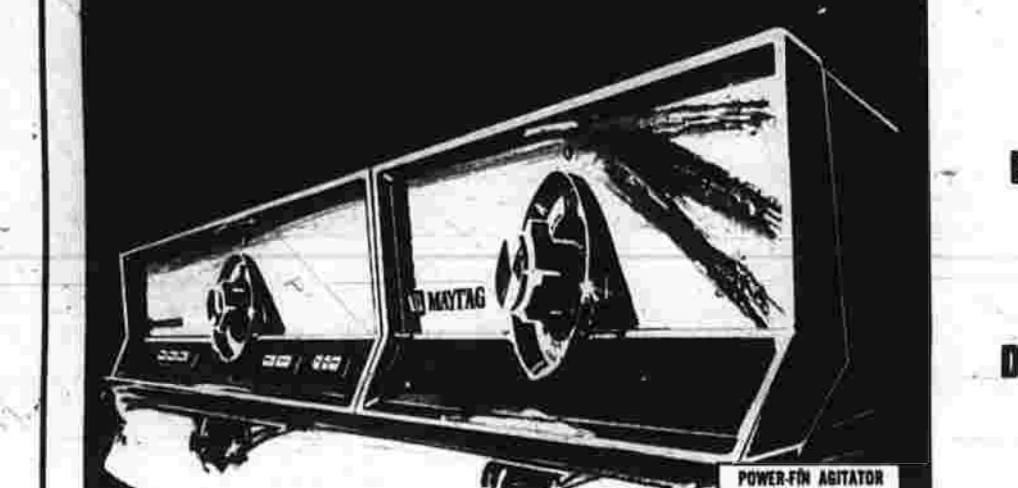
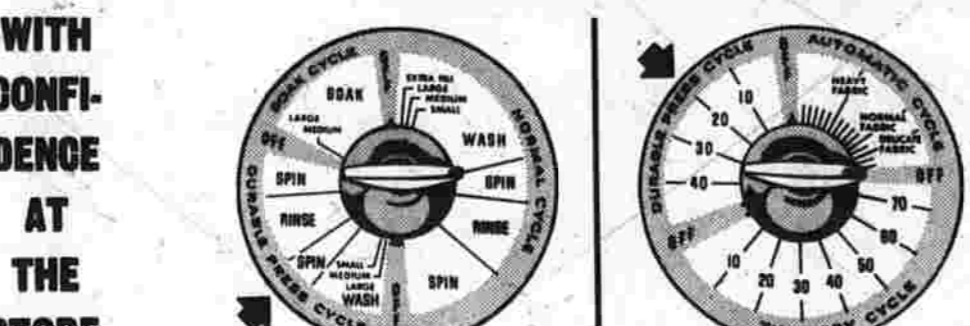

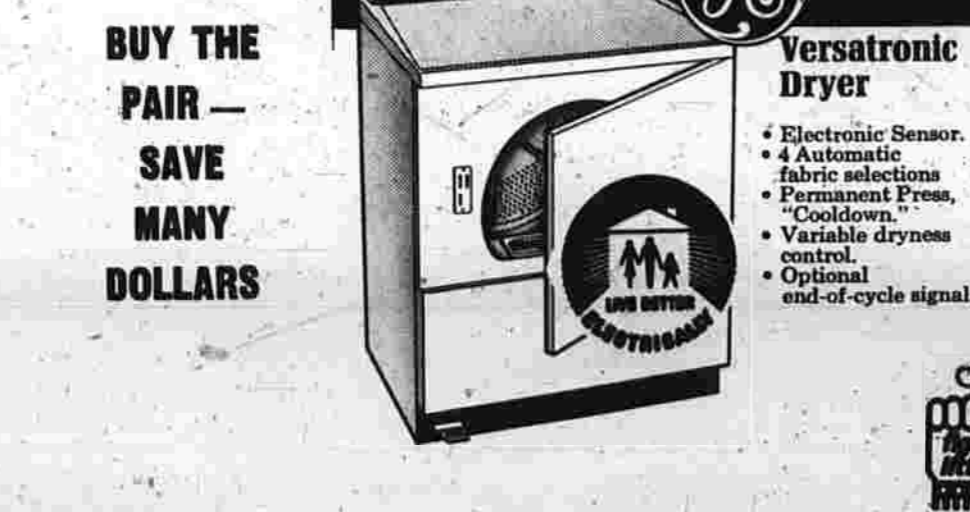

NEW YORK (AP) — One of the things some people take for granted about beauty contests is that all its takes to win is good looks.

Not so, says Herbert K. Landon, executive director of the Miss USA and Miss Universe pageants.

"We place an extremely high emphasis on personality," said Landon. "What's the use of a beautiful girl who can't hold a conversation?"

What Landon means by that is that each winner becomes a sort of goodwill ambassador for the pageant for a year. "So we need a young lady who is not only beautiful but poised and charming because she has to meet prime ministers and kings."

Fifty-one girls will be competing for the title of Miss USA when the pageant is seen on CBS 10-11 p.m. EDT today.

According to Landon, the pageant is no bed of roses for the contestants. "It's tense. The girls are competing. But there's a sort of magic that occurs, a spirit of camaraderie."

You'd think the girls would each be hoping the others would trip or something, but they're not," he said. "They help each other and root for each other."

The Miss USA Pageant began in Long Beach, Calif., as a promotion gimmick for a swimsuit manufacturer. Through a merger it became a part of the Kayser-Roth Corp. and in 1960 it was moved to Miami Beach and began its annual telecasts.

The pageant has changed through the years to keep up with the current scene. For one thing, said Landon, "the swimsuits are more daring than ever."

What becomes of the girls who enter the pageant? "Some go into modeling," Landon said, "but most wind up happily married and have children."

Dean Martin: The Easy Way

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Dean Martin switched off the sound of the matinee movie on television and turned on the tape recorder in his trailer-dressing room. A plaintive voice began singing a tune with a country and western beat.

"My next album," Martin explained. "This is how I learn my songs. Got a tape recorder at home, in my car and here. Play the numbers a few dozen times until I memorize the lyrics and the melody. Then I go in and record the album."

It's the easy way, which is the only route Dean Martin cares to follow. In records, television and films, he performs with consummate nonchalance.

Right now he is having to work harder than usual, and oddly enough he's enjoying himself. He is appearing in the all-star "Airport" as the pilot who saves a jetliner after it has been depressurized by a bomb explosion.

"On the ground, the guy is very happy-go-lucky—sort of a Dean Martin type," he commented. "But when he gets up in the air, he's a serious fellow. The role isn't as serious as the one I did in "Toys in the Attic," but it's the toughest I've had in a long time."

Martin makes his work seem easy, but no star accomplishes more in so many fields. He discussed some of the areas:

Television—"It's even easier than before; this season we cut out the dress rehearsal. Once we got behind and I did four shows in one week. I could wrap up the season in a few weeks if the writers could keep up, but they can't. All I do is go in, sing the songs and read the cards—badly. I still can't pronounce "superfluous."

CBS Lays To Rest Smothers Brothers

NEW YORK — The 15th annual general conference of the CBS-TV affiliates will be remembered as "The Tommy Smothers Memorial Conference." That's how thoroughly any hope of reviving "The Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour" was laid to rest.

About 1,000 owners and executives of stations affiliated with CBS-TV applauded this week when network president Robert D. Wood "boiled down" the Smothers Brothers controversy to one simple question: "Who is running the CBS-TV network?"

Wood answered his own question: "Let me assure you... it isn't Tommy Smothers."

Charges of "censorship," said Wood, are "a clever piece of semantics." The snipping out of material from the Smothers show, he argued, is "editing," the same kind that is done by every newspaper or magazine.

A second salvo against the brothers was hurled by Wood's boss, Richard W. Jenks, in a luncheon speech. Jenks was recently promoted to president, CBS Broadcast Group. He said that the network has no intention of rejecting entertainment material "merely because it has

topical comment of a controversial nature."

However, he continued, CBS has no intention of allowing "any performer who, by his talent, has earned exposure to a microphone or camera to voice his own personal political views at any opportunity he chooses."

"Someone," said Jenks, "has to be the judge of the difference between entertainment and propaganda."

Jenks, who is an attorney, went to the issue of free speech in television and said: "The concept of free speech means that everyone has a right to speak to whatever audience he can command. It did not, however, mean that he has a right to an audience."

Television performers, in Jenks' view, must regard themselves as "guests in the home" of the nation's viewers. "Most of our performers," he added, "realize that television is not the easy, vulgar, permissive world of nightclubs and bars."

"And they recognize that there is no legitimate entertainment, however, trenchant, which is frustrated by a reasonable insistence on some standards."

Turning to the federal government's investigation of "violence on TV," Jenks said CBS has already tried "to further reduce the depiction of violence in our programming."

Jenks is still not persuaded that "there is any demonstrated connection between depiction of violence in television entertainment and the occurrence of violence in everyday life."

The reduction came, he continued, because "we considered it our duty to give that proposition the benefit of the doubt."

Jenks argued that some violence is a vital part of great literature and drama and necessary in TV's action-adventure series. He said the TV industry must try to make certain that when violence is needed for dramatic value, it must be used "to give to the viewer a heightened sense of its reality and a keener awareness of the pain it causes both to those who commit it and to those on whom it is committed."
