LONDON (AP) — President Nixon supported to Britain today a pledge that the United States renounces the concept of an enlarged Common Market, including Britain, within a unified Europe.

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Connecticut Yankee

When Governor John Dempsey reached the most important and painful part of the Budget Message he was delivering to the General Assembly...

These messages from the Governor's inner sanctum are not to be found in any printed version of the Governor's address...

The key words he added were the two words "for you."

The "you" had to be, considering his audience, the members of the General Assembly...

The section of the budget message in which the Governor made the special addition of these two words "for you" was that in which he presented the list of revenue proposals for the state's next biennium.

As extended by what became the Governor's favorite and consistent interpretation, this would mean to produce for you \$168,000,000 in additional revenue.

The Governor used similar phrasing in his examination of the proposed increase in income tax.

Furthermore, his delivery of the two key words, "for you," was not any ordinary kind of performance. He pronounced these two words, each time, with his best clarity and emphasis.

The "you" were the legislative branch, and the audience was that it was the legislative branch "for" whom the new revenue had to bring in this additional revenue.

There was not only some justification in this gubernatorial addition of which he himself was proud, but there was also a touch of feeling too.

The justice would derive from the fact that it had been, in past sessions of the Legislature, the spending rivalry of both political parties which had played some part in spending the state toward its present fiscal crisis.

If there is, these days, a touch of feeling in Governor Dempsey about the legislative branch of which he himself was once a member, that may stem from the drastic way in which present day legislators are making annual sessions for themselves, using, as one of their main ploys for trying to middle themselves on the state for that much more of the calendar, the argument that they need to be in session to handle their own powers and status enhanced in order to check the overreaching power of the executive branch.

Governor Dempsey has been around long enough to remember that they return year upon year with regard to the state's strength of the two government branches had already been, until just lately, concerned with the supposed need for strengthening the Connecticut Governor, supposedly one of the weakest in the country, in relation to the Legislature, supposedly one of the strongest.

It is a decade ago, in fact, some of the same reformers who are now shouting slogans to ride herd on the Governor were concerned with what they then saw as the need to give the Governor enough power so the reformer's hand would be on the reins of the legislative branch. Reformers, it is said, had the power to over-ride and under-cut the state into its present predicament.

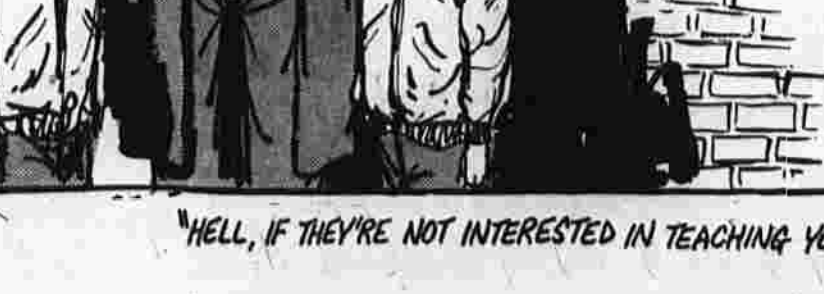

What Should She Defrost For Supper?

It was seven in the morning and I was eating breakfast when my wife asked me a question which made me choke over my soft-boiled egg.

If there's anything a man can't care less about when he's eating breakfast, it's what he's going to eat for supper.

It's especially true in stormy weather, when he's got to shove his car into the garage, back his car into the street, through the barrier left by the snow-plow, fight the traffic and the slippery conditions, and wonder whether he's even going to get home that night.

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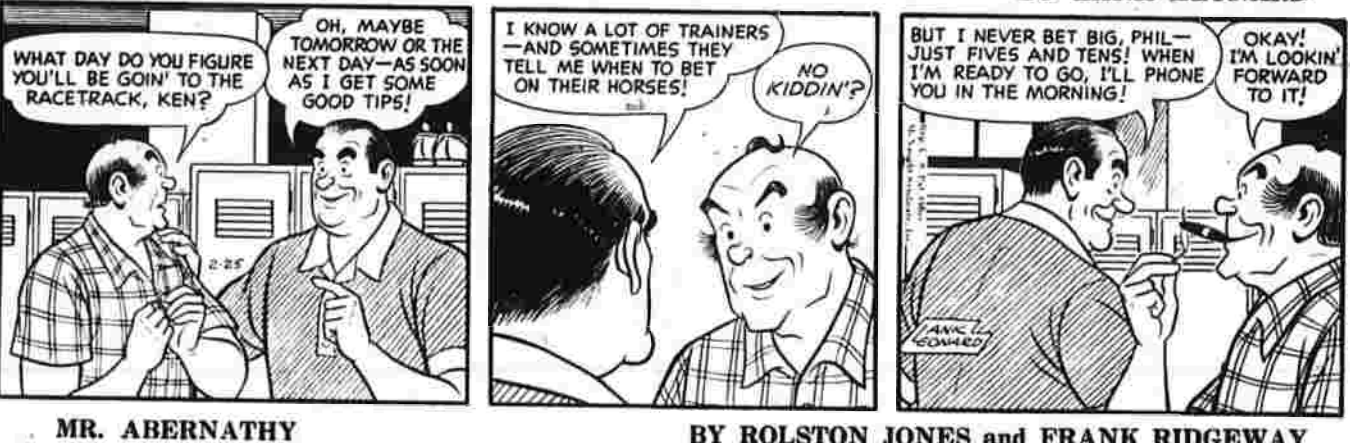
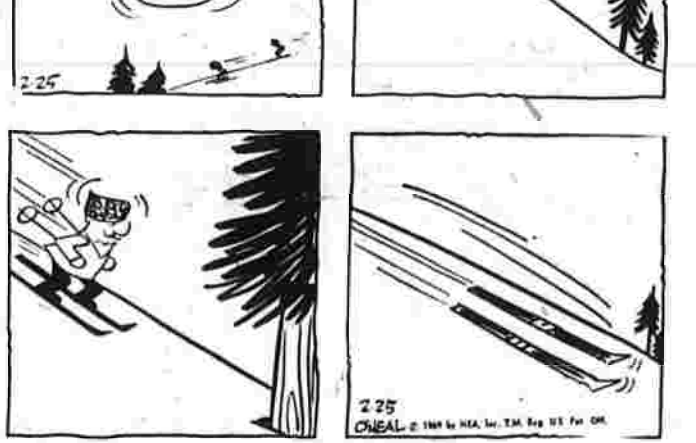
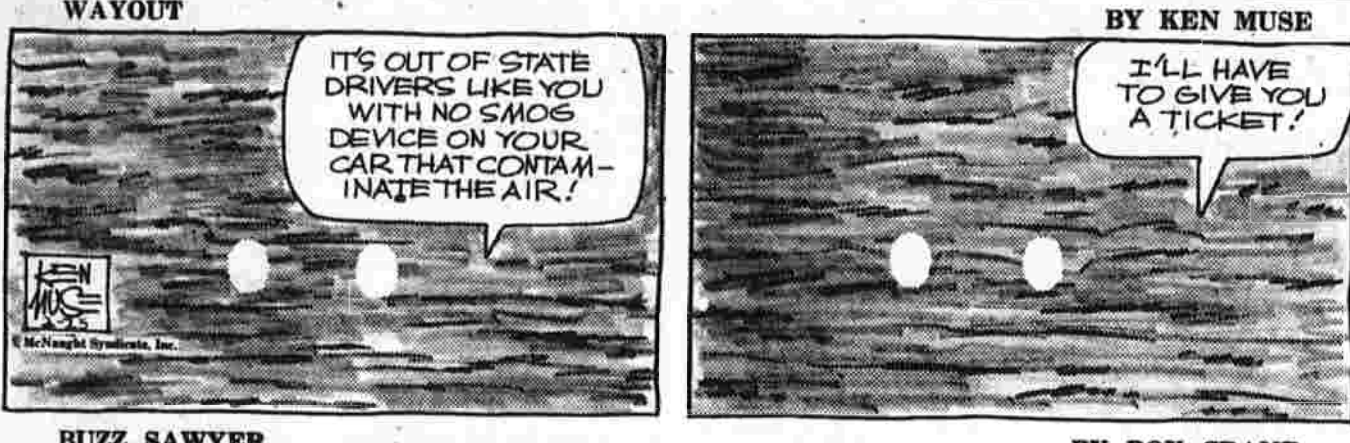
