### Italy Floods Are Ebbing; 102 Deaths

VIRECELLI, Italy (AP) — The flood waters over northern Italy today after 14 hours of rain, and waters began receding in a triangle of death and ruin along the north slopes of the Alps.

Floods and landslides took 102 lives there and other persons were missing. It was feared the toll might surpass 150 deaths of the disastrous Florence-Venice floods in November 1966.

The worst seems to be over. A report from Virecelli, in the hardest hit region, said that the waters were receding and cold weather in the Alps has checked the runoff.

But as the northern tributaries emptied floodwaters into the Po, Italy's greatest river, officials feared the crest of the danger in the river's basin. Low-lying areas were ordered evacuated as a precautionary measure.

Emergency crews worked to reopen roads in the flood zone. Some villages still were isolated. The Milan-Turin main railway line was restored and so was the international rail line through the Stupiniga Pass between Italy and Switzerland.

The latter was blocked when a rockslide on the Italian side derailed some cars of a north-bound train.

Damage to the industrially rich province of Vercelli, which also is a major rice producer, was estimated at more than \$16 million. But the total across northern Italy was certain to run far higher.

In Biella, at the foot of the Alps, some 60 of the city's 130 hotels were wrecked, thousands were jobless and many were homeless also.

### No Conspiracy Evidence Says Counsel for Spock

BOSTON (AP) — Counsel for Dr. Benjamin Spock claims there was no evidence at his baby doctor's trial that he conspired with anyone to conceal young men to avoid the draft.

Alan H. Rosenberg made this point Monday as he filed a statement of issues supporting an appeal of Spock's June 14 conviction on the conspiracy charge.

The lawyer also said that when Spock spoke against the draft he was using "constitutionally protected speech."

He further maintained there should have been a ruling to the District Court on the legality of the trial under the 25th and 35th amendments to the U.S. Constitution.

Spock and three other men were convicted by a federal district court jury. They were sentenced to two years in jail each and were fined varying amounts ranging from \$1,000 to \$5,000. The sentences were stayed pending appeals, which may not be heard until March.

Those convicted with Spock were Rev. William Slovic Coffin Jr., 45, chaplain of Yale University; Mitchell Goodman, 44, of Temple, Maine; and Michael Ferber, 32, a Harvard graduate student. A fifth defendant was acquitted.

Counsel for Goodman and Ferber already have submitted similar statements of issues to the U.S. Court of Appeals, while counsel for Coffin has been granted until Nov. 11 to submit his.

Those who criticize the present system of automobile liability insurance do so on the ground that it is unduly expensive, that it is erratic and does not

Those who criticize the present system on such terms tend to favor the adoption of entirely new standards — like the award of benefits on a "no fault" system, and the establishment of the scale of benefits on a consistent statistical basis, as with workers' compensation.

On the other hand, powerful elements in the insurance industry are quick to criticize such change proposals and eagerly want the public to know that the present system is not only sound but also profitable.

These negative arguments all fail in one important respect. 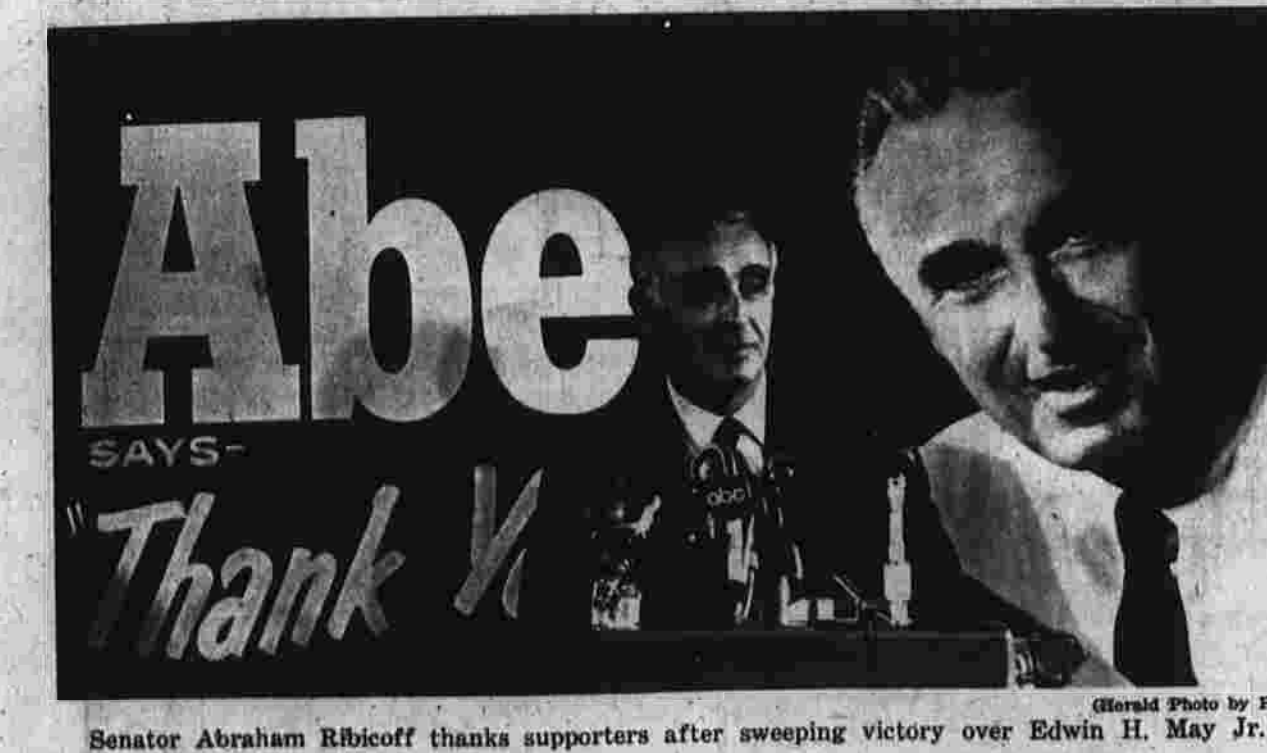
