WASHINGTON (AP) — A joint session of Congress, counting the electoral vote making Richard M. Nixon the 37th president was interrupted Monday by an unprecedented challenge to a single ballot.

At stake was whether an elector pledged to one candidate could vote in the Electoral College for another.

The challenge caused the immediate adjournment of the joint session, with the two houses taking up the dispute in their separate chambers.

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After Terrorists Bombing South Viet Minister Dies

SAIGON (AP) — Education minister Le Minh Tri died in a hospital today, victim of the first terrorist attack against a major South Vietnamese political figure in more than a year.

His driver was killed instantly and two bodyguards and a passerby were wounded by the blast, the most spectacular incident of its kind in Saigon since the enemy's Tet offensive last winter.

Tri had studied at Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia. Directing the Education Ministry is considered one of the nation's most difficult jobs. Many students are Viet Cong activists or sympathizers.



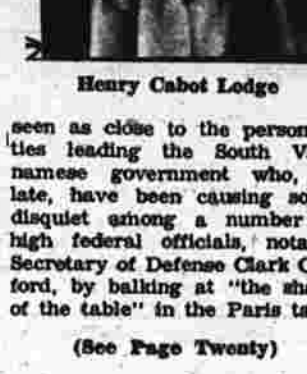
Car Burns After Terrorist Attack

NEW YORK (AP) — President-elect Nixon, without stating his own views on Vietnam peace talks, has named as his chief Paris negotiator Henry Cabot Lodge, who has a reputation for taking a hard-line view of the war.

Lodge, 66 and twice ambassador to Saigon, will head an almost-new negotiating team that, by its makeup, leaves in question Nixon's own policy attitude toward the peace efforts in Paris.

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Rostow Sees U.S. Role in Vietnam Building Independence for Asia

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has opened a "future of independence" for the nations of Asia and the possibility of some new relationship with Red China because of its role in Vietnam, says presidential assistant Walt W. Rostow.

Rostow argued that the United States would have been drawn into a bigger war in Asia, involving Communist China, if it had not chosen to fight in Vietnam. He contended that U.S. interests in Europe and the Middle East had not been damaged by the Johnson administration's concern with Asian affairs.

Hearing Due Jan. 15 On Private Airport

Starting today, all Coventry private pilots will be required to have their aircraft inspected by the state before they can be used for private flights.

Report Says Maj. Rowe Evaded Foe Nine Days

CA MAU, Vietnam (AP)—Maj. James N. Rowe, the U.S. Special Forces officer held prisoner for two years, evaded his captors for nine days after his escape before finally being picked up by a U.S. helicopter, according to reports in this week's Delta news.

Rowe, 30, of Mollan, Texas, was brought first to Ca Mau after his rescue. The U.S. Command has withheld details of Rowe's escape. The bare outline of the report says Rowe was captured in a Viet Cong camp and was picked up the same day, Dec. 31.

However, U.S. advisers who talked with Rowe said he escaped in the confusion of a 1952 bombing strike Dec. 22. "The bombing was part of preparation for a large Vietnamese operation in the U Minh forest, a thick Viet Cong base covering 150 miles southwest of Saigon."

Rowe was being held part of the time in a roomy bamboo cage—in the vicinity of the Viet Cong's region 3 headquarters, which directs enemy activities in the six southernmost provinces.

Intelligence reports indicate that possibly six to 12 Americans were being held somewhere in the 250-square-mile area of bog and woods.

With the bombing, Rowe found himself running along a trail behind his guard. One account said Rowe, while on the run, reached out to the guards' AK-47 rifle and pressed the release button that dropped out the bullet clip.

The guard's gun was empty. Rowe continued to jog for a while, until he saw a more promising path. Then, a source says, he stopped his guard, grabbed the man's radio, and took off alone through the woods. He had a sack of his own belongings, including a diary.

Lodge on Vietnam Record of Statements

NEW YORK (AP)—Henry Cabot Lodge, named Sunday by President-elect Nixon to head the Paris peace negotiating team, has been involved in the Vietnam situation off and on since 1965.

Here is a compilation of statements Lodge has made in the past about the political and military aspects of the war, its chances for success and prospects for peace.

June 29, 1966—Just after he resigned as ambassador to help former Pennsylvania Gov. William Scriven in his unsuccessful fight for the Republican presidential nomination, Lodge said: "In Vietnam, the aim of the struggle is to create a proper political atmosphere. That's what the American government of South Vietnam does not have control over. It's the balance of power throughout the country... When they have that control, the war will be over."

May 19, 1966—Lodge defended the bombing of North Vietnam, but said, "By itself, it will not bring an end to the war." He added, however, "We don't believe in a military solution and the military don't believe in 100,000 terrorist guerrillas high-rolling on the Viet Cong."

April 18, 1966—"There is no question about our determination to see that the United States gets through to the heart of the matter, which is more than the Viet Cong. We have to be sure that the Viet Cong is not a long-term problem."

April 18, 1966—"I don't think it's wise to get into a long-term war. We are on the right track. It is now a question of having the political and military plans which have been agreed to will bring victory."

Feb. 14, 1966—"I maintain that a stalemate is better than a defeat."

March 26, 1966—"The situation in Vietnam will 'improve as time goes by.'"

April 23, 1966—Lodge said the political confusion in Vietnam had hampered the war effort.

"Optimism" For 1969

"Business will get better in 1969," says the lead sentence in a Wall Street Journal survey of our economic prospects.

That is a statement which proves that, intellectually at least, we have some capacity for realism and sanity in our thinking about business.

What we feel about it may prove something else again. It is one thing to concede, from a rational point of view, that it would be a good thing to have business slow down a little.

It is an entirely different thing, it seems, to accept your own portion, of that slowdown, which may be fewer days of work, less overtime, smaller wage increases, less increase in the cost of business, slightly less demand for your product.

At any rate, if any of us can stand the incidental pain of it as it happens to hit us with our share of the "slowdown," it is not difficult to accept the thesis advanced by the Wall Street Journal's survey.

We have had, in 1968, a year better than was expected. In order to get that much better than it was expected to be, the economy had to move and expand a little faster than anything that had happened, and there were inflationary pressures keeping company with it.

It would be very unusual to try to maintain a similar pace of expansion in 1969, for one thing because the expansion itself would be hard to find, but most of all because continued expansion at such a rate would unleash still more inflationary forces.

If inflation is allowed to get out of hand, it has to be followed by deflation. This much giddy boom has to go back, sooner or later.

This is why the National Industrial Conference Board panel of 12 leading economists was actually being optimistic when the other day, it forecast that expansion would continue in 1969 but at a "more orderly pace" than in 1968.

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This is why, as one of the economists of the New York Stock Exchange puts it, today's "pessimists" are those "who forecast a continuation of the boom" while you can tell an "optimist" because he is the one who expects and hopes for a "moderation" in our economic growth.

All this smart, up-to-date economics was actually expressed long ago in an Italian proverb, which said something about trading softly at an even price in order to go far.

But there it is, from the top economic brains of the country, the same hope for 1969 - that it be a year when the economy gives up some of its speed forward and upward. Such a development may not seem good to the dividend or any particular enterprise, but it will be good for everybody collectively and return eventual long-range good and profit, even to those who breed sympathy for the Vietnamese peasant who can't appreciate the subtleties of geopolitics whose what most concerns him is how to get rice from his battle-scarred paddy. 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Meet the U.S. Senate's 15-Member Class of '69

WASHINGTON (AP) — His 47, a lawyer with at least six years experience in politics, is married and has three children, served in World War II and last November won a hard, close fight.

The average Tolland County legislator is a man, married and 46 years of age, according to statistics contained in the Preliminary Manual of the 1968 General Assembly.

The manual is printed to aid incoming legislators and contains information provided by the legislators.

Of the 56 Tolland County representatives, two are women and all are married with the exception of Representative Dorothy Miller of Bolton, who is listed as a widow.

Varied occupations are listed with only one attorney represented in the group, compared with the House average of one attorney out of every three legislators.

Representative-elect Audrey Book of Mansfield lists herself as a legislator, although she is just beginning her first term.

Of the only two women among the legislators in the House of Representatives from Tolland County, although they are Donnelly, Jr. of South Windsor, is also embarking on his first term.

Rep. Gerald Allen, Democrat from the 6th District is 48 years of age, a Vermont native and an insurance agent, and has served four terms in the House.

Rep. Robert King of the 48th District, Republican, is 55 and hails from Northampton, Mass. He is the only attorney from the area, and has served three terms in the House.

Rep. Renato Calchiera of the 49th District, is the senior member from the county at 63 years

Bolton Hartford Architects Named For School Renewal Plans

Mainfield Associates of Hartford, architects for the new elementary school, have been chosen by the Public Building Commission to draw plans for the renovation of the school.

The architects, attempting to portion out construction so that renovation of the school elementary school and its conversion to a middle school.

Both the new school, as begun in the summer of 1967, and the middle school, to house Grades 4 through 8, are requested for occupancy by the Board of Education, next September.

Grades 7 and 8 would be moved back from the high school building. The new school is under construction.

Although the town allocated \$2,000 for preliminary plans for the renovation last March, the work was not clear for the drawing of plans until a December town meeting cleared up a technicality, authorizing the maintenance of a form to the State Department of Education.

The renovations, which will be internal in the first stage of conversion, were estimated to cost last year at about \$100,000. This will include increased lavatory facilities and proposed re-arranging of the basement, kitchen and cafeteria areas which will be eliminated, because students are to use the cafeteria in the new elementary school, which will be located a few hundred yards away.

Art in Basement

The educational specifications, recently re-approved by the school board, suggest art, drama and handicraft facilities in the basement. Some members of the school board have expressed concern over the curtailment of the shop and home economics program, as compared to what is now being offered to Grade 7 and 8 students in the high school. Concern was also expressed over the possible curtailment of the French program, due to scheduling problems.

Educational specifications call for conversion of the C/D room into a physical education room. Again, some school board members expressed concern, about the noise factor, with two nearby classrooms, and about the lack of showers.

Superintendent of Schools Joseph Castagna told the board that the program at the converted school would not be as "sophisticated" as that offered Grades 7 and 8 at the high school, but that costs must be considered.

The second stage of the middle school, to be constructed at some unspecified time, will contain a gymnasium, lounge room, and other areas, according to the architects' long-range plans for Bolton school construction.

Chester Offered

Plans submitted by Mainfield Associates last year presented the Board of Education with a choice: To build the new school for elementary grades, and to either renovate or convert the old school.

The school board, on advice of the architects, chose the former because the architects said that the old school, being built level, would be more suited for older children, and because a new middle school, with its lab and so forth, would cost more to build.

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7th Suspect Arrested in Crime Probe

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—New Haven police say their efforts to round up 11 suspects of criminal violations in connection with rival-gang activities here has so far been about two-thirds successful.

Detectives added a seventh suspect to their under-custody list Saturday with the arrest of Salvatore Annunzio, 45, a former union official and professional boxer.

Annunzio, who boxed under the name Midge Renault, was charged with parole violation. He had been in prison since 1962 on convictions of two assault cases. Authorities did not disclose the nature of his alleged parole violation.

Police said Annunzio's arrest is linked with an investigation of organized crime that came to light Dec. 28 with the gangland-style murder of Richard Biardi.

Chief James Abern said after Biardi was shot in the face in his apartment that the killing appeared to be related to the struggle between two New Haven gangs. Authorities said Annunzio was believed to be a leader of the group to which Biardi belonged.

Six other men have been arrested under Superior Court warrants issued after Biardi's murder. Five of them were charged with gun violations and one with a narcotics violation. Five are free on \$100,000 bond pending trial scheduled to be held Tuesday.

No one has yet been charged with the Biardi shooting. Annunzio's three-to-five-year sentence was dropped in 1965 after the state's Supreme Court ruled his conviction came about through a judicial error.
