paper. I never got on the air at all.

The student's name is listed in the general area described as the scene of the high-speed chase.

He said he knew two respectable, substantial citizens of Memphis, who could testify it wasn't his voice.

"These two men heard it all, from beginning to end, and they know my tie and my voice. They could testify it wasn't me. I have never given their names to anyone, not the Memphis police or the FBI."

The Associated Press has a slight clue as to their identity but has been unable to locate the men.

The missing broadcast began at 6:35 p.m.—about the time the student said he took a break from his studies. This was a crucial time during which King's killer made good his escape. The student was out of the state as he headed for Interstate 55 and either go across the Memphis-Arkansas Bridge to Arkansas or south into Mississippi, trips requiring from 10 to 15 minutes. Ray, it is now known, went to Mississippi.

South Windsor School Enrollment Figures Asked Five Years Ahead

Democratic school board member James Arnold last night proposed an addition to the board policy which would require the superintendent to prepare enrollment projections by grade level for a period of five years beyond the current school year by Oct. 1 of each year.

On the other hand, said Brown, 86 per cent of the teachers voting desired that more days be made up on the Saturday immediately following the missed day.

Only 20 per cent of the teachers wanted the make-up days at the end of the school year, according to Brown.

Board member Ronald Primavera, who introduced the holiday calendar plan, said that under all but the most unusual circumstances, it will not be necessary to use any April vacation days under this plan.

In all probability, said Primavera, the board will not be required to go to the full 185 days either, and will be able to lop off a few days if they are not needed for the make-up day.

Book Review

RADICALISM IN AMERICA, by Whitney Young, Crowell, \$10. This is a refreshing, two-chapter appreciation of the American West by an accomplished writer who has a great affection for the area. The 18 essays collected here were written over a period of more than 20 years. The first half of the book contains pieces on the wilderness—mountains and deserts—which characterize the true West. Its topics include packhorse trips, camping, visits to the Havasupai and the Navajo and excursions to the canyon country and New Mexico deserts. It is a song of praise for natural beauty, but running through it is a thread of mordant comment on the ways in which successive generations have plundered the land. The latter half of the volume is on western writers—as distinguished from writers of westerns—and on the relationship between western writing and that of other regions. One of Stegner's themes is that western literature exists in a sort of "cultural" vacuum and still is developing its literary stance. He also feels that the western writer's tendency to write in the heroic vein is contemporary epiphany. But the author is brief, and he seems no surer than anyone else in evaluating it. Some remarks on the absence of a coherent doctrine and objective, in which the New Leftists "very much resemble the radicals of the early 19th century—before Marx." And he concludes that "they have not yet formulated a system of ideas or the strategy of power which might lead them into an effective force. Nor were they entirely clear where they wanted to go or how they expected to get there." Some radicals were men of the idea—the abolitionists, for example. Others preached general revolution, devoted themselves to workers and peasants but never succeeded in radicalizing American labor as a whole. The most distinguished were the Industrial Workers of the World—anti-capitalist militants, strike leaders and picket line tacticians who nevertheless remained isolated and unheeded. Laws reduced the battles, external and internal, of these picket-line leaders. A writer's intriguing and dramatic story.

THE SOUND OF MOUNTAIN WATER, by Wallace Stegner, Doubleday, \$5.95. This is a refreshing, two-chapter appreciation of the American West by an accomplished writer who has a great affection for the area. The 18 essays collected here were written over a period of more than 20 years. The first half of the book contains pieces on the wilderness—mountains and deserts—which characterize the true West. Its topics include packhorse trips, camping, visits to the Havasupai and the Navajo and excursions to the canyon country and New Mexico deserts. It is a song of praise for natural beauty, but running through it is a thread of mordant comment on the ways in which successive generations have plundered the land. The latter half of the volume is on western writers—as distinguished from writers of westerns—and on the relationship between western writing and that of other regions. One of Stegner's themes is that western literature exists in a sort of "cultural" vacuum and still is developing its literary stance. He also feels that the western writer's tendency to write in the heroic vein is contemporary epiphany. But the author is brief, and he seems no surer than anyone else in evaluating it. Some remarks on the absence of a coherent doctrine and objective, in which the New Leftists "very much resemble the radicals of the early 19th century—before Marx." And he concludes that "they have not yet formulated a system of ideas or the strategy of power which might lead them into an effective force. Nor were they entirely clear where they wanted to go or how they expected to get there." Some radicals were men of the idea—the abolitionists, for example. Others preached general revolution, devoted themselves to workers and peasants but never succeeded in radicalizing American labor as a whole. The most distinguished were the Industrial Workers of the World—anti-capitalist militants, strike leaders and picket line tacticians who nevertheless remained isolated and unheeded. Laws reduced the battles, external and internal, of these picket-line leaders. A writer's intriguing and dramatic story.

The Board of Finance at a special meeting last night set the tax rate for 1969 at 76 1/2 mills, a half mill under the prediction made in Monday's budget meeting. The tax rate for 1968 was 77 1/2 mills, up 1 1/2 mills over 1967. Finance Board Chairman Roy Peckham said when he moved to town in 1962, the rate was 30 mills. "Millage" means "taxes" and he said "remember when" he paid \$10 in taxes a year and the total town budget was \$50,000. The budget adopted Monday was for \$1,514,000.

Peckham said that the budget for Board of Education expenses will continue to be high because schools cannot operate efficiently with such a small enrollment. Vernon Court Rules Town May Sell Henry Land

The town of Vernon may sell the land where the former Henry Henry Building stood at the corner of Park St. and Park Pl., but it may not deduct the cost of destroying the building, according to a decision filed yesterday afternoon in Tolland County Superior Court.

The Henry building was owned to the town in 1921 by E. Stevens Henry. The will stipulated that income from the building be used to maintain the Grove Hill Cemetery, and the acceptance of the building by the town was conditioned on strict compliance with this condition.

On March 9, 1962, a town meeting voted to accept the gift of the building, and a committee was set up to see that the building was destroyed. The committee reported that the building had been destroyed and the cost of destruction was \$10,000.

On March 11 of this year, the town voted to sell the land and all of the taxes were ordered to move out. After a survey by an engineering firm, which recommended that the building be torn down, the Board of Representatives voted to do so.


