

Price Fix Paves Way For Suits

WASHINGTON (AP)—Some of the nation's largest makers of plumbing fixtures face the possible loss of billions of dollars from damage suits by customers who bought their equipment at what a federal grand jury found were illegally fixed prices.

Nearly every state and numerous cities already have filed suits seeking treble damages against the three firms convicted of criminal price fixing last week and 13 other companies who earlier pleaded no contest to the charges, according to a Justice Department official.

Besides the state and local governments, other major purchasers of plumbing fixtures—building contractors, and even individual homeowners—are expected to file suits, the official added.

Under federal law, those found guilty of criminal violations of antitrust acts are liable, if convicted in subsequent civil suits, for treble damages.

The prospect for the mammoth damage suits Friday when a federal jury in Pittsburgh found the Borg Warner Corp., of Chicago; American Standard Corp., New York; and the Kohler Corp., Kohler, Wis., guilty of illegally raising and pre-setting the price for bathtubs and other bathroom fixtures.

Three officials of the firms also were found guilty.

The Justice Department prosecutor for the case, John C. Fricciano, said "With the guilty verdict, they don't have to prove their case."

The 18 companies and eight officials were accused in federal indictments Oct. 6, 1966 with fixing the prices on all fixtures they sold between September 1962 and 1966.

The government said the total sales amounted to \$1 billion or 98 per cent of the enameled cast iron plumbing fixtures and 80 per cent of the vitreous china plumbing fixtures sold in this country during the period.

The guilty verdict was returned Friday, and U.S. District Court Judge Louis Rosenberg ordered a pre-sentencing investigation before setting penalties.

Rosenberg levied fines totaling \$370,000 and imposed jail terms on four executives—the other got probation—when 12 other companies and five individuals entered no contest pleas last year.

Fricciano, who took part in the investigation leading to the indictments, said the conspiracy began in a Chicago hotel room where the defendants agreed to drop their regular bathtub lines and sell more expensive acid-resistant tubs at inflated, agreed-upon prices.

During a series of subsequent meetings, Fricciano charged, prices of fixtures were "raised, fixed, stabilized and maintained at non-competitive levels."

Fricciano said the case eventually may make the largest previous price-fixing action—the one against General Electric, Westinghouse and 27 other electric equipment manufacturers in 1961-62—seem pale in comparison.

Defying Law Said Anarchy By Marshall

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—The first Negro member of the U.S. Supreme Court says black militants who defy the law should be made to face the consequences.

"Anarchy is anarchy," Justice Thurgood Marshall said Sunday, "and it makes no difference who practices it, it is bad; it is punishable and it should be punished."

Marshall spoke at the centennial celebration of predominant Negro Dillard University.

"You can't use color for an excuse for not doing what you should be doing," he declared.

"Race is not an excuse for not keeping your children in school, even though they may still be segregated."

Marshall said he realized that "so far as race problems and minority rights go, the problems are not yet solved and I have no idea when they will be, but there has been some progress."

"The seeds are here," he added. "But nothing will be settled with guns, firebombs or rocks. The country can't survive if the perpetrators go unpunished. It's that simple."

Urging Negroes to reject black militant leadership, Marshall said:

"We should stand up and say, 'Look, man, you do what you want to do and I'll do what I have to do what you want me to do just because you said it.'"

The associate justice called for leadership through education, and said students demanding black studies and African culture should not discard other studies and cultures.

"You are not going to compete in the world until you have training exactly like everyone else, and, hopefully, better," he said. "Because when you're a Negro, you've got to be better."

NEW YORK (AP)—A black militant interrupted Communion service at Riverside Church Sunday to demand massive reparations for what he said were past injustices to black people.

When James Forman stepped to the altar area of the church, the Rev. Ernest T. Campbell left the altar. The organizer drowned out Forman, but he waited out the hymn and started to read out his demands.

U.S. Silent On Results Of Bombing

SAIGON (AP)—The U.S. Command is withholding reports of damage the B52 bombers are inflicting in their campaign along the Cambodian border, the heaviest of the Vietnam war.

About 800 of the big bombers have rained \$18 million worth of bombs along the frontier in the past two weeks, but there has been no official announcement of any results.

"We have no bomb damage assessment to report," the U.S. briefing officer says each day.

Informants said U.S. forces are constantly assessing the B52 strikes, but information officers for the U.S. Command have been instructed not to discuss damage assessment. The official line is that disclosure of such information would compromise American methods of gathering intelligence.

Some informants are skeptical, however. They said one reason for the official silence is that the U.S. Command fears an unfavorable public reaction to the empty results confirmable in relation to the money spent.

"We found some enemy bodies," said one officer, "at least four or five here and there."

But Gen. Creighton W. Abrams, commander of U.S. forces in Vietnam, and the Strategic Air Command consider the B52s a vital weapon in the war. Officers say the huge bombers harass enemy troops, deny them sanctuaries, keep them on the run and prevent them from getting organized for an offensive.

Flaming Barricades Erected by Students

MADISON, Wis. (AP)—Hundreds of University of Wisconsin students erected flaming street barricades early today in sympathy with hippies whose attempts to hold a block dance were smashed by police using clubs and irritant gas.

The students poured out of dormitories and fraternity houses following two nights of battle between the hippies and the police and surged into the business area, where for several hours they defied efforts to disperse them.

More than 1,000 young persons were involved before scattered disorders subsided. The throngs also included hippies and scores of their fellow student residents of an off-campus neighborhood known as the Mifflin Street hippie haven.

The weekend of disorder resulted in about 90 arrests. Two

Voting Case To Be Heard By Top Court

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court agreed today to review state residency requirements for voting for president.

The action, setting a hearing for next term, follows the court's holding that states cannot set residency requirements for welfare assistance.

The voting case, which covers somewhat the same ground, was brought to the court by a Colorado lawyer and his wife who said some five million people were kept from voting in the United States last year because of residence requirements.

The lawyer, Richard Hall of Colorado Springs, said these laws can be decisive in close presidential elections such as the race last year, and therefore the Supreme Court should pass judgment.

In other actions today, the court:

- Threw out an Illinois law requiring independent candidates for statewide political office to be nominated by voters in at least 50 of the state's 102 counties.
- Refused a hearing to a telephone company that had no right to listen in and see if he was cheating on long-distance calls. He has been convicted of defrauding the company.
- Held that his wife, Christine, appealed following a ruling by a three-judge federal court in Denver last December that Colorado's residence requirements are reasonable.
- Held that he had been unable to vote in November because they had moved into the state recently from Lafayette, Calif. They also were not allowed to vote in California.
- Voted in Colorado one has to be a resident of the state at least six months, of the city or county at least 90 days and of the voting precinct at least 15 days.

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Balloons, Bearcats Join Race, Tolland On Course

NEW YORK (AP)—Contestants in the great transatlantic air race of 1969 are using elevators, ambulances, antique cars, jet planes, balloons. Anything to cover the distance between the observation deck of the Empire State Building and the top of London's Post Office Tower in the shortest possible time.

One of them claims a new flight record.

Lt. Paul Waterhouse piloted a Royal Navy Phantom jet across the Atlantic Sunday in 5 hours, 4 minutes and 25 seconds. When he landed in London, a Navy spokesman said it was the fastest transatlantic flight ever. His trips to and from the airport took another 58 minutes.

The race, sponsored by the London Daily Mail to mark the 50th anniversary of the first nonstop flight over the Atlantic, offers \$144,000 in prizes. It has drawn 390 entrants in 21 categories.

John Alcock and Arthur Whitten Brown flew a Vickers-Vimy biplane from Newfoundland to a bog near Galway, Ireland on June 14 and 15, 1919, taking 15 hours, 57 minutes.

Some entrants have elaborate schemes for coping with traffic jams, including ambulances with red lights flashing, motorcycle escorts and helicopters. Two entrants used a speedboat to reach a helicopter pad in the

Mayors' Study Asks State Income Tax

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—A study commissioned by the Connecticut Conference of Mayors describes the state's tax system as a "two-legged stool" that needs a personal income tax for balance.

The 63-page study, prepared by University of Connecticut Prof. Gerald W. Sasama, analyzes the concept of a state income tax in comparison to the existing two systems of taxation in the state—sales and property taxes.

Reliance of this state on property taxes the report notes, is reflected in the fact that Connecticut ranks second in the nation in that category. Revenues from those taxes go to local government, and the Conference has maintained that the cities cannot meet rising municipal costs through property taxes.

On the other hand, Connecticut ranks 46th on the basis of the amount of tax money per capita raised by the state.

To right this imbalance, the

the report concludes, the state should look to a progressive personal income tax for revenue which would enable it to help the cities cope with their problems.

Sasama says in the report that Connecticut's cities will need \$200 million more during the next two years. A personal income tax with "moderate rates," he says, could raise as much as \$500 million during the biennium.

The study does not analyze the payroll tax concept, which is being considered by the General Assembly. Sasama describes it as "superior to almost all the governor's tax proposals. However, on these a same grounds, a payroll tax is definitely inferior to a progressive personal income tax."

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Columbia ZBA Reserves Decision On Englert House Request

The Board of Appeals has reserved its decision on the request by Herbert Englert Jr. to build a house on an 80-foot lot with an insufficient setback.

Atty. John Allen of Coventry, representing Englert, said he had searched the title at the time two lots were purchased from Harvey Collins in January and said he was satisfied that Englert could build on both lots.

It was thought out that the Planning and Zoning Commission had granted permission for a house to be built on Lot 3 and not for Lot 1.

The U.S. Embassy said the three Americans were not expelled until their visas expired Sunday night.

The oath Professor Galston proposed, henceforth to be known perhaps as Galston's Oath, would have scientists making the following pledge:

"I will neither knowingly participate in research leading to the development of new weapons of war, nor of agents which are designed to kill or maim people or to destroy property.

"I will neither seek nor accept research grants from military agencies, nor will I permit any of my research findings to be restricted from free and open publication and availability to all who wish to consult them.

But even such protection of the scientist's own special conscience would not and could not absolve him from responsibility in the main test of civilization.
