

the care of the National Architect, and Nixon is known to feel that he should find a permanent home for them soon.

On the trip from Washington, Nixon stopped in Independence, Mo., to visit former President Harry S. Truman. Nixon presented to the Truman Library the grand piano which was in the White House during the Truman presidency. Nixon then sat down at the piano and played "The Missouri Waltz."

After a handshake, they parted. Nixon said later they discussed East-West relations, Nixon's recent trip to Europe and his decision to go ahead with a modified antiballistic missile system. "He was up on everything," Nixon said.

Nixon's first stop in California was the Pt. Mugu Naval Air Station where he greeted a Seabee battalion that had flown in from South Vietnam 90 minutes earlier.

After thanking the men for their service, Nixon said everything in his administration "will assume our responsibility to do everything that we can to bring the war in Vietnam to an honorable conclusion."

He defined that as "the kind of conclusion that we can have a better chance to live in a peaceful world, not to have another war, so that your sons will not be fighting at another period in another war in the future."

From there he flew by helicopter to inspect cleanup efforts on all blackened beaches at Santa Barbara.

While a crowd several hundred yards away chanted "Get oil out," Nixon told local officials he felt "this problem is bigger than just Santa Barbara. We need more effective control to protect our beaches and natural resources."

He said he believes this is what his administration is trying to do.

Hearing Set Thursday On Nurses Vote Challenge

A hearing has been set for March 27 at the Connecticut State Board of Labor Relations in Wethersfield to consider objections and challenges to the nurses election held Feb. 20 at Manchester Memorial Hospital.

The election was to decide whether staff nurses would be represented by the Connecticut Nurses Association (CNA) in collective bargaining sessions with the hospital, but so many votes were challenged by both sides that the election proved inconclusive.

To be considered at the hearing are the ballots challenged by John Gaspic, the moderator of the election and an agent of the Labor department, and the objections to the election filed with the labor department by the hospital and the CNA.

The hospital attorney, E. Terry Durant of the firm of Cummings and Lockwood, in Bridgeport, objected to the election on several grounds.

Durant's objection charges that a representative from the CNA "walked into the very room where the nurses were casting their ballots."

Durant also charged that the nurses and the CNA held an illegal meeting less than 24 hours before the election where they campaigned for the CNA.

Durant also said representa-

tives of the CNA or of Local Unit 26 circulated a false rumor among the nurses that put the hospital in a bad light. Durant said the allegations were made too late for the hospital to refute them.

The objections also criticized the "hypertechanical reasons for the voiding of some ballots. Durant said the Labor Department should have provided written instructions on the ballots informing the nurses exactly how important it was to properly mark their ballots.

Because these instructions were not provided, Durant contends that the entire election should be voided.

The relevant passage in his objection reads, "It is obvious that where 10 or more ballots are declared void out of 116, the voters were not properly instructed either orally or in writing as to the procedures with which they should mark their ballot, thereby rendering the entire election void."

M. Peter Barry, the CNA attorney, in a one page objection, said the CNA objects to the election because certain ballots found void are in fact valid and should be counted, and ballots counted against CNA found to be valid, may in fact be void; therefore, the CNA asks that the Board make a determination with respect to all the ballot cast, and to rule on the challenged ballots or votes. The hearing is slated to begin at 2 p.m.

Stoner grew up on a Welker County, Ga., farm just outside Chattanooga, Tenn. Since boyhood he had been involved in Ku Klux Klan.

At 16, Stoner was an organizer and an officer of a Chattanooga Klan and was once shown as the klan leader of Tennessee. He has called himself imperial wizard of the Christian Knights of the Klan and published a Klan newspaper in Louisville, Ky. and Atlanta.

In 1922, Stoner announced formation of the Christian Anti-Jewish party and urged deportation of Jews and confiscation of their property for distribution to "Christian Americans." The same year he polled 894 votes as a candidate for Congress in the 3rd Congressional District of Tennessee.

Stoner has been active in litigation involving racial conflicts including representation of Klan elements involved in Montgomery, Ala., litigation over freedom rider outbreaks.

She's Landed Gentry Now

 HOLLYWOOD — (NEA) — A couple of years ago, Bobbie Gentry was a nobody from nowhere. She had her guitar and her songs and her talent and she made a living, but she was stuck out there in darkest oblivion. Then, in the summer of '67, she made a record called "Ode to Billie Joe" and the lightning struck. One record, but it was enough.

Bobbie Gentry revisited. Today, she's an international star. She just moved into a house with 6,000 square feet of living space, with "26 or 27 rooms," with so many rooms that she even uses one just for the telephone.

Today, she's writing songs with the famed classical pianist, Byron Janis. He always wanted to try writing pop songs, but it wasn't until he met Bobbie that he felt he had found anyone he wanted to collaborate with.

Today, she's gone glamorous, slimmed down a little, dyed her

jet black hair a dark auburn, combed it in a fetching upsweep. Today, she is featured on top television shows — like "The Spring Thing" special on NBC on April 28 — and she flies to London for HBC specials built around her. She plays top clubs and could do movies if she wanted to.

All this on one record, basically. But she proved to the public and the producers that she wasn't just a one-record freak. There have been many of these; kids who have a big hit and then fall on their pretty faces when they try to follow it up.

Bobbie is still standing tall. She hasn't had a hit the size of "Ode to Billie Joe" but, then, nobody else has, either. That one is still selling; she says it is now in its fourth million.

Bobbie was able to keep moving because she had several things going for her. To begin with, she's beautiful — not just run-of-the-mill beautiful, but a girl with a unique face and charm to go with it. More

than that, though, she had enough years of work so that she was able to get up there on a stage or in front of a camera and perform professionally.

"I know," she says, "that many one-shot singers have problems. But I could do something else — I could write."

Writing songs was her first big love. All her tunes are her own compositions. She poured her first big windfall from "Billie Joe" into taping equipment, not clothes or cars.

In fact, she doesn't consider herself an extravagant sort. Even her big new house — "I'm landed Gentry now," she says — is not, in her own eyes, an extravagance. The 26 or 27 rooms, she says, are not going to waste.

"It's like having a bed," she says. "If you have to you can sleep on a twin bed. But if you've got a king-sized bed, you find yourself sprawling out and using every inch of it."

"I don't know if this is sparking it or what. But in two or three months you're going to see these monster commercials."

Slipping into an Inner Sanctum voice, he said, "Welcome to the Ford torture test. We'll take your car and put it through all kinds of torture—you know, things like that. Another company is building a whole food product around monsters."

"It seemed like I do at least one a day," Swift said. "Listen, you have no idea how funny it is. You'd think everybody is tapping everybody else's telephone lines."

"There are three advertising agencies after this one account. One's got it and is trying to hang onto it and two others are trying to get it away from them. By coincidence I did the presentation commercials for all three — and, can you believe it, all three came up with virtually the same kind of monster approach."

He laughed. "The thing I'm afraid of is they're going to

NEW YORK (NEA) — David Victor has a good record as a TV producer ("Dr. Kildare," "The Man From U.N.C.L.E.," the Robert Stack segments of "The Name of the Game"), so when he talks about a new series he is producing, it's worth listening.

Victor is the producer of "Marcus Welby M.D.," which will be on ABC-TV next season, but which will also be

It was easy to convince Young to come out of semi-retirement, says Victor. "He loved our script." The other regulars in the series will be James Brolin (a bright young talent) as a young doctor who faces Young across a Generation Gap, and Penny Santon, Young's Mexican-American secretary.

"That makes 2 1/2 medical series on TV," Victor says. "But the others are bound by hospitals. In mine the doctor is a general practitioner. Kildare was very successful, but there were limitations since he was first an intern specializing in

"The only series I ever remember which dealt with a family physician was Dr. Christian with Jean Hersholt," says Victor. "But our doctor will not be perfect. He has feet of clay and he will never forget to send a bill."

Playless Actor Salutes B'Way

NEW YORK (NEA)—Richard Kiley, one of our best actors, an extremely fine singer and a name of some status in the industry, is embarrassed by his forthcoming appearance, set for Wednesday on the Kraft Music Hall.

The NBC-TV program is a salute to Broadway and people like Jerry Orbach of "Promises, Promises," Herschel Bernardi of "George M" will be on, along with Kiley recreating some of his brilliant performance in "Man of La Mancha."

"But I really shouldn't be on the show," he says. "Everyone on is in a play now but me."

A helpful press agent suggested that "George M" would be closed by the time the series airs and maybe that would make Kiley feel better.

"No, it doesn't," he said, smiling. "Man of La Mancha" is still running and I'm not in it."

It's typical of Kiley that he would be worried about such a matter. He's an actor of integrity, one who has not sold out.

It's also typical that he has been approached to make records albums, but has never agreed (except of course, for original cast albums of the musicals he has been in).

"It's because I think as an actor and not as a singer," Kiley admits to having a proprietary interest in "Man of La Mancha" and wryly says, "I could be pressured into doing the movie version."

So far it seems everyone in Hollywood but he has been suggested for the role, with the names of Richard Burton and Elizabeth Taylor prominently mentioned for Don Quixote and Dulcinea.

"But she can't sing and Marilyn Nixon would have to dub for her. She would probably have to dub for him, too, because he can't sing 'The Impossible Dream.'"
