

South Viet Troops Hit Veteran Unit

SAIGON (AP) — South Vietnamese infantrymen smashed into troops from a veteran North Vietnamese regiment that spearheaded two offensives on Saigon this year, government military headquarters announced today.

A government spokesman said 22 soldiers from North Vietnam's Dong Nai Regiment were killed and 12 others captured in heavy fighting Sunday 24 miles north of Saigon. The prisoners included a battalion deputy commander and a company commander, the spokesman said.

The South Vietnamese troops also seized 21 weapons in the battle and turned up two munitions stockpiles in the surrounding area that included 400 mortar shells, bazooka-type rockets and grenades.

Six South Vietnamese were reported killed and 20 wounded. It was the first time a sizable force of the Dong Nai Regiment had been in action since last May 5, when the regiment was badly mauled in an attack on Saigon. Its reappearance indicated it may be back to full strength now and orders for a third offensive against Saigon.

The Dong Nai Regiment also was in heavy fighting in Saigon during the Tet offensive last February.

South Vietnamese headquarters said the Dong Nai Regiment may have been preparing to attack the key district town of Ben Cat, and the government operation was launched "in order to destroy the enemy in the area southeast of Ben Cat."

It was one of three actions reported around Saigon. U.S. and South Vietnamese forces killed another 28 enemy soldiers and seized 27 weapons in two clashes 10 and 12 miles south of the capital. Two Americans were wounded, and no South Vietnamese losses were reported.

The U.S. Command announced that American infantrymen sweeping in the demilitarized zone captured more than 250 North Vietnamese weapons in one of the largest battlefield hauls of the war.

The troops of the 8th Mechanized Division found 242 rifles and 17 larger weapons on the battlefield in the southern half of the DMZ where American infantrymen, tanks, artillery, planes and offshore warships killed 232 North Vietnamese in an all-day fight Friday.

The larger weapons left behind included eight light machine guns, four mortar tubes, two heavy antiaircraft machine guns and three bazooka-type rockets.

More weapons have been found in caches or aboard running vessels, but military spokesmen said it was unusual and significant for such a large number to be left behind on a battlefield.

LBJ Joins HHH In Blasting Nixon

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS President Johnson has accused Richard M. Nixon of making "ugly and unfair charges" on security and peace efforts and Hubert H. Humphrey charges Nixon with spreading an unfounded rumor that the Democrats are playing politics with peace.

Humphrey accused his Republican presidential opponent Sunday night "of simply using the old Nixon tactic of unsubstantiated insinuation" by suggesting White House "insiders" are trying to bring off a Vietnam peace development to boost Humphrey's election chances next week.

But Nixon—expanding Sunday on his Friday statement that he did not believe speculation that Johnson would make "a cynical, last-minute attempt" to salvage Humphrey's candidacy—said he was trying to squelch the reports.

"It seemed to me that I was being quite responsible in making that," Nixon said. "... I would think the President would be thanking me rather than attacking me."

Nixon made the comment on a special CBS "Face the Nation" program.

Johnson, making a political appearance in New York, had accused Nixon of making "ugly and unfair charges about our security gap and charges about our attempts to win peace in the world."

Humphrey issued a statement after Nixon's television appearance, charging him with "using a tactic which he has used in so many campaigns."

"The tactic: spread an unfounded rumor. Then say you don't believe it," Humphrey continued. "If Mr. Nixon has evidence that the President or any member of this government is playing politics with the peace negotiations, I call on him to spell it out now—openly."

Humphrey also joined Johnson Sunday and again today in disputing Nixon's statement that Democratic administrations had created a security gap and that America must maintain arms superiority over the Soviet Union.

"He (Nixon) is risking miscalculation by our enemies," Humphrey said in remarks prepared for an Akron, Ohio, rally. "He is urging a mad escalation of the nuclear arms race. And he is advocating an increasing militarization of American life and American foreign policy."

Nixon, meanwhile, accused Humphrey of loose talk on Vietnam and said: "When negotiations are in progress, an undisciplined tongue can be the worst of all weapons."

State Poll Says Nixon and Ribicoff

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—A poll conducted for the Hartford Times showed today Connecticut voters favoring Republican presidential candidate Richard M. Nixon over Democrat Hubert H. Humphrey, but Democratic incumbent Abraham Ribicoff over GOP candidate Edwin H. May in the U.S. Senate race.

The copyrighted poll said Nixon was favored by 44 per cent of those polled, Humphrey by 31 per cent, and third party candidate George Wallace by 12 per cent. Thirteen per cent were undecided.

Ribicoff, the poll said, was favored by 64 per cent of those polled, and May by 20 per cent as of Oct. 21. The survey shows Ribicoff leading May by about 280,000 votes in the state, based on a 90 per cent voter turnout. Fifteen per cent were undecided.

Soviet Soyuz 2 Lands; Cosmonaut Still Orbits

MOSCOW (AP) — The unmanned Soviet space ship Soyuz 2 landed in the Soviet Union today after three days in space.

The cosmonaut continued the planned scientific experiments: visual observation of the cloud cover of the earth's surface and observation of the starry sky.

"In the 33rd orbit of the earth, he discovered three forest fires and saw clearly thunderstorm phenomena in the area of the equator... Soyuz 3 continues its flight."

Tass said a retro engine was switched on aboard Soyuz 2 on command from earth and 26 minutes later the spaceship "entered the dense layers of the atmosphere, made a controlled descent with aerodynamic quality and landed. It was parachuted down with the use of a soft landing system at the last stage."

On his first orbit Saturday Beregovoy reportedly came close to the unmanned craft. An official announcement said he made his second approach by firing a rocket to adjust his course but did not indicate how close he came either time.

Tass said the maneuver Sunday lasted 90 minutes. There was no indication how long the Soviet cosmonaut would stay up. Western experts here said more than three or four days was unlikely unless there was to be a maneuver with another manned spacecraft still to be launched.

The announcement did not give the location of the landing. Earlier today a Soviet scientist said the purpose of Beregovoy's flight is to develop docking systems, essential for Russia's announced program of eventually constructing huge orbiting platforms in space to serve as launch pads for rockets to the moon and planets.

The statement by Boris Petrov of the Soviet Academy of Sciences was made in Pravda, the Communist party newspaper, after Beregovoy maneuvered his Soyuz 3 spacecraft Sunday in a second approach to the unmanned Soyuz 2 launched a day before him.

On his first orbit Saturday Beregovoy reportedly came close to the unmanned craft. An official announcement said he made his second approach by firing a rocket to adjust his course but did not indicate how close he came either time.

Tass said the maneuver Sunday lasted 90 minutes. There was no indication how long the Soviet cosmonaut would stay up. Western experts here said more than three or four days was unlikely unless there was to be a maneuver with another manned spacecraft still to be launched.

A link up between two manned orbiting ships would be a historic first, but a linkup with an unmanned craft would duplicate a maneuver already accomplished by U.S. astronauts.

Official reports said Beregovoy, at 47 the oldest of the 33 humans who have flown in space, was in good shape, "retaining a high capacity for work" and "successfully fulfilling his program of space research."

During one of three live television transmissions from Soyuz 3, Beregovoy was shown leaning from his seat to look at the earth. He gave a thumbs up gesture to express pleasure at the view.

Soviet television is giving close coverage to Soyuz 3, a departure from previous secretive handling of space flight. It broadcast a 20-minute program Sunday afternoon showing preparations at the Balkonur Cosmodrome Saturday morning.

Beregovoy was shown in the craft before liftoff and held up a small sign to the camera that said: "Hello Everybody." The telecast covered his ascent into the spacecraft and the blastoff.

Even if the \$1.5 billion figure is realized, the year's showing still would fall far short of original goals.

In New York School Strike

Teacher Union Head Proposes Peace Plan

NEW YORK (AP) — Teachers' union president Albert Shanker has proposed a plan which he says could end the teachers strike and get 1.1 million pupils back into public schools this week.

Meanwhile, the city's labor picture brightened as firemen announced they were following policemen in ending their work slowdowns.

Shanker's conditions Sunday night for ending the walkout by the 66,000-member United Federation of Teachers coincided with previous proposals by Mayor John V. Lindsay and the Board of Education.

Saying some of the proposals "are negotiable" and that it appeared "to be the only way out of the situation," Shanker listed the following conditions:

Continue the temporary suspension of Brooklyn's Ocean Hill-Brownsville governing board and its unit administrator, Rhody McCoy; temporarily closing Junior High School 271, scene of violence and threats against about 80 unwarranted union teachers; letting those teachers teach in the district's seven other schools; and temporary sus-

pension of the district's eight principals.

Before striking for the third time Oct. 14, Shanker and the union's executive board rejected proposals by the board and Lindsay which contained all points except dismissal of the principals.

Shanker disclosed his plan on a special WNBC-TV program, appearing with Board of Education President John Doar.

Shanker said he would get the schools open "by going back to the position—turning back the clock to the situation that existed on the day—the last day of school"—Friday, Oct. 11.

Blast Damages JFK Memorial

British Police Contain Protestors

LONDON (AP) — Police on Sunday contained and controlled the largest demonstrations against the Vietnam war ever held in London and repelled a small attack on the U.S. Embassy without using nightsticks.

The only serious damage reported was not in London but at the John F. Kennedy Memorial at Runnymede, west of the capital. An explosion Saturday night split the seven-ton stone slab down the middle. The local chief of detectives said it could have been an antiwar protest or possibly a protest against Mrs. Kennedy's marriage to Aristotle Onassis.

"We have a lead and we have every hope of success," the chief said.

Police estimated about 30,000 persons marched through London, all but a few hundred peacefully. Some 7,000 demonstrated in Grosvenor Square, site of the American Embassy, and 200 to 300 extremists broke away for a flying wedge attack on the big white building.

As thick cordons of police barred their way, the red-helmeted riot police and anarchists threw firecrackers at mounted police waiting in reserve. Some hurled banner poles as spears. Then they charged the police lines with iron pipes.

The police slowly pushed and showed the militants back, penning them into the southwest corner of the square and stopping any attempt to break out. Gradually the young demonstrators ran out of steam and drifted away. London was quiet again by 9 p.m.

Holyoake, Thieu Agree Coalition Unacceptable

SAIGON (AP) — Prime Minister Keith Holyoake of New Zealand and President Nguyen Van Thieu agreed in a communique today that a coalition government for South Vietnam as advocated by the Communists would be completely unacceptable.

The two allies thus reaffirmed a point made at a seven-nation Vietnam conference in New Zealand last April.

The communique said they also agreed that the National Liberation Front, the political arm of the Viet Cong, could not be admitted to peace talks as an independent entity, but that all allied nations with troops in Vietnam should have a role in the final settlement.

Holyoake, nearing the end of a visit to Saigon, was Thieu's guest in a state dinner at Independence Palace.

U.S. Ambassador Ellsworth Bunker had met Thieu twice during the day. In all they have now had nine meetings since President Johnson's proposals for a halt in the bombing of North Vietnam were reported Oct. 18. Thieu is known to be talking at some parts of the plan. But, as usual, nothing was

disclosed about their conversation.

Holyoake told newsmen the proposals are more generous than ever before, but Hanoi's leaders have shown no sign of seriously discussing a peaceful settlement.

The New Zealand chief of state said he did not believe any of the allies had suggested an unconditional halt in the bombing.

"There should be some reciprocity," he said, adding that this could include an assurance that infiltration from the North would cease or be modified and that attacks would be reduced.

Asked if he felt a complete bombing halt is imminent, the silver-haired prime minister replied: "You will have to ask Ho Chi Minh. At the present time, it rests with Hanoi."

Since New Zealand is one of the seven allied nations in the war, Holyoake said his country would expect to be included in negotiations on a final settlement. He added that his government would not expect to sit in at the present time, but emphasized that the allies were being

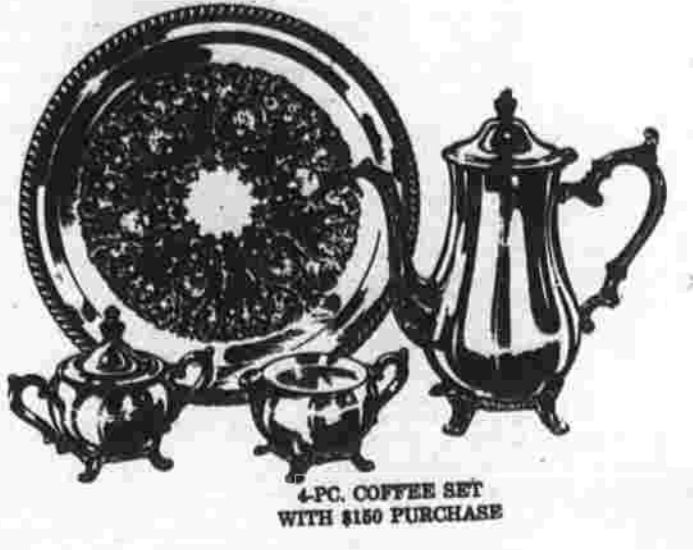

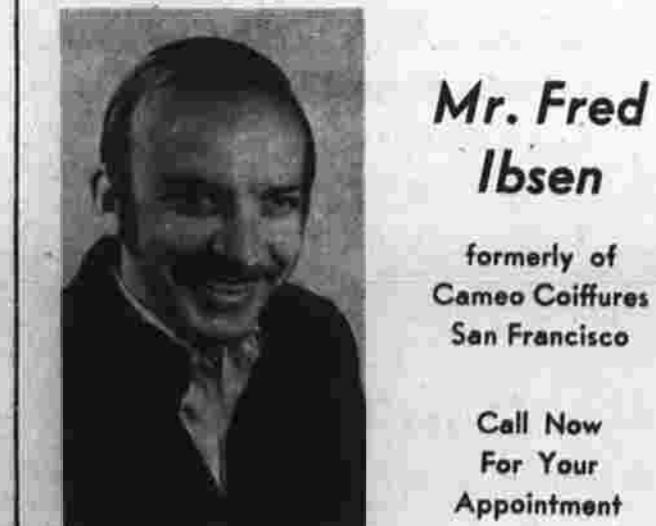

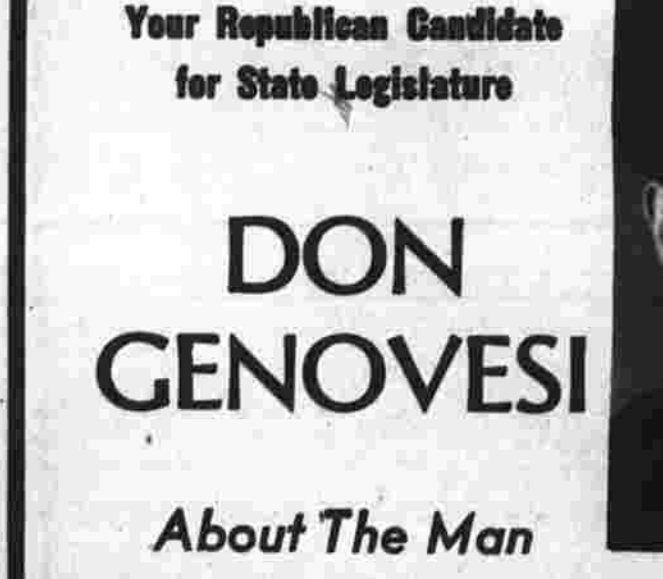

### Tolland County Marianni Would Drop Draft For a Voluntary Service

Peter Marianni, Republican for Congress from the Second District, has advocated a plan designed to substitute a voluntary military service, permitting the country "to eliminate the draft."

"We must continue to help our country but we cannot do so at the expense of our own strength and standard of living," Marianni stated in a speech.

"I visualize a United States military service which is used primarily for training," Marianni stated. "I visualize a regular Army, Navy, and Air Force, whose chief assignments are to train foreign military forces, as well as our own National Guard and Reserve."

In another speaking engagement last week, Marianni spoke out for a strong NATO and a United Europe.

"A strong NATO must be the cornerstone of our foreign policy," he declared.

"If we are to help our allies and receive help in return, we must work closely with them."

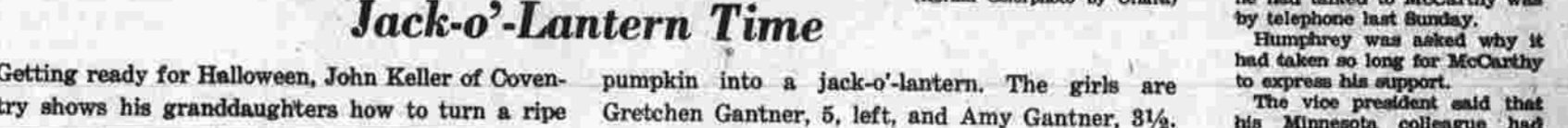
