

Soviets Win Footholds in Arab Nations

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—The Soviet Union has won important new footholds in Arab countries in the 16 months since the 1967 Middle East war.

The Russians have returned Egypt, Syria and Iraq and increased the Soviet presence there. They are active in seven out of the Arab League's 14 states—Egypt, Syria, Iraq, Yemen, South Yemen, Algeria and Sudan.

The Kremlin has increased its naval presence in the eastern Mediterranean to a record 44 ships, including the aircraft carrier Moskva which is capable of landing Russian marines by helicopter.

Unconfirmed reports say the Russians are surveying the Syrian port of Tartus to establish facilities there. Soviet ships are said to have already established a permanent presence in Alexandria and Port Said.

Newly involved with the Soviet Union are Yemen, Sudan and the former British colony of Aden, now called the South Yemen People's Republic.

Last December, when the pull-out of Egyptian troops from Yemen was imminent, the Russians agreed to supply the republican government with a squadron each of fighters and bombers.

In April, a shipment of 22 tanks plus rocket-equipped armored vehicles, self-propelled guns and ammunition arrived in Yemen. Forty Yemeni officers went to Russia last month for weapons training.

Now the Yemen premier and strongman, Lt. Gen. Hassan el Amri, is in Moscow to work out a new arms agreement. He has said a new offensive by his royalist opponents, backed by neighboring pro-Western Saudi Arabia, is imminent.

Sudan, in Africa, has signed a \$90-million arms agreement with Russia, including MIG jets, antiaircraft weapons and tanks. Sudanese officers are in the Soviet Union for training.

Following the approval of the arms deal in July, a new Soviet ambassador was appointed in Khartoum because, in the words of Pravda, "the atmosphere is becoming ever more favorable"

First Place Finish Seen By Wallace

WASHINGTON (AP)—George C. Wallace says a poll showing that he could finish second to Richard M. Nixon for president is wrong—he is going to finish first.

Wallace, in Washington for speeches today at a meeting of United Press International editors and the National Press Club, disputed a New York Times survey that said Wallace was running a distant second to Nixon but ahead of Democrat Hubert H. Humphrey.

"I don't think the New York Times knows anything more about public opinion than this microphone," Wallace told newsmen Sunday.

The Times survey showed Nixon leading in 34 states with 380 electoral votes, Wallace ahead in 7 with 66 electoral votes and Humphrey winning in four states and the District of Columbia with a total 26 electoral votes.

Election requires 270 electoral votes. Wallace's campaign managers say the former Alabama governor's popularity has taken a sharp rise partly because of what they call a perfectly timed announcement that former Air Force Chief of Staff Curtis E. LeMay would be his running mate.

The announcement came last Thursday at a time when Wallace was receiving widespread national attention on his campaign swing through the North Midwest.

The news corps accompanying the candidate had suddenly tripled in size before the announcement and he had to charter two additional prop-jet airliners to accommodate them.

Ades say letters from supporters, many enclosing contributions and praising his choice of LeMay, have increased to about 15,000 daily at this Montgomery, Ala., headquarters.

The announcement of a running mate added a new national tone and legitimacy to Wallace's campaign, his managers say, and LeMay has brought

Warren Convenes Supreme Court

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court opened a new term today, 20 minutes late, but unruffled.

At 10:20 a.m. EDT, Chief Justice Earl Warren led the other eight black-robed justices to their places behind the long mahogany bench, a clerk in morning coat called the packed courtroom to attention and Warren announced briefly: "The 1968 term of the Supreme Court is now convened."

Far to the chief justice's right at the end of the bench sat Justice Abe Fortas, whose nomination to succeed Warren was beaten down in the Senate during the court's summer recess. He and the other justices quietly watched lawyers troop to the

bench to be welcomed by Warren and then be sworn in by court clerk John Davis.

The tranquil ceremony was in contrast to the storm stirred up by the Fortas controversy and to the explosive cases on the justices' docket.

The court faces a session accepted by dissenters, and an opportunity to extend its activism into the plight of the poor.

The political campaign also has been thrust at the court, exemplified by third-party presidential candidate George C. Wallace's statement that Warren "hasn't got enough legal sense to try a chicken thief in

Half of Senate Seen For Halt to Bombing

WASHINGTON (AP)—At least half the Senate favors one plan or another to halt U.S. bombing of North Vietnam, although conditions under which the air raids should be stopped vary.

Twenty-seven senators of the 85 who responded to an Associated Press survey said they favor an unconditional bombing halt. They were opposed by 18 senators who said there should be no further bombing reduction in the current stage of the war.

In between were 25 senators who said they would insist on some matching action by Hanoi, either in reducing the level of the fighting or in compromises at the bargaining table in Paris.

The 18 who opposed any reduction of the air predicted that a bombing halt would result in wholesale military infiltration from the North and stepped up, costly ground action in the South by Communist units taking advantage of a toothless American air dragon.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson will speak on a National Broadcasting Co. network radio program Thursday night on behalf of the Democratic Party and its candidates, the White House announced today.

This will be the first such national radio appeal of the campaign for Johnson. So far he has confined himself to a statement or two and to addresses tinged with politics rather than outright campaigning.

The Thursday night address will be carried at 7:45 p.m. EDT and is sponsored, as the first of a series, by the International Ladies Garment Workers'

union. He said that should the Hanoi government "show bad faith, I would reserve the right to resume the bombing."

Thieu Claims Foe Has Lost Militarily

SAIGON (AP)—President Nguyen Van Thieu said today the enemy has lost the military part of the Vietnam war and has turned to politics to recoup.

He made the statement at a Senate reception after telling the National Assembly the enemy has failed in every attempt to bring "disastrous consequences" to South Vietnam in 1968. "They know they cannot win militarily so they move to the political phase," Thieu commented to newsmen. "Now they would like to use what they still have to consolidate the political area."

It was the first time Thieu has stated flatly that he thinks the enemy has lost militarily. He has repeatedly stressed that the South Vietnamese people and government should grid for a political struggle that would follow the military battles.

Thieu said the enemy was preparing for the political fight by training more cadre "among the people in the countryside."

He added that he had no fear President Johnson would call a full bombing halt over North Vietnam before the Nov. 5 presidential election.

"I don't have a worry with President Johnson because he has discussed it at length with me," he said.

Stockpiles Found

Allies Make Sweep Of Khe Sanh Area

SAIGON (AP)—Thousands of allied troops scoured the battle-scarred mountain valleys near Khe Sanh and the jungled foothills southeast of Da Nang today in new offensives aimed at spoiling enemy attacks.

Task forces of U.S. Marines and American and South Vietnamese infantrymen met little resistance, but continued to turn up valuable enemy munitions stockpiles, probably hindering or even delaying any offensive plans.

One stockpile found two miles below the center portion of the demilitarized zone yielded 300 rounds of 152mm artillery ammunition plus 100 fuses. This was significant because it marked the first known time in the war that 152mm ammunition had been found in South Vietnam, indicating that the en-

emy might be planning to try to move big Russian-made guns into the South. The 152s, the biggest in the enemy's arsenal, can fire a 90-pound missile 10.5 miles.

Military spokesmen, in delayed reports, announced the loss of four more American aircraft to enemy ground fire over the past three days.

They included an observation plane and a reconnaissance helicopter helping the allied ground troops search for the enemy, a Navy A7 Corsair fighter-bomber downed over North Vietnam, near the Cambodian border northwest of Saigon. One American was reported killed and five wounded and seven South Vietnamese soldiers wounded.

One of the observation planes was shot down Sunday 500 yards south of the abandoned Marine base at Khe Sanh, the pilot and

The U.S. Presidential Elections

The Greatest Sham on Earth?

WASHINGTON—The strangest thing about the current American presidential election is that the really important question—what is it all about anyway?—is the one that somehow never seems to get asked.

For the next month balloons will continue to blow in the air, the contest to fall from the office window, the embossed trinkets to be passed everywhere into uncommitted hands: But at the end of it all, when the posters come down and the debris is swept away, what exactly will be in terms of policy that the American people have decided?

The first lesson, of course, that any European has to learn about American politics is that they are not "issue oriented"—and that is certainly not too clear this year. When former Governor George Wallace of Alabama announces that "there's not a dime's worth of

difference between those two big parties of ours" he may not be speaking the literal truth; but it is hard to quarrel with his use of a politician's license.

For on Vietnam, on law and order, even on the place of dissent in the nation's political system it is almost as if Hubert Humphrey and Richard M. Nixon had made a compact together to regard fundamental disagreement as an un-American activity.

There is scarcely an area of public policy in which Nixon and Humphrey do not make the same soothing noises. What division there is between them is not ideological or philosophical: It is purely personal—a twiddle-dum-tweedle-dee argument between the two of them as to which is the better qualified to occupy the White House.

In normal times it might well be considered reassuring that this should be the case—a reflection, as it were, of the essential stability of the Ameri-

can system. But, in a period when the nation is in danger of being split asunder by war abroad and insurrection at home, it is almost unbelievable that all that should be going on by way of political dialogue is a mouthing of clichés and a brewing of bromides.

It is also—as the success of the Wallace campaign was already proved—highly dangerous. A democracy that has over half-a-million of its young men pinned down 10,000 miles away fighting a miserable war in Asia derives its principles and mores its ideals when none of its claimants for national leadership can summon the courage to subject the whole record and judgments that led to the present impasse to the harsh and hard judgments that the failure of the Suez adventure ultimately produced in Britain or, for that matter, the fiasco of the Sicilian expedition almost immediately provoked in ancient Greece.

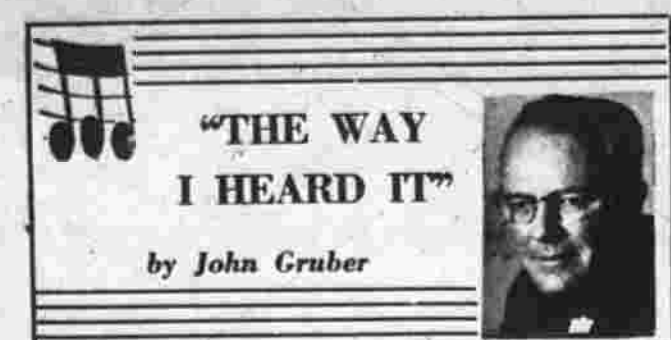

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'New Jersey' Shells Along North Coast

SAIGON (AP) - The battleship New Jersey continued further up the coast of North Vietnam Sunday, shelling six artillery sites and supply point near the Hon River about 50 miles north of the demilitarized zone.

The ship arrived on firing station last Monday but her first assignments were against North Vietnamese army strongpoints inside or just north of the demilitarized zone.

A Navy spokesman said the shells from the New Jersey's 16-inch guns destroyed one gun position and a bunker and damaged the supply area.

While the New Jersey is well north of the DMZ, it still gives some 100 miles below the 20th Parallel set by President Johnson's 1964 southern limit of American raids in his partial bombing halt of North Vietnam.

The board announced Sunday a 30-day suspension of the local board and directed Superintendent of Schools Bernard E. Donovan to assume direct supervision of the school.

The suspension stemmed from the local board's steady refusal, backed by parents and demonstrators in the predominantly Puerto Rican and Negro section, to take back 80 teachers.

The AFL-CIO United Federation of Teachers has a new strike vote set for today.

UFT President Albert Shanker, when informed Sunday night of the board's suspension, termed it "a step toward compromise."

He cited three responsibilities in Vietnam: To give "adequate protection to the men we have sent there at the risk of their lives; to make sure that the safety of the ordinary people of South Vietnam is guaranteed; and to make sure that we negotiate a lasting peace in Southeast Asia that is based on the free nations in that area is preserved."

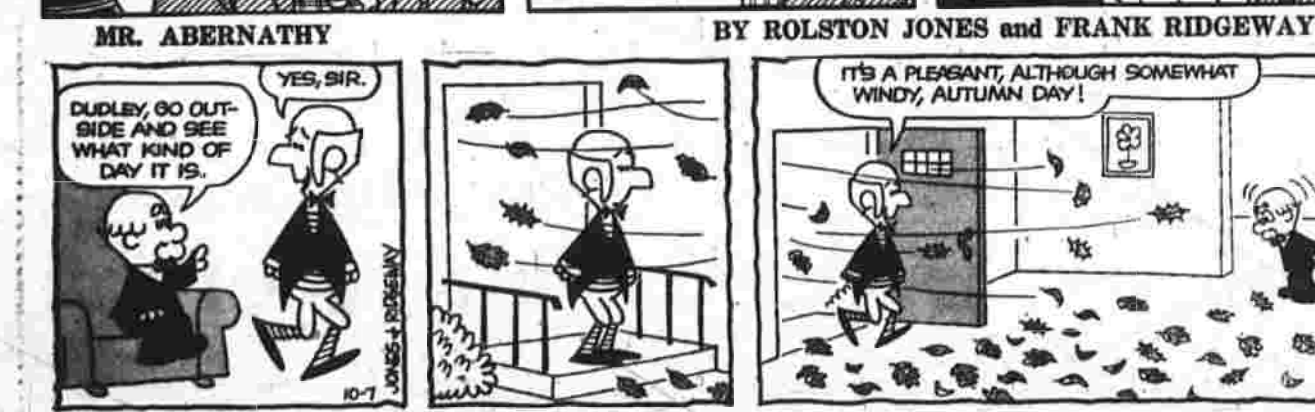

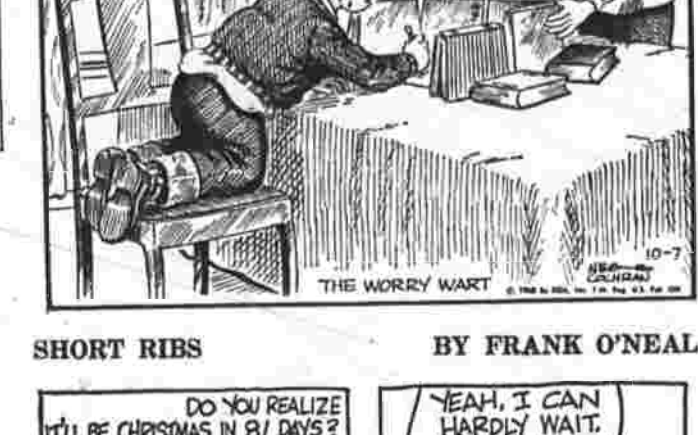

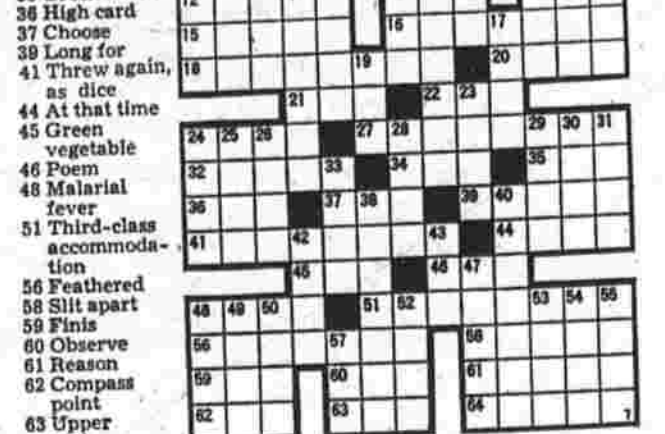
