Vernon Town Rehires John Osypuk Despite Objection of Mayor

At a special meeting last night the Recreation Commission voted to allow reemployment of John Osypuk as municipal swimming pool director for this season.

The special meeting was called after Mayor Berger received a letter Saturday from Mayor John E. G. suggesting that Osypuk not be allowed to work for the town.

Actions of Osypuk at a recent town meeting and hearings on the budget prompted the Mayor to request Berger not to rehire the pool director.

Mayor G. in his letter, said, "I was shocked to find out that our town is paying good money to a man of Mr. Osypuk's caliber." Osypuk was pool director last summer and the commission said its decision to rehire him was "based solely on his pool record" during last season.

Osypuk, who lives on Kenneth Dr., a reading consultant in the Hartford school system and just finished a term as president of the Hartford Educationists' Assn.

At hearings held prior to the annual budget, Osypuk spoke out against higher taxes and also against the proposed \$1.00 raise for Mayor G.

"There are some people in town not historically minded or ethically knowledgeable, who are advocating setting the hand on which the ball is built, to private interests," it continues. "They give no consideration to the fact that if it is financially profitable to an individual, it is likewise of similar financial worth to all the citizens of our town."

The building in question was built in 1885 as a memorial to the veterans of the Civil War. It is made of sandstone and granite trim and brick construction. The cost was \$88,106. It took the town 54 years to pay this amount in full.

Presently the ground floor contains the office of the town clerk, the tax collector, assessor and the probate court. It also has the room where the court of common pleas is conducted.

On the second floor is the auditorium and rooms containing various memorials. The third floor is not used now but it was the place where the town meetings used to be held as well as high school graduations and other social events.

Pastor Dropped, His Book Advised New Sex Outlook

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP)—A pastor of the United Methodist Church, whose book defends free practice of the sex act has been ousted from the ministry.

The Rev. Stephen Cree of Monroe, Iowa, wrote recently in a book called "The New Act of Sex" that "sex with dependent contraception is a morally new and different act to which Biblical prohibitions against adultery do not necessarily apply."

The official conference of the church, in a closed session last week, voted to drop Cree from the ministerial rolls.

"They are trying to padlock the church position on marriage and family life," Cree said. "Denying that the views expressed in the book were the primary reason. Cree was suspended from the ministry, the head of the Iowa conference of the church, said Sunday that Cree 'clearly overlooks the times.'"

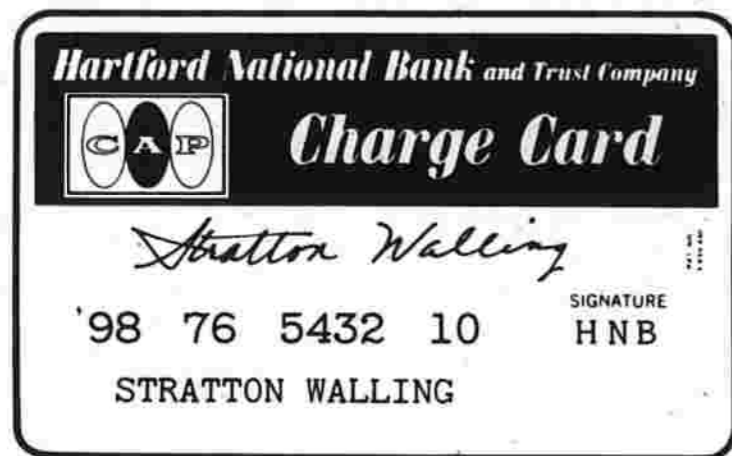

NEW MILFORD (AP) — A rain storm and high winds caused power failures and road washouts here Sunday. The storm struck between 4:15 and 5:15 p.m. Sunday, washing out a section of Route 25. Heavy flooding closed Route 4 and a fallen tree blocked Route 7 for a short time.

Officials said the roof of the city's First National supermarket had caved in from the weight of the rain collecting on it. Downed lines caused a number of small fires. Power lines also were reported down in Bridgeport. Police said minor flooding occurred in Norwalk, Fairfield, Danbury and Stamford.

Ellington Pro Shop Destroyed by Blaze

More than 250 members of Ellington Ridge Country Club are without golf clubs today, the result of a fire that destroyed the Pro Shop during the night. The estimated loss in those clubs alone is \$75,000 to \$100,000, according to Wally Cichon, club pro.

Besides members' clubs, the Pro Shop housed the golf equipment show room, a golf club repair shop, and to the rear, an overhang for protection of golf carts. A dozen of the electric carts were also badly damaged. Electric chargers for the carts were destroyed. Only the overhang of the building's rear porch was left standing.

A building enlargement was completed this weekend. Ellington firemen responded to the fire that apparently broke out shortly before 1 a.m., it was reported, but they were unable to save the building.

Fire officials and electricians were checking the remains to see if they could learn the origin of the blaze. Temporary quarters for the pro shop are being made available in other areas of the club. Cichon left the scene of the blaze in mid-morning to acquire new clubs and merchandise from manufacturers as that members equipment could be replaced starting tomorrow.

A large amount of the loss is covered by insurance.

Giving Bonus To Elinstees Under Study

A military pay study, drafted by a group headed by Rear Adm. Lester Hubbell before the Nixon administration took office, has been submitted to a congressional management institute for study.

The Hubbell plan in essence recommended placing the pay system for career servicemen on straight salary comparable to that of the federal civil service, and ending most housing and other separate allowances. The Nixon administration has not discarded the Hubbell report, but may well change its terms, particularly to put more stress on a better deal for lower-ranked servicemen.

Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird has told Congress the administration's military pay proposal will not be ready until after July 1. Indications are that those proposals will not be in shape to go to Capitol Hill until possibly September.
