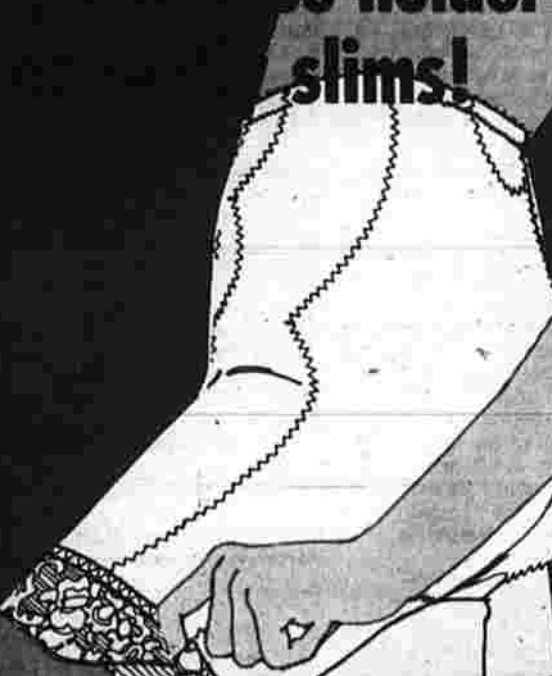

One Real Chance in Near East

Every new shot that is fired, every new terrorist bomb that is exploded, every exchange of artillery shells, every retaliatory bombing or strafing that takes place in the Near East has one effect which dramatically increases the need for outside action.

Each of these acts of conflict intensifies the emotional, instinctive commitment of both sides in the Near East to bigger battles. And it is the kind of emotional instinctive commitment which does not pause to reason whether or not it can win. It has to do what it has to do, win or lose.

These acts of conflict take place in a setting which is itself a masterpiece of tactlessness: the desperation impels toward full commitment on both sides. The restraint which is the only restraint is the restraint of the Arab leadership.

To have the people of Israel, on one hand, determined that they will have to fight eventually and then determine to fight now, and to have the Arab peoples, on the other hand, finally begin to feel that they too must fight even when they expect to lose — this present impasse, for both sides and for everybody, conceivably, most probably, Israel now possesses the capacity to score new military victories in the conventional sense.

All this is analysis and forecast of how it is and how it is likely to be in the Near East, if the belligerents there are left to themselves, and to their own respective sense of their own necessities. The line that divides the two sides is that of two acropoles in the same bottle.

What this means is that, even for their own survival, somebody has to step between them, put stinger-proof barriers up between them, in locations which will be considered both fair and practical, for as long a time as it takes the two enemies to develop some instinct to live peacefully in the relatively small room available to them.

This outside somebody should be the United Nations. It will be difficult enough getting the United Nations the power to act as someone must act in the Near East, and getting both sides to accept its jurisdiction and its decisions. But any other kind of outside intervention, such as some four power dictate, would be totally inane.

Now the 23 judges are threatening to go on strike, on March 22, unless somebody finds some way of paying them before that.

It is, we suppose, something in their favor that the judges do know what they would be striking for, and that their case seems to be completely reasonable. No one can, or should, expect judges to serve just for their titles and their love of the law.

Bill, we hope the judge retract even their threat. There needs to be somebody, somewhere, who will refrain from trying to fight battles of personal or group interest by trying to struggle public function which is for the general interest and welfare.

And, pragmatically speaking, if we do really want law to forbid strikes by public employees, we will need judges to enforce it.

The Bar and Mr. Garrison

We're happy to note that a committee of the American Bar Association has recommended that the Louisiana Bar investigate the conduct of New Orleans District Attorney Jim Garrison. It will be interesting to see if disciplinary action does result. It is, among other things, an excellent test of the bar's asserted ability to police pre-trial publicity.

Mr. Garrison has now had his day in court, and the jury made short work of the case that businessman Clay Shaw conspired in the assassination of President Kennedy. The upshot, indeed, has been to vindicate his opponent. The Warren report has never looked better; this long and well-financed investigation of its findings turned up nothing new.

Also vindicated are such national news media as the late Saturday Evening Post, Newsweek and the National Broadcasting Co., which early in the game pegged Mr. Garrison's case as suspect at best.

So it is with no little irony that we remember the typical picture of the press pointed to the extent of pre-trial publicity. The press, it was argued, was an intruder in the judicial process, creating a vindictive atmosphere likely to convict the unjustly accused.

In the Garrison episode, the truth seems more nearly the opposite. Any vindictive atmosphere of the public atmosphere came from an official of the courts who indicted an innocent man for committing a crime. The most notorious murderer of our time, then, was publicly rebuffed in public support of the conspiracy. And who spoke out against him? What he called the media.

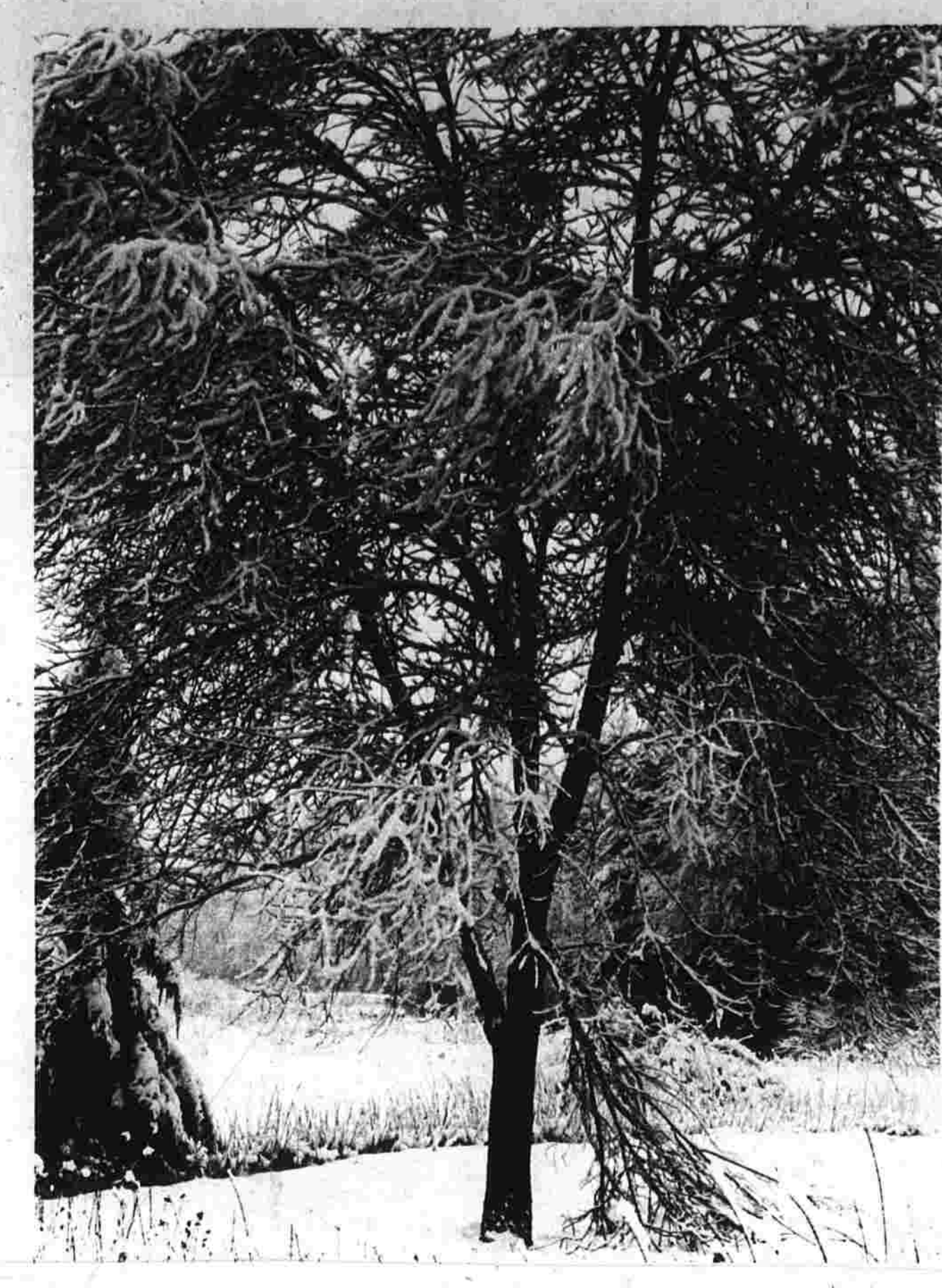
The more sophisticated students of pre-trial publicity, like the ABA's Research committee that recommended that restrictions on release of news, did realize that the problem was not the news but the officials. And who it is "the bar putting its own house in order."

Disabling Mr. Garrison would be an obvious step in that direction, but such an action is far from certain. A spokesman for the Louisiana Bar Association said it will consider the ABA suggestion, but added that the state association has no power to move directly against Mr. Garrison. Even if an investigation and discipline do result, for that matter, they will come rather late in the day.

While Mr. Garrison was republishing his various conspiracy theories, the bar had every right to say what they thought. But a spokesman for the Research committee said that a spokesman for the Research committee, but was unwilling to be quoted about them. Very little in the legal maneuvering, moreover, suggested that the bar and bench had much ability to put their own house in order.

In April of 1967, the trial judge, following the terms of the Research report, ordered all participants not to talk about the case. But in May, Mr. Garrison was indicted. Mr. Garrison went to jail for all his sins. Mr. Garrison would also lose its effect. Change of venue was denied. In September, Mr. Garrison again elaborated his theories in an interview with Playboy magazine.

In another notorious case, meanwhile, the attorney defending James Earl Ray in the murder of Dr. Martin Luther King was offered contempt on the grounds of improper publicity. The offense was that one of his investigators complained to the press about the conditions of Ray's imprisonment, a matter obviously irrelevant to guilt or innocence.

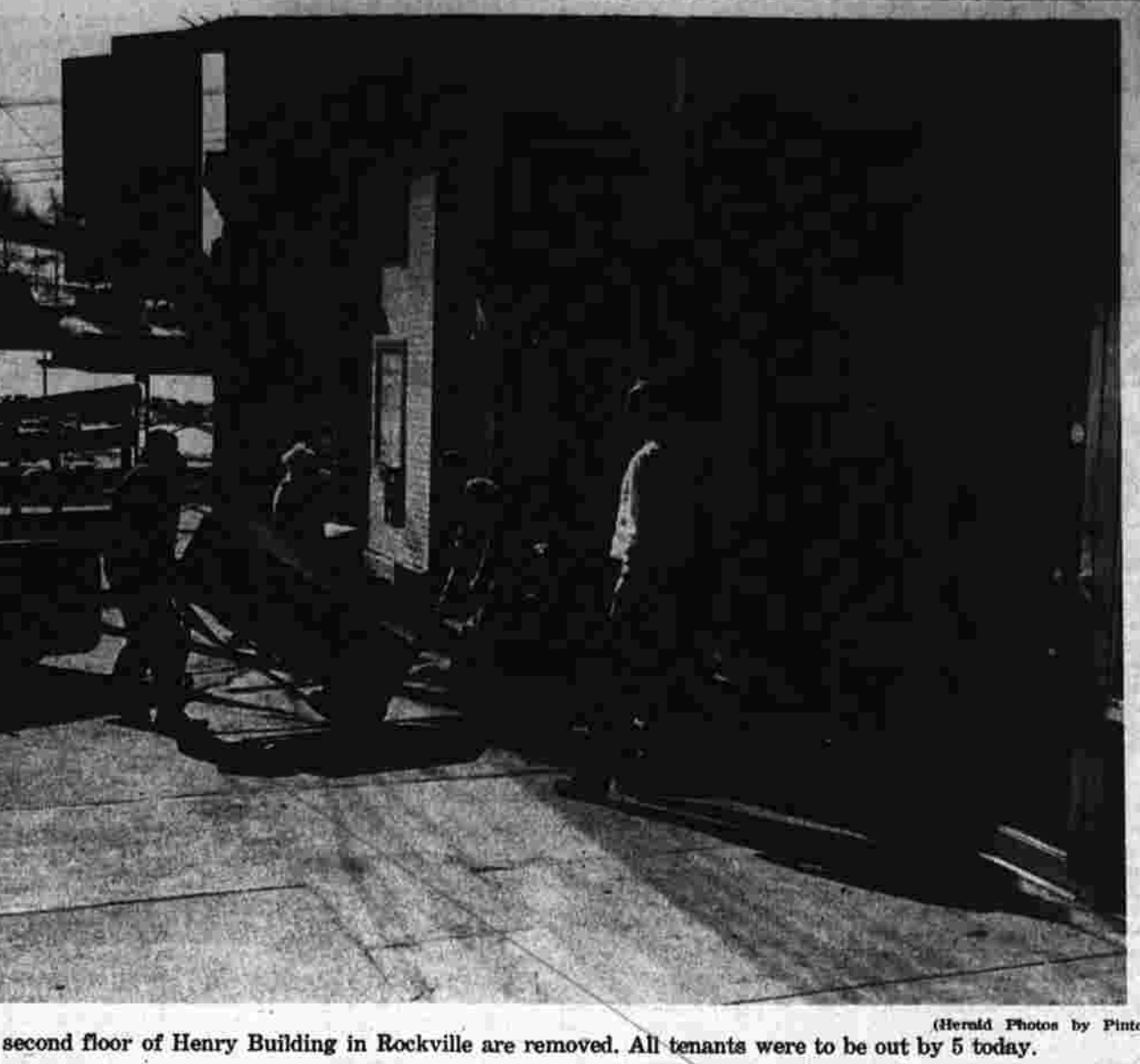

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Files from offices on second floor of Henry Building in Rockville are removed. All tenants were to be out by 6 today.

Meanwhile, a more comprehensive report was ordered on the building's condition and it was this report that was presented to Mayor John Grant yesterday and prompted the calling of the emergency meeting.

According to Dawson, the last and closest inspection convinced the engineers that the building is in an even more precarious state than previously thought. The order to vacate immediately and to protect the sidewalk on the Park Street side of the building was issued. Protective shoring had already been constructed along the Park Place side and about 100 loose bricks, part of the 80-year old building's facade, were removed by a large crane. Last week, Dowling, Moriarty and Rau, insurance firm, will move to the Palmer Building on Union St. The law firm of King and Caldwell will move to Tolland Ave.

Board members, asked to decide last night as to whether the tenants would be told the building would be razed or repaired, decided this was a decision they could not easily make without more study.

It was finally decided to make it permanent after representative Thomas Wolff said, "I don't visualize them moving out only temporarily for that long. We should tell the tenants that the building has been abandoned and that they should move out immediately." The 27-page engineering report was read to the board in part by Mayor Grant. It noted that the building had been scrutinized carefully from the viewpoint of structural stability and conformance to local codes and ordinances.

The report referred to the fact that the first two floors had been heavily used by their construction and that the top two floors, occupied by the old opera house, had been used very little in the last two-thirds of its existence.

"The building has not been maintained well, particularly the upper portion, within recent years," the report stated. "A history of neglect regarding the structural stability of the building has been recorded," it noted.

In a section of the report dealing with the history of the building, it was stated that in 1951 an engineering report made by A. John Macchi recommended various repairs which apparently were not fully carried out. It added that in 1960 the town's standing engineer, Richard Lombardi was authorized to make a survey of the building. This survey was never made, it said.
