Negroes on TV Are More White Than Black

HOLLYWOOD — The technology of color has been known by the television industry for many years. Beginning this fall, television will be tested in the psychology and sociology of color — the color of men's skins.

The networks and producers are now aware that Negroes make up an important and highly visible minority of Americans. Years of pressure from civil rights groups, the condemnation of television by the President's Report on Civil Disorders, and many other outside factors have persuaded the networks to place Negroes on entertainment shows in greater numbers.

At least 30 weekly series (out of a total of 72) will regularly feature Negro actors, singers or dancers. CBS alone projects 15 continuing parts for Negroes, up from last season's five. Negroes will star in three new series, "Julia" (NBC), "The Outcasts" (ABC) and "Mod Squad" (ABC). Most dramatic series will include segments with Negro guest stars, and the odds are that any time you turn on your television set during prime evening hours you will find at

least one Negro on one of the three networks.

For an entertainment medium that not so long ago ran the "Riverboat" series about pioneer days on the Mississippi (not one black man was to be found), the new black handwagon appears to be a giant step forward. But is it really?

Yes, according to Perry Laferly, CBS vice president in charge of West Coast programming. "The whole general mental attitude toward minority races has opened up in the last few years," he says from his wood-paneled office in TV City. "Television is part of the national fabric and it moves in about the same way. A TV show must mirror society or it doesn't work. We now have Negro mayors of several big cities, and as Negroes assume more prominent positions, the more they can be used on television, because it will be what's happening."

No, says Otis Young, a young black actor who will star in the new "The Outcasts" series. "When they portray Negroes in a contemporary setting they want it to be all peaches and cream. What television is doing is lying, and that's what they've been doing in the communications medium since it began.

Now they are putting in the symbolic Negro week in and week out, but he is such a neutral nondescript type that nobody cares anything about him."

"I Spy was on for three years and that was three years lost," says Young. "Lost for all of us, black and white. Three years where they could have been educating the white middle classes to what a Negro really is. And they didn't."

With the new season arrives "Julia," a situation comedy starring Diahann Carroll as a young mother and widow. The show will not ignore Miss Carroll's color. Neither will it doze on it.

Says creator-writer-producer Hal Kanter:

"It's quite obvious the minute she walks into a room that she's a black lady, and there are times when it is commented on and times when it is not." (In the pilot episode, Julia has been turned down for several jobs, quite possibly because of her color. She calls up a doctor to apply for a position open in his office. He hires her over the phone. She hesitates, then says self-consciously, "I should tell you... I'm Negro." Pause. Then his voice is heard to ask, "Have you always been a Negro or are you just a Negro now that it's popular?")

A Negro family is being added to "Peyton Place" this fall on ABC. One member (a neurosurgeon played by Ossie Davis) was introduced in July. Executive producer Paul Monash says he will soon discover that he has a wife (Ruby Dee) and a son (Glynn Turman). And they

have lives and loves and hates and problems in communication both with the white residents of the town and within their own family.

"Peyton Place" will also be the first series to include a relationship between a Negro boy and a white girl. "I'm carefully not defining the nature of that relationship," says Monash. He expects the audience and the residents of the town to be doing a lot of defining for themselves.

Less important roles will be played by Negroes on many other series. A secretary on "Manix" (CBS); An architect on "Family Affair" (CBS); a farmer on "Mayberry RFD" (CBS); a young neighbor boy on "Gentle Ben" (CBS); a deputy sheriff on "The Doris Day Show" (CBS); policemen on "Adam 12" (NBC), "The Outsider" (NBC) and the continuing "NYPD" and "Felony Squad" series on ABC.

You'll notice, Negroes play more policemen than anything else. This is partly because there are so many police series on TV, but it is also the safest

part in which to cast a Negro. There's no confusion over his allegiances; He is a protector of Great White America.

Each of the Negro characters on our list can be justified individually, but taken together they constitute a terrible distortion; They form one gigantic lie.

"If those in white suburbia cannot learn what it means to be black, they might never comprehend the full implications of being white." That is a quote from one of the many documentary specials on Negroes and race relations being produced this summer by the network news departments. But they should be talking to their own program departments.

"They're second bananas," says Monash of most TV Negroes. "And when you peel the skins they are pure white inside. When you strip a man's color from him he is no longer a person. That is ignoring a central fact of his existence."

The reason that Negroes are

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Don Rickles, flanked by Alan King and a female assistant choreographer standing in for Eddy Arnold, was something less than Fred Astaire as he executed a dance step during rehearsal for the "Kraft Music Hall."

Producer Dwight Hemion came forward to make a suggestion and Rickles screamed, "What do you expect? Marge

and Gower Champion in the nude?"

The choreographer broke into the conversation and Rickles screamed even louder, "When we're talking, butt right in and you'll be through here."

That's the Rickles that audiences have come to know and laugh at and imagine haunts what is basically a quiet, thoughtful man. When he has an audience, he can't resist the outrageous personality TV audiences know. The more the audience laughs, the more outrageous he becomes. When he doesn't have an audience... well, he was embarrassed about walking out into an upper East Side street because he was in rehearsal shorts and a sports shirt. "Do you think they'll let me into a restaurant?" he wondered.

After years of being a well-known name among people in show business and the trade, Don Rickles has finally become a household word — and one that can be repeated in front of the children.

"That's been my problem," Don said. "I've been known in the business, but I couldn't break through to the public. Greg Garrison was the first when he said I should be on the 'Dean Martin Show,' which he produces. He said comedy was a matter of attitude, not words. So he decided I could use my attitude and change some of the words I have always used in night clubs. That's why some people were afraid

of me — but words I use in clubs are not the same as I use on TV. Now I'm proud that an agency like J. Walter Thompson, which handles Kraft, believes in me and uses me on the show where the image has always been people like Dinah Shore, Roy Rogers and Dale Evans and Eddy Arnold."

Rickles, according to those who know him well, was not always a happy man. "At one time he meant those insults," one friend said. But today his buddy, Don Adams, characterizes Rickles "as a completely happy man." Marriage three years ago, at the age of 38, and fatherhood at the age of 39, are credited with helping in the change.

"I'm really not the guy some people think I am," he says. "I'm really the guy who says to his wife, 'Do you think I ought to have a piece of Melba toast or a cracker?'"

Now he is a success, with an ABC series, "The Don Rickles Show" premiering on Sept. 27, and two more appearances set for The Kraft Music Hall. People say to him, "You're one of the hottest guys in the business."

"But I don't believe it when they do," he says. "I had 20 years of getting no place. A guy said to me the other day, 'Don't you worry about getting overexposed on TV?' I said, 'How? I've been off it for 20 years.'"

Rickles' ABC series, produced by Goodson-Todman, has been erroneously referred to as a game show. It's not. It's a format he and Mark Goodson devised and "free-wheeling" best describes it. Much of it will be ad lib as he discusses the news of the day with writer-performer Pat McCormick, chats with name guests, and goes into the audience to talk to preselected people with unusual occupations.

"I come on Friday night opposite 'The Name of the Game,' on which they are spending \$40

million and will have 7,000 actors running around in 'leotards and 'The Friday Night Movies' on which they will probably have the story of that birth in Bethlehem. I might as well be opposite World War III. My middle name is Charley Underdog and I just hope someone turns on my show and uses it as a night light."

This is not exactly unprecedented in television: The only thing that makes it unusual is that Arnold is a young pig. Arnold—or rather Arnold and Baby, his stand-in—were working Tuesday at the studio with the trainer. Neither seemed interested in anything but a bit of dog food, rewards for learning, on command, to trot up to a mail box, open it, remove a letter and return to Glen Garner, their drama coach.

Jay Sommers, "Green Acres" producer, slipped Arnold into the show for off-beat comedy value early in its run. The pig was treated like a child by the Ziffel family. Then Frank Inn, who specializes in training what he calls "picture" animals—from assorted critters of the "Beverly Hillsbillies" to the performing cats of "Hhubart"—taught the original Arnold and his twin so many unusual tricks that the role became stronger. Arnold learned to turn on and off a television set—he likes only westerns. Arnold learned to pull a little cart, so one story was built around the porker and his newspaper route. It built and built.

Arnold suddenly started getting lots of fan mail, kids all over the country wrote in asking for autographed pictures and official permission to start Arnold Ziffel fan clubs. Eva Gabo, never one to be upstaged by a human, much less a pig, trotted Arnold out on Joey Bishop's stage one night and the hammy actor, in jeweled collar and leash, stopped the show. He is now besieged with requests for personal appearances.

Sommers said he has a network deal to develop a show called "Arnold," perhaps for next season, and plans to base the story line on having Arnold inherit \$80 million—in trust, of course—and leave the Ziffels to go to New York. Among other things, he'll buy a hotel when it won't admit a pig; buy a stockyard to liberate fellow porkers. Sommers is intrigued and amused with the idea—and also very aware of the popular and

"I think you can do even more with a pig—in comedy anyway—than with a bear," he said. "We can also insert some oblique social commentary."

In next season's opening "Green Acres" show, Arnold will win an all-expense trip to Hawaii, but in the climactic scene, turn it down when he finds that he will be guest of honor at a luau—the Hawaiian feast which centers around a roast pig.

usually portrayed so unrealistically is not one of prejudice—that is, not the obvious kind. It is a combination of ethnocentricity and economic survival. The character of Julia, Diahann Carroll explains, "is realistic within the confines of making a TV comedy show. I don't know how many shows on the air represent realism to you. I would guess very few. We are talking about television, and Julia is right in there with televisionland. We are making black television people, and I hope they will be accepted. There are many things Julia can say and do after we find out what kind of acceptance she will have in the first place, given that this is a terribly racially ignorant society."

"If you will study television series as a whole, black or white," CBS executive Lafferty says, "you'll see the characters don't have all the attributes of people. I don't think there was ever anybody quite as invincible as Marshal Dillon on "Gunsmoke." The characters on television are created to give the audience what they want."

That line is television's oldest copout, but the disturbing part about it is that Lafferty can prove it. The top programs today (all fantasy-comedy and fantasy-adventure) are the same as they were 10 years ago. As he puts it:

"Only the names have changed. The audience doesn't want to see it real, like it is. They want to escape. Television is not the boob tube," says Lafferty. "But it is the dream machine. Go change the audience." He shrugs.
