Stocks Off Slightly for Week But Bullish Sentiment Holds

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market this week edged off from making a record on attaining the Wall Street million of "Dow 1,000" but a fair degree of optimism remained.

Analysts pointed out that the Dow Jones industrial average had climbed 36.87 points in the four weeks prior to the one just ended. Therefore, it came as no great surprise to many that the average this week declined 6.64 to 978.24.

This was a moderate correction of a large advance and fits into the pattern of market behavior, partly on a technical basis, they said.

The decline, however, was triggered by a surprise rise of higher interest rates. The stock market always dislikes tighter money.

When the news came on Monday, the stock market was advancing vigorously. Even as the news came and was digested, there was no pausing to let the stock market settle down.

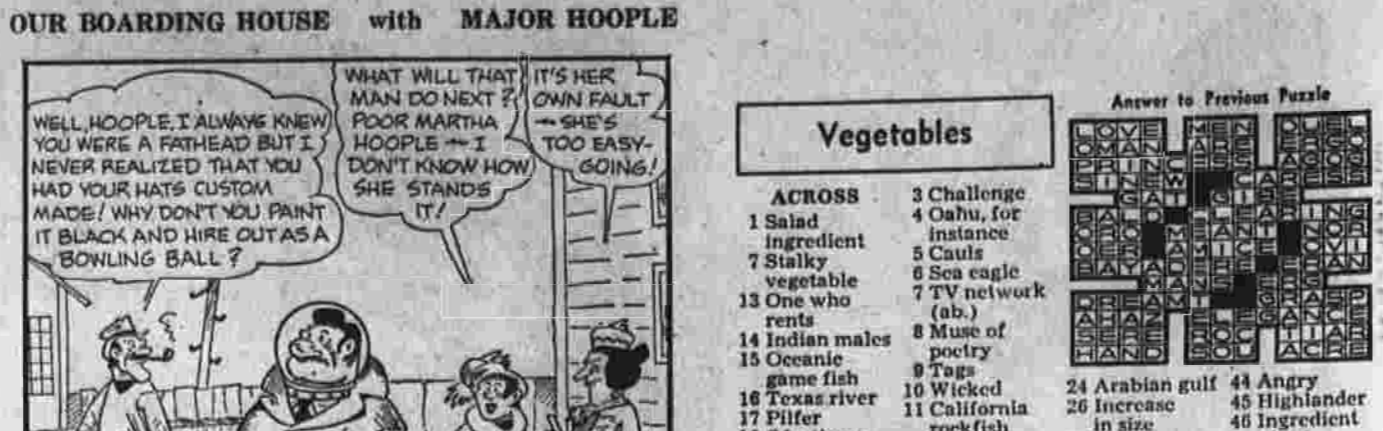

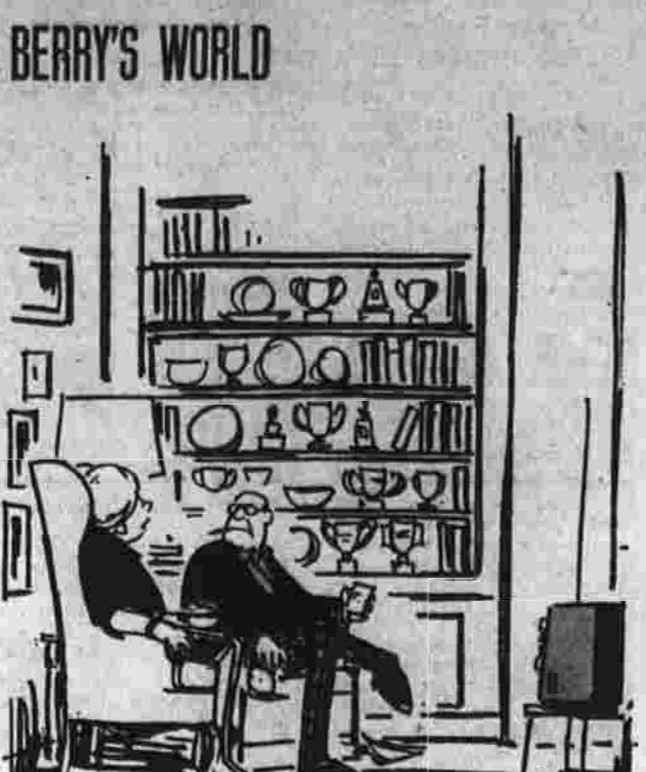

"But, sir," he said, "I've been reading books about all the great leaders of men, and there was something they all had in common. Washington, Caesar, Napoleon, all of them rode a white horse. Sir, if you rode a white horse, I just know all the guys would follow you anywhere."

The major exploded, "You blankety-blank, don't you know we're mechanized?" The lip persisted, "Then, sir have you ever considered a white tank?"

The medical man, the catatonic, the Aussie and the lipping soldier were all Jonathan Winters, a man who can't resist a chance to be someone else.

Winters is the kind who, when he achieved his lifelong ambition to own a trench coat, went into a bank and stood under the clock, which he compared to his watch while looking around furtively.

He's a man who studies people constantly ("I have people days when I go to museums or markets") and who has an opinion on everything, including flower children.

"Under many of those beautiful little bouquets of flower," he says, with a glint in his eye, "are hand grenades with the pins out."
