**CAREFUL REASONING** SHOWS BEST DEFENSE

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD

Sometimes it's hard to tell whether you or your partner is responsible for a mistake that allows an opponent to make his contract. Most rubber bridge players are irritated by such discussions but top-flight tournament players sometimes spend hours searching for the answer to such a question. Today's hand, played in the Vanderbilt Cup contest last month, provided the players and kibitzers with a difficult problem of this kind.

Both sides vulnerable. Opening lead — six of diamonds. West led the six of diamonds, an unlucky choice. South won with the nine of diamonds and lost a diamond with the queen of hearts. East returned the seven of spades, and South played the ace.

West thought for several

seconds and then played the eight of spades. South led a diamond to dummy and returned a club. East could have defeated the contract by taking the ace of clubs and leading another spade, but East actually played low and South ran his nine tricks before anybody could change his mind.

Players and kibitzers agreed that East made a mistake in playing the low club. Some thought that West could have made the right play simpler by taking the queen of spades and then returning a low spade.

Repeated Play

West said he had thought about his play but had rejected it. If West took the queen of spades and returned a low spade, dummy's nine would win. Then East might fear that South had started with A-J-K instead of K-J-x of spades.

Since it was clear that South did not have A-K-Q-J of spades, East knew that West could win the first spade trick. West would surely take the first trick if his

### South Windsor Voting District Changes To Get Hearing April 21

The residents will get a chance to comment on the proposed changes in the voting districts of South Windsor at a public hearing April 21, at 7:30 p.m. in the Town Hall.

The plan will divide the number of districts from two to four, and will mean that many voters will be casting their ballots at different polling places in the future.

The boundaries of the proposed districts are as follows: District One, roughly the southeast corner of town, the town line on the south, the Governor's Highway and Ellington Rd. on the north, and Buckton Rd. on the east.

District Two, roughly the northeast corner of town, Governor's Hwy. and Ellington Rd. on the south, the Connecticut River on the west, the town line on the north, and a line formed by Griffin Rd., Graham Rd. and Sullivan Ave. on the east.

District Three, roughly a central corridor running from south-east corner of town, a line formed by Griffin Rd., Graham Rd., Sullivan Ave. and Buckland Rd. on the west, the town line on the south and the north, and a line running from the town line up Oakland Rd., Foster St., Bealston Rd., Ellington Rd. and Dart Hill Rd. on the east.

District Four, roughly the southeast corner of town, bounded on the south and east by the town line, and on the west and north by a line running from the town line up Oakland Rd., Foster St., Bealston Rd., Ellington Rd. and Dart Hill Rd. on the east.

District Five, roughly the southeast corner of town, bounded on the south and east by the town line, and on the west and north by a line running from the town line up Oakland Rd., Foster St., Bealston Rd., Ellington Rd. and Dart Hill Rd. on the east.

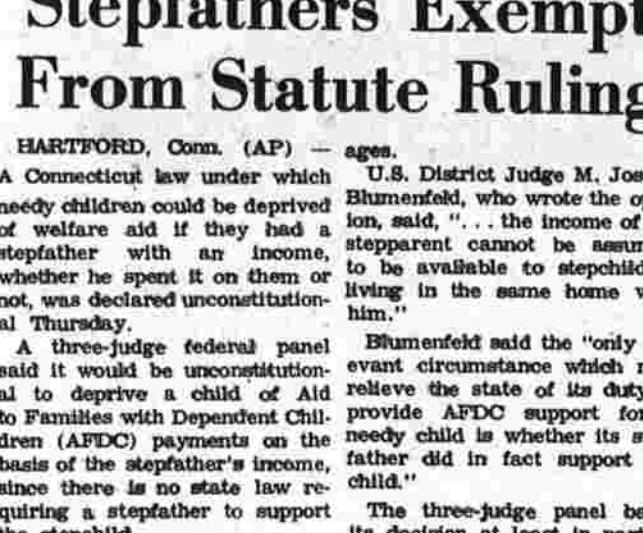

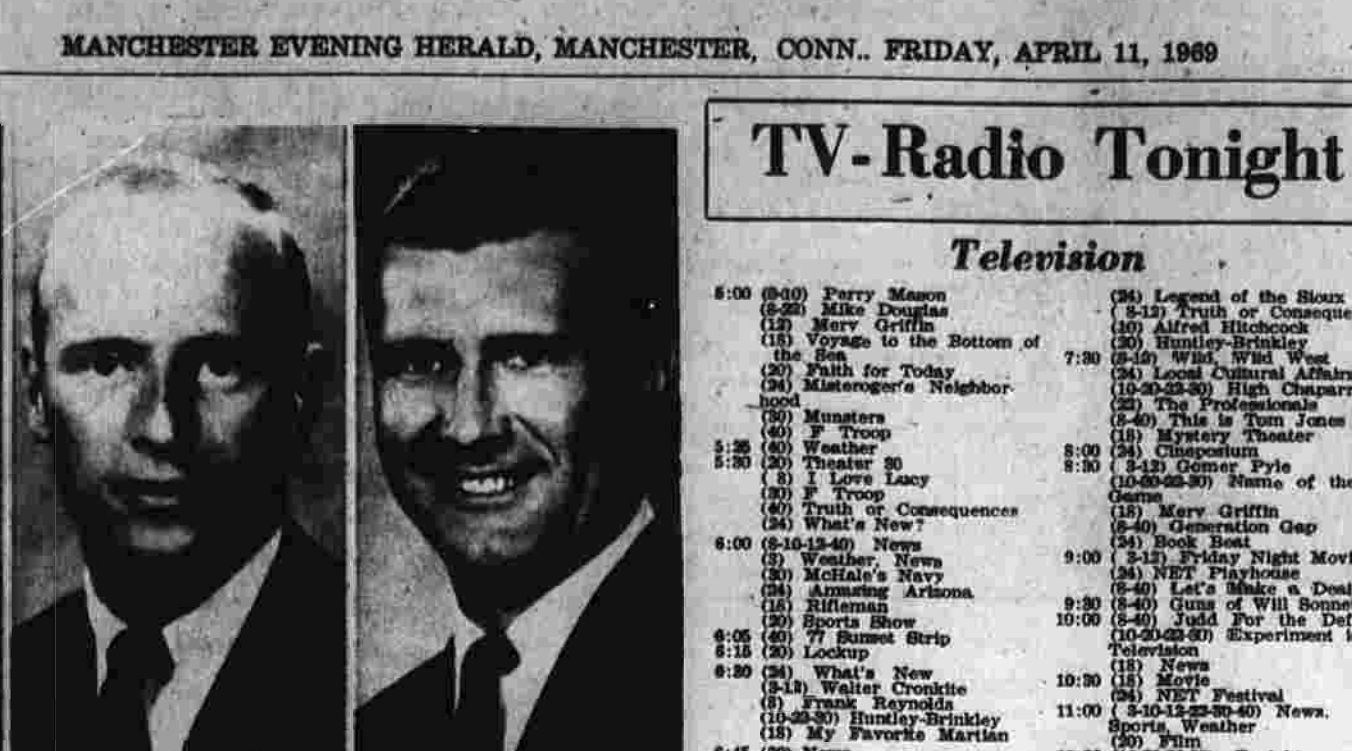

Kilties Plan Anniversary Concert

A Hartford man, Frank J. O'Leary, was promoted by tomorrow's 50th Anniversary Concert of the Manchester Pipe Band to write the following brief version of the origin and history of the bagpipe. The concert will be at Ball's auditorium of Manchester High School starting at 8 p.m.

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Sees Victims Unearthed. Militiaman, 26, Describes His Escape in Tet Offensive. DIEN BAI, Vietnam (AP)—The militiaman stood watching workers dig up victims of the Tet offensive. "When I could not breathe any more, I hid under the brush. I heard the shooting and the cries. They had murdered the other prisoners." Officials say the job of excavating all of the mass graves will take at least 30 more days. The scenes of stark horror and tragedy that unfolded day after day east of Hue remind senior American officials of the mass murders revealed in Europe at the end of World War II. "The Viet Cong murdered the people of Hue in the same cold blood as Nazi concentration camp guards drove their victims into gas chambers," one general officer said, starting into a 70-year long execution trench. The mass graves of Dien Bai are in what allied officials say is now a pacified area. After years of Viet Cong control and terror over this region, allied troops drove the enemy off into the mountains to the west. At dawn, old women and children, carrying baskets of fruit and fresh vegetables swinging from poles, now walk to the Hue markets along the same narrow dirt roads over which the victims of the massacres stumbled to their deaths. Each morning a truck convoy carrying workers to recover and identify the dead rolls past the same green paddies and pagodas that the prisoners saw on their death march more than a year ago. "The Viet Cong murdered the people of Hue in the same cold blood as Nazi concentration camp guards drove their victims into gas chambers," one general officer said, starting into a 70-year long execution trench. The mass graves of Dien Bai are in what allied officials say is now a pacified area. After years of Viet Cong control and terror over this region, allied troops drove the enemy off into the mountains to the west. 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### Did Record Snows Build First New England Glacier?

MOUNT WASHINGTON, N.H. (AP) — Did the record snowfall of last winter give birth to New England's first glacier?

It is estimated to be at least 100 to 200 feet deep in spectacular Tuckerman Ravine, high on the side of this highest peak in the northeast.

The threat of avalanches is ever until more snow falls. The first signs advanced the high slopes above timberline this week.

There is no old low anywhere on this 6338-foot high ice cube and where need to gendarmes and chair lifts find themselves puffing every step of the 3 1/2 mile hike from Pinkham Notch in the Valley.

"There has never been another winter like this one," says Joe Dodge, veteran Appalachian Mountain Club hutmaster now retired.

"Over 45 feet was recorded by the Summit Observatory and we will probably have a few more snow storms," says Dodge who has compiled weather records on the mountain for nearly a half century.

The biggest previous snowfall was 37 feet in 1878-9.

The snow blows off the slopes above timberline and piles up in the ravine.

Geologists call Tuckerman Ravine a glacial cirque and say it was gouged out of the side of the mountain by ice 400 glaciers thousands of years ago.

Weather experts say even a slight drop in the annual average temperature of 37 degrees might cause a carry-over of snow through the summer and formation of a glacier.

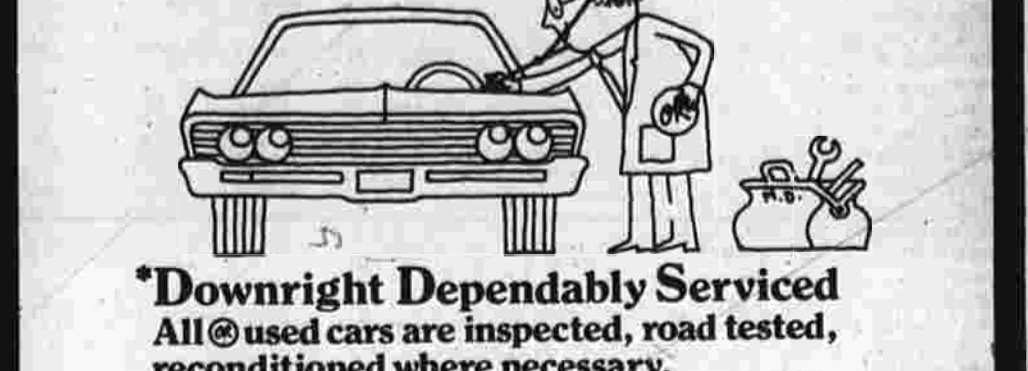

An advance warning light will be placed at the intersection of Rt. 50 and 84. An ordinary traffic light at the intersection of Rt. 50 and 104.

Several other locations will be the subject of studies to be made by the highway department.

The intersection of Rts. 74 and 80 at Windsorville Rd. is given high priority by the state according to Houley. A study on traffic signals for the intersection and a "geometric reworking" of the area were suggested as possibilities. This would involve minor construction suggestions.

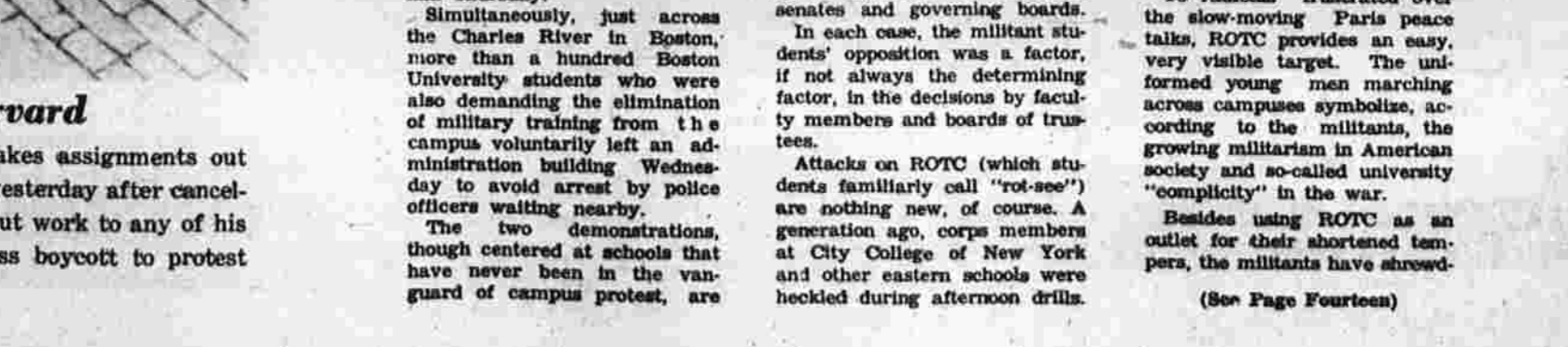
