JUMP RESPONSE FORCES ONLY AS FAR AS GAME

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD
Most players flounder after partner's opening bid of one trump. A response of two of suit is weak, inviting partner to pass. A jump to three of a suit usually tells the responder to look out the blackwood convention. How then can the responder force to game without getting too high?

Opening lead—jack of clubs. The opening responder should not get beyond game unless the responder makes the first move toward slam. In today's hand, for example, after South's jump to three hearts, North may not bid anything higher than four hearts.

But what bid is to be rejected. South may lead another trump to encourage a diamond bid. Declarer should take the ace and then the king of diamonds, planning to lead a third diamond toward dummy if the queen does not drop. This develops a third diamond, trick not only when West has the queen but also when the suit breaks 3-3 and he has only 18 points. Moves toward slam must come from South.

South's best chance is to take the first trick with the ace of clubs and draw three rounds of trumps, ending in the dummy. He then ruffs a low club to see if the king drops, a slim

U.S. Confronted by Dilemma Over Brazil Power Grab

WASHINGTON (AP) — The assumption of dictatorial powers by the military-backed regime of Brazilian President Artur da Costa e Silva has put the United States face to face with one of its toughest Latin American problems in recent years.

Another Airliner Hijacked to Cuba

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A hijacker who said he had nitroglycerin forced an Eastern Airlines jet with 131 persons aboard to fly him to Cuba late Thursday. He apologized as he took the plane.

"I'm sorry, captain," the tall, slender hijacker said on arrival in Havana where six soldiers escorted him off the aircraft. It was the fifth consecutive week that an airliner had been hijacked to Cuba. Six commercial planes have been hijacked to Cuba during that time and 20 this year.

meeting Nov. 30 that year in a fashionable East Side restaurant, during which De Sapio met with Elias Ulrich, a Con Edison vice president, and public relations man Sydney Baron.

Although Tammann (Ulrich) had been synonymous with graft and corruption throughout much of his history, during De Sapio's reign there were never open charges of graft against him.

In 1967, a cab driver found an envelope containing \$11,200 in old bills tucked down in the back seat of the cab. He said he had just dropped De Sapio off at the Biltmore Hotel when he made the discovery.

But De Sapio repeatedly denied having anything to do with the money and eventually it reverted to the cab driver.

De Sapio was subpoenaed as a witness in the trial last June at which Corallo, Fried, and bakery union leader Daniel J. Motto were convicted of bribery in a bribery charge involving an attempt to fix a federal case.

The new indictment describes two meetings involving a Gerald Hadden, not further identified.

Enemy Sets Saigon Push, Officers Say

campaign, or about 20,000 troops.

Against this, the allies have about 80,000 troops in 120 maneuver battalions, including 50 Americans, 64 South Vietnamese and six Australian and Thai.

"We have no indication the enemy has changed his plans," the source said.

In the continuing American campaign to blunt the expected assault, 18 Air Force B-52s dumped more than 500 tons of bombs on the jungled approach corridor 25 miles northwest of Saigon.

American paratroopers from the 22nd Airborne Brigade sweeping the outer perimeter of Saigon seized 200 rounds of mortar shells and bazooka-type rockets 11 miles from the capital.

"We feel the first phase of the winter-spring campaign against U.S. and allied installations other than in Saigon has commenced," one intelligence officer said. "The enemy has not conducted any major offensives actually, but he has increased the intensity of the ones he has initiated. In the last 48 hours, there has been an increase in the intensity of contacts."

Most of these have been mortar and rocket attacks on U.S. and South Vietnamese bases in an arc north of Saigon. These appear to be diversionary attempts to pin down allied forces while Viet Cong and North Vietnamese troops maneuver in from the Cambodian border.

Eight allied bases and three provincial capitals were shelled during Thursday night, with 10 rounds of mortar shells at U.S. Marine positions but caused no casualties or damage, U.S. headquarters said. The Marines returned the fire.

No major ground fighting was reported across the country.

The U.S. Command announced that North Vietnamese antiaircraft battery fired Thursday on U.S. F4 Phantom fighter-bombers escorting a reconnaissance plane over North Vietnam but none of the planes was hit. The Phantoms bombed the AA battery, which was about 45 miles north of the demilitarized zone, but heavy smoke prevented assessment of damage, a spokesman said.

The U.S. Command says American planes have bombed North Vietnam four times and the southern half of the demilitarized zone another four times since the May 1 bombing halt. A spokesman said the attacks were made against North Vietnamese gunners firing on unarmed reconnaissance planes or their armed escorts.

Vernon Busing Foes Deny 'Phony' Data Charge

Asserting that they can prove the salaries of the directors of the "Concerned Citizens of Vernon" are not as high as the group has claimed, busing opponents are denouncing a charge that the material is "phony."

The Vernon group held a meeting last Friday to allow the opponents and proponents of the project to bring city officials into the suburbs to hear and discuss options on the subject.

The local group was formed several weeks ago and is headed by Mr. and Mrs. Franklyn Jordan.

The controversy is over a proposed legislative bill to correct racial imbalance in the schools.

The Jordans and William Withersell, who is a member of the executive committee of the "Concerned Citizens" issued a joint statement today in replying to Dr. Plante, who is with the State Board of Education.

Dr. Plante accused the group this week of "quoting from a phony bill" that implies reverse busing. The local group charged that "We are not sure that he is fully informed regarding matters passed out."

"If he is referring to the copy of the rough draft of legislation given to the Commission of Human Rights and Opportunities, then he is in error in calling it phony," Jordan said.

Jordan said he can prove that the rough draft did come from this group. "I also have a copy of this legislation as reprinted by the State Board of Education. With the exception of section 2 of the rough draft which was eliminated in drawing up the final copy, the bills are very much alike," Jordan said.

Withersell said copies of both drafts have been left at the Rockville Public Library and any person who cares to read them may do so. "I can't imagine why he (Dr. Plante) would say that," he said.

Withersell said he explained that the first draft in entitled "An Act Concerning the Elimination of Racial Imbalance in the Public Schools of the State." Dr. Plante's copy reads, "An Act Concerning Racial Imbalance in the Public Schools."

The three questioned, "If the State Board does not intend to buse students across districts, why is a provision included for such an eventuality?"

"They refer to a sentence in section 4 which states, 'The plan may include provision for cooperation with other school districts to assist in the correction of racial imbalance.'"

"Mrs. Jordan added, 'I find it hard to believe that the State of Connecticut neither needs nor desires to have such legislation and is at the same time proposing to put into law such measures.'"

"I demand that Dr. Plante prove that this material is phony. Since I can prove that it is not I suspect he will find this difficult," Mrs. Jordan said.

Mrs. Jordan further pointed out that the Concerned Citizens of Vernon have researched this subject carefully and "can prove every statement we have made." "I do not believe that any official of the state should be allowed to make a public charge of blatant dishonesty with no proof to back up his statement," Mrs. Jordan asserted.

Jordan asked, "If Dr. Plante would like the people to look at the facts, why does he not publish the financial information we have been trying to obtain?" He said the group would like to

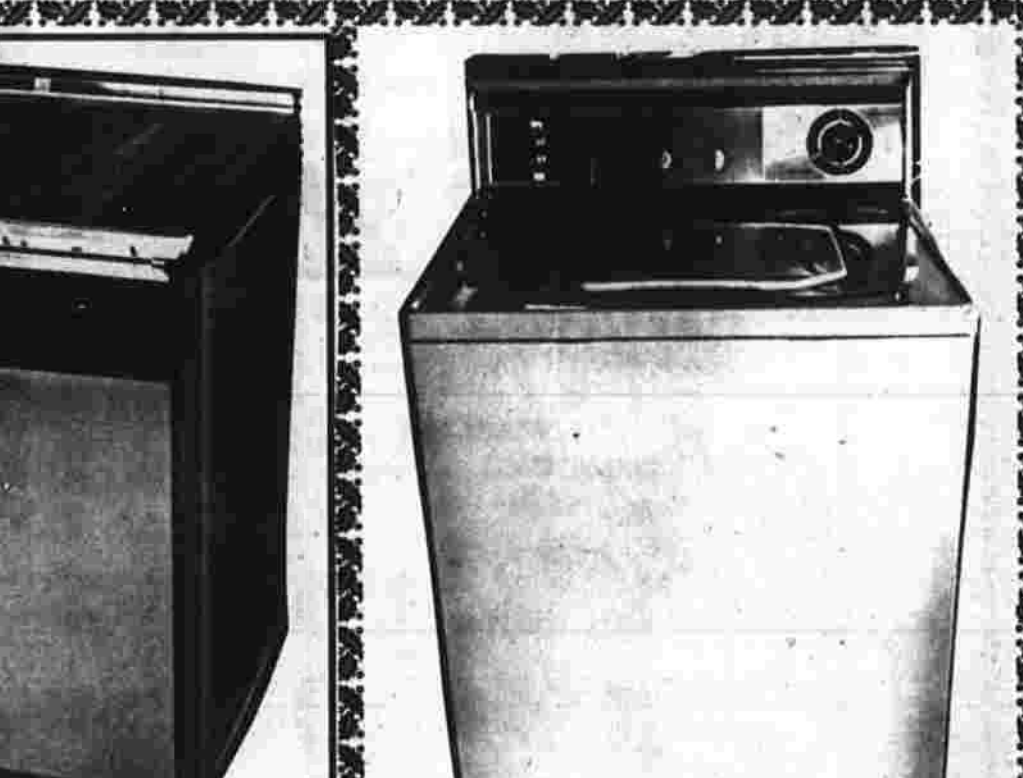

notable for wet and miserable weather, says the Environmental Science Service Administration. In fact, one president, William Henry Harrison was thoroughly chilled during his inauguration in 1841 and died of pneumonia a month later.

But only two of the eight inaugurations held on Jan. 20 have been meteorologically marked. The first was the 1807 inauguration of Franklin D. Roosevelt, the first to be held on the new date. It was almost required heroic efforts to clear the snow washed out by one day of the most rains in the history of the event. The second was in 1961, when a heavy snowfall of 10 inches fell on the inauguration.

According to ESRA, almost 100 years of records reveal that average conditions for the noon hour on Jan. 20 are a temperature of about 37 degrees, a wind of 10 miles an hour or less and partly cloudy skies. This is, repeat, an average and not a forecast.

The records also show that the chances against precipitation of any kind during the inauguration ceremony are at least six to one, and about 20 to one against snow. There could, however, be some accumulation on the ground from previous snowfalls. If there is, it will only be some lingering Democratic snow, failed to melt in Washington, unless Mother Nature has other ideas and upsets the statistical aspect.

Art Treads New Paths

Art planners continue to strike out in new directions. A current exhibit at the Whitney Museum of Modern Art in New York examines the state of contemporary sculpture through the works of 137 artists.

Many of the pieces move, light up or make sounds. One gigantic sculpture, which would seem to qualify as architecture as much as sculpture, is 24 feet long and 15 feet high with a number of 15-foot beams cantilevered 15 feet overhead.

Another work involved removing four stone paving blocks from the museum floor and lining the empty space with sheet metal for an "earth sculpture" entitled "City Depression."
