### Columbia Town's Volunteer Firemen Supply Ambulance Service

The Columbia Volunteer Fire Department now supplies full-time ambulance and emergency service to the town, according to the selection.

The department owns and operates a hospital ambulance as well as an emergency vehicle. The rescue wagon was donated to the town by the Lions Club and the ambulance was donated by Raymond Judd.

The town voted last March to use the local fire house facilities and withdraw from the five-town Inter-County Ambulance Service. Voters appropriated the \$700 formerly paid to the association to the CVFD, the sum to be used only for the ambulance service.

Thirty of the local firemen are qualified to man the ambulance and another 14 are currently en route in a training course.

Both vehicles are equipped with crutch-like stretchers, resuscitators, inflatable splints, first aid, burn kits and oxygen. Rescue 7 also has special tools for use in rescuing persons trapped in cars.

### Ratchford to Be House Speaker

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Connecticut Democrats have elected William Ratchford to serve as Speaker of the State House of Representatives during the 1969 General Assembly.

Ratchford of Danbury was elected at a Democratic caucus Tuesday.

Rep. Curt Agello of Ansonia was elected majority leader. Outgoing Majority Leader Peter Crombie and Rep. James Kennedy were chosen to serve in two new posts which Democrats will request the House to create. Both representatives had reportedly been looking for higher posts.

Crombie of Enfield will be deputy speaker. Kennedy of Hartford will be deputy majority leader.

All the leaders were elected by unanimous vote. Outgoing Speaker Robert J. Testa presided over the elections.

Kennedy earlier had sought the majority leadership and Crombie had hoped to be speaker, but there was no sign at Tuesday's proceedings of the contest for the offices.

The four men were applauded heartily as they were called to the rostrum from their seats in the Hall of the House.

Also present at the meeting was Democratic State Chairman John M. Bailey who commented after the session: "The big problem in this legislature is going to be a question of money."

Bailey predicted taxes would have to be raised to meet the needs of the state.

### Hill Central Project Unveiled in New Haven

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — A revised housing-schooling project with a \$12.5 million price tag for one of this city's main minority group neighborhoods was unveiled Tuesday night.

The Hill Central renewal project will contain two new schools and 300 housing units—241 new

units and 59 rehabilitated ones—a boys' club and a large play area.

It was presented by its creator, architect Louis Kahn, who traveled from Philadelphia for the meeting. He is currently \$10 million, was criticized by several black leaders.

### SNET Official Speaks to PUC On Rates Hike

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Income of Southern New England Telephone Co. (SNET) would drop nearly 50 per cent in 1969 if rates stayed at the same level, says a SNET spokesman.

The telephone company's comptroller, Carl N. Hansen, said during the second day of State Public Utilities Commission hearings Tuesday that the estimated 1969 income of SNET is \$28,425,000, but increased costs of operations would lower income to \$28,800,000 next year.

The hearings concern the SNET request for permission to boost its revenues by about \$24 million per year by rate increases which would cost most home phone users an extra 40 to 50 cents a month.

Hansen told the PUC that company revenues "are no longer relative to others that in 1967 only about \$10 of revenue for each \$100 of plant was available to pay taxes and service capital versus about \$13 for the average Bell System company."

"Analysis of 1967 results," he said, "indicates quite clearly that the problem we face stems from a general insufficiency of revenues. The plain facts of the matter are that our plant and services, with rates that have not increased in more than a decade, cannot produce revenues adequate to meet, in terms of today's costs, the expenses demanded by the investment for maintenance, depreciation and the support of customer services."

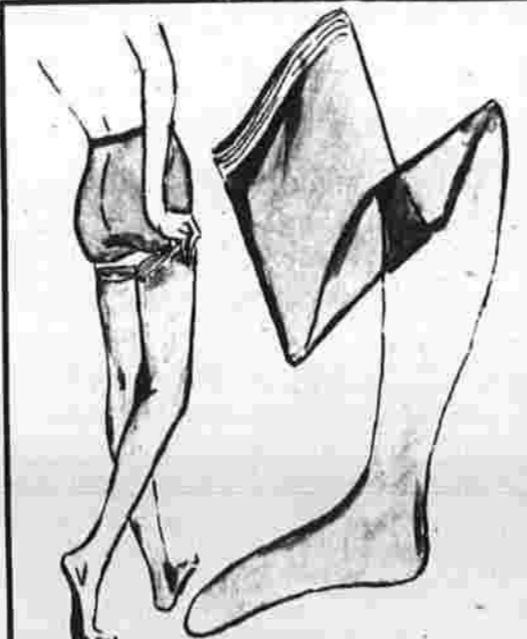

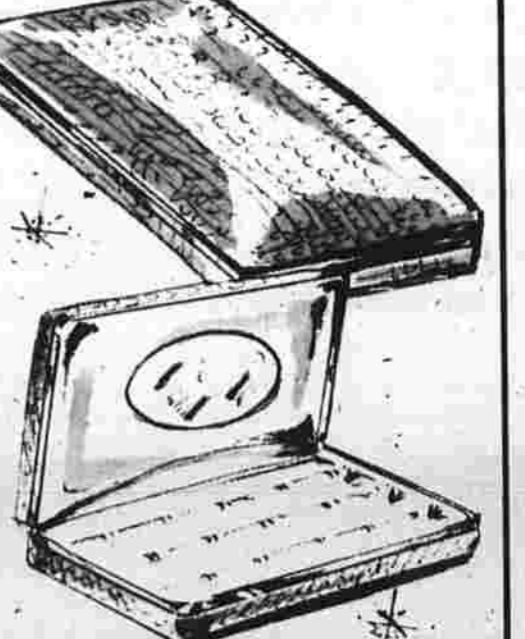

# Why Shoot for the Moon?

**EDITOR'S NOTE** — Ever since the nation's space program got under way one of its main goals was to land men on the moon. The goal is still there. But what is to be gained in going to the moon? That is a question that has been asked by many men in the street. Here are some answers.

**CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)** — Three American astronauts are about to rocket into space on a momentous journey to see why the moon.

Why are they going? Why is the United States investing \$23 billion to land men on the lunar surface next year? Why not spend that money on earthly problems such as the pollution of cities or to find a cure for cancer?

These questions have been asked by many Americans who want to know why anyone in the right mind would risk a quarter-billion-dollar trip across the void to land on a bleak, barren globe which has no apparent value.

On Dec. 21 Air Force Col. Frank Borman, Navy Capt. James Lovell Jr. and Air Force Maj William A. Anders are scheduled to embark on their lunar orbit mission.

They'll be followed next year by other U.S. astronauts—and perhaps Russian cosmonauts—who will land on the moon and begin the exploration of this alien body.

The moon's most immediate resource is scientific knowledge. Many consider it the key to the knowledge of the solar system.

On earth, the atmosphere and oceans wear away surface features in 10 to 50 million years. Mountain-building activity turns over large areas in about the same time.

But on the moon there are no oceans or atmosphere to destroy the surface, and there is little, if any, mountain building. Thus, the moon may have retained the record which dates back billions of years to the infancy of the solar system.

During the last five years, the United States and Russia have sent several unmanned spacecraft to study the moon. They have lit it, orbited it, photographed it and soft-landed on it.

They provided a treasurehouse of knowledge, brought back lunar rocks, and raised more questions than they answered.

They also, they proved the moon is a safe place for man to visit.

But until man has visited the moon and brought back samples of the lunar surface, there will only be conjecture about such things as the moon's origin.

Such colonies might become self-sustaining. If, through chemical synthesis, the explorers could extract from lunar rocks those elements that comprise the molecules of life, they could be used to synthesize amino acids, proteins, carbohydrates and fats.

On drawing boards in the United States and Russia are satellite launchers that could yield the greatest return—the so-called earth resources satellites.

Before long, advanced versions of these satellites will be in orbit. They could locate arable farm lands, mineral deposits and good fishing grounds.

It is estimated an earth resources satellite can be activated for between \$4 and \$7 million and could pay off more than that in a matter of months.

The biggest fallout from the space program to date has been in the fields not readily known to the public—new materials and technology.

Titanium, for example, could be a stopping off point, a fuel station, with the fuel manufactured in lunar refineries.

Designers of the Mercury man-in-space capsule said they needed something like lightweight titanium as a basic material. So they went to work and developed a titanium alloy that did the job. Now it is being used in building airplanes and other structures.

There is another reason for going into space, perhaps the most important. The United States does not like to talk about it because of its military overtones.

The fact is that more than half of the satellites launched by the United States have military assignments—reconnaissance, communications, missile detection, navigation and research.

Being developed are satellites that will spot missiles underbrush or a missile buried underground; to locate submarines; to locate surface ships.

The American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics estimates the business of satellite communications will be growing \$200 million by 1975.

Advanced programs are being developed which are believed aimed at de-

veloping a dominant military position in space.

Of the reconnaissance satellite, President Johnson said last year:

"If we got nothing else from the space program but the photographs that it is worth 10 times the money we've spent. Without the satellite, I'd be operating by guess and by God. But I know exactly how many missiles the enemy has."

In recent months the Soviet Union has registered many technological breakthroughs previously mastered by the United States. It has had a very active launching program of both manned and unmanned ships, and this year for the first time since 1957 will orbit more satellites than this country.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration hopes the U.S. moon landing will focus attention on the effort and rally the public—now more concerned with domestic problems—behind the space effort.

While these explorations are for the future, the United States already has reaped major benefits from the space program.

Whitey is the achievement of technology.

As for future benefits President Johnson recently said:

"The funds going into space research are investments which will yield dividends to our lives, our business, our professions, many times greater than the initial cost."

Benefits already are coming from communications, weather and navigation satellites.

Satellites operated by the International Telecommunications Satellite Corp. have added tremendously to worldwide traffic capacity, reduced rates considerably and made possible the televising of events from distant lands.

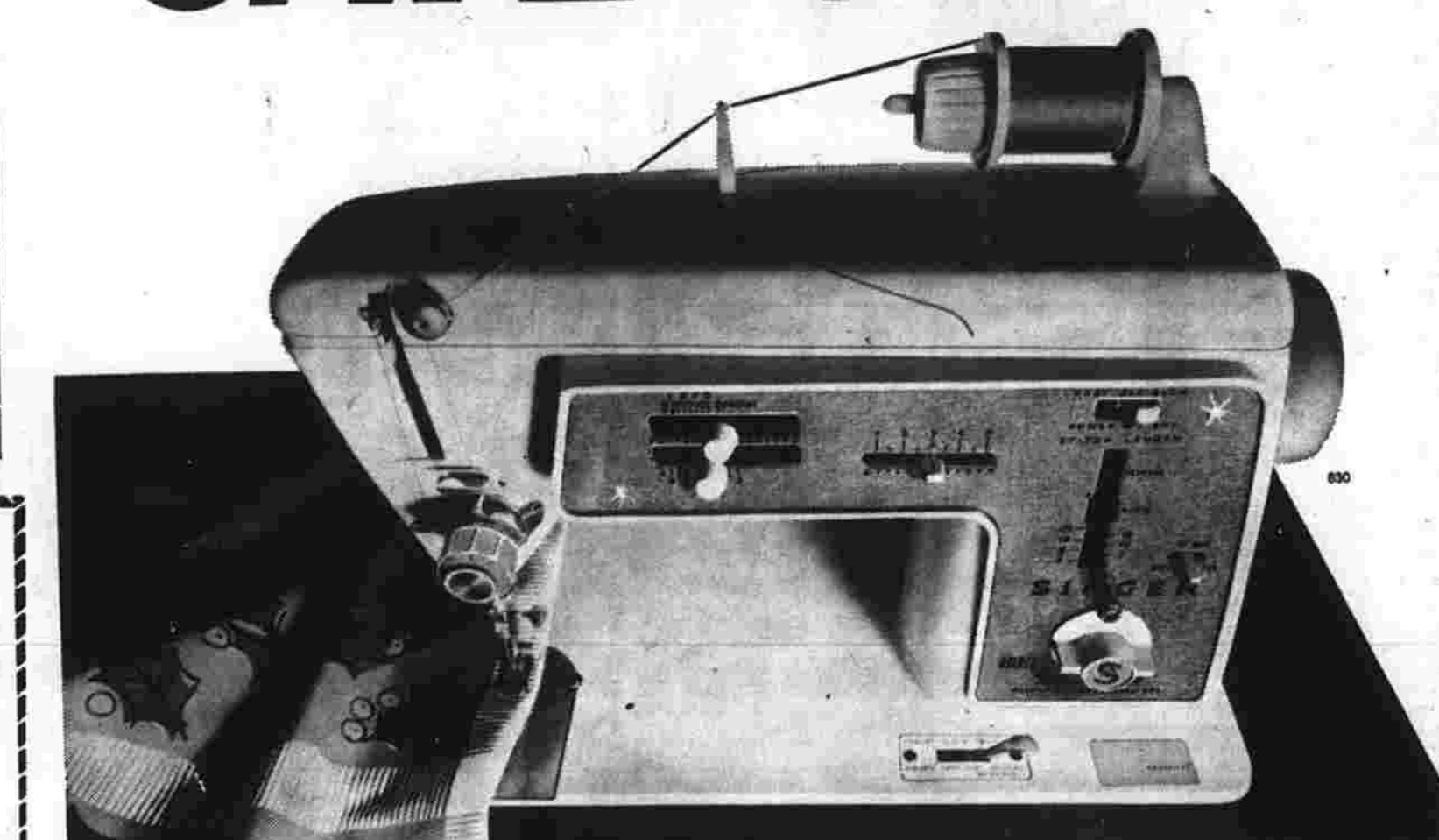

# Groobert Endorsed For Clerk of House

Atty. Paul B. Groobert of Manchester last night was endorsed for re-election to the post of clerk of the State House of Representatives. The endorsement was at a caucus of Democratic members of the House, meeting in the State Capitol.

A resolution was adopted, endorsing William Hatchford of Danbury; speaker; Peter A. Crevier of Essex, deputy speaker; Carl Ajello of Ansonia; majority leader; James Kennedy of Hartford; deputy majority leader; Groobert, House clerk; and Michael Mori of Danbury, assistant House clerk.

All are certain of election to the posts when the State Legislature convenes Jan. 4. The House of Representatives is Democratic-controlled, as is the State Senate.

Groobert will be serving his second term. He was elected unopposed on Jan. 4, 1967, succeeding Republican John Gerardo of Hartford, who had served three terms. The House was GOP-controlled.

Groobert is a state representative in the 1963 and 1965 State Assemblies. He is a member of the 1968 Constitution Convention.

November 1966 he ran for re-election to the state assembly and lost to Democrat Robert Stavinisky. He sought the Democratic nomination for the House of Representatives in the Nov. 8 election but failed to receive the endorsement of the Manchester Democratic Town Committee. It went to Town Director Francis Mahoney, who defeated Stavinisky in the Nov. 8 election.

# Voice Sought By Students In Policies

Involvement of high school students in decision-making has generally up to now been along the lines of how much to charge for the school dances. All through the grades and in almost all schools, administrators have traditionally laid down the laws and students haven't been asked for anything but obedience.

Today's student generation resents the dictatorial way in which school rulings have been handed. They say: "Listen to us; we want 'in' on such matters as courses, grading and discipline." They want representation at faculty meetings, and they're asking for open student-teacher meetings to discuss school policies.

Should parents and teachers fear this kind of student involvement? No, writes Dexter K. Strong, headmaster of Seattle's Lakeside School.

In a recent issue of "The Independent School Bulletin," he says: "We should be thankful that a student generation has arrived which is interested in education and in its improvement... students don't want to replace boards and heads and faculties. They just want to be heard, and they want no only assurance but proof that we pay attention to their considered opinions when we make decisions."

He points to one school which offers students four different kinds of senior English. Each year the juniors are asked to choose among eight or ten different but equally academically acceptable kinds. Courses with the most votes are then offered.

A group of teenagers from Washington, D.C.'s Cleveland Park area was asked what they wanted out of school and how they thought it differed from what their parents wanted when they were in school.

**Czechs Say USSR Meets Troop Pledge**  
PRAGUE (AP) — Military experts say the Kremlin apparently has fulfilled its pledge to get the majority of the troops that invaded Czechoslovakia out of the country by today.

The Soviet-Czechoslovak treaty legalizing the occupation was ratified by the National Assembly on Oct. 18. Premier Oldrich Cernik said then that the pact provided for the withdrawal within two months of the majority of the troops who invaded Czechoslovakia on Aug. 20. No numbers were disclosed.

Military experts who estimated the invasion force at more than 600,000 men now estimate that all but about 70,000 occupation troops have left the country.

Most of the remaining troops are reported camped outside major cities in barracks of the Czechoslovak army. The experts say there is no evidence of unusual troop concentrations near the West German border despite much Moscow talk about Soviet troops being needed to defend Czechoslovakia against West Germany.

Residents of Mirovice, 25 miles northeast of Prague, say two divisions of some 60,000 officers and men are still at a base there. Military experts say they are one of the largest Soviet camps in the country.

Meanwhile, the members of the national assembly gathered in Prague, for a four-day session, starting today, to approve changes in the economic program and in the government adopted by the Communist party central committee last week.

### Saigon Set To Discuss Cease-fires

February, when the Viet Cong launched its biggest offensive of the war, and "unambiguously" in the north, and the Viet Cong was the previous truce proposed by the Communist Government.

"It is still too early," the spokesman said, "to make any decision concerning a possible cease-fire in military operations for New Year's Day and Tet. In case there is no agreement, a true arrangement for New Year's Day and Tet, the government of the Republic of Vietnam will be ready to discuss the matter with the representatives of North Vietnam."

The foreign military said it had consulted with the United States and Saigon's other allies, and "they have all expressed their agreement with regard to the truce issue."

In the war, meanwhile, a U.S. F-4 Phantom II transport plane with 40 passengers and four crew members aboard crashed and burned Tuesday but after it had taken off from the Chu Lai Air Base, 55 miles south of Da Nang.

Fourteen persons were killed and most of the others were injured, three of them seriously. They said most of those aboard the two-engine Phantom II were American troops but there were some South Vietnamese soldiers.

One spokesman reported the plane may have been hit by enemy ground fire, although a command from the U.S. Command said an investigation was being made to determine the cause of the accident.

The U.S. Command also announced that another U.S. reconnaissance plane flying over the southern part of the demilitarized zone had been fired on by North Vietnamese troops inside the zone. The single-engine plane was not hit, and the pilot directed the aircraft to land at a nearby airfield.

The U.S. Command said the Viet Cong snatched three more American planes and a U.S. Navy supply depot Tuesday night and landed them in a bay near the southern coast.

The incident and earlier attacks were light, with not more than 15 rounds fired in any one direction, U.S. headquarters said. A few American troops and five

Vietnamese civilian workers round barrage from mortars were wounded, no one was killed, and damage was light.

The invaders were driven off by about 75 militiamen and pacification workers. The spokesman said at least four of the Viet Cong were killed and two militiamen were wounded.

U.S. B-52 bombers kept up their attacks on reported Viet Cong and North Vietnamese concentrations north of Saigon and south of Da Nang; their chief target areas in recent weeks. The purpose is to keep the enemy from launching the new offensive which some U.S. officers expect in those areas.

Twelve of the eight-jet B-52s struck 10 miles south-west of Da Nang in support of the 5,000 U.S. Marines making another major sweep of that area.

Eighteen more B-52s attacked on two sides of Song Be, hitting infiltration corridors 68 to 72 miles north of Saigon and about 12 miles from the Cambodian border.

### Absenteeism Closes Waterbury Schools

Waterbury, Conn. (AP)

Waterbury public schools have closed for the Christmas and New Year's holidays three days ahead of schedule because of a high absenteeism rate blamed on the Hong Kong flu.

Nearly 5,000 students in the system of 17,700 students were out Tuesday when School Superintendent Michael Wallace announced the decision to close the schools well ahead of the scheduled Friday ahead of the holidays.

Wallace said 112 of the city's 1,000 teachers also were absent Tuesday.

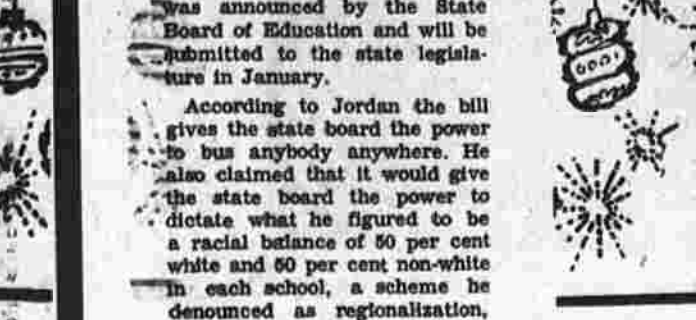

et visits in order to avoid exposing patients to the flu virus. Many public schools and colleges were closing early because of high incidence of respiratory disease.

A Health Department official in Allegheny County, Pa., where Pittsburgh is located, said the Hong Kong flu had reached "epidemic proportions" in the county. School absenteeism in some districts was as high as 50 per cent, the official said.

Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey was still suffering from the flu Tuesday in Phoenix, Ariz., and was expected to remain there another day.

Schools and businesses in Phoenix reported absenteeism running 20 per cent above normal. More than 4,000 students were absent in the 38,000-student Phoenix Union high school district.

Reported flu cases in New Mexico increased to more than 4,000 during the past week, compared with 1,800 the week before.

One influenza death was reported in Milwaukee, Wis. The health commissioner there also said there had been 17 pneumonia deaths in the first half of October in the same period last year.

Absenteeism at some schools in Seattle, Wash., were reported as high as 22 per cent. Absenteeism in public schools in Detroit, Mich., was reported at 17 per cent of enrollment, double the normal rate.

Eighty thousand doses of scarce Hong Kong flu vaccine arrived at the New York City Health Department Tuesday. They will be distributed to medical facilities for administration to the elderly and to other persons considered likely to catch the disease.

Twenty thousand doses of the vaccine are being administered at medical facilities in lower Michigan. And in Fayetteville, Ark., shots were made available Tuesday to the entire Arkansas football team.

"I have quite a respect in my own mind for the advertising industry," he said. "Our merchandising was the most effective in the banking-savings and loan field."

Lytton handled much of his own advertising, which he personalized with his photograph in newspaper ads and his voice on radio commercials.

Two of these had requested additional time in preparing their bids. He also noted that several other contractors had indicated interest if the bid opening were delayed.

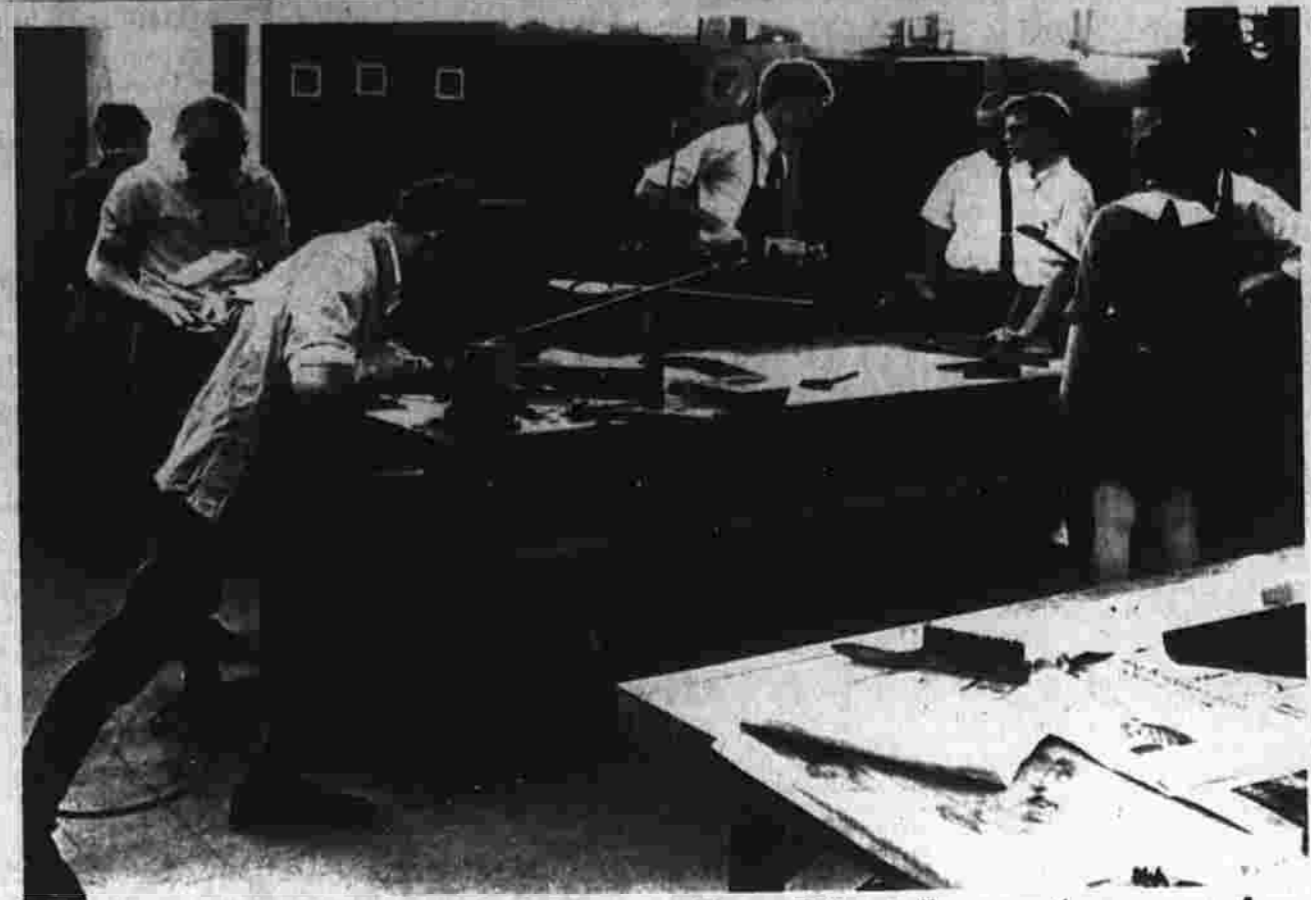
The board received a bill from the architectural firm for \$28,000 for services to date. The board reserved action until the next meeting.

Book Review

REMEMBRANCE PAINTINGS. By Robert Grosse. Boston, 80, distributed by Marrow, \$2 to \$3. This handsomely printed and illustrated packed work must be counted a major contribution to the literature on Rembrandt's life and his paintings. It succeeds in being both an illuminating story and a reference work for scholars. The 80 color plates bring the major paintings to the eye of the reader in black and white and record not only the works of the master but also many other paintings of the period. In the text, Dr. Grosse, a Dutch art historian, emphasizes Rembrandt's place in the context of his time. His artistic heritage, his artistic legacy and his associations with Dutch painting. As a reference work this volume is especially valuable for the way in which it goes beyond the text to offer a complete set of reproductions of the artist's work. It is a list of the paintings arranged by geographical locations, and the catalog itself. The catalog is a very interesting item, containing frank notes on the contrasting viewpoints of the experts on questions of attribution and quite candid comments on the present condition of various paintings. FORCE IS FROM NAVARONE

By Alberto MacLean. Doubleday, \$4.95. This novel takes up where MacLean's World War II tale "The Guns of Navarone" left off. Capt. Keith Mulroney, the mountain climber from New Zealand, and Capt. Dwyer Miller, his poetry-reading companion, head off the "Big Green" command set forth on a new mission as secret agents in Yugoslavia. The Allies want to reduce the German pressure on the Italian front, so they set up a diversion in the mountainous terrain of Bosnia, where Marshal Tito's partisans are fighting desperately. The key to this situation lies in a high valley where a Yugoslav Division, running out of food and ammunition, is trapped by German forces, including an armored division. Mulroney's assignment is to lead the Germans, save the partisans and incidentally rescue some British agents who have been captured. In the climax, he has to lead his little crew into an assault on a high cliff and battle. The plot is enthralling by some.

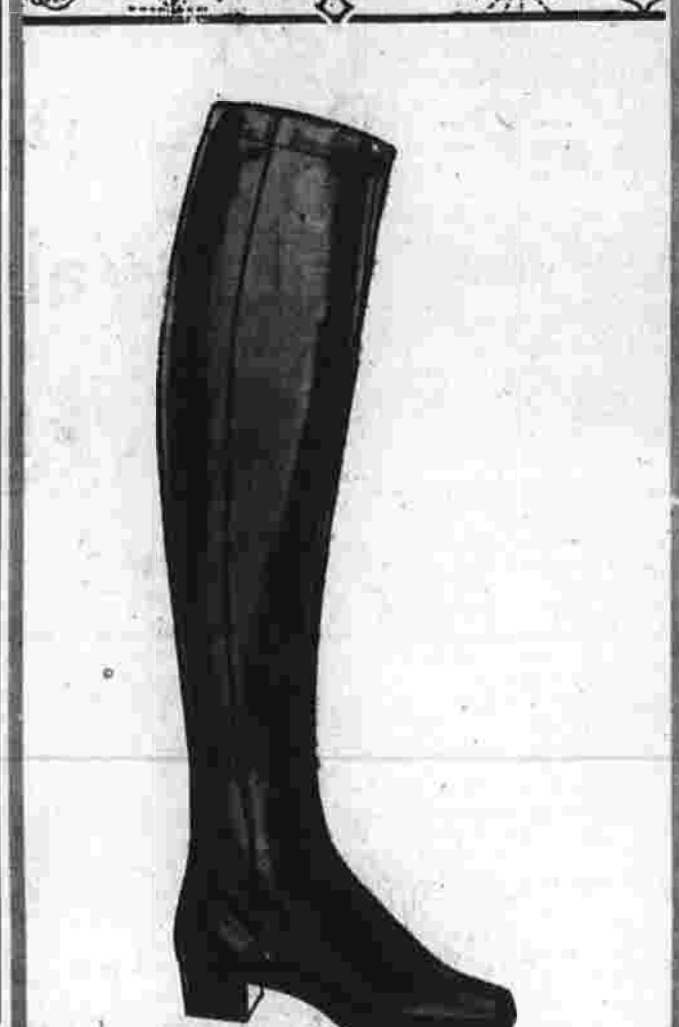

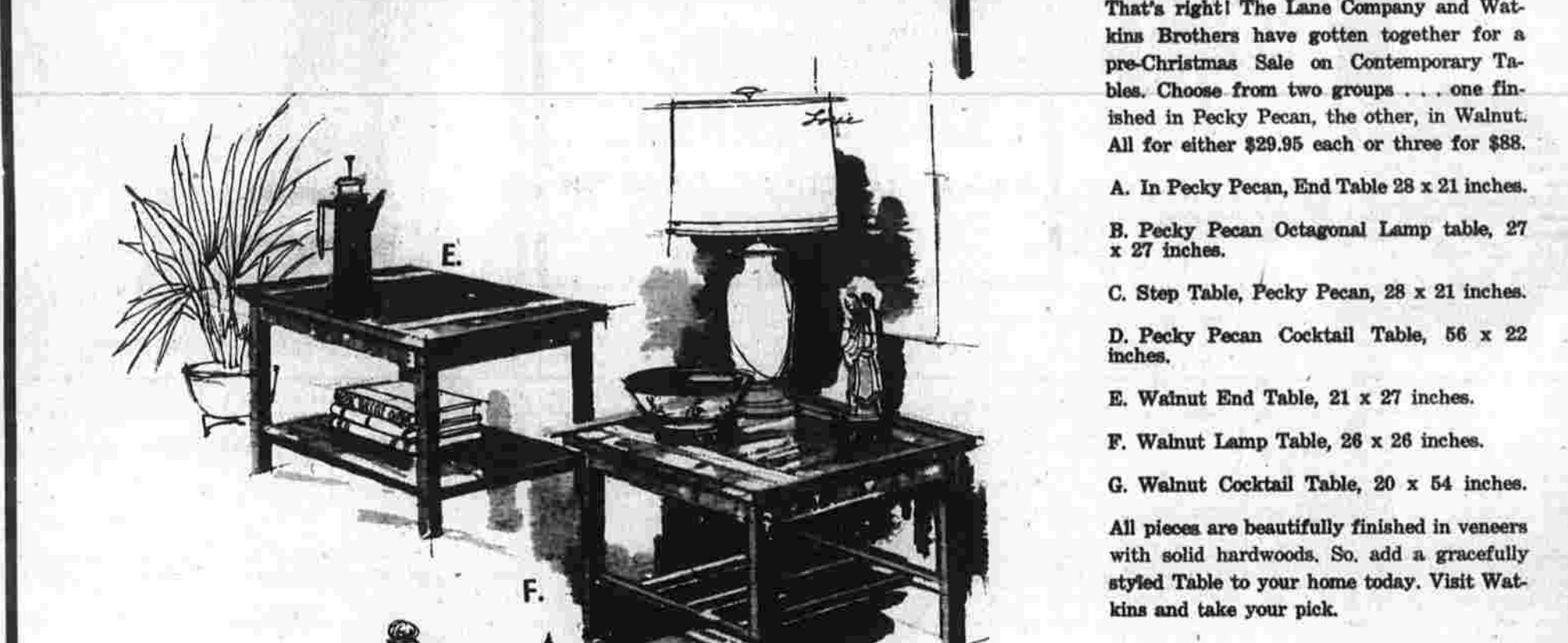

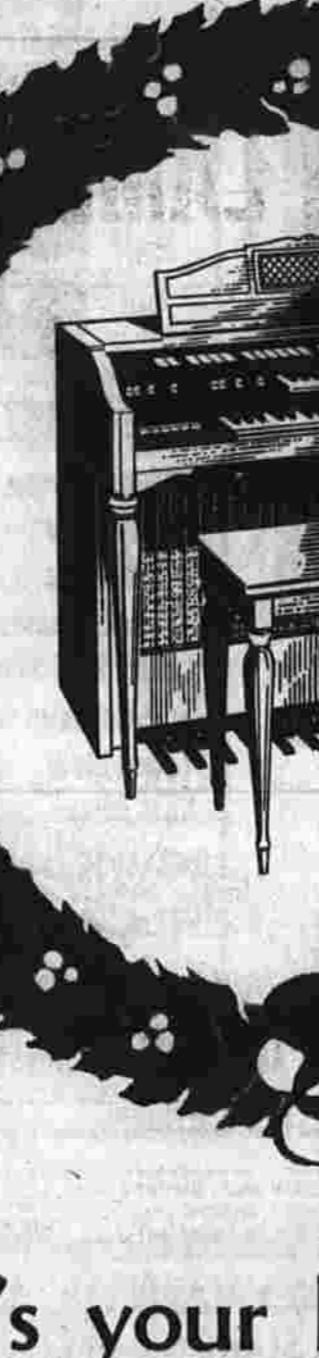

In Washington Monday, Senate Republican leader Everett M. Dirksen said after a meeting with the President-elect that he supports the treaty and its swift ratification and is prepared to vote for it if it comes up prior to the inauguration.

Ronald L. Slegler, Nixon's press aide, said the President-elect was taking no public position on the issue now, even to the extent of reaffirming his campaign statements. "Mr. Nixon will not be stating positions between now and Jan. 20," Slegler said.

Nixon went to the United Nations with his secretary and state-designate William P. Rogers and said the visit indicated "our continuing support of the United Nations and our intention to strengthen this organization as it works in the cause of peace throughout the world."

Tuesday Nixon announced his appointment of Dr. Herbert Gold to be a member of the council of Economic Advisors. Stein has been former fellow of the Brookings Institute in Washington, D.C.

**Navy Redfaced Over Saving \$8 From Scorpion**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy is trying to explain an embarrassing claim of big savings economically from the loss of the nuclear sub Scorpion which went down in the Atlantic last spring with 96 crewmen.  
The Pentagon said Monday that despite a budgetary estimate last week that listed a \$3-million savings through loss of the sub it really does not consider the tragedy as resulting in a "total net saving."  
The \$30-million craft disappeared on or about May 27 while returning underway from Europe. Some wreckage was recently located two miles deep near the Azores.  
An itemization Dec. 10 of ways the Navy cut expenditures in fiscal 1968 to save \$92 million toward a Pentagon goal of \$3 billion included the entry:  
"Reduction in personnel and support costs due to loss of the U.S.S. Scorpion . . . \$3 million."  
Officials were asked to explain that, and further to say why the intelligence ship Pueblo, which is in the hands of North Korea, couldn't also be claimed as savings.  
After several days of choosing its words very carefully, the Pentagon told the Associated Press:  
"It was not the intent of the Defense Department to indicate that the loss of Scorpion resulted in a total net savings for the Navy. The \$9.2 million figure was largely programmed funds for operating the submarine this fiscal year, which included funds previously appropriated for her scheduled overhaul in 1968."  
"The loss of Scorpion is not considered a 'saving'. The loss of the lives of Scorpion's highly technically trained crew can never be categorized as a 'savings'. Their value to their country can never be addressed in terms of monetary value."  
"Concerning the Pueblo, her routine operating costs are comparatively small. A planned overhaul was not budgeted for Pueblo."  
Finally, the Pentagon said:  
"Combat losses, ship losses and personnel losses in general are never considered as 'budget reductions'.  
"Expenditures which are programmed or planned, but which because of combat loss or ship loss do not make, are savings in the budgetary sense."

**BAD MEDICINE**

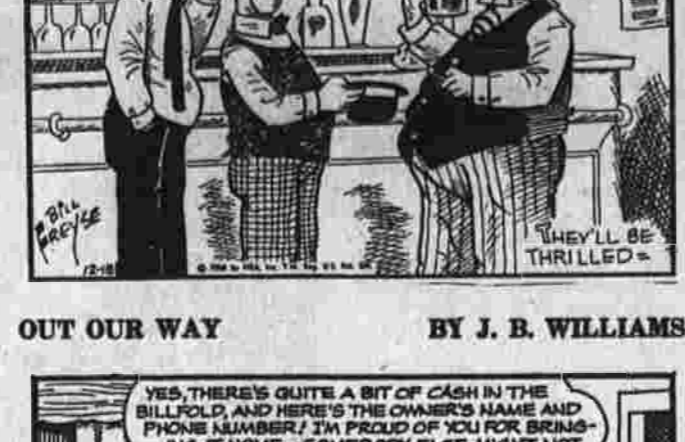
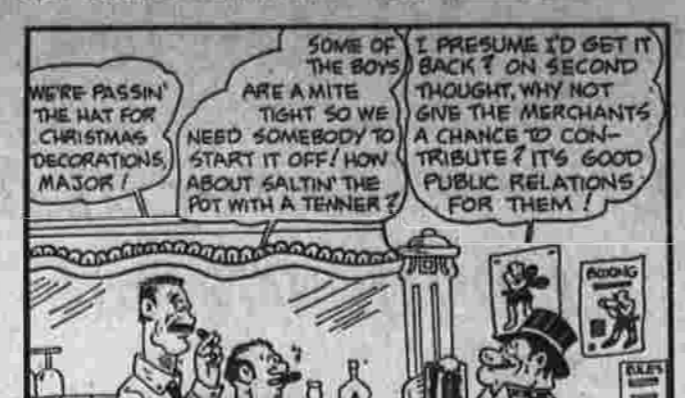
