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U.S. Flights Being Resumed Off Korea

Protests Feared In Dubcek Ouster

PRAGUE (AP)—Police and soldiers guarded strategic points in Czechoslovakia today against possible disturbances in protest of the replacement of Alexander Dubcek as Communist party chief by a pro-Moscow Slovak.

The nation learned officially for the first time that another of the leading reformers also had been ousted from top leadership role. The official news agency CTK reported that Josef Hurty had been dropped from the eight-man executive committee of the Communist party, and that the Presidium had been cut from 21 to 11 members.

Dubcek remained in the Presidium, the ruling body of the party. Two new members were added, trade union leader Jiri Polacek and Parliament President Petr Pobenka, both regarded as reformers in the Dubcek tradition.

The names CTK listed on the new Presidium were identical to those reported Thursday night by the Bulgarian News Agency. But this was the first official word of the changes to reach the Czechoslovak press through their nation's own media.

The 190-member Central Committee of the Communist party at a crisis meeting Thursday named Gustav Husak, 57, as head of the Slovak Communist party, taking over the party leadership from Dubcek, who held it since January 1968.

Troubled by police reinforcements and army armored cars were outside university buildings at the National Assembly, near student dormitories and at factories.

No plans for demonstrations were reported. Moscow was said to have warned the Soviet occupation troops would intervene if local forces could not keep order.

Prague airport reported no normal traffic today after closing to commercial planes Thursday night. Airport employees said Russian officers had appeared at the control tower. Students and young workers were reported planning meetings to determine future steps. They would react to the leadership change. Although Dubcek, 47, lost much of his widely enthusiastic following as he was forced to make concession after concession in the weeks of the Soviet invasion last August, Husak is generally disliked and distrusted by freedom-minded trade unionists and students.

Nixon Vows Planes Will Be Protected

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Nixon ordered today protection against armed attack of U.S. intelligence plane flights near the coast of North Korea which he said were being resumed after a brief suspension.

Nixon told a news conference the unarmed plane which North Korea jets shot down Tuesday with an evident loss of 21 American airmen was 80 miles from the United States coast at the time. He said it was flying away from North Korea territory because its mission had been aborted.

He said he had ordered the flights continue and "they will be protected," and declared at a later point: "When planes of the United States and ships of the United States are in international airspace or in international waters, they are not fair game. They will not be in the future."

After Nixon reported the shooting down of the American plane, he said: "I have today ordered that these flights be continued. I believe such flights should be a statement of the United States' position on this matter."

Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield applauded Nixon's decision to provide protection but said he did not believe such flights should be a statement of the United States' position on this matter.

The Columbia group voluntarily left Philosophy Hall late Thursday after being served with a restraining order. The students emerged chanting, "This is just the start. We will win."

Another general meeting of the student body was called today to consider whether to continue the strike which began last Friday. An informal poll of nearly 2,000 students Thursday showed 75 per cent favored a return to class.

In Miami, a homemade-bomb explosion blew in the door and shattered windows of the dean of a Negro woman's cooperative house at Cornell University. Payroll Tax Criticized by Businessmen

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—A suggested state tax levied on the payrolls of employers was severely criticized Thursday by members of the business community.

The suggestion, or trial balloon as some Republicans called it, was raised Wednesday by Senate Majority Leader Edward Marous, who said it would allow the governor to dispense with some of his most unpopular tax proposals.

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Cho Bung in Mekong Delta Hamlet Gets Nightly Signal, State of Siege Is Resumed

CHO BUNG, Vietnam (AP) — Just after dusk every evening a rubber-encased missileman climbs the bullet-riddled brick tower guarding this Mekong Delta hamlet. He fires two shots that sound over the paddies and along the narrow Tam Hiep River. They signal the resumption of the nightly state of siege that Cho Bung has endured through years of war.

From the moment the two shots ring from the 20-foot tower, the surrounding countryside of paddies, rice patches and canals becomes enemy territory. Except for the military radio in the militia's mud fort, Cho Bung is cut off from the world.

The only outsiders working in the hamlet—five teachers—depart by motor scooter each afternoon. They travel 10 miles to the provincial capital of My Tho rather than fly overnight in Cho Bung.

The villagers accept stoically the state of affairs. Their own emotionally rooted attachment to the land keeps them in Cho Bung.

Mostly they were dabbled in an open area and admitted "worried mothers to keep treatments going. Aspirin was doled out. In the older folks, it was pretty rudimentary, but there were no complaints in Cho Bung.

By nightfall, perhaps 500 people, mostly kids but quite a few adults, were gathered for the movie. They saw one outfit propaganda film attacking the Viet Cong, a short Vietnamese comedy, and a travel film about Thailand. The travel film about Thailand is always popular, the Americans report, and they still can't figure out why.

After the movie the hamlet chief was brought in to officiate at the raffle. Numbers were printed on the leaflets outlining the fire, but none of the teams has won by a 10-year-old boy whose mother promptly expressed her protest.

By 10 it was all over and Cho Bung's residents went sleepily to their homes. The Americans rolled out their ponchos to sleep on the ground in the market place. Two South Vietnamese militia men brought out guitars and began wrapping songs with Spec. 4 Robert Breeze, 20, Joliet, Ill., who had brought his guitar to help entertain the hamlet's kids earlier in the day. As one GI stretched out on his poncho and placed his head on his helmet, a little Vietnamese girl emerged from a nearby house and gave him a regular pillow of duck feathers.

Indirectly, that was one of the reasons that brought Meiklin and his GIs to Cho Bung—to give the villagers more confidence and at least in some measure to take the night away from the Viet Cong.

Such visits by small teams called Medevac—have long been carried out by U.S. forces in the daylight. The U.S. 8th Infantry Division, however, decided they would be doubly effective if the troops stayed all night, depending mainly on the Vietnamese militia forces for security.

"Every battalion, in the division now does at least one 'nightcap' each week," reports the division civil affairs officer, Maj. Bernie Loeffler, an air-borne soldier who often goes out with them. They have been frequently bothered by harassing simple health risks. The hen-yet lost a man.

In Cho Bung, the operation went off like a village fair. Two Army medics—Sgt. Jack Bergman, 22, Kingston, N.Y., and S. Sgt. Ralph Robles, 28, Hayward, Calif.—were immedi-

ately surrounded by an unending swarm of kids with cuts, sores and the myriad skin diseases abounding in the delta.

"Three people need help and somebody has to do it," said Robles, who has spent three years in Vietnam.

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By 5 a.m. the market began to fill with old women bringing in vegetables, fruit and fish. The soldiers rolled their ponchos and set at the little market stalls, drinking thick black coffee along with the sweetened condensed cream the South Vietnamese love.

About an hour after sunlight, two more shots rang from the guard tower—the signal that patrols had swept the roads just outside the hamlet and found no signs of Viet Cong mines.

The little American convoy rolled out, the GIs waving at the women along the road. Part from the medicines left behind and the cost of manpower and such things, the cash outlay for the night's work had been about \$5—the price of the hen and T-shirts.

A certain type of false card is invented every day by some desperate bridge player when he judges that nothing else will lure declarer away from the winning line of play. You may be the last to invent this play if you are desperate and alert enough—but your task may be easier if you've seen the play in operation.

North dealer.
East-West vulnerable.
Opening lead—eight of spades.
West led the eight of spades, and East topped dummy's king with the ace. East removed dummy's single trump with the ace and then took the ace of clubs. West signaled encouragement with the ten, and East continued with the three of clubs to declarer's king.

South led the queen of hearts to drive out the king and East led another club to the queen. Now West saw that a club continuation would allow South to ruff and draw trumps. South would then obviously make the rest of the trick.

Daily Questions
As dealer, you hold Spades, A-7-2 H-A-R-3 D-10-3 C-A-4-4-3. What do you say?
Answer: Bid one club. If partner responds in a red suit, you can bid one spade. If partner bids one no-trump, you can raise to two or three no-trump. You avoid an opening bid of 1-NT with a very weak doubleton, and it's easy to steer clear of this danger when you have a comfortable rebid of one spade.

The police told them that their first step in dealing with disruptive activities would be to invite the disrupters to meet with him "at some stated place at some stated time" for a discussion of the issues involved.

If the invitation to discussion were spurned by the disrupters, the university would inform them they would be subject to suspension if the disruption did not end in a short, stated period of time.

If the disruption still persisted he would be obliged to use whatever force deemed necessary to restore order, Brewster said. Campus security police resources would be exhausted before any "last resort" request for outside assistance, he said.

The list of demands presented to Brewster by the students included discharging and severing of any and all contractual relations and obligations Yale has with the Defense Department and the Central Intelligence Agency.

The demands also included representation of all segments of the university community on the Yale corporation—the university's governing body.

Two representatives of undergraduates, two from graduate and professional schools, two representatives of the faculty and two from the university's non-academic employees should be on the corporation, the statement said. The letter to Brewster requested a reply by next Wednesday.

The letter was signed by 10 students, who said it was not the work of any specific group such as Students for a Democratic Society, but rather a concerted action by like-minded individuals.

When the group of 10 students was barred from entering the faculty meeting with Brewster, faculty spokesman told the students that their wish to enter the meeting could not be granted "without due notice or under duress."

Some Cases Easy But Many Tedious

Stolen Harp, Circs 1014, Released for Ransom
DUBLIN, Ireland (AP) — The theft of the ancient harp of King Brian Boru from Trinity College Dublin March 28 was reported as a national disaster. Today police, sitting on a tip, found it crumpled in plastic and buried in a mountain quarry near Dublin. Heavily armed men with rifles made off with the harp and its wicker frame, the harp is Ireland's national symbol. Tradition says Brian Boru played it before he was killed in the Battle of Clontarf in 1014, but many believe it dates from the 15th century.

Police said the harp appeared to be slightly damaged. After recovering the relic, detectives raced back to the city to return it to the Trinity College. The harp was found in a quarry near a garage in which a 16-year-old youth who did not admit to being there.

The kid wanted to make a clean breast of everything," according to Det. Sgt. John Krnjak, acting in charge of the department during the recent burglary. A 25-year-old man was then arrested on a 12th Circuit Court warrant, and he and the youth were charged with burglary.

The girl explained her troubles with the men to the detective. They are still facing court action.

"That was a case that involved a lot of leg work," Krnjak said. "It also points out how important a citizen's call can be."

"We need help. We accept all we can get. Without it, our job would be five times as hard," he said.

He tried to describe crime in Manchester.

"It seems to come in periods. A certain two or three or more will start opening like a flood. There'll be breaks of all kinds for months.

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CCD Constitution

The constitution adopted last Saturday by the State Caucus of Connecticut Democrats (CCD) states that the organization will operate within the framework of the Democratic Party, and that it will have two classes of members — regular and associate.

A regular member may be any Democrat registered in the state; any Connecticut resident who is 18 years of age or older, but less than voting age; and any full-time or part-time student in the state, who is at least 16 years of age and is not a resident of the state.

An associate member may be any person over 16 years of age who resides in the state, of any party, or unaffiliated, or not a registered voter.

Associate members have all the rights of regular members, except that they may not vote for candidate endorsement or resignation from CCD office, or officers of the CCD, or members of the Delegate Assembly of the CCD.

Associate members may vote for delegates to the Delegate Assembly. Delegates are chosen on the basis of one for each 100 or less regular and associate members in a chapter, plus an additional delegate for each 50 regular and associate members or fraction thereof.

The constitution provides for the election of a CCD ombudsman in each of the state's six Congressional Districts, to receive recommendations, real individual CCD members.

Any regular or associate member may be a candidate to statewide or national elective office. A provision is included to provide for resignation from CCD office, simultaneously with the announcement that he is seeking elective office.

Any regular or associate member may be a member of any regular, temporary or ad hoc committee or subcommittee of the CCD.

Zinc for Arteries
ROCHESTER, N.Y. — Zinc, which is used to speed the healing of wounds, has been found useful also in treating hardening of the arteries, Dr. Walter J. Davies of the University of Rochester reports. Low zinc levels may be associated with chronic diseases, including lung cancer and cirrhosis, Dr. Davies believes.

Dr. Davies reported that he had found a correlation between zinc levels in the blood and the extent of arteriosclerosis in 100 patients with this disease. The patients with the lowest zinc levels had the most advanced disease.

Drug Spoilage Queried
Nixon Chopping Funds For Disaster Hospitals

By DECK BARNES

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon has moved to cut off funds for rehabilitating the emergency hospitals stored for use in event of a nuclear disaster. But officials raise the possibility that the budget savings will be offset by increased drug spoiling.

The development comes as the Nixon administration pushes for an anti-inflation package to "minimize American casualties in any nuclear assault."

The President slashed the planned spending for emergency health services from the \$75 million recommended by President Johnson to \$2.76 million.

The cut would mean the Public Health Service must suspend its one-third completed program of sorting through 250 million worth of prepackaged drugs, ointments and drugs that have set life for years.

As much as \$5 billion worth of supplies a year have already gone to waste, say officials, through spoilage, rotting or deterioration resulting from neglect since they were purchased beginning in 1963.

Dr. Henry C. Huntley, director of the division of health manpower, said the budget cut would also rule out any updating of the \$100 million national medical stockpile.

"If this holding operation were to continue for any length of time, it would result in some additional deterioration of the items in the medical stockpile," he said in answer to a question.

The Nixon budget would freeze operations at least through June 30, 1969.

Some 1,785 packaged disaster hospitals were acquired by the government's old civil defense organization between 1953 and 1967, and were stored in central depositories.

In 1969 they were turned out to communities for storage. When President Nixon took office, the hospitals were still in the depositories.

It resulted in a program whereby the packaged hospitals — which had been stored by communities in such bizarre places as open fields and chicken coops — would be turned over to community hospitals near or remote nuclear targets.

The community hospitals would agree to rotate drugs to minimize losses, store the equipment so it would not deteriorate, and develop a staffing plan so the packaged hospitals could be used during disasters.

About two-thirds of the packaged hospitals are still unassigned.

The bulk of those which have been assigned to community hospitals were from the sewer hatch and cost about \$7,000 a unit to restore. The older packaged disaster hospitals cost

Ruby Keeler, 60, Revisits Old Studio

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Come stock company, but then she is and meet those dancing feet... a trifle vague about that part of 'On the Avenue' I'm taking you to... her past, Ask her which was her favorite film, and she replies: 'Go, I don't remember. They were all so much alike.'"

Ruby Keeler is 60 this year, but doesn't look it. The figure is classic 1930s musical: "42nd Street." Westport Buying Cokenoe Island

WESTPORT, Conn. (AP) — The purchase of Cokenoe Island for \$250,000 was approved unanimously by Westport's Representative Town Meeting after a stormy three-hour session Thursday night.

Most of the angry debate that preceded the vote was criticism aimed at the town's Planning and Zoning Commission. In a surprise move earlier this week the commission rejected the island purchase idea—citing other spending projects members felt would be more beneficial to the town.

Purchase of the offshore island, 23 acres now owned by United Illuminating Co., has been the subject of a three-year campaign by conservationists and some town officials.

They argued that as long as the utility company owned the island there was a possibility it would eventually become the site of a nuclear generating station—only one mile off the shore.

Because the Planning and Zoning Commission recommended the town not purchase the island, the Representative Town Meeting needed a two-thirds majority to override the commission action.

Four Students at Porter In ASK Program Two Years


Next fall's memorial tree plantings will be in Robertson Park and around the new Bunsen swimming pool in the North End. Further Keene St. School landscaping will be added next year.

Lobbyists at the State Capitol Offer Varying Views on Role

Editor's Note: The halls of the Connecticut State Capitol during a legislative session are often filled with people seeking action, or inaction, on specific bills. The following is an appraisal of how lobbyists and how they work.

What is a lobbyist? That question was asked of several registered lobbyists the other day and an impressive answer quickly developed.

Almost everyone had a different definition, and the answers turned into an argument. It might be more instructive to ask WED is a lobbyist?

Joseph P. Cooney, Hartford lawyer, for one, whose clients include the American Insurance Association, the Connecticut State Medical Society, and the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Hartford.

No one doubts that Joe Cooney is a lobbyist — and one of the best and one of the highest-paid of the bunch.

But what about John M. Bailey, the state and former national Democratic chairman? "I lobby for the administration," Bailey smiled and said when the question was put to him.

And, under Connecticut law, Bailey might be required to register as a lobbyist if he is not paid anything by the Democratic State Central Com-

mission, or by the administration. It is apparent that Bailey does promote or oppose, directly or indirectly, the passage of any legislation as the statute says. But the legal definition of a lobbyist also includes the requirement that he be "retained or employed for compensation."

It may be argued that the function of the editorial writer is simply to comment on events. But surely his employer would not object if an editorial writer were able to successfully "promote or oppose" legislation through his skill as a writer. Indeed, a publisher might well ask his editorial staff to wage a campaign for or against certain types of legislation.

It would seem that a person with an axe to grind — and every one does have an axe to grind — would hardly know whether he was registered or flattered if he were required to register as a lobbyist.

The issue would lie in being grouped with professional "opinion leaders." The statutory time of registration, however, seems to be in being regarded as a real or potential influence on the state's official events in the General Assembly.

The above examples should indicate that there are some

Presumably if a lobbyist knows he is going to be paid whether or not he succeeds, he won't be so diligent in his efforts to get a bill passed. And he won't be tempted to split his fee with a legislator who might hold the key to his success or failure." — Yes, the law does not require that the fees paid to lobbyists be reported until AFTER the legislative session is over.

And who is to know what the arrangement was? It could have been on a contingent fee basis for all the state may know.

The employer of a lobbyist knows after the session is over whether the lobbyist has been effective or not. And there is no way, under the present system, that the state could tell whether the success of the lobbyist determined the size of his fee.

If the lobbyist's employer were required to report the fee BEFORE the session, or at the time of registration, however, the state would be likely to prevent the payment of fees on a contingency basis. (And probably no one would be happier with such a requirement than the lobbyists themselves.)

Cheshire Man Gets 7-15 Years In Girls Death

WATERBURY, Conn. (AP)—James Elburg, 27, of Cheshire, who pleaded guilty to manslaughter in the death last September of a 3-year-old Hamden girl, was sentenced Thursday to 7-15 years in state prison.

Cheshire police found the battered body of Margaret DeBellefano on the pillow table of Elburg's home at 82 Elm Street Sept. 19. She remained unconscious until her death the next day in Waterbury Hospital.

State's Atty. Walter M. Pickett said Mrs. Elburg, a driver of a school bus that transported retarded children, had come interested in Margaret, Vermont.

On the day of the incident, Mrs. Elburg had left the child in her husband's care. The child was found, Pickett said, and Elburg became involved in her. Afterward, Elburg called neighbors, who summoned police.

Elburg had pleaded guilty to the charge of manslaughter in court Feb. 28. He switched his plea to innocent on March 11, and a jury trial was set for last Tuesday. The case was continued to Thursday when Elburg again changed his plea.

QE2 Delivered To Cunard Line Five Months Late

LONDON (AP)—The Queen Elizabeth 2, Britain's ill-starred luxury liner was formally handed over to the Cunard Line today—five months late.

Sir Basil Smallpiece, chairman of the line, pronounced himself satisfied that the ship is ready for service after repairs to her turbines and completion of the interior decorations.

The ship was formally handed over in a ceremony at Cunard's London office, Anthony Happer, chairman of the Upper Clyde Shipbuilders, signed for the vessel's builders.

Simultaneously, Upper Clyde's house flag was lowered from the QE2's mast in Southampton. Up went the Cunard house flag—representing a gold lion rampant, holding a globe between his forepaws.

The vessel was originally scheduled to have been delivered last Nov. 19. This was delayed until Jan. 1, after a shake-down cruise over Christmas. Such a delay is not unusual for British yards. The cruise disclosed the turbine and decoration faults, and the new hand-over date of Jan. 1 was put back until the line was satisfied the ship was seaworthy. Smallpiece estimated the delay cost Cunard \$2.3 million in revenue.

Most of the ship's 1,300 passenger berths are booked for her eight-day preview cruise to the South Atlantic starting next Tuesday. She starts her transatlantic maiden voyage May 2 and is due in New York for the first time May 7.

LAUSANNE, Switzerland (AP)—Funeral rites for ex-Queen Victoria Eugenia of Spain were held here Saturday, with three kings and queens and scores of other members of European royal families attending.

The queen, a granddaughter of Queen Victoria of England, died at her villa last Tuesday at the age of 81.

King Constantine and Queen Mother Frederica of Greece, ex-King Umberto and Ex-Queen Marie-Jose of Italy, and King Khalid and Queen Anna of Romania were among 300 titled mourners in the small 19th century Sacra Coeur church, where the late queen had regularly attended Sunday services since she came here 27 years ago. Bishop Ambrogio Marchionni, papal nuncio in Switzerland, conducted the requiem Mass.

Large crowds, estimated by police at 4,000, assembled at Ouchy and before the church. Among them were more than 1,000 Spanish royals who had come by car and in five special planes from Madrid.

Some of them waved Spanish flags, but obeyed when Swiss policemen asked them to put the flags away.

Eight sons and grandsons of the queen, including Don Juan, pretender to the Spanish throne, carried the matagony casket from the villa to the hearse. The casket was covered with red roses and daffodils, the colors of the Spanish national flag.
