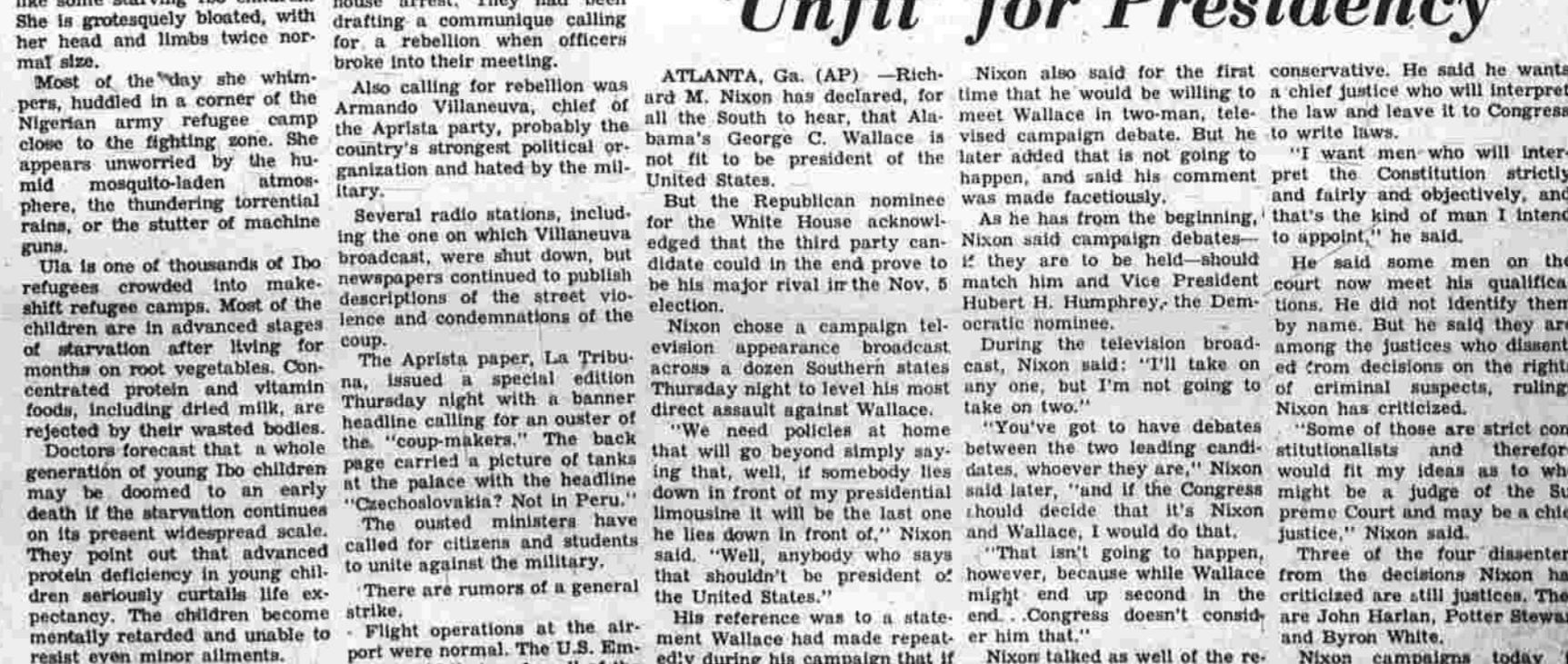

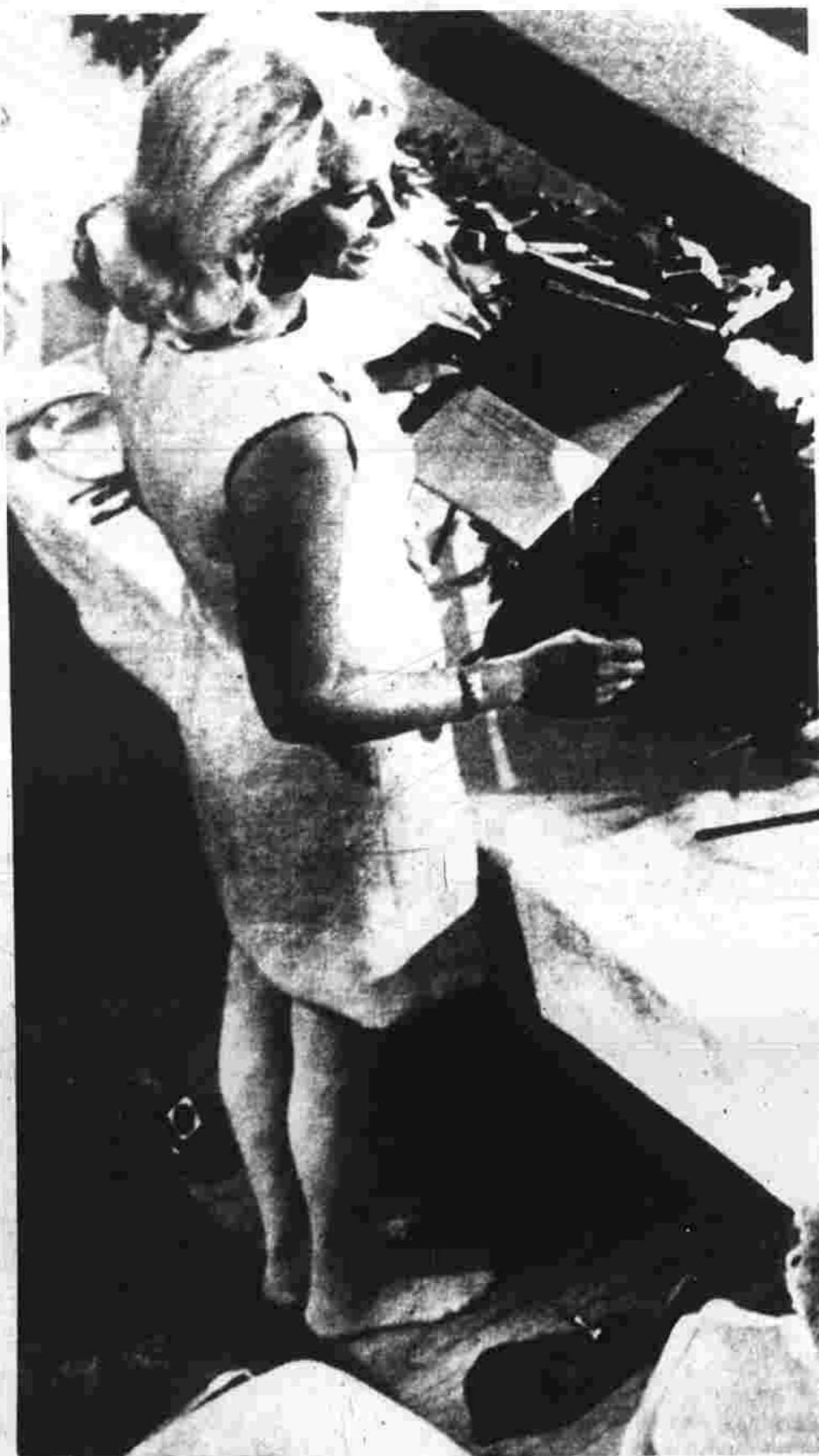

## Board Plan Set Giving Negroes Job Advantage

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — The state Board of Education has set up a plan devised to give Negroes as much advantage as possible in getting professional jobs in the department.

"We have not had difficulty in recruiting black candidates for clerical or classified positions," Education Commissioner William J. Sanders said at a Thursday meeting, "but we have found it difficult getting qualified professional candidates."

Grouped in the professional category are the jobs of administrative head, bureau directors, associates and consultants, and others.

Steps approved as part of the department's new recruiting approach include the following: —forming a recruiting committee of all expected vacancies for better advertising and pairing with existing applicants. —Giving a "black candidate preference" in cases when all other qualifications are equal. —Temporarily down-grading associate and consultant job requirements for desirable Negro applicants lacking the necessary schooling or experience. —The State Commission on Human Rights and Opportunity has requested that all state agencies take steps for more active recruitment of minority group members.

**Sand Pits in Sea?**  
GROTON (AP) — Connecticut may go down to the sea to renew its depleting supplies of sand and gravel, according to a state-financed researcher.

Surveys of the seafloor beneath Long Island Sound in a 600-square-mile area owned by Connecticut have disclosed undetermined amounts of the two substances, United Aircraft Corp. researcher James Goodier told a three-day oceanographic conference Thursday.

Goodier said the nation is using up its sand and gravel supply at a yearly rate of 6 percent and will run out in 17 years. Connecticut's supply is being mined more than twice as fast, he said.

## Nasser Friend Sees Mid East Peace Hope Dim

CAIRO (AP) — A close confidant of President Gamal Abdel Nasser said today the possibility of achieving a peaceful settlement in the Middle East now looks dimmer than ever despite the current efforts at the United Nations.

Mohammed Hassanein Helal, editor of the semi-official newspaper Al Ahran, explained that neither the United States nor Israel—who he said hold the key to peace to the Middle East at the United Nations is likely to modify its position because the leaders of both countries currently are engaged in or preparing for general elections.

Helal, who usually expresses Nasser's views, said the next U.S. president whether Republican or Democrat, would be restricted in his policies by the weight of what Helal described as sizeable Jewish donations during the presidential campaign and vast Zionist influences in America.

"The next United States President, whether his name is Nixon or Humphrey, would also start his White House term with an eye on the next congressional elections," Helal added in his weekly editorial.

Israel, he went on, is faced with general elections next summer and various Israeli factions would be expected to bid for voters support by competing in hard-line statements.

Helal said many formulas for solving the Middle East crisis will be proposed within the next few weeks at the United Nations but he cautioned the Arabs against "jumping eagerly at mere illusions."

He exhorted the Arabs to continue their military buildup, which he said constituted their only guarantee for a just settlement, and warned that a surprise Israeli attack was an ever present probability.

He said he believed in balance of military power in the area would prove to be the most decisive factor in shaping future events.

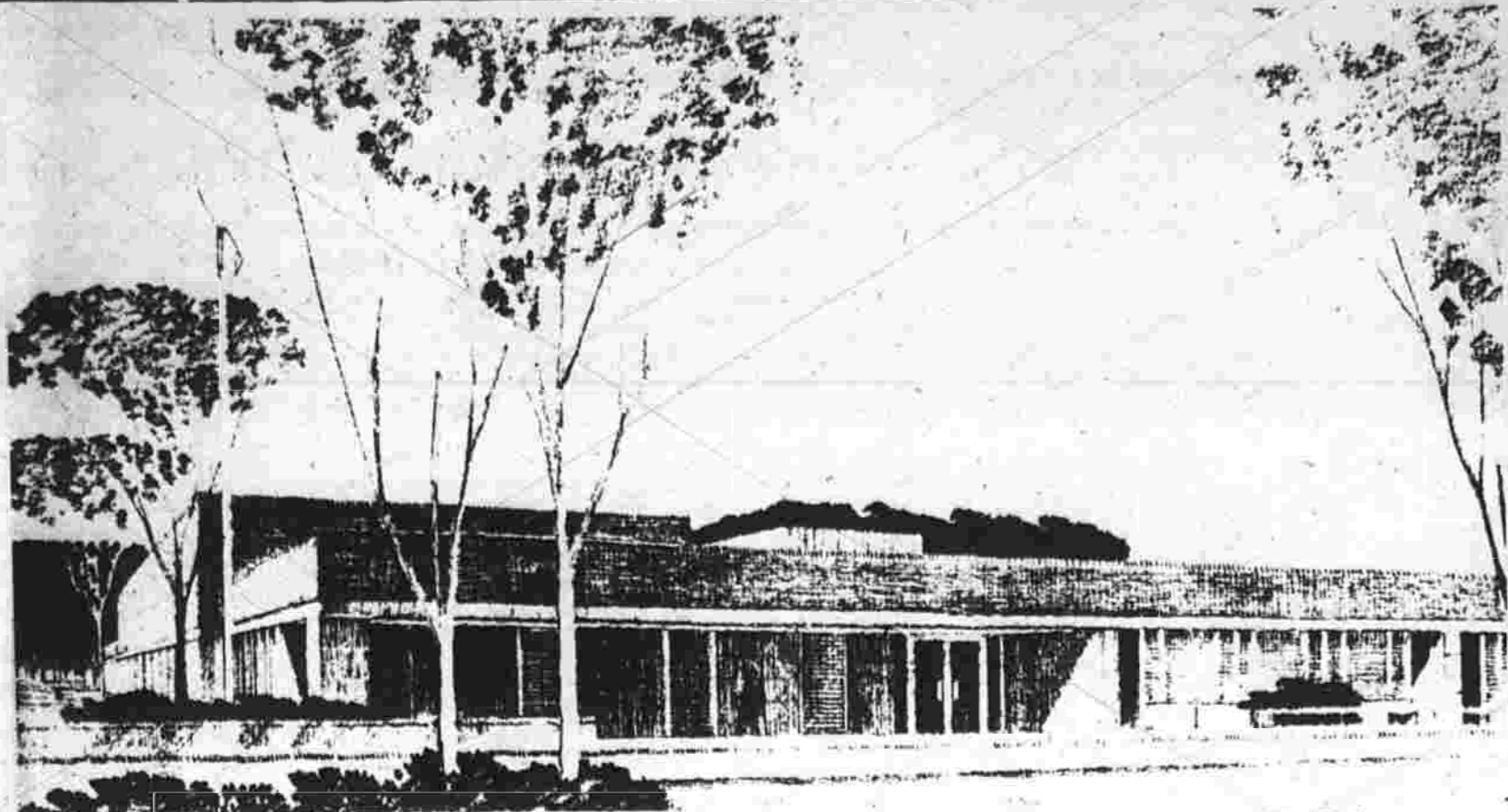

### Bolton Referendum Votes New School, 345-221

The new elementary school passed the referendum vote yesterday 345-221, and the contract to build the school has been awarded to the A. F. Peaselee company of Hartford, Peaselee was low bidder in a bid opening Oct. 4.

The total amount to be appropriated is \$975,000. The exact cost of the construction bid is not known at this time since the bid has been reduced through negotiations and a few items are still undecided.

The school is to be ready for occupancy next September. It is to be built near the present elementary school. It will contain two kindergartens, 12 classrooms, probably three special rooms, and core facilities for an eventual 24 rooms. It will house kindergarten through Grade 4.

According to registry lists, 1,798 persons were eligible to vote in the referendum. The total number of votes cast was 566, of which 345 were in favor and 221 were against.

Both the secretary of state's office and Mrs. Toomey noted that the decision to build the school would not in any way have reversed the vote.

A total of 34 votes on the machine to the left of the Community Hall did not record, comparing the total recorded votes to the total number of voters recorded as going into the booth.

On that machine, the public count was 230 and there were 57 yes votes and 94 no votes, leaving 58 lost somewhere. (The other machine recorded 228 yes and 127 noes, with a public count of 292. Seven were lost here, but this number is not unusual.)

Mrs. Olive Toomey, town clerk, called the secretary of state's office this morning. That office said that other towns have had this problem and have solved it in different ways, she said, but that it would be up to the town to decide to make two machines used recorded data that 621 persons did vote.

Officials say that one of the machines was apparently not recording properly, but that this would not in any way have reversed the vote.

A relatively small crowd was gathered at 8 p.m. for the reading of the results. As with all such occasions, there were happy faces and some who were disappointed.

The Public Building Commission and the Board of Education met after the referendum. The contract was awarded to Peaselee, with some areas to be worked out by the architects, who were present last night.

The architects and Dr. Joseph Casparaga, superintendent of schools, discussed the disposition of some of the special education children, said in a prepared statement, "I am very pleased that the majority of voters in Bolton have accepted their responsibilities and have voted in favor of the new elementary school. This approval will enable the children of Bolton to pursue a sound educational program in good educational facilities following the completion of the new school and the renovation of the North Rd. school."

"I would like to take this opportunity to thank the voters and all those who supported the board by their vote. It would also like to thank the Public Building Commission and the Board of Education for their efforts in presenting a clear picture to the town and in bringing the town to the point of voting on the referendum."

The school has been talked about and planned for about three years. The school board originally hoped for occupancy this fall.

The referendum was actually an extension of a town meeting held last week. A petition required that all items relating to the school be voted on by machine, and they were combined into one question.

### Combat Deaths Drop Slightly; Fighting Slows

SAIGON (AP) — Combat deaths in the Vietnam war dropped slightly last week, reflecting another of the periodic slowdowns in ground fighting across the country.

The U.S. Command, in its weekly summary yesterday, reported 247 Americans killed in action in the week ending last Saturday. A week earlier 290 were killed.

The number of wounded were 1,778 Americans wounded last week with 818 hospitalized, compared with 1,762 wounded and 818 hospitalized a week earlier.

The summary said the latest casualty count raised to 28,493 the number of Americans killed in the war since Jan. 1, 1961. The number of wounded totaled 178,235. Another 1,203 Americans are listed as missing, captured or reported.

South Vietnamese casualties last week were 1,200 killed, 1,250 wounded and 32 missing. Vietnamese headquarters reported the number of enemy killed in the period from Jan. 1, 1961, to Saturday climbed to 49,102.

The total U.S. military personnel in South Vietnam as of Saturday was 538,000, the same as the previous week, headquarters reported.

### Building Costs Up for Month

Market Trade Soars

Volume Near Record

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market had its second best day in history Thursday as volume soared to 21.11 million shares.

The volume, the number of shares exchanged, reached a first-hour trading record of 6.74 million shares, and the total for the day was second only to the 21.35 million shares traded June 13.

Trading was the broadest in the history of the New York Stock Exchange. Of 1,618 issues traded, 867 advanced and 417 declined. The previous highest number of issues changing hands 1,601 Sept. 19.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average jumped 7.15 points to 948.7. It was a new recovery peak from the Sept. 26, 1967, close of 943.08. The average reached its record high of 966.15 on Feb. 9, 1966.

### Fortas' Law School Speech Brings Standing Ovarations

NEW YORK (AP) — Supreme Court Justice Abe Fortas says he will "persevere" in the fight for civil liberties and says "fundamental human rights" guaranteed in the 14th amendment are under attack.

"Be careful on this issue of 'law and order,' a great phrase to which strange meanings are being attached," Fortas said Thursday night at a New York University Law School conference on the 100th anniversary of the 14th amendment.

Fortas got a standing ovation of several minutes when he entered the filled, 80-seat auditorium and brought the audience to its feet several times during his speech.

He was preceded at the lectern by Arthur J. Goldberg whom Fortas succeeded on the Supreme Court in 1965 when Goldberg became U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, a post he has since resigned.

Noting Fortas' presence, Goldberg said he did not want to act "like an ostrich with my head in the sand."

"I want to express, here and now," he said, "my very profound regret at the wrongful action of the United States Senate."

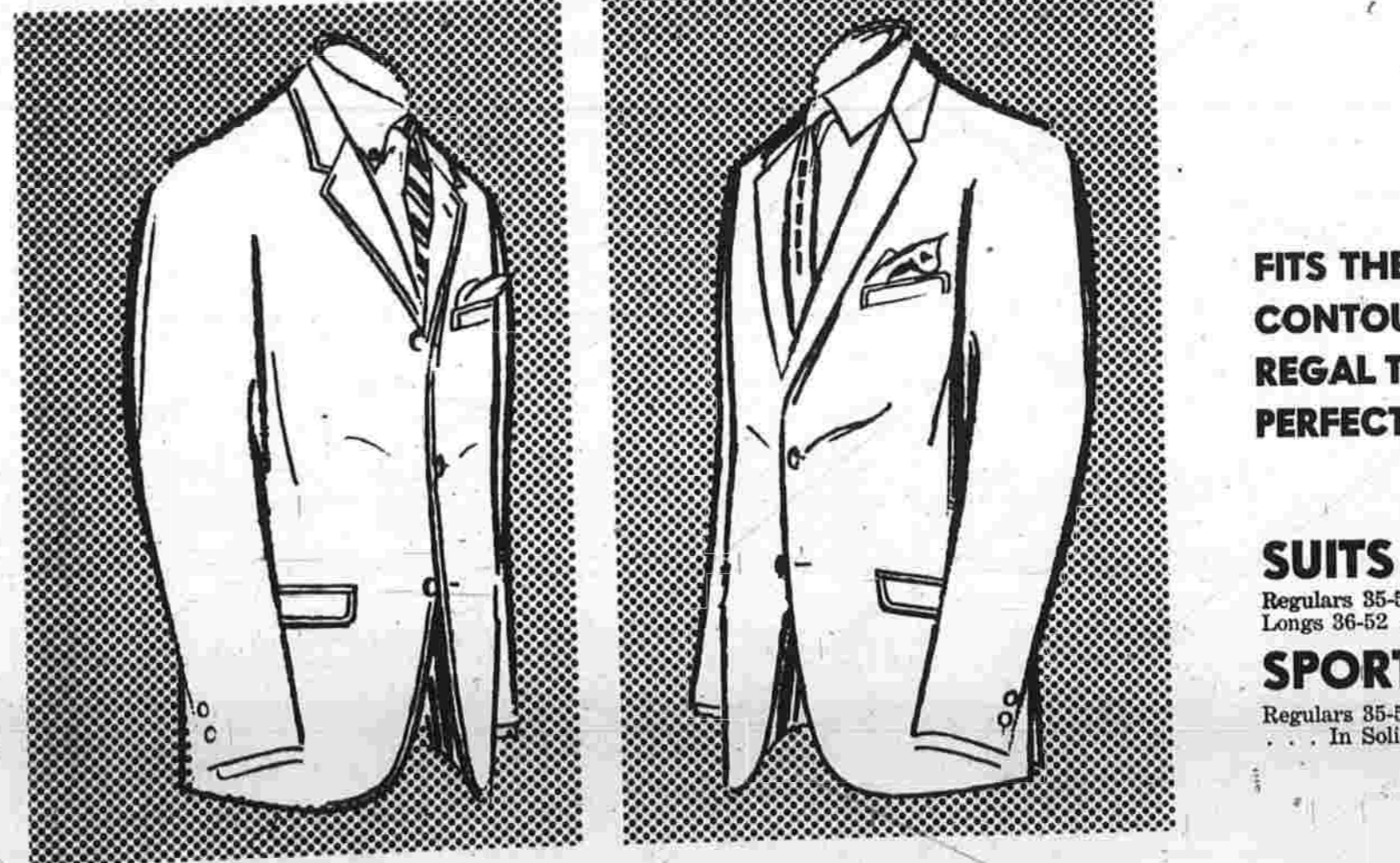
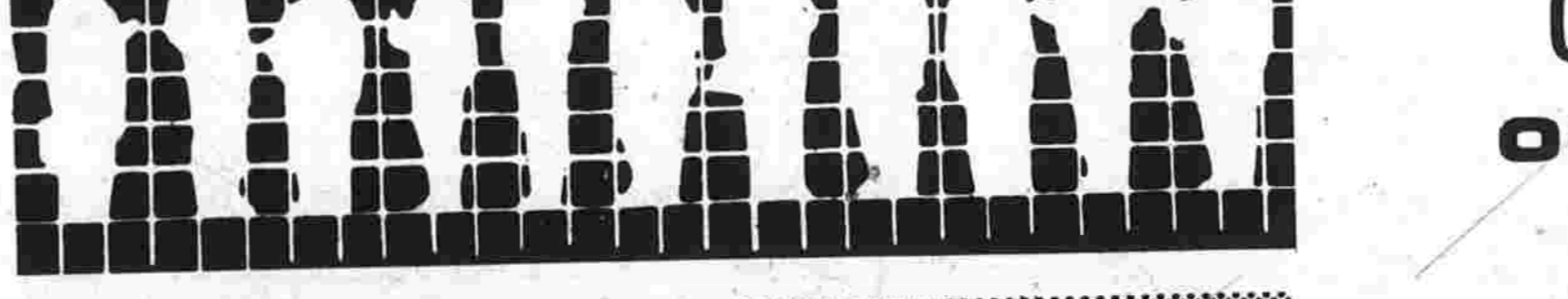

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### AP Spot Check in State Reveals Junk Car Dilemma

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS  
 The abandoned car, an eyesore to pedestrians and motorists, can become a headache to the municipal government that tries to remove it.  
 Not only is the cost of moving it greater than the value of the car itself, but some Connecticut communities have abandoned cars, making them a headache to the municipal government.

Stamford may have a partial answer. The city is building a \$1.1 million multipurpose incinerator as a demonstration project with federal, state and local funds. The incinerator is supposed to burn the instead of abandoned cars, making them easier to demolish.  
 Since Stamford Mayor Bruno E. Giordano took office last December, his abandoned-car program has picked up more than 300 cars from the city streets. They are kept 30 days from the owners to reclaim, then sold to the highest bidder.

It costs more to try to an abandoned car five miles and prepare it for a shredder than the car is worth in scrap, say the Capital Region Council of Elected Officials (CRCEO) and the Regional Affairs Center of the University of Hartford.  
 The two groups are seeking \$25,000 from an unidentified agency to pay for a study of the disposal of abandoned cars. A regional system for collecting, crushing and shipping the cars to shredders, they say, would be cheaper and more effective than the present meager local efforts.

Manchester is one town with a problem. Last month it adopted an anti-littering ordinance that defines junked cars as litter. The ordinance sets a fine of up to \$20 a day for each day an offense is not corrected.  
 But the town has no place to store its junked cars, and paying rising towing costs and continuing losing money on each junked car.

### And Federal Spending Cuts U.S. Economy Continues Advance Despite Surtax

 NEW YORK (AP)—The U.S. economy continues to advance at a rapid pace despite the enactment of the 10 per cent tax surcharge and the accompanying federal spending cuts.  
 A leading bank economist says that when he left on a trip to Europe early in the summer there was considerable fear among some fellow economists that the fiscal restraint package would lead to a recession or a sharp slowdown. Upon his return, he was surprised to find how much the talk had turned to complaints that the surcharge was not braking the economy soon enough or fast enough.  
 The consensus among most economists is that the shift in fiscal policy enacted last June eventually will be reflected in a cooling off of the economy. But some are questioning whether the change will be enough to alter materially the inflationary bias in the economy.  
 The First National City Bank of New York, in its monthly economic letter for October, noted that the consumer price index rose again in August, following sharp increases in June and July. During the three-month period, consumer prices rose at an annual rate of 5.3 per cent, well above the increase in earlier months.  
 Citibank also noted that consumers have returned to be inhibited by the tax increase, as reflected in the sharp rise in retail sales in July which continued at a high level in August and September. Consumers apparently have avoided spending money by dipping into record savings and through pay increases which offset the tax, the bank said.  
 Many economists maintain it is hard to expect the economy to react at once to the tax increase. Andrew F. Britton, a member of the Federal Reserve Board, said recently the goal of moderating economic growth will be achieved despite the delayed response "of some sectors of the economy," particularly the durable consumer area.
