North Vietnam Charges U.S. Again Bombing Above DMZ

PARIS (AP) — North Vietnam charged today the United States had carried out new bombing attacks deep in its territory Thursday and demanded an end of what it said "were acts of war."

A spokesman for Hanoi's delegation at the Paris peace talks asserted the American bombings had occurred for the third straight day Thursday.

The United States' acts of war are in violation of national sovereignty and security of the Democratic Republic of North Vietnam," he said.

The spokesman charged that three F-4 jets of the U.S. Air Force dropped explosives and fragmentation bombs on four villages and hamlets in the Province of Quang Binh, near the DMZ, he said, in more than 40 miles north of the demilitarized zone.

The United States has claimed the right to send planes, under United States law, over North Vietnam for reconnaissance. It also has warned the North Vietnamese that it would defend Americans imperiled by hostile actions or go to the rescue of the crews of downed aircraft.

The North Vietnamese charge was disputed there. American officials said they were not involved in the bombing attacks.

The spokesman asserted the Americans attacked Thursday night and on Friday morning. He said the attacks were connected with rescue operations.

"We protest against these acts of war, and we demand that they be stopped," the spokesman said. "We demand that the United States withdraw its planes from the DMZ area."

U.S. Air Cav Pursues Foe Near Border

U.S. Air Force B-52 bombers dropped 600 tons of explosives on infiltration corridors near the Cambodian border and 20 miles southwest of Saigon where unexplained "enemy activity" was reported.

Searchers Fail To Find Cleaver
SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Police say a widespread hunt has failed to turn up any trace of Black Panther Eldridge Cleaver, missing since Wednesday when he failed to appear for return to prison charges of parole violation.
The State Department of Corrections said it had received a tip that Cleaver might have been rushed out of the country by an underground organization, but authorities said Thursday there was no evidence to support that theory.
Cleaver, lecturer in a controversial racism course at the University of California, was sentenced to 12 years in prison on a conviction of attempted murder in Los Angeles in 1966 through farmers' cooperatives and was paroled in 1968. Farmers now get about 50 per cent of what consumers spend on food produced in Sweden.
Cleaver was released in June after a Superior Court Judge in Solano county ruled he was being held for political purposes. This decision was overturned by an appeals court, which was upheld by the State Supreme Court.
Tuesday, he was denied a stay by U.S. Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall.

Rare Wine Sold
LONDON (AP)—Seven half bottles of Tokay Keszence, a rare wine supposed to revive the dying, sold at auction Thursday for \$204 each. All went to an anonymous buyer.
One of the sellers was Dennis Wheeler, writer of thrillers, who acquired his two bottles, vintage 1888 and 1898, from the cellars of the King of Saxony before World War I.
The wine is sweet and greenish in color. It was made in a small region of Hungary from grapes dried in the sun.
Michael Broadbent, wine expert at Christie's Auctioneers, said: "It is said that the life of the pope was prolonged for six weeks by small doses sent by the Emperor Franz Joseph. I don't know if it is still being made."

Japan Has Surplus In Balance of Payment
TOKYO (AP)—Japan had a \$219 million balance of payments surplus in October, the biggest monthly surplus since April, 1965, when the country adopted the international monetary fund's formula for calculating external accounts.
It compares with a \$77.6 million deficit in October 1967, the Finance Ministry reported today.
The Bank of Japan and the Finance Ministry said October exports totaled \$1,164 million, compared to \$937.1 million in October, 1967. Imports totaled \$944 million, up from \$717.3 million a year earlier.
Added to this October trade surplus of \$226 million long-term market on the wholesale level through farmers' cooperatives and was paroled in 1968.

The bill imposes restrictions on the acquisition of certain classes of land by non-citizens, and by New Zealand subsidiaries of overseas corporations, and by New Zealand citizens in which 25 per cent or more of the voting power is controlled by non-citizens.

State Turnout Of Voters Hit 20-Year Low
HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—The voter turnout in Connecticut out on Nov. 6 was the lowest in percentage terms in any presidential election in two decades.
According to official figures released Wednesday by the State Board of Registrars, there were 1,082,200 Connecticut residents eligible to vote.
Of these, 1,274,000 actually voted. And of those who went to the polls about 15,000 did not vote for any of the three presidential candidates on the 76,412. Meekill's margin: 40-76.
The turnout was 88.9 per cent of the eligible voters. The average turnout in presidential elections in recent Connecticut history has been around 90 per cent.

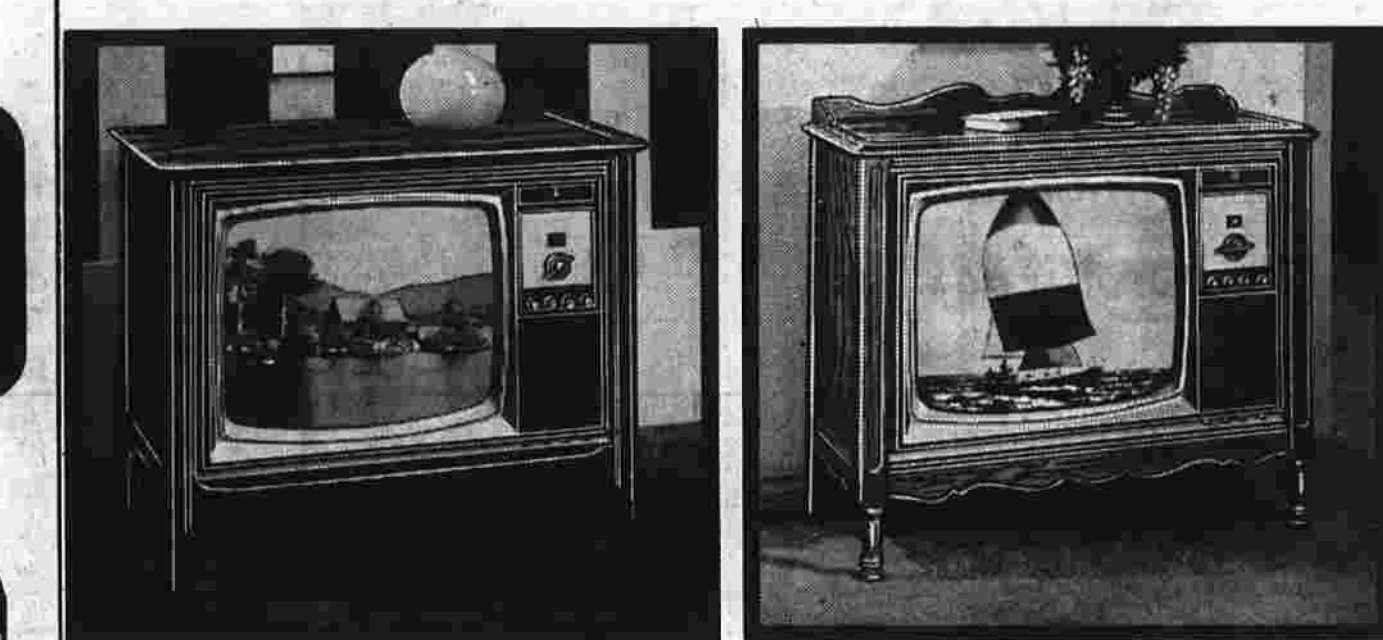

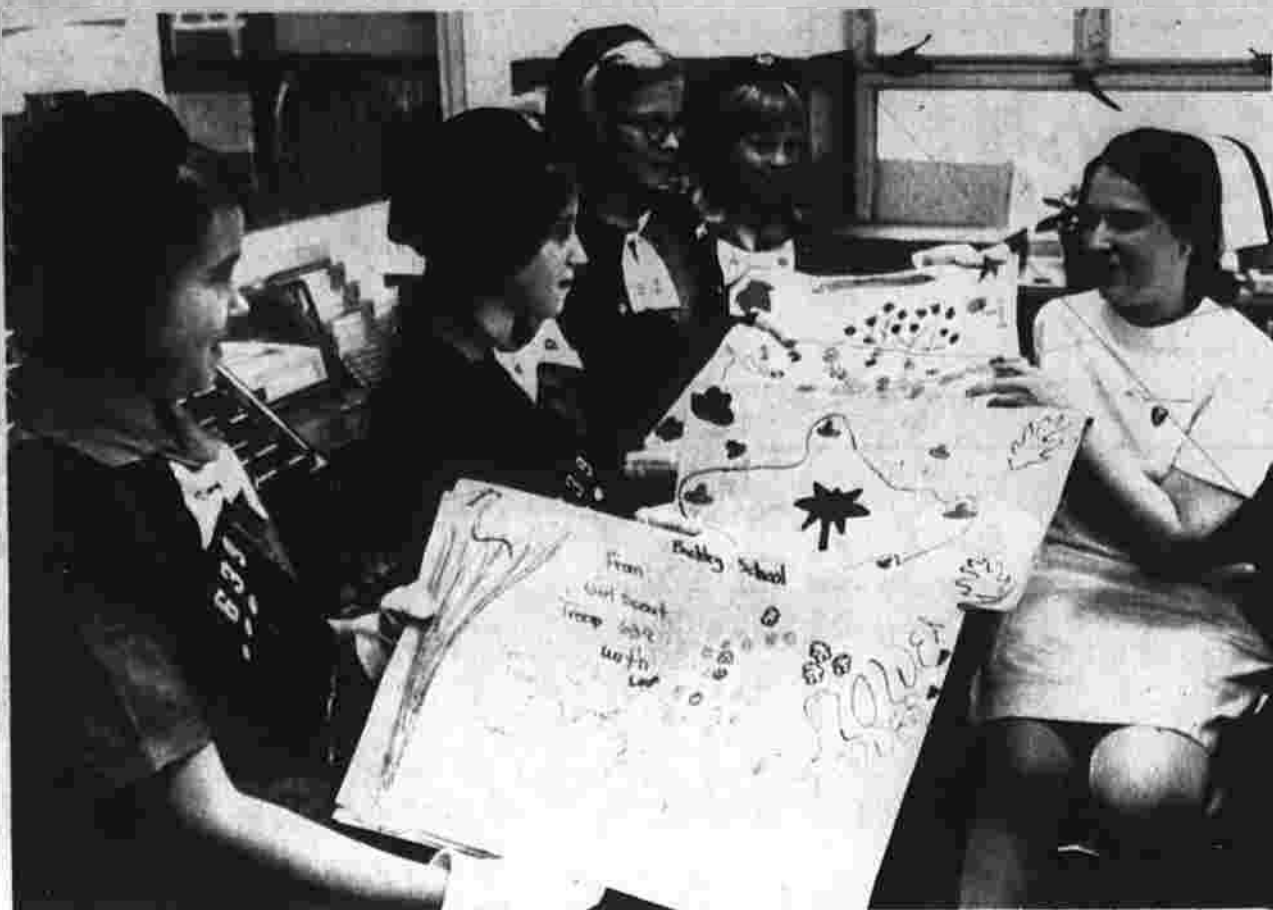

Fireman Dies In Seattle Pier Blaze

SEATTLE, Wash. (AP) — Fire believed caused by a cable short circuit under a pier roused through a dock area, leaving one fireman dead, 23 others injured and an estimated \$200,000 damaged.

Henry C. Gromerud, 41, a 12-year veteran fireman, was killed early today when he stepped onto a high voltage wire at the scene. Most of the injuries were from smoke inhalation. Twenty-six boats helped battle the flames, which broke out on the underside of the dock Thursday. A small blaze on the tanker was extinguished quickly. Heavy-cranes piled up and sent clouds of smoke high into the air over Puget Sound.

Does State Court Ruling Write Off Probate System?

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—The State Supreme Court this week upheld the right of the legislature to appoint an administrator to write off the probate system.

In so doing, it may also have sounded the death knell for the probate court system.

Although the Supreme Court overruled two provisions of the reform law passed by the General Assembly last year, its decision apparently opened the door for further legislation that could actually wipe out the probate courts—without any necessity going through the time-consuming process of amending the state constitution.

The crux of the matter lies in this simple declarative sentence in the state constitution (Article Five): "The judicial power of the state shall be vested in a supreme court, a court of appeals and lower courts as the general assembly shall from time to time, establish."

What this means, according to the Supreme Court decision announced Monday night, is that "the office of judge of probate is not a constitutional office."

"Although a judge of probate holds a public office of the state government," said Connecticut's highest court, "he does not hold an office established by the constitution, even though his term of office and those who can vote for him are set forth in the constitution."

The probate courts, said the Supreme Court, are among the "lower courts" dependent on the General Assembly for their existence. (The other "lower courts" are the Circuit Court, the Court of Common Pleas and the Juvenile Court.)

The legislature, it is understood, could extensively revise the Circuit Court or even abolish it, if it chose. After all, it created the Circuit Court in its present form in the major court reform act of 1962.

So what is to prevent the legislature from extensively reorganizing the probate courts—

to enact more drastic legislation than it did in 1967.

The probate judges, after reading between the lines of the Supreme Court's decision, may regret that they challenged the 1967 reform act. Without the Supreme Court's definitive declaration that "the office of probate judge is not a constitutional office," the legislature may have refrained from any additional major reform efforts.

As it is now, the General Assembly apparently can do pretty much what it wishes with the probate courts, within the narrow and qualified limitations of the state constitution.

All it says is: "Judges of probate shall be elected by the electors residing in their respective districts on the Tuesday after the first Monday of November 1968 and quadrennially thereafter, and shall hold office for four years from and after the Wednesday after the first Monday of the next succeeding January."

Does the constitutional provision for election of probate judges mean that there have to be probate judges?

If the state constitution required registration of public officers, would that mean that the state would have to make sure there was a judge of probate in operation somewhere in Connecticut?

An analysis of the landmark Supreme Court decision on the probate court reform enacted by the General Assembly suggests that the probate courts may be revised, reshaped, even abolished by the legislature.

As long as there are such courts, the Supreme Court said, the legislature will not be able to give a court administrator the power to suspend probate judges. This was one of the provisions of the 1967 reform act nullified by the high court.

Neither will the legislature be able to delegate to the administrator the authority to set probate courts, the Supreme Court said. The legislature may do itself—and, in fact, it did do it in the legislation enacted last year—suspend judges who have not been re-elected.

But aside from these restrictions, the legislature may have a clear field ahead if it chooses

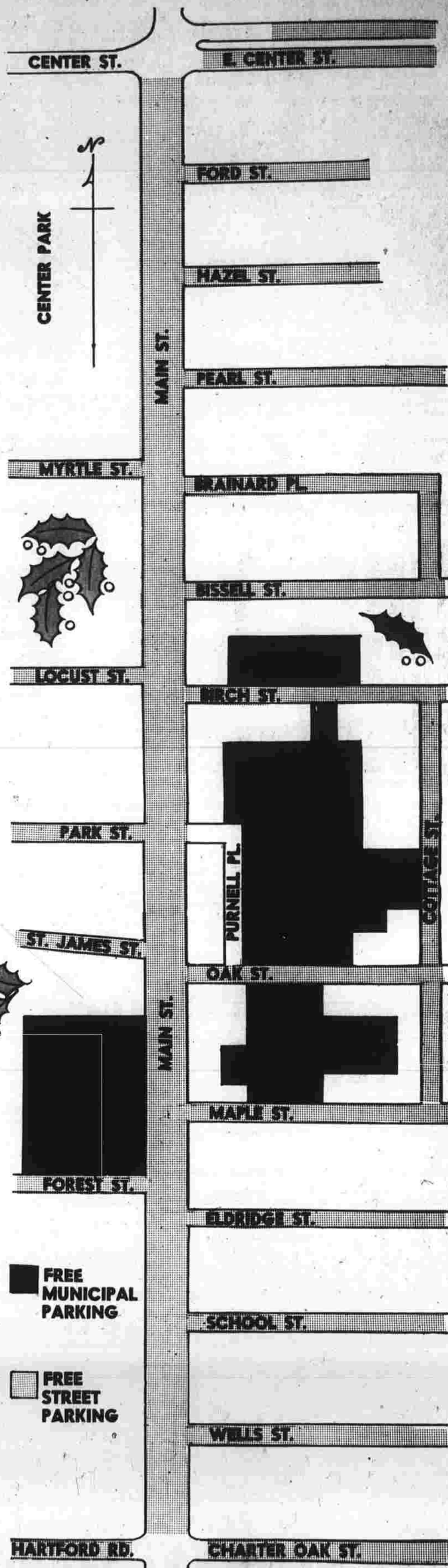
