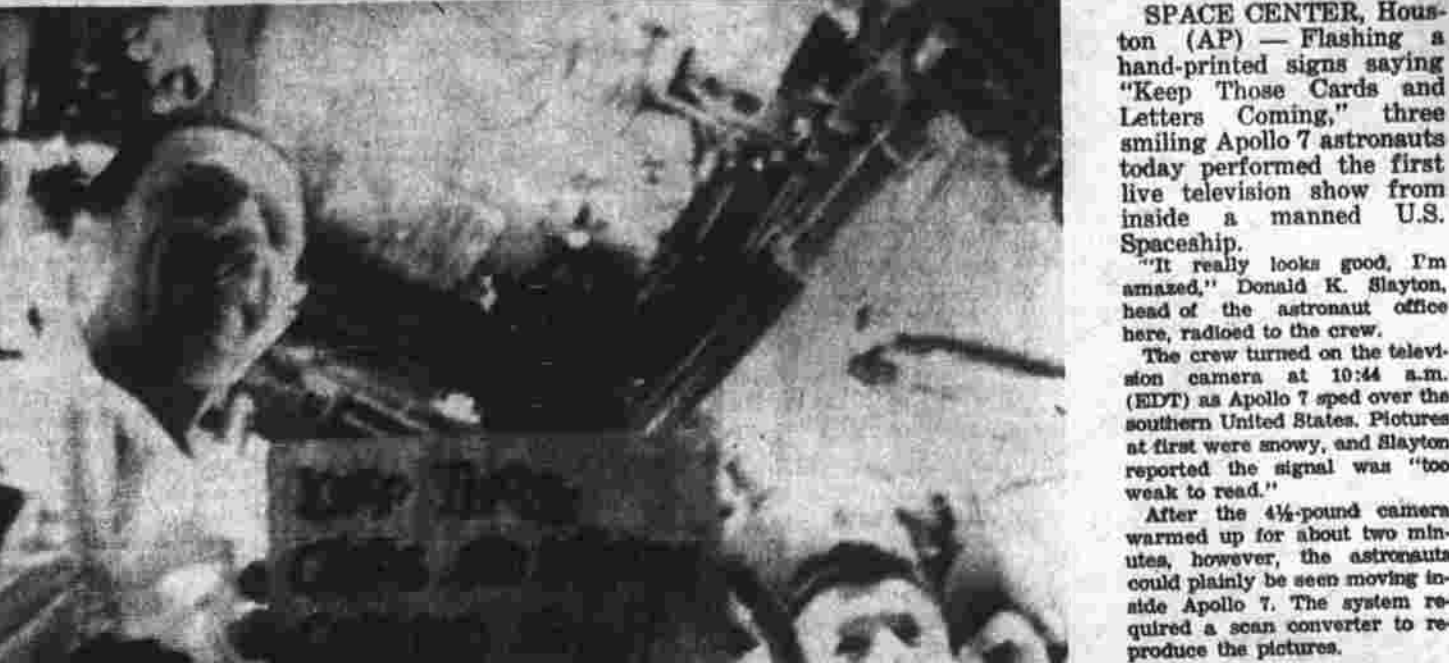

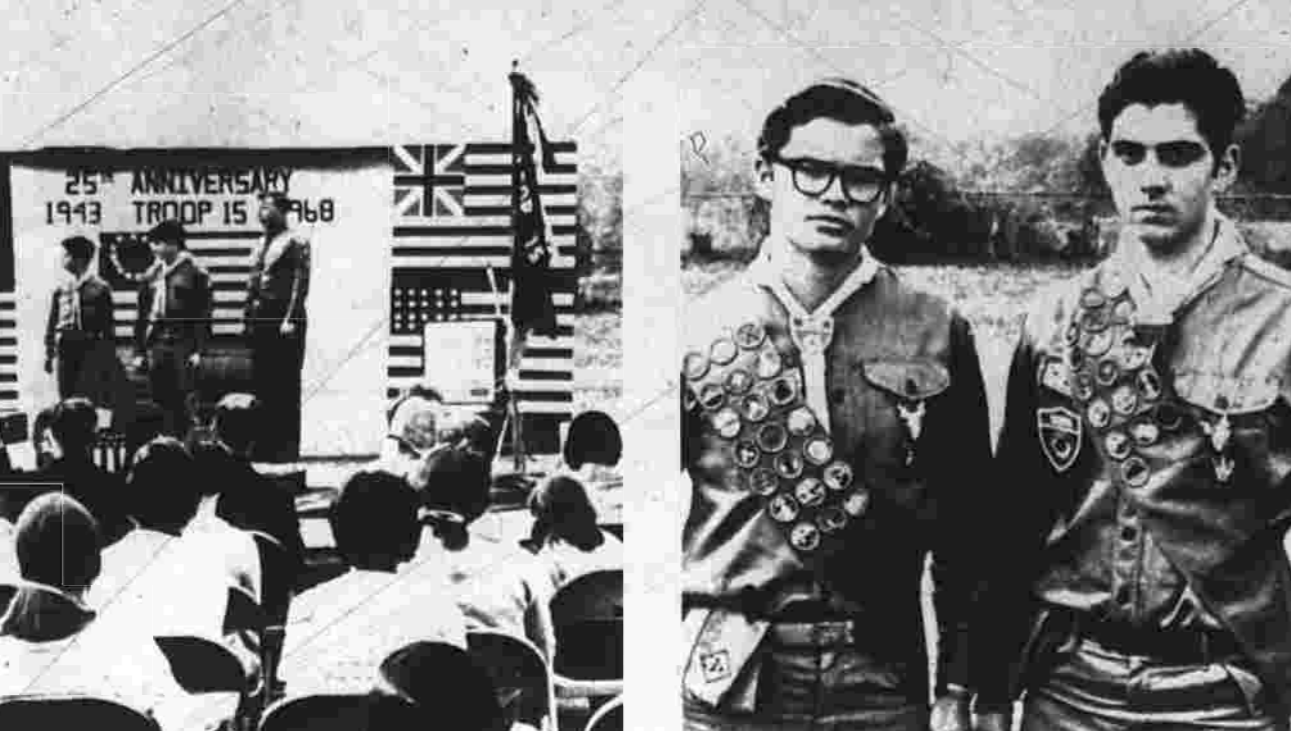

peace, it had criticism for just about everybody else, too. It found the administration of Columbia's affairs to often convey an attitude of authoritarianism and invited distrust.

It concluded that some of the revolutionary students had used tactics which invited police brutality, but that it also found that the police thus stimulated had been guilty of more brutality than could be excused or considered necessary.

It found that the revolutionaries who really wanted to paralyze and destroy the university were present, but that they were only a small core. And it traced its finding that the rebellion ended up with support from students and faculty members to that fact when it began largely to the blind and mistaken policies of the university administration, not merely on the scene, but in the few months and even years which the gap between Columbia and the world in which it was situated had been growing.

But even while it thus seemed to explain revolution almost to the point of justifying it, the Cox Commission also managed to turn around family and declare that "respect to violence or physical harassment or obstruction is never an acceptable tactic for influencing decisions in a university. This principle does not require notions of property or legality to sustain it. It derives from three considerations."

"First, force, harassment, and physical obstruction contradict the essential postulates that the university is dedicated to the search for truth by reason and civility.

"Second, resort to such physical coercion tends to set in motion an uncontrollable escalation of violence. This is the plain lesson of the rising cycle of violence that began at Columbia with the Naval ROTC demonstration in 1968 and culminated in the brutality of April 30 and May 23. The response to steps was not inevitable but each was the readily predictable consequence of those that went before."

"Third, the survival — literally the survival — of the free university depends upon the entire community's active rejection of disruptive demonstrations. Any stable group left to pursue such tactics can destroy either the university by repeatedly disrupting its normal activities or the university's freedom by compelling the authorities to invoke overwhelming force in order that the activities may continue.

"The only alternative, in this section of the Commission's report, continued, "is for the entire community to reject the tactics of physical disruption with such overwhelming moral disapproval as to make them self-defeating."

"This vital decision rests with the liberal and reform-minded students. They can save or destroy the institution. Thus admitting access for unrest and discontent, but rejecting the selection of the tool of violence, the Cox Commission report, bold and realistic yet also temperate and reasonable, is itself likely to prove helpful in inspiring each positive, creative climax and relationship at Columbia.

SEN ROUTE WITH NIXON: Vice President Humphrey's demand that Richard Nixon face him in debate has now surfaced as the most difficult issue facing the spottily efficient Nixon campaign.

To all down his challenge, Humphrey fund-raisers have now received a pledge of gold cash to cover one-half the cost of a network debate if five times is unavailable.

With Nixon so far in front that the election seems to be in the bag, it is natural to wonder everything to avoid the unknown pitfalls of a face-to-face confrontation. First, if runners never want to debate their opponents.

Thus, Nixon up to now has taken his campaign behind section B-B of the Communications Act. This prevents him from offering free time to any presidential contender unless they offer to all minor candidates too.

Archeologists Discover Croesus' Gold Refinery

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — A workshop where King Croesus had his gold refined has been discovered at Sardis, Turkey, by members of an American archaeological expedition.

The find, announced by Harvard University, was a refinery where pure gold was extracted and treated during the time when Croesus, the last king of Lydia in Asia Minor, made Sardis a byword for wealth and introduced the system of coinage into the marts of the civilized world.

The workshop was uncovered on the Paclous torrent, which according to the historian Herodotus, was famous in antiquity for its gold-bearing sands.

Croesus reigned from 560 B.C. to 546 B.C.

The scientists, representing Harvard, Cornell, and other universities, excavated the area inch by inch, recovering numerous tiny bits of refined gold droplets, foil and gold leaf which traces of processing and working they also recovered fragments of crucibles, blowing pipes, and other goldsmithing apparatus.

Fire burned out the 120-foot dome of the museum Sunday night, but an official said most of the priceless collection from the two world wars was saved.

Officials said the fire was the work of an arsonist and was started by two incendiary bombs, one hidden in the dome and the other thrown through a window.

The museum, opened in 1909 by King George V in the building that once housed the lunatic asylum known as Bedlam, is a favorite spot for schoolboys as well as military scholars. Its collection included tanks, aircraft, 4,500 small arms, four forms of military machines, four million photographs and 20 million feet of film recording the impact of war since 1914.

Its galleries have more than 800,000 items, including a collection of Italian human torpedo and the rifle carried by Lawrence of Arabia in the desert.

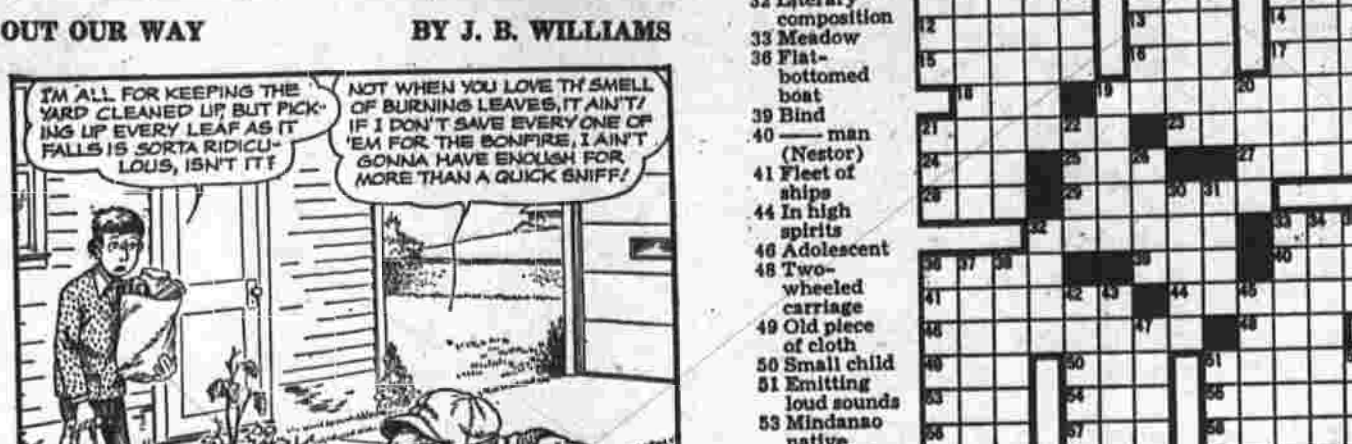
