Major Bills Voted On Aid, Schools

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress has cleaned up all of the major legislation it is expected to send to President Johnson this year except possibly for a foreign-aid appropriations measure.

Clanking perhaps the most productive congressional week of its long year, the Senate Friday cleared for the White House four major bills.

A \$1.56-billion vocational education bill also extending the National Defense Education Act and the impact of the program of aid to school districts with populations swollen by federal installations.

A \$27-million bill extending the 1962 Manpower Training Act and broadening it to modern job training and to add literacy courses to the program.

A \$1.5-billion military construction appropriations bill containing funds for bases all over the country and in many foreign countries.

FBI Nabs Trio in Kidnaping; Most of Ransom Recovered

WASHINGTON (AP)—The FBI said it has nabbed three men and recovered nearly all of the \$240,000 ransom money.

"Thank God, it's over," said Frank Sinatra Sr. Sunday evening, after the FBI reported that it had nabbed three men and recovered nearly all of the \$240,000 ransom money.

The three suspects were identified in an announcement released here and in Washington as John W. Irwin, 42, of Hollywood; Barry W. Keenan, 23, of Los Angeles; and Joseph Clyde Amster, 25, of Playa Del Rey, Calif., a suburban beach town.

The FBI said all three would be charged with kidnaping. It convicted they will face a possible maximum sentence of life imprisonment.

Keenan and Amster were held at the FBI office in Los Angeles while Irwin was held by the FBI in San Diego, according to speculation that he might have been planning to cross the border into Mexico.

At the time of his son's safe return, the elder Sinatra told a news conference that the kidnap gang may have numbered from seven to nine persons.

But an FBI agent said the trio captured "I think that's all of them. I think we've got them all."

Keenan, by coincidence, was graduated from University High School in the same class as the younger Sinatra's sister, Nancy.

A spokesman for the family said he wasn't sure whether Nancy knew Keenan but added "she probably did if they graduated together."

The father of the victim, who had obeyed FBI orders like a good soldier during the 14-hour ordeal, said his son was held by the kidnap gang in a motel room in Sinatra's motel room when abduction occurred.

Merger Plan Of Railroads Voted by ICC

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—Merger of two major railroads serving the Southeast—Seaboard Air Line Railroad and the Atlantic Coast Line—will abolish more than 4,000 jobs and relocate some 4,000 employees.

The Interstate Commerce Commission's approval of merger plans by a 3-2 vote Friday gave the railroads permission to merge in 30 days.

The merger came as a surprise to most, especially to several thousand employees of the Atlantic Coast Line who had moved their families from Wilmington, N.C., to Jacksonville, Fla., several years ago when the Coast Line was merged with the Seaboard.

The Justice Department and railroad labor groups objected that the merger might result in a monopoly.

The linkup is expected to eliminate duplicate facilities, 37 points and result in estimated savings of \$37.7 million in five years.

The ruling followed an ICC order last Dec. 31 approving so-called "interline" mergers.

A third proposed merger in the East—and the biggest of all—would merge the Pennsylvania and New York Central railroads.

In the latest decision, Commissioner Rupert L. Murphy said the ACL-Seaboard merger would result in "significant reductions in internal costs and enable the merged company to effectively meet the every-increasing competition from other modes of transport."

The new system will be known as the Seaboard Coastline Railroad, with the Seaboard Railroad the surviving corporation.

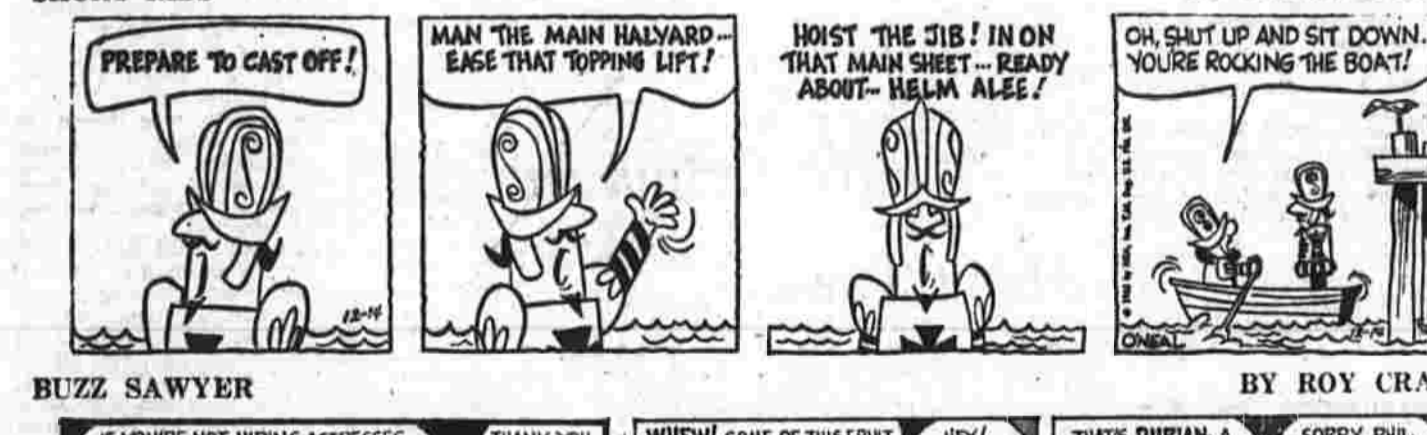

The 15-member CAC, now down to 11 members, due to moves or disinterest, is an important and necessary adjunct to the housing for the elderly and renewal projects now being conducted in Manchester.

Its function is to advise and inform all interested townspeople of their rights and interests, as plans for the government granted development programs progress to their eventual completion.

Federal House and Home Finance Agency (FHFA) regulations stipulate that no federal grants will be awarded for any renewal projects unless an active Citizens Advisory Committee exists.

The proposed ordinance is aimed at reviving the interest of qualified persons in seeking membership on the committee.

Sid Serious Guy When Not Acting

You've heard the legend that all big-time comedians sit around Lindy's Restaurant on Broadway laughing at each other's jokes? Me too.

Well you can count out one the biggest... Sid Caesar. It's not that he doesn't appreciate other comedians, rather it's just not his nature to be funny when he isn't actually working.

"Sid, in fact, is a very serious guy," a long-time associate said of the man whose great comic talent has been rocking audiences since television's infancy and who can currently be seen on ABC-TV on "The Sid Caesar Show" which alternates the 10 p.m. Thursday time slot with Eddie Adams.

"Snooty he isn't but hard to define he is," another friend cautioned. "I don't think you'll find him much easier to figure out than Garbo." But I went on anyway asking questions of his friends, his writers and of Sid himself.

Selma Diamond, a wonderful comic in her own right, invited me along to Toots Shor's for dinner. She'd been working with Goodman Ace when he was head writer of the Perry Como Show, went along when Ace joined forces this season with Caesar. Money alone couldn't buy him... but he'd worked on a guest shot for Caesar, was intrigued with his ability.

"How does a man supposedly as shy as Sid Caesar manage such authoritative delivery?" I asked.

Selma gave me to understand there are as many types of comedians (and also of comedy writers) as there are human beings. "But for Sid, comedy isn't something that's written down for him to spout, it's created." And the writers she indicated, are first of all comedy-olimpic creators. "In the final analysis it's the twist Sid himself gives our material that makes the difference... further up a lot of the basic ideas for material are Sid's own."

"We start on a Monday morning, sitting around over coffee. One or another of the boys will throw out an idea and we'll bat it around. Goody himself types as we go along. "Three days later, it'll be ready for rehearsal through refinements and changes continue right up to show time."

Selma who kids about making her film debut in "It's A Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World" says "Sure I'm in it, but so's everybody in the business." Then she gave a comic sigh. "Let's not forget Spencer Tracy, though. He's a star, Sid, he's really got it, like Sid... and wait until you see Sid in the picture. He's a brilliant."

People kept dropping by to

had Selma who kept a constant stream of funnies rippling. I made a mental side note. Somebody could make a nice living being Selma's Boswell. I figured she's good for a column a day. I've even got a title for it: "Selma's Diamonds."

"Sid," Selma went on in a quieter vein after the last table hopper had settled down, "in addition to being a great talent is a wonderful person to know. You can't fake that, it shows through. No matter how far-fetched a shtet may seem, he insists that truth be at the heart of it."

It was another day, and early afternoon, when I got to the top floor (the fifth I think it was) of a rehearsal hall that looked and smelled like almost any dancing school in any city. There was a ballet bar on one wall, a huge mirror on another... both of which were ignored by the cluster of half a dozen men and a girl (Gisela MacKenzie) huddled around a group of folding chairs in a chalk-marked section of the middle of the floor. They were going over and over their lines doggedly. The only bright notes at the moment were Sid's red shirt and Gisela's red slacks.

With one ear on the dialogue I quizzed Rosetta Ploesser, long time member of Sid's personal staff known to everybody as Ploss. Like everybody else that's close to him, she too, thinks the world of him. His sense of perfection makes him work much too hard. In fact, "Little Me" in which he played seven roles had to end its run prematurely because he became ill from exhaustion. Yes, she says, he does take little vacations. Mostly at a hotel owned by his uncle in Woodbridge, New York... "but only when it's closed for the season. He's good at shooting, but won't kill anything. He does like to shoot at big Halvah cans filled with water."

"Why are Sid's eyebrows blonde? Because he was blonde. In fact his hair didn't go brown until just a few years ago." Yes, I suddenly remembered, a year ago I saw a re-issue of "Tara and Spars" and the slim blonde boy was indeed Sid Caesar. It was that show, stage version, which changed his life. Before enlisting in the Coast Guard in World War II Sid was known as a good saxophonist with name bands. Assigned to the show he took to presenting skits for his fellow performers between scenes... and Max Liebman who knew a find when he found one, switched Sid to comedy. A few years later they were to make TV history with "Show of Shows" with Imogene Coca.

Then Sid himself came over, very quiet. I suddenly realized why he gets such loyal raves. Unlike some of the brasher comedians, he doesn't accept even genuine compliments about his work, let alone flattery. "All I know is it has to feel right to me. We're still working around with our new team this season. But it felt right to me with the first show. We're going to give ourselves a chance to come up with something new... but I'll stay with some older things like 'The Professor', too. One good thing we all got along fine. What else do I want to do? Re-open 'Little Me' and tour it."

NEW YORK (NEA)—This may go down in television history as the year they discovered Woody Allen.

Woody is a wonderfully funny man with a physical appearance something like a husky Wally Cox. But his humor isn't weak or diminutive; it is strong and virile. It seems twice as funny coming out of a small body and a nicely nondescript face.

This character that you see on Candid Camera, Hootenanny and the Jack Paar Show wasn't born. It is a creation that evolved slowly.

Woody started as a sort of comedy prodigy. As a kid in Brooklyn's Midwood High School he wrote gags and submitted them to New York columnists. Many were run, and one grateful columnist included Woody's name.

Peter Lind Hayes hired him—at \$25 a week—to write gags for him. Hayes introduced the high school boy to Herb Shriner who hired him for \$75. From Shriner, Woody graduated to Sid Caesar, Art Carney, the old Pat Boone Show, various television specials.

"I did very well," Woody says. But he never thought of performing himself until, as he

puts it, "the new wave of comedians came in." Woody watched people like Mort Sahl and Lenny Bruce perform and decided that he could do that, too. Jack Rollins, Woody's manager, encouraged him in that belief.

At the time he decided to become a performer, he was writing for Garry Moore. He worked all day for "a good salary." At night, he worked for nothing in little Greenwich Village dives.

When he first began performing he had funny material—naturally, since he was an experienced comedy writer—but no theme, no steady character.

"Gradually," Woody says, "the character evolved. It didn't evolve deliberately. I just wrote stuff that seemed funny. But the character was really assigned to me by my audience. They laughed more at certain things. Naturally, I used more of those things."

"And the critics helped assign me a character, too. They would write about me and describe me as a certain type. So I put more material in the act that would fit that type."

Even though he is now a profitable entertainer as a comic, he hasn't abandoned writing. Currently, he's working on a movie scenario. But he thinks, and most people who have seen him would agree, that he has a bright future as a comedian.

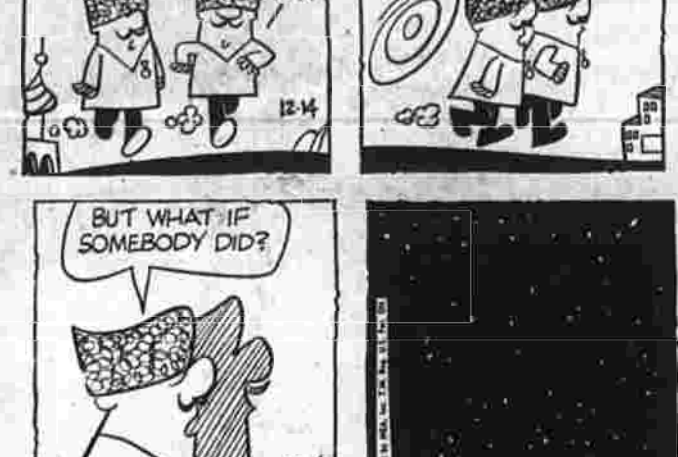
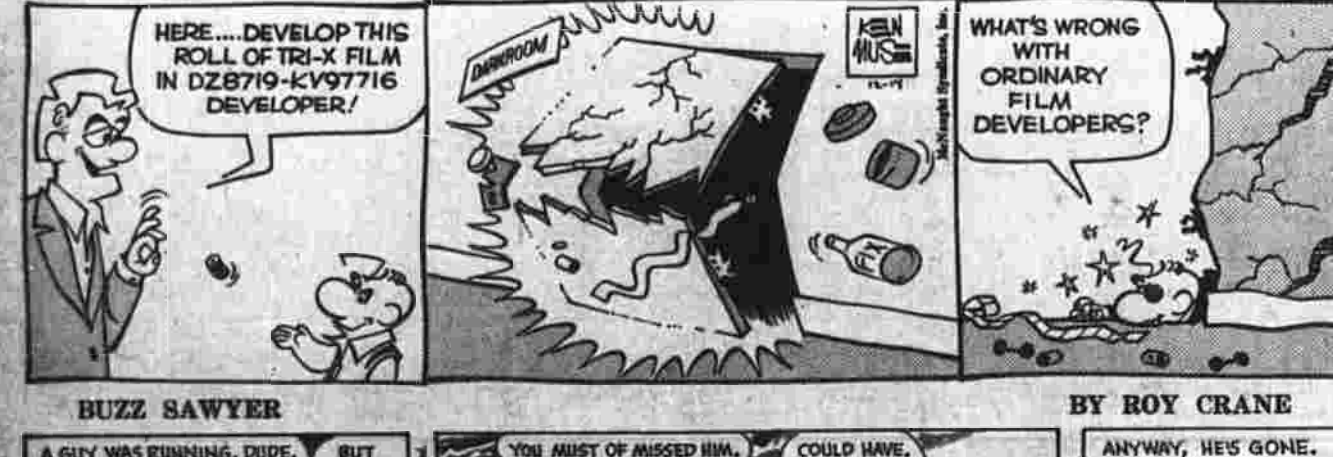

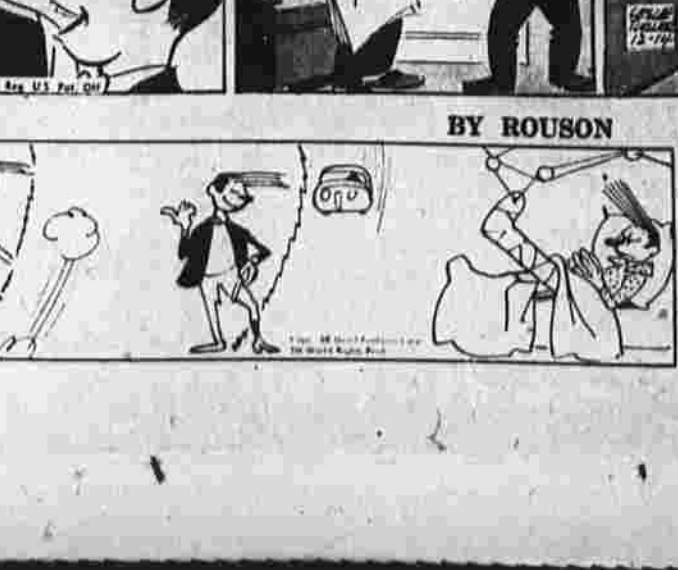
