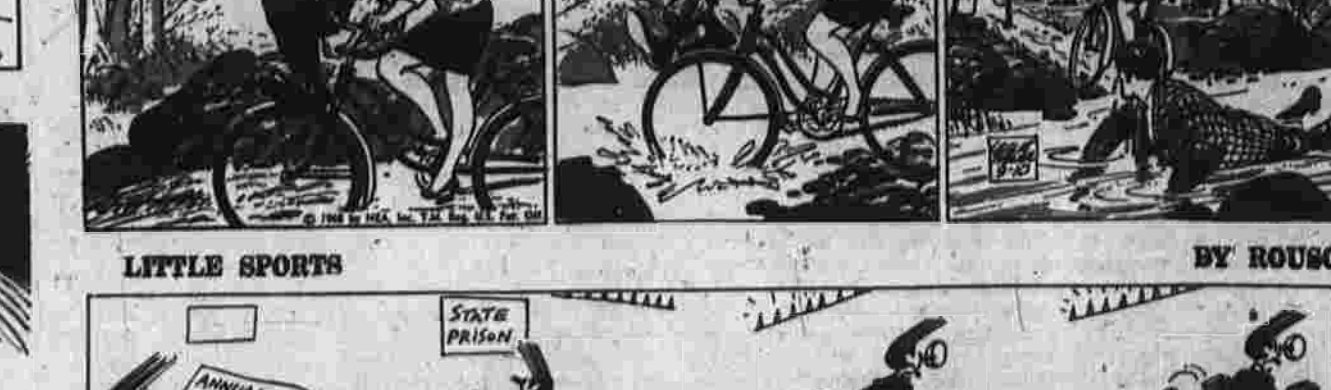
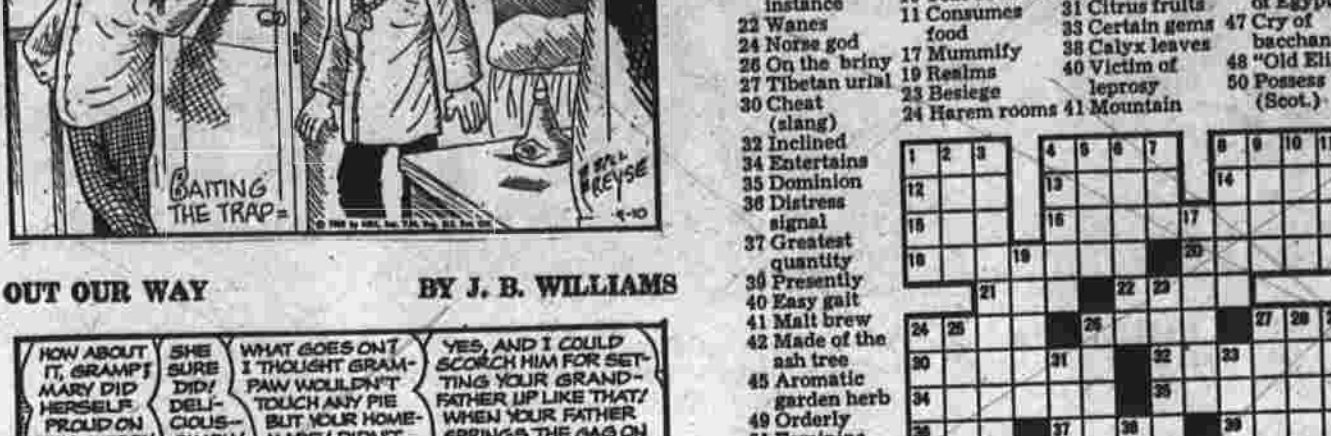
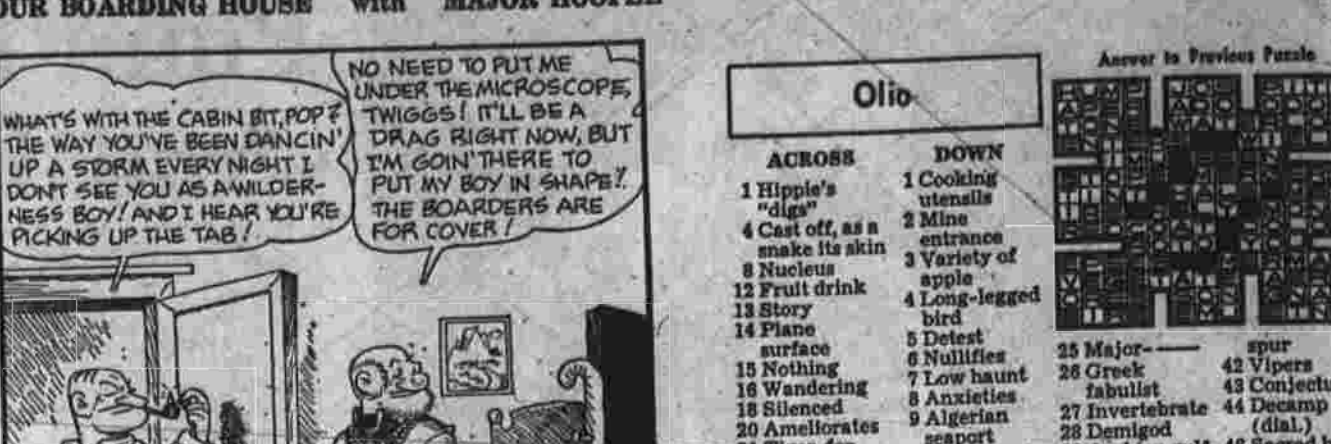

Richard M. Nixon says the Democrats "had their chance to lead the country and they missed it" and his running mate, Spiro T. Agnew, says Democratic Hubert H. Humphrey is turning "regularly" on the Vietnam issue.

Humphrey, in the harshest assault on his Republican opponent since he was elected president, questioned Humphrey's record as president and said he would support the strategy of the most recent political cosmetic treatment.

Humphrey did not name Nixon but made it clear he was referring to his opponent. Nixon made his comment on the Democratic Vietnam record when he was elected president in 1964.

Humphrey is getting pretty much of a free ride in the Vietnam issue. He is trying to place the blame on the Democrats for the Vietnam situation.

Humphrey's running mate, Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, said he would favor a North Vietnam withdrawal.

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Johnson Warns Russia Against Starting War

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson, urging Moscow for the second time in two weeks not to "unleash the dogs of war," says the only way to peace in Europe is through non-negotiated negotiation.

While urging the Soviet Union to accept earlier proposals for high-level talks on arms and troop reductions, Johnson warned that the United States never will tolerate the use of threat or force in a search of "common responsibility like Berlin."

Johnson said the other day in San Antonio, "Let no one unlearn the dogs of war." Europe has suffered enough in this century," he added.

Johnson's San Antonio speech Aug. 10 was the strongest he has aimed at Moscow in months and seemed to represent part of a

carefully orchestrated U.S. response to the Soviet-led invasion of Czechoslovakia 10 days earlier.

The public part of that response has included cancellation of some features of the cultural exchange program with Russia, orders that work proceed on missile development and de-

ference to improve any U.S. negotiating position, and some Johnson comments at a news conference that the United States remains "very concerned" over Soviet actions in Eastern Europe.

The 1941 British speech, his second of the day to dwell on foreign policy and the quest for peace, appeared to be more of the same rather than being prompted by any fresh Soviet action.

But Johnson told his enthusiastic audience, the Czech invasion has given rise to "new military and political risks... which demand even closer cooperation among Western allies."

Czech Leader Cheered

WASHINGTON (AP)—Czechoslovak Communist party chief Alexander Dubcek, met again today with Moscow's men in Prague amid reports of further Russian complaints that Dubcek's regime is not doing enough to check "counter-revolutionaries."

A small crowd that had waited for hours cheered Dubcek as he entered the meeting with Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Vasily Kuznetsov, who came to Czechoslovakia Friday.

Pravda's Otdelchik said Tuesday night he informed Soviet leaders in Moscow that "certain effective measures will be realized in our country which will have a favorable influence on the further development."

Apparently he referred to the imposition of press censorship and a ban on formation of new political organizations. These measures would be the certain approval of the National Assembly Friday.

The country's reformist liberal leadership has stressed, however, that the measures will be temporary and reassured the population there will be no departure from what one newspaper termed "Dubcek socialism with a human face."

In Communist Romania, whose independent-minded leaders have backed Czechoslovakia, British Foreign Secretary Michael Stewart ended a three-day visit today. He and Romanian President Nicolae Ceausescu agreed an East-West detente for the sake of world peace.

Czechoslovak government leaders assured their people Tuesday night that due process of law will be observed despite the Soviet occupation and appeal for the return of refugees from abroad.

There have been rumors of arrests since the Soviet Bloc troops invaded Aug. 20, but the leaders' proclamation said: "We reiterate that we shall never allow slow deformations of violence."

Vote on Fortas Set for Tuesday
WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Judiciary Committee agreed unanimously today to vote next Tuesday on whether to confirm the nomination of Abe Fortas to succeed Chief Justice Earl Warren.

WASHINGTON (AP)—An Interior Department study recommends turning major portions of the 400-mile Connecticut River Valley into a scenic and recreational area.

The department's Bureau of Outdoor Recreation proposes a federally-owned Connecticut River national recreation area—composed of three parks in Connecticut, Massachusetts and surrounding the Vermont-New Hampshire border—supplemented by new or enlarged state parks in the four states.

All segments would be knitted together by a Connecticut River towway—a network of existing roads criss-crossing the river and connecting points of major scenic, historic and cultural interest.

The three proposed federal lands would be:—A gateway unit in Connecticut extending 11 miles along the river between Hadley and the Connecticut Turnpike.

—A Mt. Holyoke unit in Massachusetts near the Springfield-Chicopee-Holyoke metropolitan area, with 4 1/2 miles of river front and including the Mt. Holyoke Range.

—A Cox's neck river unit along 13 miles of river in New Hampshire and Vermont between Moore's Reservoir and Lake Umbagog.

The bureau, which conducted the 20-month study under legislation introduced by Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D-Conn., estimated federal land acquisition costs at \$45 million and development costs at \$13 million. The federal assets would total 26,000 acres.

The study also recommends a "scenic rivers" trail connecting off the Appalachian Trail near Hanover, N.H., extending northward along the river, then looping through to the Connecticut lakes area and returning south.

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Teacher Strike Ends, NYC Schools Open

NEW YORK (AP)—The city's schools opened their doors today after a two-day teacher strike ended by a community control fight.

The opening of the fall term, which was to have started Monday, came after teachers voted overwhelmingly to accept a settlement worked out between the AFL-CIO United Federation of Teachers and the Board of Education.

The vote was 5,815 to 218 in favor of the agreement. But the teacher turnout was only half that which marked the vote to strike last Sunday. The city has 100,000 teachers.

Union President Albert Shanker had predicted a favorable vote, but he said the vote was "a victory for the teachers and a defeat for the school board."

The precipitating factor in the strike was the school board's plan to open two new schools in the fall term opening for two days, and the refusal of a locally organized experimental school district in Brooklyn to reinstate 10 white teachers it had dismissed.

Underlying the specific dispute was the union's fear that teachers would not be given adequate job security in the new citywide decentralization plan which is to take effect shortly.

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Plane Bound For Toronto Is Hijacked

MONTREAL (AP)—A Boeing 707 jetliner, en route to Toronto, was hijacked today and the airline said it was holding a gun on its crew.

The hijacking occurred over the Gulf of St. Lawrence, about 100 miles from Montreal. The plane was carrying 100 passengers and crew.

The hijacker landed at 10:30 a.m. and the 11 passengers and two stewards were allowed to leave, but the gunner remained aboard with the pilot.

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French Airliner Crashes in Sea
