Jews Will Mark Feast of Weeks

The Jewish holiday of Shavuot, or Feast of Weeks, will begin today at sundown and will continue through tomorrow and Saturday.

Holiday services will be held at Temple Beth Shalom this evening at 7:30, tomorrow at 10 a.m. (Family Service) and at 6:15 p.m. (Confirmation Service) and on Saturday at 10 a.m. (Memorial Service).

The name of the holiday is derived from the fact that it follows seven weeks after Passover. It is also referred to as Pentecost, a Greek term denoting that the holiday comes 50 days after Passover. In ancient Palestine, Shavuot was observed as an early agricultural festival marking the beginning of the summer harvest season. On this occasion the farmers would make a pilgrimage to Jerusalem and bring the first fruits of the harvest to the Temple.

The holiday was also observed as the anniversary of the giving of the Ten Commandments to the Israelites on Mt. Sinai on their way to the Promised Land. It is this aspect of the holiday that has been stressed for the past 2000 years since the destruction of Palestine as a Jewish State. In modern times the holiday is marked by special confirmation services held on the holiday at which the young people are confirmed in the faith of their fathers.

As Sinai marked the beginning of the spiritual odyssey of the Hebrew people and because the source and fountainhead of their religious and spiritual heritage, the events that took place there at the giving of the Ten Commandments and the giving of the law have been given the name of transmitting God's words to humanity.

And Helen Hayes Reminisces The Front Page Revived, MacArthur, Hecht Success

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Helen Hayes had just returned from the Broadway premiere of the revival of "The Front Page," written in 1928 by her husband, Charles MacArthur, and Ben Hecht.

Hayes asked Charles to try to persuade him, Charles tried, but she was only reasonable and unyielding.
He changed publishers, and the book was a success.
Hecht continued pouring forth scripts and books until his death in 1964, but little of his work reflected the brilliance he showed with MacArthur.
MacArthur died in 1964, and his last years were frustrating and unproductive.
"Those were terrible years for Charles," Miss Hayes recalled sadly. "He just couldn't seem to get anything done, for the last eight years of his life he and Ludwig Bemelmans were trying to write a play, but they never got it done."
"It's awful for a writer to be here that he just doesn't have the spark any longer, Charles was terribly depressed. At night he'd lie in bed and think, 'Charles, I don't know if I can reach you, but I wish you would read what you and Ben accomplished with "The Front Page."'
"That single play you changed the course of the theater and freed future playwrights from the shackles of the popular idiom."
"But I'm afraid, I couldn't reach him, if only he and Ben could have seen that opening night on Broadway last week."
"I don't think that Ben wasn't an able writer, too. He certainly was. But he didn't have the instinct for perfection that Charles had."

prevention, lanes from freeways, quiet residential sections from apartment units usually being built, eventually, to give through traffic a "bypass" route.

This is not, however, the normal experience, as any examination of the present urban highway department reports by the cities and towns, and upon the Federal Highway Department by the states, would be likely to reveal.

The actual experience in the past has been that the typical American community won't wait to have the sophisticated urban highway department. Most communities act as if they had in mind the situation of using more space to let people go through it than it costs to let people live on.

The commuter themselves first decide they get full cooperation from state and federal highway authorities, all of whom are what might be described as compulsive road builders out to pave the country solid.

Too late, in most instances, but still in time in some cases, people are beginning to wake up and realize that a road can and should be, in relation to the community it is supposed to serve, a convenience but not a domination, and should be built as a public service, not an end in itself.



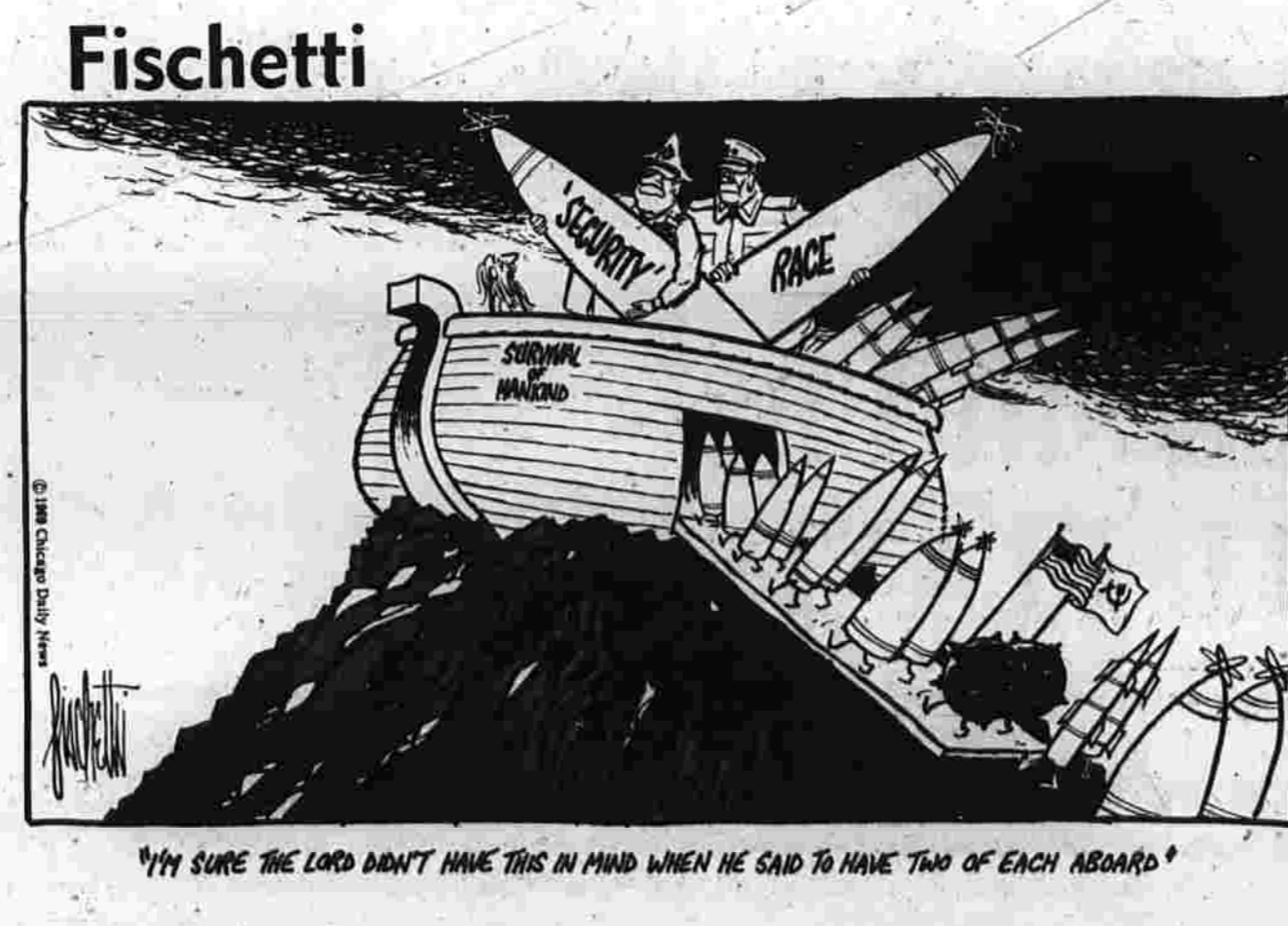

WASHINGTON (AP)—American Tobacco Co. has been accused by the Federal Trade Commission of misrepresenting the amount of harmful tar in Gales of its leading brands of cigarettes.

The brands named are Full Mail Gold 100s, Full Mail Menthol 100s and Lady Fillets.

The FTC action—with one member abstaining—is aimed at forcing American to back the advertising campaign which the majority contends fails to disclose material facts and "conveys the impression that its cigarettes are low in tar."

The 6th commission member, Everett MacIntyre, said American had reduced the level of tar and he is informed the advertising is literally true.

The commission said Full Mail Gold 100s are ranked 66 among 122 brands tested while Lady Fillets are 77.

Trade Group Rejects U.S. Textile Claims

WASHINGTON (AP)—A trade delegation from the European Common Market has rejected as unsupported United States claims that textile imports are damaging the industry.

Commerce Secretary Maurice H. Staze has said the United States would be forced to introduce protectionist measures if the situation trade bloc refused to accept what he called voluntary limitations on textile exports to America.

Staze said the delegation argued with Staze that textile statistics do not justify Staze's complaint. In fact, they said, the American textile industry is in better shape than that of Europe.

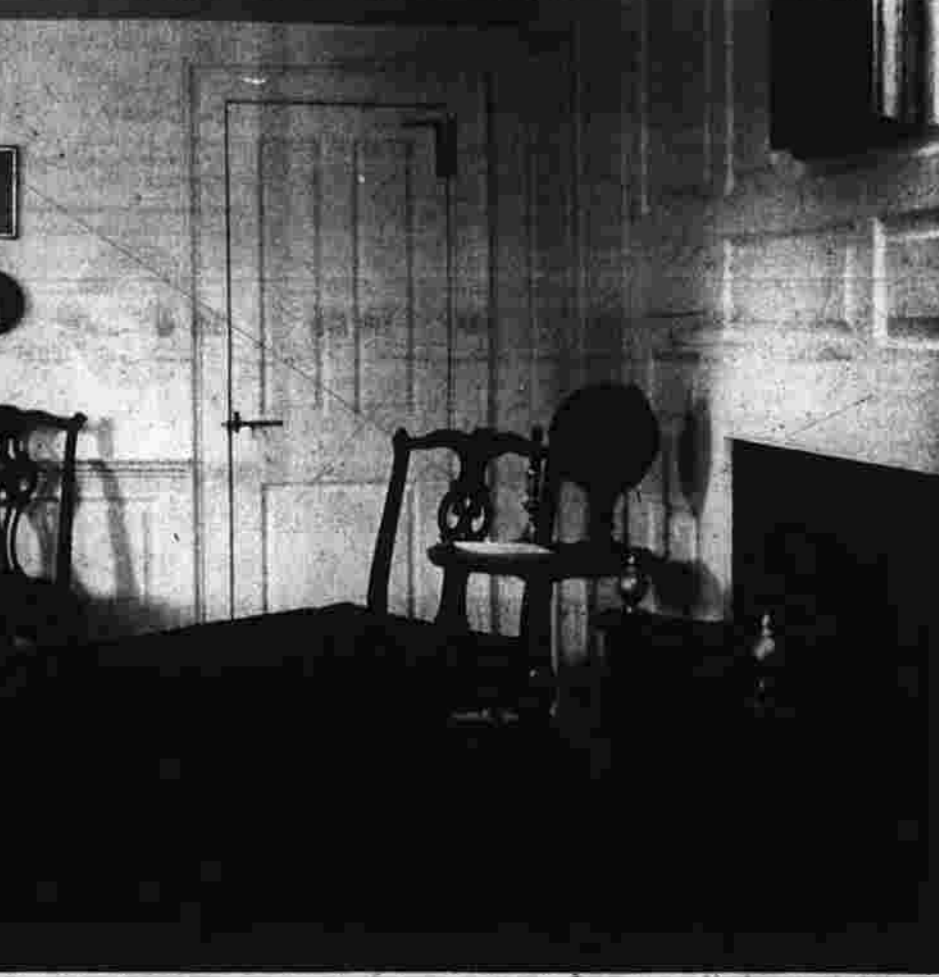
