**Stamps**

**Grandma Moses**

The first U.S. microdot postage stamp to be produced in coil form will be issued May 30 and will feature as its design the American flag flying above the White House. The design is a duplicate of the six-cent American flag stamp which was produced in sheet form last year.

The new stamp will be issued with first-day ceremonies at Chicago in connection with the Combined Philatelic Exhibition of Greater Chicago (COMPEX). Collectors desiring first-day cancellations may send addressed envelopes, together with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster, Chicago, Ill. 60607. The envelope to the postmaster should be endorsed "First-Day Covers 6c Flag Coil." Requests must be postmarked no later than May 30.

It is fitting that the Grandma Moses stamp in the American Philatelic Series come out in May. May has been designated as Senior Citizens Month by President Richard M. Nixon.

One purpose of this special month is to honor older Americans for achievements which came later in life. Grandma Moses took up painting at the age of 78 and continued her work until her death at 101.

The new stamp reproduces a detail of the painting "July Fourth" created by Grandma Moses when she was 91. It shows an outdoor scene at an Independence Day picnic at the turn of the century.

To celebrate its 25th anniversary of statehood, Israel issued two new stamps honoring its Armored Corps and the Navy; the same date Israel also issued a Memorial Day stamp dedicated to the men and women who have died in defense of their country, reports the Israel Philatelic Agency in America.

The Armored Corps stamp shows a new tank while the Navy stamp depicts a new warship. The symbolic design of the Memorial Day stamp illustrates the flag of Israel at half mast.

All three stamps are available at your local stamp dealers and at the stamp and coin departments of various stores throughout the nation.

Did you know that the late Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower was a collector of stamps? The 34th President of the United States once said: "More than the prizes of a hobby for the enjoyment of leisure hours, the stamps of the world are powerful object lessons in the eternal hunger of men for knowledge and the news about their fellow men."

**Aide Claims New Strength For Wallace**

**MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)**—It remains to be seen whether George C. Wallace will run for president again, but an aide says he already has "the balls for a better national organization than we had in the election last year."

The aide, Taylor Hardin, said it was put together over the weekend in Cincinnati, Ohio, when Wallace participants from 36 states formed a new American Party.

Walled together were Wallace's old American Independent Party and kindred third-party alliances—in one election campaign last year, said Hardin, was that in the process of getting on the ballot by "a loose organization" with little central control.

Wallace disclaimed any active part in the new organization but said he was "pleased with the outcome" and with the officers chosen to lead the new party.

T. Coleman Andrews of Richmond, who headed the 1968 third-party movement in Virginia, was elected national chairman and Bill Davis of Covington, Tenn., a pro-Wallace candidate for Congress earlier this year, is the vice chairman.

A source close to Wallace described the newly organized party as the nucleus of a political force which "can be used if Wallace wants to use it or if events dictate that he should use it."

Whether the former governor will run in the future will depend on "how brought up the people are and what President Nixon does," he said.

Hardin, a National Guard two-star general, gave up a six-year career in the staff of the State Finance Department to work full time as director of the Wallace campaign, as the movement laid its known. He has a staff of about 20 men.

**Doctors Advised They Should Tell Of Pilot's Illness**

**SAN FRANCISCO (AP)**—Should a physician tell federal authorities when a patient who is a commercial pilot develops a disease that makes it dangerous for him to fly?

Does his responsibility to the flying public supersede the traditional secrecy of the doctor-patient relationship?

Dr. Peter Siegel, federal air surgeon, answered yes to both these questions Monday in a talk at the annual meeting of the Aerospace Medical Association.

Dr. Siegel, who is in charge of medical certification of civil pilots for the Federal Aviation Administration, acknowledged that doctors who are not designated medical examiners face the risk of legal action by pilots they report as unfit.

He urged legislation providing immunity from lawsuits "when it is in the public interest."

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**Buckley Sues Gore Vidal For \$500,000**

**NEW YORK (AP)**—William F. Buckley Jr., of Stained Glass, the conservative columnist, is seeking \$500,000 damages against Gore Vidal, the liberal writer, charging Vidal libeled him by falsely alleging he was a Nazi.

The suit filed in U.S. District Court Tuesday charged that Vidal conducted a campaign of persistent, false and defamatory vilification by allegations, both oral and written, that he (Buckley) is a Nazi.

The court papers asserted that Vidal's comments on a television program last Aug. 29 during the Democratic National Convention showed "reckless disregard" for the truth.

Buckley also mentioned a subsequent newspaper article in which Vidal refused to apologize and an article by Vidal in a national magazine.

Vidal and Buckley appeared on television together during the convention as commentators.

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**Merger Approved**

**BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP)**—Shareholders of Harvey Hubbell Inc. of Bridgeport and the Keeney Co. of Seymour approved a merger of the two firms Monday.

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**Portugal Ends Coimbra Classes**

**COIMBRA, Portugal (AP)**—The government today shut down Coimbra University—Portugal's oldest—saying the end of the school term was being anticipated and there would be no activity until the examination period, scheduled for June.

The Education Ministry announcement gave no reason for the move but said the ministry acted after "having heard the university senate, implying that this governing body of professors and deans had proposed the closure."

The students demanded the reinstatement of 15 students who were suspended for allegedly showing disrespect to Portuguese President Americo Thomaz when he visited the campus April 17. They also sought curriculum reforms and a voice in policymaking.

The Board of Education has approved its original contract proposal for the teachers' association by a 10-5 vote. The board has taken action on the proposal by the local school board.

The board had asked for salaries of \$10,000 to \$12,000 for four-year preparation, \$11,000 to \$13,000 for five years, and \$12,000 to \$14,000 for six years, and proposed a 3.5 percent cost-of-living increase.

The board balked and proposed \$10,000 to \$12,000; \$11,000 to \$13,000; and \$12,000 to \$14,000. The increase is given in 13 steps.

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### Program Spreading—To Include Hartford Employment Needs Spawn The Job Bank in Baltimore

By DAN DONAHUE Associated Press Writer BALTIMORE, Md. (AP) — People need jobs and employers need workers. And out of that friction an idea came into being — the Job Bank in Baltimore.

"One employer wants no one but his own people. Sometimes a man has the potential, and 'graduate' is shown at work to have the year ago—a step-up clearing house for job seeker and job giver.

Now through use of a computer, an up-to-date list of the thousands of jobs currently available is turned out every weekday morning.

The Job Bank, as it is called, has come far enough that Baltimore people are traveling all over the country looking for better jobs to do.

The program is ready for launching in Chicago, St. Louis, Mo., Atlanta, Ga., Hartford, Conn. and New York City. A do-it-yourself program is expected to open job banks by July 1, and the government hopes to have them operating in 30 more cities during the 1969-70 fiscal year.

"It's a 'little revolution,'" says J. Donn Alken, vice-president director of the Manpower Employment Service which is creator of the project.

"This was set up just for Baltimore. Now we're spreading it to other cities. It's so simple when you look at it, work you wonder why it has not been done before."

In March 1968, employers were asked to provide a list of their openings from all of the many programs financed by federal funds. One company was getting more than 50 calls a day.

That month, Alken and Eugene B. Moore Jr., general manager of the Chamber of Commerce, met with representatives of 30 agencies that touch on manpower to devise something better than the hodgepodge of the past.

The mechanical process of the Job Bank began at Alken's office at 6:30 p.m. by 1 or 2 a.m. — 3 or 4 a.m. during the busy summer. One computer operator has turned out 20 copies of pages containing thousands of current job openings.

The pages are assembled into books, and distributed by morning. More than 50 pieces of information are listed for each opening, ranging from a \$1.50 hourly minimum to \$100 a week. A \$10,000-a-year marriage advance is also listed.

"We can show as different types of job codes," Alken said in an interview.

"When we first began, we had 3,000 openings a day. Right now, we're carrying 9,000 to 10,000."

Orders of the daily job books also go to neighborhood and suburban Employment Service offices. There are 15 of them as far as 15 miles from downtown, and Alken hopes to open 20 more by the end of the year.

The Job Bank opened May 27, 1968. "In the first six months, we placed 10 per cent more hard-core unemployed than at any other time," Alken said.

During September, November and December of last year—October is omitted because of a transit strike—114 poor people were placed in Baltimore area jobs, more than triple the number a year earlier.

Eighteen of the 30 agencies represented at that first meeting with Alken and Moore are using the Job Bank. Alken said he has no figures, but estimates that "90 to 95 per cent of the employers in the metropolitan area are listing with us."

A year ago, employer response to referrals was 30 per cent on Jan. Now Alken's office receives a card from the employer on disposition of the applicant 70 per cent of the time.

"Our chief charge today is dealing with the disadvantaged," Alken said. But he said much of the work is with senior citizens, and contacted the Job Bank is not just for the hard-core jobless.

"Any and all jobs are in the hard-core program," he said. Teacher, journeyman trades, the Job Bank is for everyone. It was established to serve the employer.

In a very competitive labor market, orders do pile up in the bank—such as openings for 30 clerks with no applicant to refer. Transportation is a serious problem. Many applicants don't have a clock to help them get to work on time.

Sometimes, another problem: "We have to make sure they are job ready. Frequently they need proper clothing, wash up, or even get a haircut."

Job Bank workers are state employees paid by the state. The bank started with \$25,000. "Only 10 additional staff members work in the whole operation."

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### Educator Says Students Should Bear Freedom's Cost

By GEORGE W. CORNELL, Staff Writer

NEW YORK (AP) — If you don't have to pay the piper, the dancing may get wild.

That, really, is the condition now prevailing in the view of a noted Catholic educator, Jacques Gressman, who suggests a radical remedy: Give students complete responsibility, both for their conduct and also the costs.

Radical freedom is much harder than partial freedom, he said in an interview. "As we want to make their own decisions, we're going to have to go all the way, and put the responsibility on their shoulders. Today's colleges insist that they're entitled to a major role in running the educational process."

Miss Gressman, an eminently sensible, vivacious and attractive Christian philosopher, created a sensation in Catholic educational reform in 1967, and did so with a grace that won of her from even as a nun of the Sisters of Loreto to transform Webster College, of which she is president, from a Church institution to a secular one, under lay control.

"I'll always be grateful for the 20 years I lived within our religious community," she said. "I still feel a part of that family. But if one loves and is loyal to an institution, one must challenge it to new possibilities."

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### Where Is Nearest Shelter? U.S. Civil Defense Program Said Wanting in Many Areas

WASHINGTON (AP) — After two decades of planning and \$1.5 billion in spending, the U.S. civil defense program is not a business as usual of fall-out shelters.

If there were a nuclear attack today, millions of Americans would react by looking for one of these shelters. Finding one might be tough, though, because 2 percent of every 4 don't have a shelter.

Those who did find a shelter would face 60-80 odds that it would be bare of civil defense provisions. Half the shelters have not been stocked with food and water.

What would happen inside the shelters after an attack has been the subject of research for nearly a decade, including the study of 25,000 man-days of volunteer shelter occupancy.

Dr. J. O. Buchanan, Civil Defense's deputy assistant director for research, gives a flat "yes" answer to the question: "Does it show that people could get by in a fallout shelter?"

But living in a shelter is no simple task. For example, management of the facilities, most of which hold 8,000 or more persons, is fraught with problems.

Civil Defense's "Shelter Management Course" makes a fresh review of civil defense.

So far, the scope of that review has not been determined. "We hope it will be finished in six months to a year," said an OEP spokesman. "But you know how studies are."

When the ABM system was completed by the Johnson Administration, its role was to defend cities. Nixon, however, proposed placing ABM in more offensive missile sites in lightly populated areas. He told the nation that the cities would be in any event be defended against nuclear attack.

Opponents contend the program is a waste of time and money because nuclear war won't come—and if it did, would be so devastating that civil defense wouldn't make any appreciable difference.

Supporters argue that civil defense activities should be increased now—that the program is an inexpensive way of saving lives in event of enemy attack.

Civil defense officials say the program provides a base for stepped-up training and shelter development. They say that government agencies, which declined in recent years, are now spending \$200 million in 1969, then \$400 million in 1970, then \$600 million in 1971.

The 1969 surge in spending followed the 1967 Berlin crisis and coincided with the Kennedy administration's reorganization of the civil defense program. Since that reorganization, the program's emphasis has been on establishing the network of fallout shelters.

The shelters are not special structures. They are simply areas in existing buildings or other facilities, such as tunnels, which are retrofitted with a large area against radioactive fallout.

They are not designed to protect against the blast itself.

Civil Defense Director Joseph R. Rouse says the present shelter program, although "far from complete," could save "up to 15 million lives... that would otherwise be lost if an attack were to occur today."

If the program approved for future years is not further delayed or deferred, he said, "this life-saving capability would be doubled by 1975."

According to civil defense statistics, 185,000 shelters with 128 million spaces have been located. That's almost one space for every American. But only 118,000 shelters with 113.7 million spaces have been formally licensed. And only 110,000 shelters have been marked with the familiar yellow and black fall-out signs.

In addition, only 85,000 of the 185,000 shelters have been stocked by civil defense with canned water, nutritional biscuits, and medical and sanitation kits. These would supply 88.8 million people for the 14 days Civil Defense says is a likely length of stay in a shelter. Those 85,000 facilities, however, accommodate 67.7 million people—who could split the supplies and get along for eight days.

Those shelters are not distributed in the same proportion as the population. Thus, although about 20 per cent of people supposedly would have a shelter space, it would not work out that way.

In Washington, D.C., for example, there are nine times as many shelter spaces as residents. There are four times as many in Boston, three times as many in Pittsburgh and ten times as many in Miami Beach. Less densely populated areas don't fare as well. In Ohio's smaller cities and rural areas,

Gifts to Schools Hit Record High

NEW YORK (AP) — Private gifts to 50 major colleges and universities topped \$600 million — a new high — in the past year, according to a survey published Monday.

John Price Jones Co. Inc., a company describing itself as "managers and consultants for institutional financing," reported that gifts to the 50 colleges had totaled \$604,700,000 in the fiscal year 1967-68. The total was 21 per cent greater than the previous year's \$500,000,000, the report said.

Harvard University was by far the preeminent recipient, receiving \$80,000,000 in private gifts. It was followed by its traditional rival, Yale, with \$58,000,000.

Nineteen large and 18 small privately supported colleges and universities were included in the survey along with eight private universities supported by state and federal governments. Thirty of the 50 institutions reported an increase in

### Worst Crack-Up of War Helicopter Crashes, 34 Die, 35 Injured

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Pentagon report says the worst crack-up of the Vietnam war was a helicopter crash in North Vietnam, in which 34 soldiers died and 35 were injured.

The report, which was part of a larger study of helicopter operations in Vietnam, said that the crash occurred on May 1, 1968, near the town of Quang Binh. The helicopter was carrying 68 soldiers and was flying from a base to a landing zone. It crashed into a field, and the soldiers were killed or injured.

The report also said that the crash was caused by a combination of factors, including poor weather, lack of communication, and a lack of training. The Pentagon is now reviewing the report to see what can be learned from the crash.

### Job Figures Don't Reveal Whole Story

 NEW YORK (AP) — Some believe the nation's job figures don't reveal the whole story. The statistics are being overblown or not given the proper weight.

In April, for example, the job loss rate went up to 2.3 per cent. The labor force, but the labor status of the help wanted column in newspapers show record high demand for work.

Construction companies are being held back by a slow start because they can't find enough labor, some of it unskilled, but the latest figures show a rise in unemployment among the unskilled.

The National Alliance of Businessmen, formed to search for jobs for the hard-core unemployed, reports unusual success in finding jobs for nonwhite and unemployed women. Unemployment among Negroes jumped sharply last month.

There are some logical explanations for these contrasts. Of course, one of the major ones being geographical. Thousands of miles, for example, may separate job and job seeker.

Jobs of other reasons too. Skills become outdated; some people have their first job and then move and leave pockets of unemployment. And there is the frustration, not always overt or intended.

Some analysts even argue that explanations really aren't needed because the percentage of unemployment really is very low. Only 1.5 per cent of married men, for example, were jobless in April.

But increasingly it appears that the biggest missing factor in the picture is education. The job charts there always remain that correlation between education and jobs.

Even the National Alliance, successful as it is, has learned that it takes education to command a man to take a job. For 145,000 of the hard-core unemployed who were put to work only \$7,000 at a recent date continued to hold their jobs.

The importance of education to the individual and to the nation is pointed up in a study by the National Planning Association entitled "Manpower Needs for National Goals in the 1970s."

A manpower shortage, the study states, will prevent the United States from fully achieving during the 1970s some of its most important goals. There will be more jobs than workers, according to this projection, but you can bet there will be plenty of people looking for work and not finding it.

Health goals, it suggests, could be frustrated by a shortage of doctors, dentists and nurses. Some 15,000 more doctors would be needed each year in the 1970s, it states, but medical schools may graduate only 5,700.

In the social welfare field the 1970s will demand about 30,000 social workers a year, but if the past is a criterion the need won't be met. In recent years about 5,000 new social workers have been graduated annually.

Housing and urban development goals, the study indicates, will demand increases in skills far greater than the rate at which these skills have been growing.

The number of carpenters has been declining recently, for example, but the National Planning Association expects that 7,000 new carpenters a year will be needed to fulfill housing goals in the 1970s.

The evidence—both from recent job statistics and the projections of future needs—indicates that the solution of the job problem lies in proper education and effective apprenticeship systems.

The experience seems to indicate that most other measures are stopgap; they provide a quick answer to an immediate need, but they offer little of permanence. Education does.

### Mao Extends Olive Branch To Enemies

TOKYO (AP) — In his first major move to restore unity after nearly three years of strife, Mao Tse-tung's forces today held out the olive branch to all but "absolutely unrepentant die-hards" in Communist China.

Mao's new soft line spelled out in the official Peking People's Daily two weeks after the 75-year-old Communist party chairman's ideas were made the law of the land by the state party congress.

An editorial by commentator Jue Ping expressed willingness to "unite with, educate and reform" the intellectuals who have resented him, "to save all those who can be saved" and even those who formerly were classified as enemies.

Reporting that almost all of those "have to be given a way out," the paper added: "With the exception of isolation and biting hard the very few absolutely unrepentant die-hards, the proletariat tries in every way to reform all those who can be reformed. This will be beneficial to the proletariat and harmful to the bourgeoisie."

Mao's new soft line does not extend to ousted President Liu Shao-chi, the editor said. Liu's influence may breed "stubborn resistance," particularly in high cultural and educational circles.

"We recognize in all circumstances that the class struggle in the ideological and political sphere will not stop simply because the intellectuals who have resented him, 'to save all those who can be saved' and even those who formerly were classified as enemies."

The editorial made clear that Mao's Cultural Revolution, which began in August, now has taken a new turn and will concentrate on a few figures.

The paper also indicated that the cases of children of prominent Communists are under review. Liu's son, for one, has been reported in jail on charges of spying for Russia.

Mao is believed to have taken a dim view of the activities surrounding new political media, and the editorial insisted that the working class must assume the leadership of the new phase of the revolution.

"Without working class leadership," it said, "it is impossible for us to win victory in the struggle in the superstructure."

**Belfast Grants Broad Amnesty To Dissidents**

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — The government declared an amnesty yesterday for anyone charged with offenses arising from the civil rights campaign, which has led to bloody street rioting throughout Northern Ireland during the last eight months.

Police said the amnesty, the first since the 1968 election, was announced by Prime Minister James Callaghan-Clark's new cabinet, would affect 120 persons, some already in jail and others are awaiting trial.

The Rev. Ian Paisley, Ulster's extreme Protestant leader, and his top aide, Maj. Ronald Bunting, will be among the first to be let free from Belfast jail.

They have been serving sentences for unlawful assembly, rioting, and assault, and had been due to be freed at the end of this month.

A charge of causing a breach of the peace lodged against Bernadette Devlin, 22-year-old student civil rights leader and youngest legislator in the British Parliament, will also be dropped.

The amnesty was announced by Callaghan-Clark in the Ulster Parliament in Belfast. He called it "a bid to wipe the slate clean."

Although all civil rights sentences will be remitted, he warned that criminal proceedings will still be taken for acts of sabotage.

**New Holiday Old Custom**

NEW YORK (AP) — Mother's Day was first observed nationally in 1914, but the practice of honoring mothers at a special time of the year goes all the way back to ancient Greece, report researchers at Hallmark Cards, Inc.

The early Greeks honored Cybele, mother of the gods, and by 250 B.C. Romans were paying homage to Cybele.

Christmas transferred the veneration to the Madonna and by the 17th century English Christians honored both their mother church and their earthly mothers on "mothering-Sunday," the fourth Sunday in Lent.
