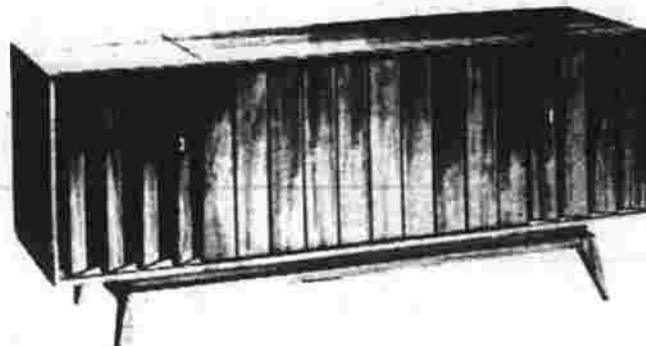

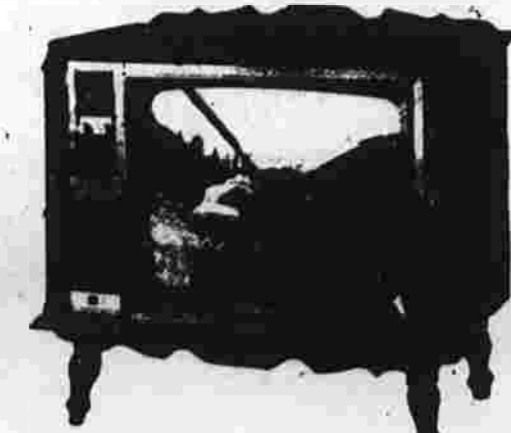

The 15,000-man air cavalry division has been operating north of Saigon for more than a month, awaiting 15,000 to 20,000 North Vietnamese troops that are reported deployed along a 100-mile stretch of the Cambodian border.

NHRR Bonds' Rise Brings ICC Probe

WASHINGTON (AP)—Bonds of the bankrupt New Haven Railroad rose sharply on the stock market immediately after a secret Interstate Commerce Commission ruling that was not announced to the public until a week later.

May Go to \$160,000 Town Gets Windfall In Budget Surplus

The taxpayers of Manchester are getting an unexpected, but welcome windfall of from \$100,000 to \$140,000. Town Manager Robert Weiss told the Board of Directors last night.

The sum is in unanticipated surplus for the 1967-68 fiscal year, which ended June 30.

When the current General Fund budget was adopted last May, the 1967-68 surplus was estimated at \$20,711. It was included as a revenue item in the current budget, and all of it has been appropriated.

Weiss said last night that an official audit reveals that the correct surplus is in excess of \$123,000. Reports are that it may go as high as \$160,000.

Weiss was asked to explain why it has taken more than five months from the close of the last fiscal year to get the final figure. He said the figures were discovered only after the audit, conducted by the town's auditors, Rhodes, Rice and Kanehl.

He explained that approximately \$60,000 of the unappropriated surplus is from income from invested funds, overtook previously. The money was those from the bond issue for the Martin School.

The money was invested, primarily in municipal bonds, and it was to be paid to the town in 1968.

Another source of unanticipated income is from the town clerk's office, for conveyance taxes on property transfers.

The return from that source was greater than forecast. For 1967, the conveyance tax was a record \$1,100.

State Legislature passed an act, authorizing that state's towns and cities to collect the tax when the federal government dropped it.

The town's official audit will be released in two or three weeks, Weiss said last night.

The Board of Directors last night approved five additional appropriations to the General Fund, and used \$130,000 of the 1967-68 unappropriated surplus for funding some of them.

A \$3,000 appropriation to cover cost of legal advertising to the remainder of the year. It will be financed from the surplus.

A \$5,000 appropriation for the refund of 1967-68 taxes, resulting from court appeals. It will be financed from the surplus.

A \$25,000 appropriation to the Welfare Fund, to cover increased costs. It will be financed from the surplus and \$15,000 from a state grant.

A \$200 appropriation to the Cemetery Fund, to cover a refund for a cemetery lot fee paid twice in error. It will be financed from the surplus.

A \$2,000 appropriation to the Police Department, to pay for special services in conjunction with the 40th anniversary. It will be financed from equal contributions by the contractor.

Town Loses Water Super

Manchester Water and Sewer Superintendent Lawrence Wittkobe has resigned his post effective Jan. 11.

In his letter of resignation yesterday to Town Manager Robert Weiss, he stated that he will enter private employment. Although when contacted, he would not disclose the name of the private employer, reports

Wittkobe's resignation was effective Jan. 11, 1968. He has been with the town since 1958.

Wittkobe, 44, started working for the town part-time in October 1962, while still a senior in high school. In October 1963 he was drafted into the U.S. Army and spent 27 months in the service, 18 of them in Europe.

After his discharge, he returned to his Manchester job in the town water department, first as a junior engineering aide, then as senior engineering aide.

In March 1966 he was appointed assistant superintendent to Fred Trull. He had finished one of the top three finalists in that year's competition.

When Trull retired in October 1967, Wittkobe was named acting superintendent. He was appointed superintendent on July 21, 1967, after examination and certification by the State Personnel Department.

Wittkobe, a Manchester native, was married in April 1968 to the former Helen Shtetes, also of Manchester. The couple reside at 189 Benton St.

Weiss said yesterday that the town will advertise soon for applicants to replace Wittkobe.

The effective date of the resignation, Assistant Superintendent Grayson Lechwood will serve as acting superintendent.

Wittkobe is the third town department head to resign within the past several months. The others were Town Planner Joseph Tananay, who left to take a similar post in Norfolk; and Rec Director William Boyer, who resigned for personal reasons.

Electric Boat Gets
More 'Quiet Sub' Funds

WASHINGTON (AP)—Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics Corp. has received another \$15.5 million to continue planning work on the expensive "quiet submarine."

The shipyard in Groton, Conn., has now been granted a total of \$22 million by the Navy for the project. Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D-Conn., said Tuesday in announcing the contract award.

The quiet sub, so described because its electric drive will be much quieter than gear drive now used in nuclear submarines, will be built in Groton, according to Electric Boat.

Designed for anti-submarine warfare operations, such a boat would cruise underwater with reduced chance of being detected by an enemy.

The Navy expects the cost of the quiet sub to be as high as \$150 million to \$200 million. The most recent contract award for a nuclear attack sub with the gear-drive propulsion was \$78 million.

Dr. Sheppard's Wife Sues For Divorce on 'Cruelty'

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP)—The blonde German woman who married Dr. Samuel Sheppard after he was released from prison in the slaying of his first wife has sued for divorce and obtained a court order to keep Sheppard from any contact with her.

Sheppard's divorce sought Tuesday night to serve Sheppard with the restraining order but his whereabouts were not known.

Mrs. Ariane Sheppard, 39, who met her husband through a divorcee, filed the suit in a trial court in Cleveland.

Sheppard was acquitted in a retrial in 1966 and for a time the couple lived in West Germany.

They returned to Cleveland early this year and troubles again started. He went back to work at the Youngstown, Ohio, Osteopathic Hospital and was named last September in two counts charging negligence in surgery resulting in the death of two patients. The damages sought totaled \$1.2 million.

On Monday, the hospital announced that Sheppard had resigned.

The Sheppards had no children in their marriage. He has a son and a daughter by previous marriages.

Mrs. Sheppard had filed for bankruptcy protection last month in Youngstown. They also maintain an apartment in Youngstown.

U.S. Seeking Support Of Mid-East Peace Plan

PARIS (AP)—The United States is reported seeking the support of key nations for a new seven-point plan to bring peace between Israel and Egypt.

Informed diplomats said the initiative by President Johnson's administration gathered momentum after the Nov. 5 election and has attracted the interest of President-elect Richard M. Nixon's entourage.

The informants, who declined to be identified, said the American plan foresees as a starting point Israel's withdrawal from the Sinai peninsula and Egypt's termination of its 20-year-old state of war with the Jewish state.

The ultimate aim of the U.S. program is an acceptable peace document signed by the main contenders in the Middle East high-level negotiators, the diplomats said. The American plan is said to reflect the chief ingredients of the resolution adopted by the United Nations Security Council in November, 1967, after the six-day Arab-Israeli war.

Informants gave this outline of the American plan: 1. Withdrawal of Israeli forces from the Sinai desert. This would leave the status of Jerusalem and other areas unsettled.

2. An end to the state of war between Egypt and Israel, including withdrawal of Israeli troops from occupied Jordan and Syria, would be settled later.

3. A settlement of the future of Arab refugees in Israel-occupied territory. On the same day, Jerusalem is believed to have accepted the principle of free Israeli navigation through such international waterways as the Suez Canal and the Tiran Strait.

Replacing Israeli troops in the Sinai and Egyptian forces in the Golan Heights, the desert foras guarding the Tiran Strait. The offer of a U.N. garrison from this outpost by President Gamal Abdel Nasser in 1966 was a key factor that led to the six-day war.

HEED YOUR PARTNER'S
DISCOURAGING SIGNAL
By ALFRED SHEINWOLD
As an experienced defender
you know that you can encour-
age partner to continue a suit
by playing a higher card than
necessary. You can discourage
a continuation by playing the
lowest available card. This is
very valuable, but no method
will work with a stubborn part-
ner.

Opening lead—King of Clubs.
West opened the king of clubs
and shifted to the ten of clubs
diamonds upon seeing the dummy.
Declarer took dummy's ace of
diamonds to conceal his own
diamond strength, but East dis-
couraged a continuation by
playing the deuce of diamonds.
Declarer led dummy's low club
to force out the ace with the
ten. West wondered what
to lead next because he had
seen the deuce of diamonds, but
he still hated to lead a spade
fear of giving declarer a
ruff.

West wanted to lead the nine of
diamonds, giving declarer little
chance to grab East into little
tricks. Declarer took the king

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Read Faster for Better Comprehension Load Up with New Words

You can master all the techniques for faster and better reading, but without a decent vocabulary you're in trouble. The language you use in everyday conversation with your friends is probably adequate. But do you feel like a wallflower in conversation with older people because your active vocabulary is limited or inaccurate? The best way to enlarge and improve it is to improve your passive (reading) vocabulary. There are four simple steps:

LEARN FROM CONTEXT. Try this sentence for vocabulary: "The matter which I go to may lister turns up, lead you to conclude that the Dettig is not looking for self-enrichment, but you're eager to see as for information." If you write "ubiquity" all by yourself, you might have trouble looking at it in its context and see how it is used. There's only one meaning that word can have when being used there at the same time. Don't go to the dictionary until you've made an educated guess at its meaning. Then, by all means, do go to the dictionary, and remember that word three times, and in your home town, at least night's sporting event! LEARN FROM LISTENING. Maybe it was the same man who said, "Knowledge enters through a closed mouth." "Choose at least one friend who is smarter than you." When you hear a word you've never heard or are unsure of, wait for the proper moment to ask them the exact meaning. They'll be flattered, you'll be informed.

LEARN FROM WHAT YOU ALREADY KNOW. In grade school they taught you the prefixes and suffixes. Make full use of them. SUBmarine, ANTIroom, AMBIdextrous, AMPHIdrama, FEMItoe, POLYgon, ECTricite. If you forget what these prefixes mean, try to derive their meaning from your knowledge of the entire word. Then, when you encounter a strange word with one of these prefixes or a suffix, you have additional knowledge to bring to the context.

LEARN FROM THE DICTIONARY. Here's how to use the dictionary:

- Get the EXACT meaning.
- Look for examples of how the word has been used.
- Look for different shades of meaning, colloquial usage.
- If you look up a verb, don't leave the page till you check out its noun, adjective, adverb.
- Check the correct pronunciation of the word. Where does the accent fall?
- Note the derivation of the word. Did it come from Latin, Greek, Old English or Sanskrit?
- Look for synonyms and antonyms.

Consulting Firm Proposes Sites For 2 Colleges

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Community colleges should be built in the New Britain-Hartford and Norwich-New London areas, a consulting firm has told the Board of Trustees for Regional Community Colleges. The trustees earlier this year recommended that two colleges be established in 1969 and hired Arthur D. Little Inc., of Cambridge, Mass., to determine the best sites. At the trustees' meeting Tuesday, John Keck, a member of the firm, said the report did not rule out the need for community colleges in other areas of the state. He said it simply set priorities. The recommendations were based on population statistics and on the number of high school graduates, graduates not going to college and low-income and minority-group families in the areas. South Pole's Youngest Visitor Is U.S. Ambassador's Son, 12

CANNBERRA, Australia (AP) — When 12-year-old Bill Crook goes back to Texas he can tell his friends he walked around the world four times.

He did it the easy but cold way. He walked around the South Pole.

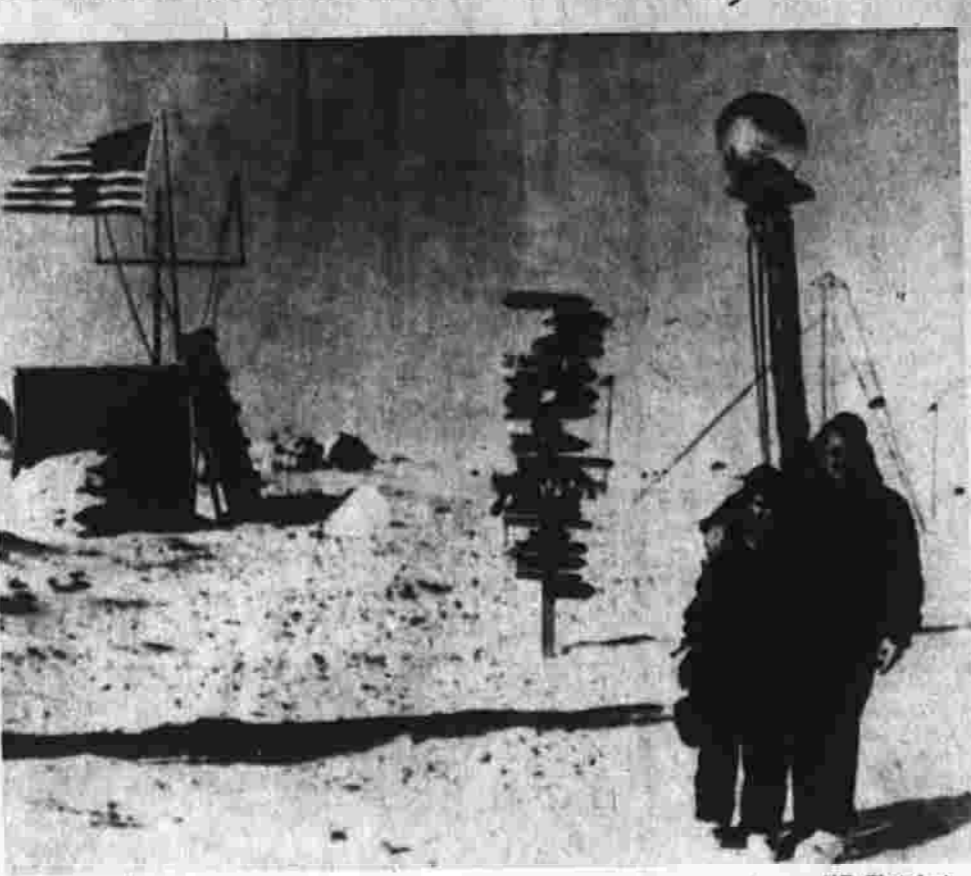
Bill went to Antarctica with his father, William H. Crook, U.S. ambassador to Australia.

"I felt a deep sense of awe when I saw the South Pole," the boy says, "and also a great feeling of excitement because I was the youngest boy—the youngest person ever—to go there."

The trip was part of Ambassador Crook's job. It has become the custom of the U.S. ambassador here to inspect American research stations at least once during his term in Canberra.

The father was in Australia as ambassador last June after serving in the Office of Economic Opportunity in Washington.

The Crooks family went to Washington from Texas where the father had been president of the San Marcos Baptist Academy. Before that Crook, a native of Monroeville, Ill., was pastor of Baptist churches in Morgan, Franklin and Nacogdoches, Texas.

Since no 12-year-old boy had ever been to the South Pole before, the special snow pants issued to young Bill were much too big. Yet they are the smallest size available at the Christchurch supply house for voyagers to Antarctica.

"I was given heavy insulated snowboots, a parka, a pair of thick gloves, a cap covering the ears, and shoes that I could wear when I did not need snowboots," he recalls.

"Everything was too big for me, except the snow boots. The most outside of all—that is, for me—were the pants. They were five or six times too big."

From Christchurch in New Zealand the party flew to McMurdo.

"The flight ended in daylight because it is daylight down there 24 hours a day at this time of the year," Bill says.

"I was tired and happy to go to bed but it seemed like I was going to bed in daylight.

"The food was tremendous. We had steaks, spaghetti, cake, and the ice cream was terrific."

Bill's diary covers the two big highlights of his stay in the Antarctic—his visit to the South Pole and his trip to McMurdo. It reads:

Thursday, Nov. 14—After breakfast at McMurdo we went to the helicopter where a bright orange helicopter was waiting. There were eight of us, plus the crew, strapped in when the helicopter took off. It was very warm inside.

We headed north along the coast of Ross Island, which all the great explorers were familiar with. At Cape Royal, 20 miles from the station, we saw a smoke bomb which gave the pilots an indication of the wind drift.

We landed nose into a light wind. Below us in a small sheltered spot was Ernest Shackleton's 1908 hut from which he set out on what was to be the most spectacular journey up to the pole.

Here 15 men lived in a cramped little hut, and here some of the supplies still remain; frozen seal meat, books and magazines abandoned when the relief ship arrived 60 years ago.

We signed the visitor's book and went across to the Adelie Penguin rookery. Scott discovered the penguins got very excited when we pulled them. They whine happily when you pat them on the stomach. They allow themselves to be killed without resisting whenever seal meat is needed.

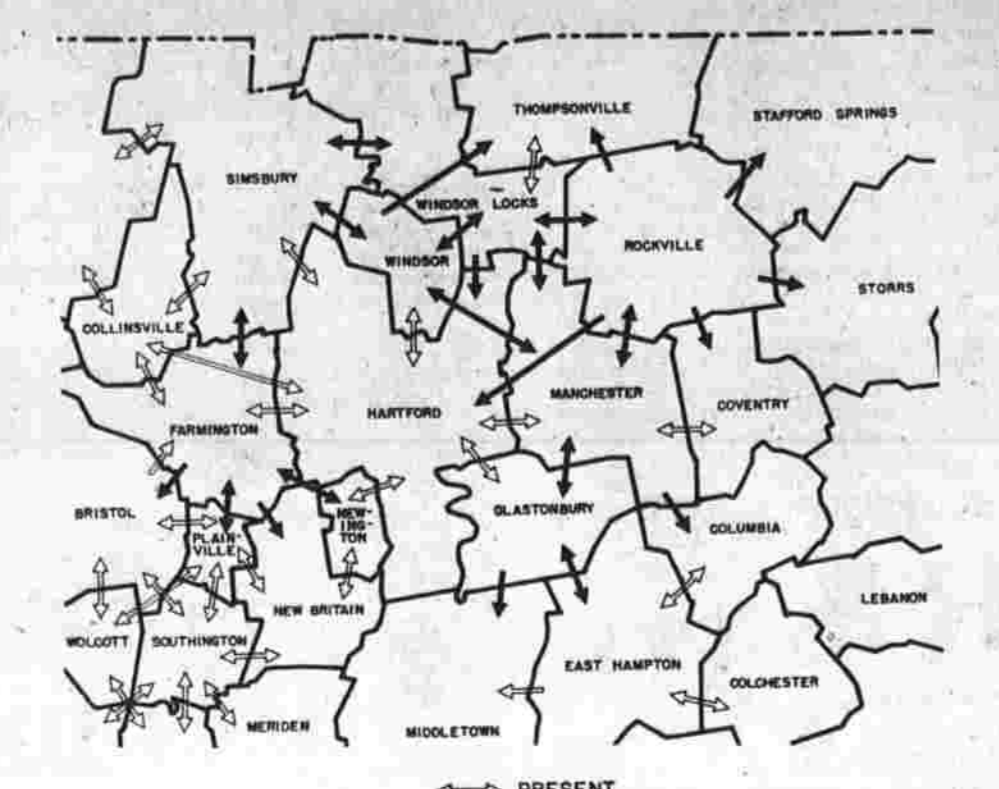

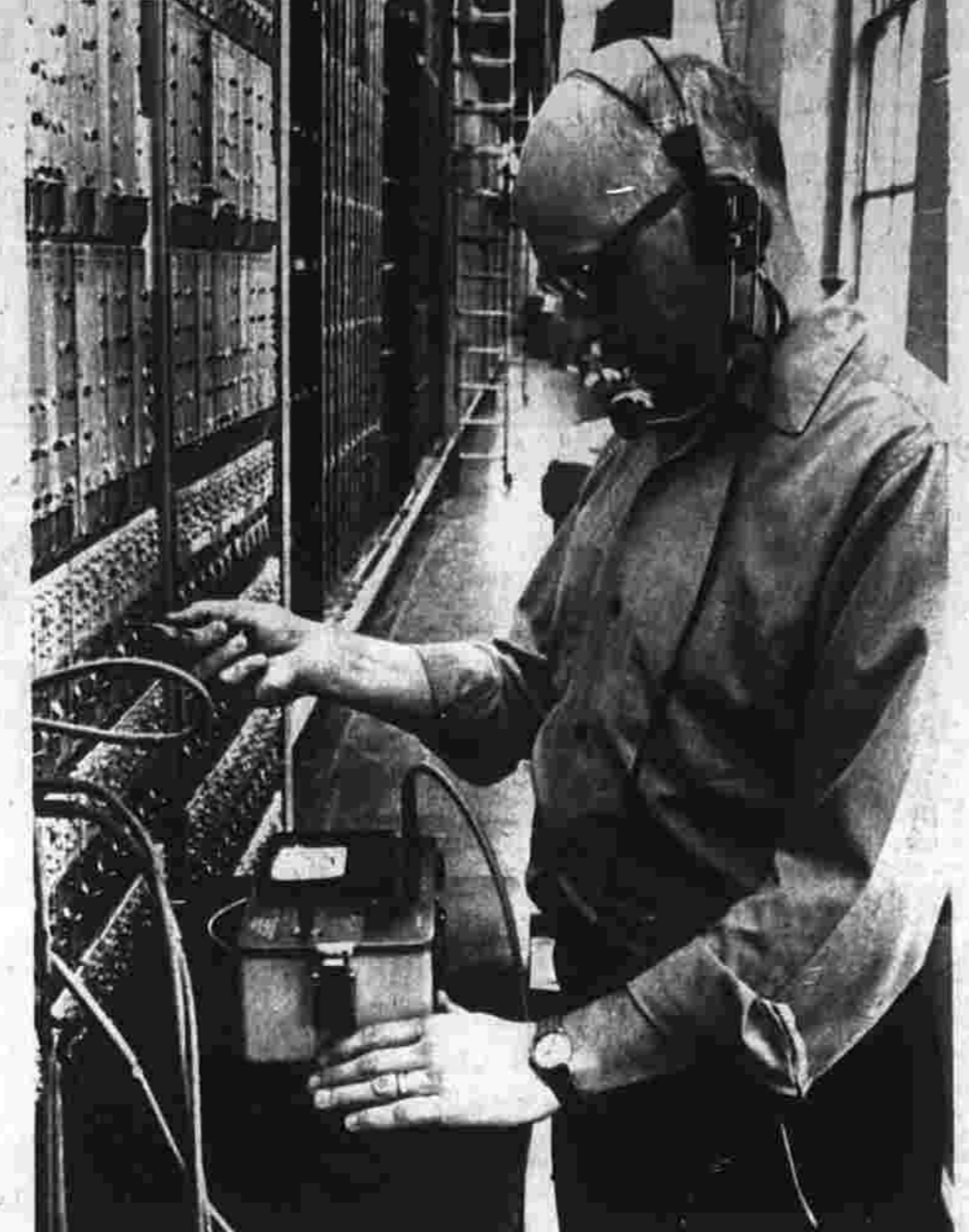
SNETCO to Expand Area For Toll-Free Phoning

While the State Public Utilities Commission considers the rate rises requested last month by the Southern New England Telephone Co. (SNETCO), the company is breaking down toll call barriers between 10 Hartford area exchanges which include the towns served by the Herald.

The new free call area will open up the first week in May without free calling to another exchange.

Yet in the summer of 1967, Rose said, a company poll of the exchange showed that 71 per cent of the phone users who voted in favor of the exchange. The \$2.5 million expansion project in the Hartford area would need more switching equipment and wires before the company leaders say the toll barriers will definitely drop in the first week of May 1969 if everything works out.

'I'll Never Fly Again,' Says Ditched Plane's Pilot

ELIZABETH CITY, N.C. (AP) — "I was scared," says John Daniel Hemphill, who ditched a small plane in the Atlantic after falling in four attempts to land at New York's busy Kennedy Airport.

Safe on land after clinging to a lifeline for an hour and 15 minutes Tuesday, Hemphill said, "I'll never fly again. I won't even be a passenger."

The 22-year-old Hemphill, from Bricktown, N.J., was free on \$2,000 personal recognizance today after being held briefly on federal charges of transporting a stolen plane outside the country. He planned to return to Newark where the warrant was issued.

A Coast Guard pilot who had trailed Hemphill out to sea received instructions that successfully enabled Hemphill to set the light plane down on the sea about 50 miles off Norfolk, Va. A Coast Guard helicopter from Elizabeth City picked him up.

Hemphill, a 6-foot-7 member of Halifax, Nova Scotia, wore a white tee shirt, brown corduroy trousers and a new pair of white loafers as he sat in the office of U.S. Commissioner L. Thomas Gallop in Elizabeth City.

"I was scared," Hemphill said. "I felt I wouldn't make it."

He praised Coast Guard Capt. Vance K. Randle for "talking me right into the water."

Asked why he took the plane from the Lakewood, N.J., airport around 1 a.m. Tuesday, Hemphill said, "I don't know. I've been taking flying lessons but couldn't afford to fly. I thought I would try my hand at it again."

He tried his hand for five hours. During that time he wandered into one of the nation's most complex and crowded airports at Kennedy Airport, announcing over his radio "I'm riding a stolen plane. I'm lost. I need help."

Air traffic controllers abandoned 12 airplanes from the vicinity and tried to talk Hemphill into a landing.

Four times he started down and four times he pulled up at the last minute. Then he headed over the water and a Coast Guard plane piloted by Randle trailed him.

Hemphill said when he first took the plane he wanted to do "just a couple of landings and takeoffs."

"But the runway lights at the Lakewood Airport went out and I had to go to Kennedy Airport," he said. "The first flight of times I came in to land but just couldn't make it. The last time I got it on the ground but it didn't stay there."

"Then I flew over the water to get cool before I came back. All I could think of was getting

back on the ground. I didn't think all this would happen."

While ditching the plane, Hemphill said the "lifeline" over and he kicked the door out and swam to the surface.

"My lifeline wouldn't move. I just held on to it," he said. "After awhile I couldn't move my arms and legs. I kept going and my whole body felt like a giant cramp."

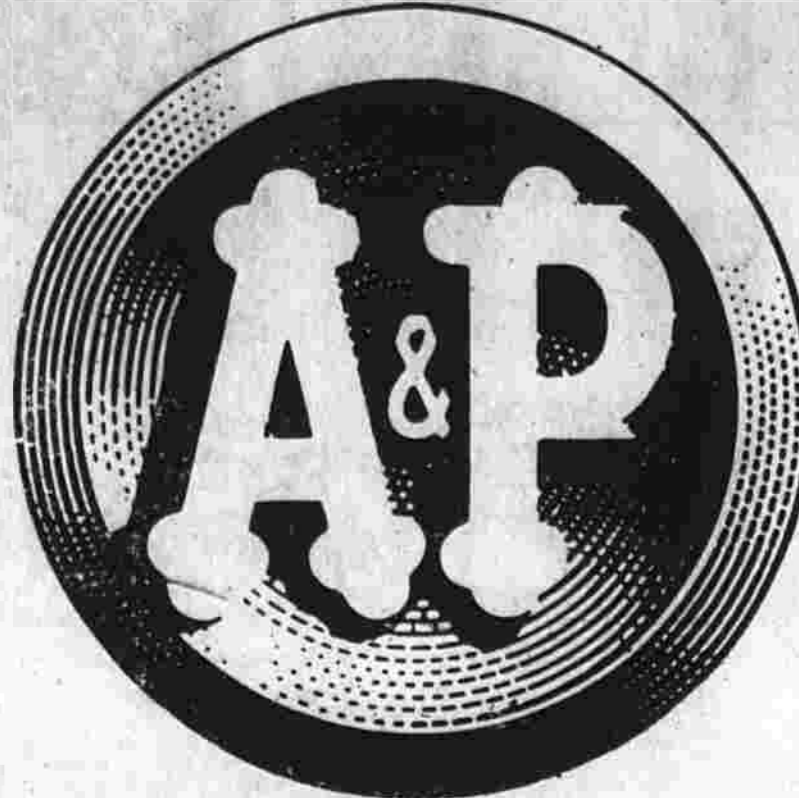

Stamps In the News

A national stamp design contest is under way for the first U.S. postage stamp ever issued honoring the state of Alabama.

The contest, guided by rules formulated by the United States Post Office, will be open to anyone wishing to enter. It will be sponsored and administered by Operation New Birmingham, a civic organization working in cooperation with the Organizational Philatelic Committee and the Alabama Sequelentennial Commission.

A panel of judges will first choose the 10 best entries and then the winner will receive a first prize of \$1,000. Rules and entry blanks may be obtained by writing Operation New Birmingham, 270 East 18th, Birmingham, Ala. 35201. A check or money order for \$1 should be enclosed to defray costs of postage and handling.

Grenada, upon island of the Caribbean, will issue its first definitive issue since attaining associated status with the Great Britain. The first series consisting of eight values will reflect the island's lushly rich flora and fauna. The artwork is based on locally gathered scientific information. Each stamp shows a Dorothy Wilder portrait of Queen Elizabeth II as well as an outline of Grenada's flag.

The Department of Posts and Telegraphs of Papua and New Guinea announced that it will issue a new definitive set of stamps depicting shells of the territory to replace the present butterfly and foliage set. The new set will be issued in three stages with the last in the series scheduled for January 1969.

The Executive Council of the Universal Postal Union is contemplating a proposal by the United Nations and the Swiss government to issue U.N. stamps in Swiss denarii to be valid for postage from the European office of the United Nations at the Palais des Nations, Geneva, Switzerland. It is expected that the agreement would be identical with that under which the U.N. Post Office operates at its New York headquarters.

Big Raises Expected in Federal Pay

WASHINGTON — A study by the Bureau of Labor Statistics confirms that the 1.3 million federal classified and related employees are slated next July to get the largest pay raise they have had in years.

The adjustment is expected to average nearly 9 per cent. The Bureau announced that the rise in pay rates in private industry for professional, administrative, technical and clerical personnel was the largest during the year that ended last June of any of the past eight years it has recorded them. It cites these per cent increases in average salaries:

Accountants, 8.7 per cent; auditors, 8.5 per cent; chief accountants, 8.3 per cent; managers of office services, 8.8 per cent; buyers, 4.9 per cent; job analysts, 7 per cent; personnel directors, 5.4 per cent; chemists, 8.1 per cent; engineers, 6.4 per cent; engineering technicians, 8.1 per cent; drafting, 8.8 per cent and clerical, 8.1 per cent.

The Bureau's findings were designed to compare federal with private pay, and the government is expected to pay the increases with rates in industry for similar jobs.

Federal salaries have lagged behind private rates but a 1967 law directs the government to pay fully comparable salaries as of July of next year. The average increase represented by the "lag" is around 2.5 per cent which generally would have been added to the 1967-68 increase in private pay rates cited above.

The Bureau said it had surveyed 21 clerical work levels and found that the government pays rates ranging from 200 dollars a month for the lowest-paid file clerks to 608 dollars for secretaries. A majority of engineering technicians were paid salaries ranging from 625 dollars to 781 dollars and draftsmen from 412 dollars to 611 dollars.

Accountants ranged from 211 dollars for trainees to 1128 dollars for journeymen. Auditors were at similar levels. Personnel directors ranged from 918 dollars to 1663 dollars; job analysts, 728 dollars to 1048 dollars.

Federal employees will still be a year behind private pay rates if they are paid fully comparable salaries as of July 1969, said Richard M. Nixon, presidential spokesman, who would speed up pay raises to eliminate the delay.
