Laird Orders Pentagon To Study Pueblo Case

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird announced today he has ordered a high level Pentagon study of the Pueblo case "to see that incidents of this kind do not happen again."

At his first news conference as Pentagon chief, Laird said he had appointed Deputy Secretary of Defense David Packard to head the study and oversee matters involving the intelligence ship, whose capture is being investigated by a Navy court of inquiry in California.

The ship was seized by North Korean naval forces Jan. 23, 1968. Laird said the matter is being "very carefully watched" by Packard—among other things, to see that the interests of the shipper and crewmen have been and are protected.

The new defense chief said the court of inquiry is "well in hand" but that he felt the widespread public interest in the matter required high level Defense Department attention to the situation.

On other matters, Laird said the second in command, will conduct a wide-ranging review of the Joint Chiefs of Staff's defense budget, including a program should be increased to insure maximum readiness of the lowest possible cost.

Laird said he will be going to South Vietnam in the next few days. He said the military situation in Vietnam has "improved somewhat" in the past 12 months and that the South Vietnamese army is the upgrade.

Laird declined to discuss possible U.S. troop withdrawals from South Vietnam, saying "I don't think it would be useful to talk about unusual withdrawal until we are in a substantive talk" in the fall.

Laird said the goal of U.S. nuclear strength is "sufficient power to deter the enemy," in line with President Nixon's preference for the use of the term "sufficiency" over "superiority."

Laird said he has not given up the idea of maintaining a superior status of the U.S. nuclear arsenal. He said the Joint Chiefs of Staff's defense budget, including a program should be increased to insure maximum readiness of the lowest possible cost.

Jet Strike on Iraqis Is Denied by Israel

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. Iraq led several jets in a surprise attack on Israeli troops in Jordan today but Israel denied it.

An Israeli army spokesman in Tel Aviv said: "I completely deny this report. I know that there has been absolutely nothing like this along the entire border."

Newsmen on the Israeli side of the cease-fire line saw no sign of any unusual air activity. A communication broadcast by Baghdad radio said the planes attacked Iraqi units east of the cease-fire line with Jordan.

The Iraqi communiqué said: "At 21:30 Baghdad time this morning, seven Israeli planes launched an air raid against our units operating on the eastern front."

Our anti-aircraft guns shot down one straggler plane. It was seen with a parachute and was crashing in flames over the occupied Syrian Golan Heights. There were no Iraqi casualties."

At the same time, a Jordanian broadcast said two Israeli fighters had been shot down by Jordanian troops. This was followed by a Jordanian communiqué which said two Israeli jets crossed the cease-fire line at 8:40 a.m. It added that four others crossed later and flew over areas where Iraqi troops are stationed.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Allen W. Dulles, America's master spy who steered the Central Intelligence Agency through nine years of controversial international intrigue, died late Wednesday. He was 78.

Dulles, appointed CIA chief in 1961 by former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, retired to private life in 1965. He was the son of the late Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

Philippines Hit By Earthquake

MANILA (AP)—An earthquake of intensity equal to the one which killed over 500 persons in Manila last year, struck the southern Philippine city of Davao, the Weather Bureau announced today.

A radio report from the scene said one student who jumped from the second floor of a university was critically injured and hospitalized. There were no other immediate reports of casualties or damage.

A spokesman at the National Earthquake Information Center in Washington said the tremor measured 7.2 on the Richter scale. The Weather Bureau said the quake was felt in a large area of the island of Mindanao, and some parts of the central Visayan Islands.

Coventry Bookstore A Browser's Delight

Rare is the person who does not on occasion browse among words. At one extreme is the Sunday headlines, his neck twisting to read the large black letters on newspapers lining the drug store floor. At the other extreme is the hunter of used book stores, his eyes roaming the shelves, for what, he is often not sure, but when he finds it, he knows.

For the latter group, the only haunting ground between Colebrook and New Haven is on Rt. 1 in Coventry, just beyond the mill. The Coventry Book Store occupies a huge Victorian house, with white shingles, which used to serve as Sunday school headquarters for a church across the street.

Readers of this newspaper recall that the entire stock of a used book store in Lebanon, N. H., was moved down by its new owners, Mr. and Mrs. Donald West, of Coventry. That this venture, the Wests had been possibly leading to their jobs as librarians in Hartford and at the University of Connecticut, and fitting up the old James Root house further west in U.S. 1. They had even lived quietly in Manchester for a while, but all the time they were bookstore haulers themselves.

Now, six months after the grand opening, Mrs. West continues as a librarian, at UConn, but her husband devotes full-time to the store, and is assisted by three ladies, and his wife on weekends.

Mrs. Robert Watson of Wapping has charge of the juveniles, the poetry, and the cookbook and gardening collection in the "Kitchen." Mrs. Lynnwood Walters of Storrs, a former reference librarian for Time Magazine, is in charge of science and technology. Mrs. Bernard Belcher of Storrs is in charge of fiction, which fills two rooms and most of the large basement. The biggest main business is in fiction, which Mrs. West handles. She has heard of some of the authors, some of whom he has never heard of until he began to operate the store. The works of Joseph C. Lincoln, for instance, are in demand now. (Lincoln wrote stories about Cape Cod.)

West's own specialty is history — he majored in it at Harvard — and travel. Not only has he in his varied career, been a travel agent (as well as in advertising), but his father started the Experiment in International Living.

Sounds a little awe-inspiring to the off-the-street browser, who may have parked along Mason St. and wandered in one winter afternoon, out of curiosity, but it needn't.

The sign on the door says the store is open seven days a week, from "noon to sunset." Just inside the long Victorian hall, a child's slate proclaims that sunset is at 4:59 on that particular day. An aluminum coffee pot gleams from a table down the hall, and West steps from his book-cluttered office to invite you to have a cup, a cookie, and to tell you to go ahead and browse, or, if you have some particular search, to direct you to the proper room.

There are 14 rooms, not all filled with books yet. Like the stacks in a library, the shelves neat and well-marked, go from floor to nearly ceiling. Unlike a library, which shares the same sense of predominantly drab bookcovers, there are surprises — the National Harms Review for 1964 lying near some scientific tomes; for instance, or an old edition of a children's classic that brings an instant pang of recognition.

On the stairs to the third floor (literary criticism, biography, philosophy and psychology) is the warning "It's an awful

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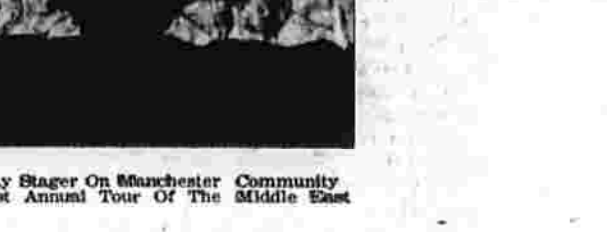
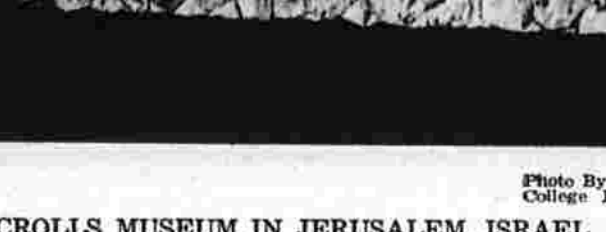

Manager Explains CDAP Study Goals

The Manchester Board of Directors, at its Tuesday meeting, will be asked by Town Manager Robert Weiss to approve an application for a \$200,000 state grant, 75 percent of the estimated cost of a two-year project.

The projected cost of the proposal, as prepared in a 60-page report submitted to the Board of Directors, is \$268,887. The \$200,000 requested from the state is the maximum which the State Department of Community Affairs allocates for the study.

The town's 20 percent cost share, \$56,887, would be paid by the Municipal Building, utilities, and time spent by town employees in preparing the plan.

CDAP is a massive federal, state and local program, prepared at state expense, which would eliminate the town's current 20 percent share and which would establish priorities for their fulfillment.

A paid staff and a volunteer staff would be responsible for its operation. The staff would be headed by the 21-member Citizens Advisory Committee, which would review, analyze and recommend proposals, as well as monitor the two-year study.

Wells, on Tuesday, will ask the Board of Directors to approve the plan. He said he has chosen for the CDAP Agency to be the Citizens Advisory Committee to become involved in the planning.

In addition, he will inform the Board that he would appoint his administrative assistant, John Harkins, to be the CDAP coordinator, at \$12,800 per year. The salary would come from the \$200,000 state grant.

In the event the application is approved, the grant made, and Harkins appointed, the town will be required to appoint a new administrative assistant. Under CDAP, he said, the application, as drawn, makes no provision for participation by the town's Department of Economic Development, established by ordinance in September 1965 as "a part of the administration of the municipal government."

The nine-member CDAP Agency, appointed by the Board of Directors, consists of Dr. Bruce Watkins, Dr. Fred J. Ravetta, Mrs. Jerome Nathan, Atty. Eugene T. Kelly, William E. Thomson, Mayor Edward J. Readson, Fred E. Thrall, Lyman B. Hoops and Clinton E. O'Brien.

Last night, Wells held an informal meeting to brief the nine-member CDAP Agency, the 21-member Citizens Advisory Committee, and the seven-member Town Development Commission on the goals of the proposed CDAP study.

Only 10 of the 27 who were invited appeared at the meeting. Also on hand were Harkins, Town Planner Eric Foster, Superintendent of Schools Donald Hennigan, and one member of the public.

It was the consensus of the group that it will recommend to the Board of Directors that it approve the CDAP application. Wells asked them to appear at Tuesday's meeting to lend support for approval.

The two-year CDAP study is aimed at developing both a five-year program of town needs and a long-range program, spelling out priorities in all areas of town development—industrial, municipal, educational and recreational.

Wells said last night that he plans to involve all government, education and citizen groups in the study. He predicted that as many as 100 persons may be involved.

He explained that, in the final analysis, it will be the Board of Directors which will approve or disapprove proposals and priorities.

He called CDAP "a blueprint of the town's present and future—where we are and where we are going."

He said that it will accomplish in one orderly study what town officials and department heads now do on a haphazard, piecemeal basis planning for the town's future.

And, he added, the planning Colonial Gardens will be the topic of an open meeting at the Board of Directors, Tuesday at 8 p.m. Rudy Favretti, landscape architect, University of Connecticut, will be the speaker. He will discuss flowers used in a colonial garden as well as garden plans.

This will be an opportunity to learn what flowers are best adapted to growing in Connecticut—slide to be shown to illustrate the points. The meeting is sponsored by the Tolland County Extension Service and is open to the public.

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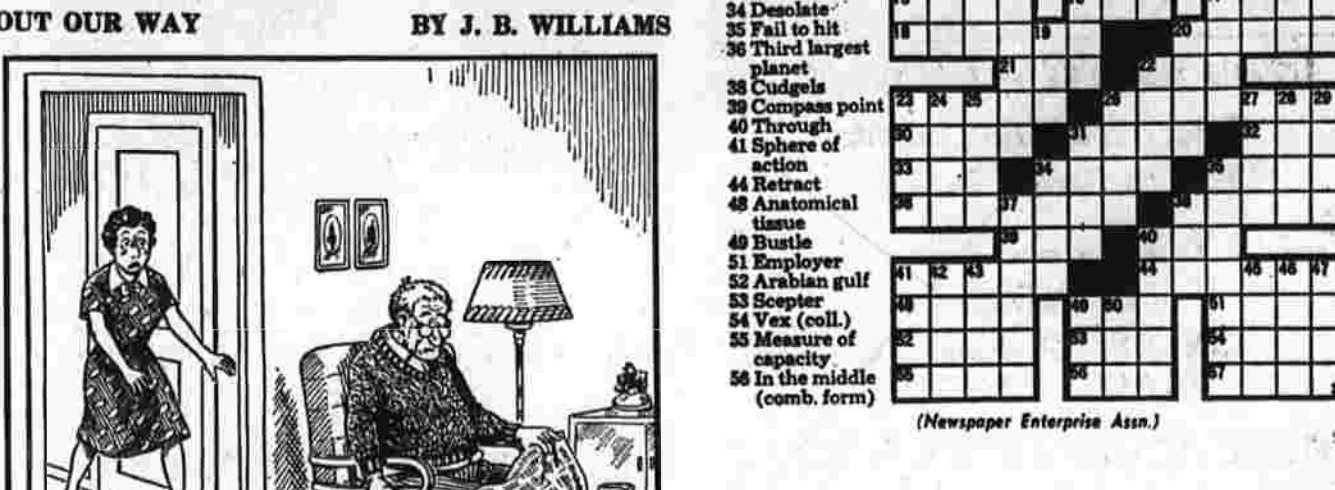

AEC Reports
Additions to
Its Arsenal

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Atomic Energy Commission said today it has developed new and secret nonnuclear components for the nation's already fearsome weapons.
The agency hinted the new developments may already have been tested in the continuing quest to improve the nation's nuclear arsenal.
The component development disclosure came in a short paragraph of the AEC's annual report to Congress prepared for release today.
In the same report, the AEC made a new oblique reference to a controversial 1966 report by Congress' Joint Committee on Atomic Energy that China could be capable of launching a hydrogen-missile attack on the United States before the early 1970s, and conceivably as early as 1971.
The indirect reference came when the AEC disclosed for the first time that it has set "late 1971" as the target date for full-scale production of hydrogen-missiles for providing "the new capability and increased capacity" for the nation's nuclear arsenal.
A key objective in this expansion program is to speed up the geared-up production of Spartan and Sprint missiles for the new system, which is designed to be launched with any early threat to the United States.
The AEC's reference to the development of new nonnuclear components is the first time in various kinds of atomic weapons.

He is said to have taken poison as well as having been urged by Kremlin guards who followed the assassination attempt.
Sources said Ilyin left his post in the Leningrad area on Monday, Jan. 20, without reporting back to his unit to return his pistol.
While official confirmation of this account is not expected in the near future, it is reported that it tallied remarkably with numerous other reports, rumors, and unusual circumstances since the Kremlin incident was disclosed last Thursday.
Different semi-official Soviet informants had previously said that the assailant was an Army deserter and the shooting was a result of a quarrel between Ilyin and a high-ranking officer.
According to this account, official investigations still underway have yet to reveal whether Ilyin left his post because of his possible motive, or whether he acted alone or as part of some organized conspiracy.
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
