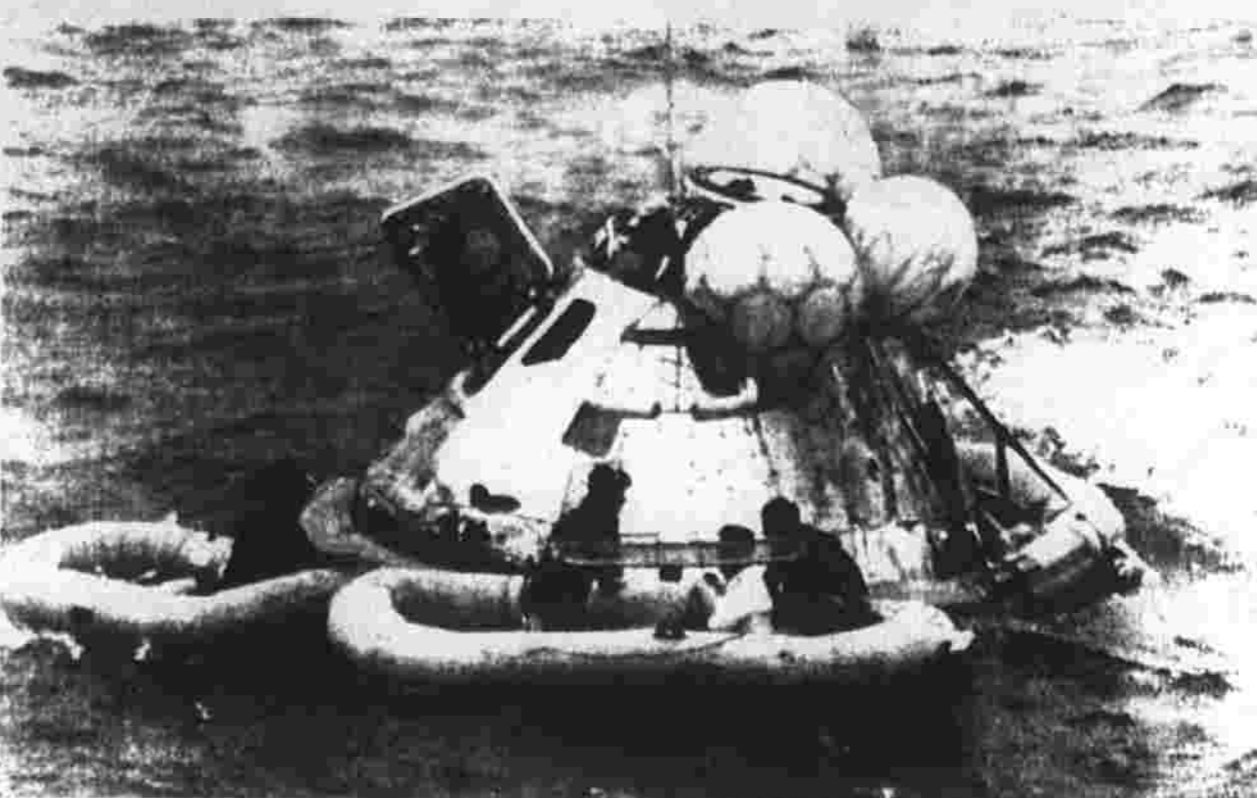

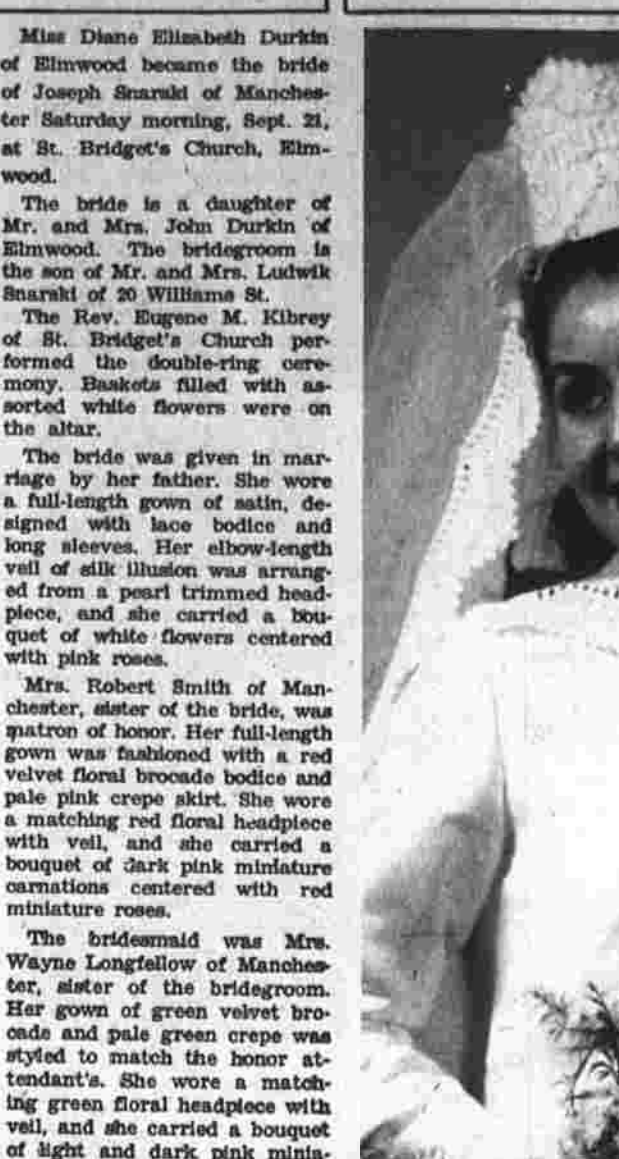

Encouraging The Issue

Those who saw the regional Nixon campaign tins from Boston to the other side of the country were impressed by the development and growth of the Republican candidate as a campaigner. It is true enough that he has been in politics long enough to have become proficient in the art of that profession. But the art displayed in the present program from Boston, as in the quiet discussion of the radio address, is quite a different kind of art from the politics previously associated with Mr. Nixon. And it is quite different from the kind of politics that has been delivered by him on his four non-affectionate returns to the "Speech," in which he has displayed his mastery of the art and rite of voice and smile, and the few catch phrases that are supposed to be good applications for a casual listener with barely already faithful to the cause.

An Olympic Triumph

If there is a gold medal for stupidity and narrow-mindedness, then award it to the U.S. Olympic Committee. They have won it going away. Not that the triumph was easy, it takes a certain amount of stupidity to react the way the committee did when two black members of the American team, in a mild protest against discrimination in the U.S. society, stood during the playing of the American National Anthem with their backs to the flag. It is a gesture on behalf of black power, unity, and dignity. In addition to their official black socks without shoes (a symbol of poverty), and one white pair were a black scarf. Each wore a button citing certain demands for racial equality.

Siesta Goal, Not Foe of Progress

After what had just happened in Peru, this hemisphere needed another military take-over in Panama. Like it needed a perforation in its capitolium. And political retreat there has a shade more to offer us in the way of reproach and disappointment. For Panama is the irritation we created and the one with whom we share our possession of the Panama Canal, the most direct of any of our ties to a Latin American neighbor.

But Peru, after all, was previously under a veiled control by the military as that which has happened, basically, is that the veil has been ripped down. And Panama had already made so much mockery of its last election that the military coup against its delayed victory after a handful of days in office was not really disillusioning—merely more of the same.

Perhaps there is more important news from another country in the hemisphere where our real stakes and hopes have actually been higher. In Chile, President Eduardo Frei and his Christian Democracy party have been conducting a rather thrilling experiment in middle road democracy which has been getting things done in the way of progress for its people and thus fending off, so far, challenges from the potential violence of either the extreme left or right in Chile.

Sighted Island, Park Name

It now appears, perhaps not surprisingly in this age of reversal, as if the battleship USS Jersey were speedily making its way back to the problem of Vietnam, ahead of all the newfangled strategies employing helicopters, defoliants, and other miscellaneous peep-finding devices which can trace human movements through jungle, mountains, and seas. In the New Jersey's 16-inch guns were so powerful in their attack on a North Vietnamese base that they were able to take a huge slice of it and send it below the sea. That eliminated all question of sovereignty, all necessity for future bombing, all possibility of future guerrilla warfare on the territory in question. The more of Vietnam can be sunk, the more the problem itself will disappear. All the human and national goodwill over Vietnam can be saved simply by handing the whole country over to the Pacific Ocean.

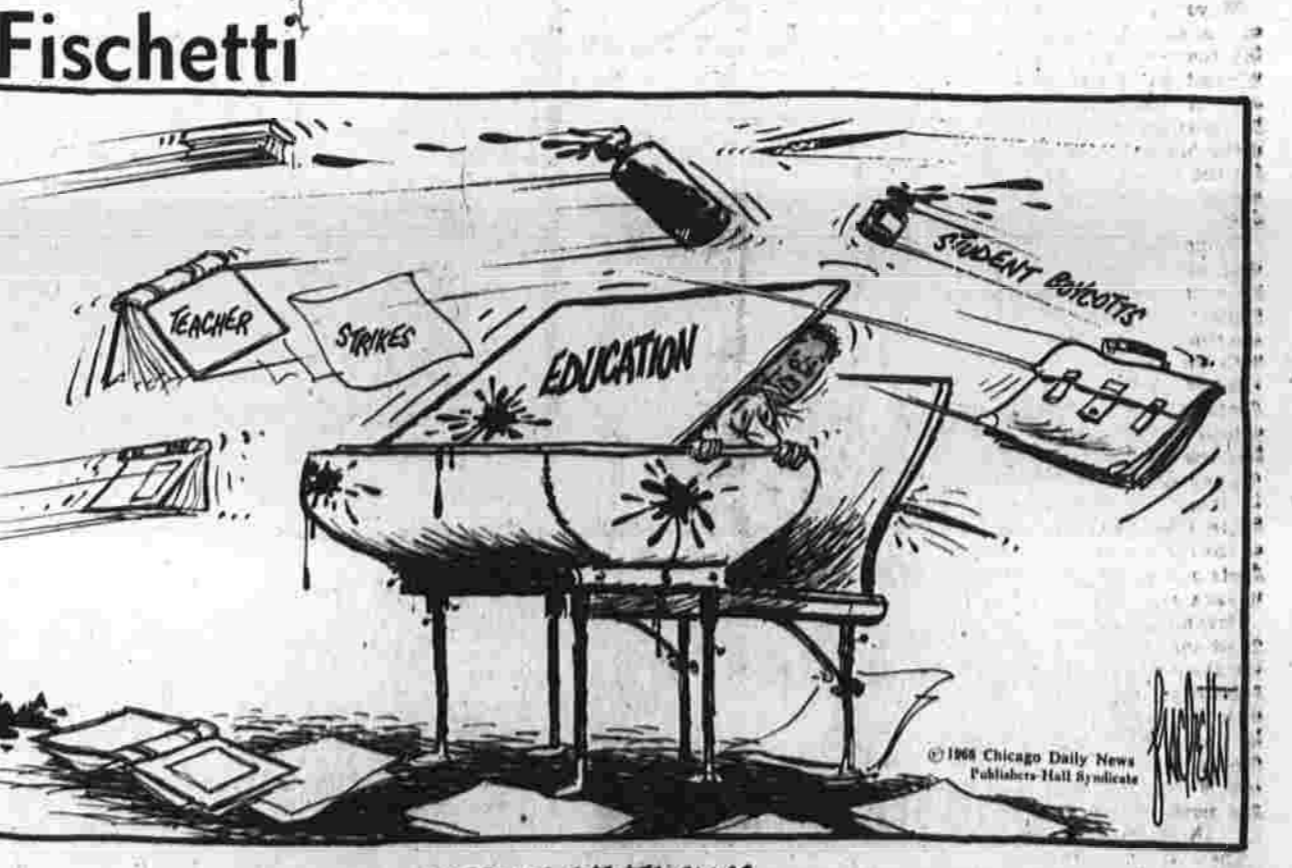

Humphrey Discusses Law and Order Issue

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS
NEW YORK (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey says federal financial aid to state and local law enforcers is a needed step toward law and order because "there isn't a single city in the United States that is adequately policed."

He warns against creating a federal police but also says a Richard M. Nixon plan for town hall meetings of people who are concerned about crime "smacks a little bit of vigilante."

The Democratic presidential candidate discussed his approach to law and order and other issues in an interview with Associated Press editors Oct. 9 in New York City.

"Because law and order is a national problem, and yet it is under local administration," said Humphrey, "it is my view that here is a very legitimate area for substantial federal assistance in funds, in personnel, in equipment, technical assistance."

To direct help police, he advocated increased federal aid for recruitment, training, salaries, university programs and implementation of data processing, communications and other technical advances.

"There isn't a single city in the United States that is adequately policed," Humphrey said. "And when I use the term 'adequately,' I mean in terms of police quality, quantity, training, and equipment. The average police officer receives two thirds of a living wage."

"He really is underpaid and yet he is required to take on one of the most important jobs in our community."

"If you want better police, however, you are going to have to pay for them," he said. "You cannot expect a police officer to know how to deal with the most difficult human relations situations if he has never had any training or experience in this field."

The vice president said the federal government also could assist courts in cutting backlogs, register and license firearms if the states do not, aid criminal rehabilitation and coordinate "a massive federal, state and local assault on organized crime and drug peddling."

Asked how his approach to law and order differs from those of his opponents, Nixon and former Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace, Humphrey declared:

"Well, I do a little less sloganizing and do a little more specificizing. I haven't seen any specifics from Mr. Wallace at all. We feel that we have really gone into this as a responsible person. Mr. Nixon has given four suggestions, four specifics. One of them is a federal academy, which we have; two is a cabinet committee, which we have; three is an office for coordinating crime information, which we have. The fourth is town meetings of people who are concerned about crime. Well, I would say that I worry a little bit about that last one. That smacks a little bit of vigilante. But I am sure he may not have meant that."

In dealing with riots, said Humphrey, "there must be rapid introduction of sufficient manpower into the area for quick and prompt action, including, if necessary, augmentation of the police force by adequate numbers of military—National Guard or regular Army. The emphasis must be on additional men rather than on guns. Use minimum force, but make arrests rapidly and in sufficient number to stem the tide of violence."

In another law enforcement area, Humphrey declared:

"Dissent is never a very pleasant experience for those toward whom the dissent is directed. Nevertheless, it is something that we have to protect and preserve. But disorder is another thing. When a demonstration gets to a point where it affects the physical well-being of others, or where it becomes destructive of property or injurious to person, then it is unlawful. And at that point the police or law enforcement officials must take action."

Humphrey said the controlling issue of the time is reducing tensions both at home and abroad.

NEW BRITAIN, Conn. (AP)—At the last stop on his campaign swing through Connecticut Tuesday, Democratic Vice Presidential nominee Edmund S. Muskie was given a hot but which was said to represent "a workman's town—a labor town."

Muskie visited the building site of the 15-story tower which will be the new international headquarters of the Knights of Columbus in New Britain, where he shook the hands of steelworkers.

"You know, my brother is a steelworker, and he told me the union never paid attention to him until I got the nomination," Muskie told the 100 workmen clustered about him. The workmen were part of a crowd of about 1,500 which turned out at the site for Muskie.

Since about 1960, Wallace has floated down from the lower where several steelworkers were perched on a girder. Those shouts were the closest thing to heckling Muskie heard all day.

In an interview taped for later release by Hartford station WYCT-TV, Muskie attacked Wallace directly. Responding to a question, Muskie said he believes Wallace's major source of support is linked to a combination of fear and hate.

"Once you get a man like Wallace in power," Muskie said, "you don't get him out very easily."

Later in New Britain, Muskie said Nixon and Wallace do not meet the standards of a president.

In New Haven, which was the second town on the day's itinerary, Muskie had lunch in the workers' cafeteria at the Sargeant Manufacturing Co. plant, which manufactures electrical hardware. There he shook hands with numerous workers who crowded into the cafeteria.

He told them in a short speech that one of the nation's major goals should be to make it possible for all Americans to enjoy opportunity and equality.

In New Britain he told thousands standing outdoors on a chilly and damp night: "I see faces of people who are here because someone came to this country looking for freedom."

Freedom and opportunity were stressed often by Muskie as a contrast to his estimate of Wallace's campaign as one playing to fear and hate.

Before lunch, Muskie visited the New Haven headquarters of the Southern New England Telephone Co., where he greeted workers.

Muskie Given Warm New Britain Welcome

Nixon Says HHH Can't Bring Peace

SAGINAW, Mich. (AP)—Richard M. Nixon, accusing Hubert H. Humphrey of treating Vietnam with "the fastest, loosest tongue in the nation," said today the Democratic administration "cannot restore peace."

During his speech, the Republican presidential candidate had been asked if he hoped President Johnson could achieve a Vietnam peace before the Nov. 5 election, and he also had repeatedly said he would use great care in discussing the question lest he interfere with the Paris peace talks.

Ron Ziegler, a Nixon press aide, said in response to an inquiry that the latest statement by the GOP nominee did not reflect any secret information about current peace search but referred to what had transpired on the public record.

Nixon and all other major presidential candidates have been briefed periodically by Johnson aides on the peace negotiations, and just last week, he talked with the President by telephone about the matter—as did his latest.

The latest step in Nixon's war of words against Humphrey came in a statement issued as he moved from 14,000 Ohio train four Tuesday into a three-city flying visit to Michigan.

He spent Tuesday night in Toledo, Ohio, where he told an overflow crowd of more than 4,000 at a rally that the Vietnam war "has been ended before now with a better kind of leadership." He then dropped the subject.

In the past, Nixon generally has lined up in support of Johnson's Vietnam policy, while other spokesmen reported today.

Peace Envoys Clash, No Signs of Accord

PARIS (AP)—American and North Vietnamese peace envoys today clashed over charges today of aggression in Vietnam without providing any defensible sign that they might be nearing agreement on the bombing of North Vietnam.

There had been speculation that Hanoi might reply in the 27th session of the conference to Washington overtures about ending the aerial attacks.

Ambassador W. Averell Harriman and Xuan Thuy clashed in the 24-hour meeting over who is entitled to speak for the South Vietnamese people.

Harriman reaffirmed American backing for the Saigon government of President Nguyen Van Thieu while they once again demanded U.S. recognition of, and negotiations with, the Viet Cong's National Liberation Front.

There was no immediate information to indicate whether the two envoys used their 20-minute tea break for a private exchange on the status of current moves for a bombing halt.

Harriman started reporters on emerging from the old Majestic Hotel conference headquarters when he said: "We have decided to meet again tomorrow."

For some months the sessions have been held at weekly intervals so that some newsmen assumed a break in the situation was developing.

But as the chief American delegate talked, his spokesman, William J. Jordan, was seen to shake his head. And later Harriman himself and Thuy made clear it was a slip of the tongue. The next formal meeting will be on Wednesday, Oct. 30, maintaining the usual pace.

It remained a possibility that Harriman's slip was an unconscious giveaway. He and Thuy are believed to have met in private several times outside the conference framework.

But spokesmen of the U.S. and Vietnamese delegations here have consistently declined to comment on whether any private contacts have been taking place.

In the session itself the two envoys accused each other of being the aggressor in Vietnam.

Thuy declared: "If the United States does not renounce its policy of aggression, its involvement in Vietnam will continue."

Marine Artillery Cuts Enemy Force in Half

SAIGON (AP)—U.S. Marine scouts staged more than 400 North Vietnamese troops' heavy fighting through jungle foothills southwest of Da Nang and air strikes on Tuesday. Four soldiers were killed and 148 others wounded.

Thung Duc was attacked by strong North Vietnamese forces on Sept. 28, and heavy fighting raged for two days. Two or three North Vietnamese soldiers, or from 5,000 to 7,000 troops, were reported in the artillery missions and air strikes killed 170 of the enemy troops, a spokesman said.

The enemy soldiers, wearing various uniforms and carrying various types of weapons including rockets and mortars, were spotted in one of the open valleys about 25 miles southwest of Da Nang and only five miles below the unshattered Thung Duc Special Forces camp.

They were generally headed by a north-southwestern direction, perhaps toward Thung Duc or even Da Nang, South Vietnam.

To End NY Strike School Board Will Restore Teachers

NEW YORK (AP)—In a major change of policy, the ousted Ocean Hill-Brownsville experimental school board said today it was willing to restore 120 expelled white teachers to classrooms in an effort to end the citywide teachers' strike that has kept most of the city's 1.1 million pupils from the schools.

The announcement from the board of the largely Negro and Puerto Rican school district came as New York's labor troubles with its police patrol force and school district were in a work slowdown today.

The Rev. C. Herbert Oliver, chairman of the Ocean Hill board, said the returning teachers would be given classroom assignments. The Rev. Oliver said the principle of the eight schools in the district would honor the decision of the local board.

The refusal of the Ocean Hill board—set up as an experiment in limited community control of schools—to take back the teachers has been at the heart of the bitter dispute between the AFT-CIO United Federation of Teachers and the experimental district.

120 Students Jailed In Berkeley Sit-in

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—The people, "We are the people!" as those arrested—mostly students—were taken from the campus police headquarters to a bus.

Demonstrators in the crowd lit a bonfire and turned over a motorized cart owned by the university. A tear gas canister was thrown and a bank window was broken.

The sit-in on the 7,000-student campus started shortly after the course's third lecture, one by Eldridge Cleaver, the Black Panther leader whose participation in the class drew objections from the university's Board of Regents.

Cleaver, charged with attempted murder during a shoot-out between his militant Negro followers and police, said: "We are the people, we are the people!"
