No Opposition Voiced To Plans for Bank

No opposition developed yesterday before the State Banking Commission, as it conducted a public hearing upon a petition from 20 Manchester-area firms for authority to open a bank, to be known as Manchester State Bank.

The commission, comprised of State Banking Commissioner Philip Lewis, State Treasurer Gerald Lamb, and State Comptroller Louis Gladiatore, heard testimony from experts and from non-experts on the need for a new commercial bank in Manchester.

The experts were Alexander Haddon, vice president of Armstrong Associates of New York City, who submitted the results of his feasibility study; George Baraglio, head of a Windsor Locks firm of certified public accountants, who predicted that the bank could operate in the black in its second year of operation; and Town Clerk Edward Tomkowiak, a bank official before he was town clerk, who said the need for a small town home-office bank, to provide personal services.

Non-experts were Mayor Nathan Agostinelli, who called the proposal "an exciting new venture for Manchester"; and Andrew Annali Jr., who told of plans for a bank building on the west side of Main St., between Gorman Pl. and Myrtle St.

Tomkowiak, Agostinelli and Annali are three of the 20 incorporators of the proposed bank. Haddon projected deposits of \$1.4 million for the proposed bank in 1970, and predicted it could grow to \$4.4 million in 1973 and to \$7 million in 1975.

Baraglio, whose firm specializes in bank auditing, bank taxation, and bank accounting procedure, predicted \$1.3 million in deposits the first year. He said that the incorporators plan to start with a capitalization of \$1.5 million, to be raised by the sale of 75,000 bank shares, at \$20 a share.

District Board Recommends Repeat of 2.5-Mill Tax

The 24th District Tax Collector, Joseph Vols for clerk, and Mrs. Larria for tax collector, are up for reelection to their posts. The only announced candidate for District president is William Hammon, whose three-year term as director expires July 15. Paul Cervini, the acting president, has declined to run for president. He will serve in his director's post.

The three-year term of Director William Manning also expires on July 15. Manning has announced that he will not seek reelection. To date, no announced candidates have appeared for the two vacancies on the District board. However, the names of John W. Andreoli of 97 Breton Rd. is being mentioned for Manning's seat. Andreoli and Manning are neighbors and both were candidates three years ago. Andreoli withdrew his name from consideration at that time when Manning was nominated.

Another name being mentioned for District director is that of Winslow Manchester of 283 Hollister St., a former director.

Hartford, Conn. (AP) — The State Public Utilities Commission has asked the State Supreme Court to roll back telephone rate increases until the matter is settled in court.

Superior Court Judge Harold M. Southern ruled last week that the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Co. had broken its promise to the levels it originally requested until the company's appeal is ruled on.

Senate Probe Told Panthers Advocate Wrecking Industry

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate subcommittee today said that the Black Panther Party's activities have caused the destruction of American industry.

Washington, D.C., police department gave the Senate subcommittee transcripts of statements made by Black Panther leaders in foreign countries and radio interviews broadcast from Cuba.

He quoted George Mason Murray, the party's national director, and Jordon Ford, a Panther leader in New York as saying in Cuba last August: "So long as we are alive there will be no industry, factory, bank, or company that is not under our control power. We shall use bullets, bombs, and everything at hand to destroy imperialism."

Huy P. Newton, Black Panther minister of defense convicted of killing an Oakland, Calif., policeman, was quoted in a telephone interview from the jail cell as saying, "The Black Panther party considers itself a vanguard part of the army of resistance to U.S. imperialism that is being mobilized all over the world—we need not only a White but many White through the U.S. and throughout the world." Capt. Dross, who said he had been in detached duty since January 1968 to investigate the Black Panther Party, said the exact numerical membership of the party is not known but he estimated the number does not exceed 4,000.

The subcommittee has the names of about 2,000 identified members and has obtained the names of about 100,000 who are believed to be members of the party, he said.

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Wagner, Lindsay Lose In New York Primaries

NEW YORK (AP) — In a major primary that echoed a trend set in Los Angeles and Minneapolis, conservatives wrested the Republican nomination from Mayor John V. Lindsay and wrecked former Democratic Mayor Robert F. Wagner's comeback bid Tuesday.

Lindsay, who will be on the November ballot as a Liberal party candidate, was narrowly defeated by a little-known state senator from Staten Island, John J. Marchi, who also has the Conservative party nomination. The final unofficial count was 113,775 to 108,888.

Wagner lost to Italian-born City Comptroller Mario A. Proccacino, who rejected the label of "law-and-order" candidate; but was the most conservative in a five-man Democratic primary. He won with only about a third of the vote.

Ernest Borrough President Herman Badillo, who was born in Puerto Rico, ran a close third. Andrew Cuomo, a former state legislator, was fourth.

The vote was Proccacino 262,881; Marchi 215,881; Maller 41,138; Schear 28,881.

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Mary Mount Found Dead In Wilton

NEW CANAAN, Conn. (AP) — The body of a young girl found Tuesday near the Wilton-New Canaan town line was positively identified today as Mary Mount, 10, who disappeared in New Canaan three weeks ago.

"Through church charts and examination of an expert from New Haven the positive identification was made," said New Canaan Police Chief Henry E. Keller.

The girl's father, international Business Machines executive Joseph Mount, said to Norfolk Hospital and sent clothing of the kind worn by his daughter.

The case definitely involves foul play, and the investigation is proceeding as if it were homicide, Keller said, but he said the cause of the girl's death would not be known until completion of an autopsy being conducted at the hospital.

The girl had been the object of a man's search since her disappearance from a sand pile in Kew-Forest park 100 yards from her home in New Canaan on the evening of May 23.

House Foes Of Smoking Plan Fight

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressmen seeking to free federal agencies to stringently control cigarette advertising have promised to take their fight to the House floor after suffering setbacks in committee.

The House today faced a stark anti-smoking amendment to a bill that would strengthen the wording of health warnings on packs and cigarette packs but would continue to limit the amount of advertising and the Federal Communications Commission.

The House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee endorsed the bill following unopposed efforts by some members to amend the proposal to remove or shorten the restrictions placed on the regulatory agencies.

Other proposed amendments called for more prominent display of the health warnings on packs.

Bees Adopt Army Copter

HONOLULU (AP) — It was love at first sight when the 5,000 or so bees looking for a home saw the Army helicopter.

Since such swarming is against Army regulations, members of the 29th Infantry Brigade tried to swat them away.

When that didn't work, another helicopter hovered above and blew them away. But when the chopper left the bees came back.

Several men stirred up the bees as others pushed the helicopter inside a hangar and slammed the door. But the bees swarmed in front of the hangar.

Finally Spic, a Bob Ireland called a local bee man and followed his advice; got a big cardboard box, cut a small opening in it, then chased the bees inside. They were just looking for a place to build a hive, said the expert.

A bee keeper later took away the box full of bees.

Lindsay To Form New 'Urban Party'

NEW YORK (AP) — Mayor John V. Lindsay, defeated in his bid for the Republican mayoral nomination, said today he will form a new "urban party" and appeal to independents and liberals in the Democratic and Republican parties in the fall mayoral election.

Lindsay, who said he would remain a Republican, said that Staten Island, J. Marchi, who defeated him, had "captured" the forces of the ultra right.

"I stand for negativity," Lindsay said, "and appeal to the forces of hatred and divisiveness."

"My theme in the campaign," he said, "is to create an independent line for a new urban party."

The mayor said no name had been chosen for the new party, and he would support Marchi as the candidate of the Liberal party.

Lindsay, who lost in a mayoral election in 1965, said he was "not surprised" by the large number of voting machine breakdowns in the South Bronx, where he said he was strong. He said this indicated a "fix" to deprive him of votes.

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Surtax Extension

PITTSBURGH, Pa. (AP) — Vice President Spiro T. Agnew, citing what he called "widespread alarm," urged the nation's mayors today to support President Nixon's plan to extend the nation's surtax as a weapon against inflation.

"Without the \$7 billion to \$8 billion generated by the surtax, the federal budget would become a grim and mandatory alternative," Agnew told the U.S. Conference of Mayors.

"These cuts are bound to affect your plans and your constituents," he said. "I say this as a threat, but as a fact. Further deficit spending will further jeopardize the American dollar. Agnew's remarks, it will turn out, were not without effect."

The vice president arrived in Pittsburgh Tuesday afternoon for private meetings with local officials. He is scheduled to leave for Washington Wednesday.

The President has recommended continuation of the 10 per cent surtax through Dec. 31, then at 5 per cent until June 30, 1970.

"I ask your support in influencing your congressional representatives to support the surtax extension bill," Agnew said.

The committee was unofficially reported to have voted 10-15 against an amendment to cut back the surtax extension to Oct. 31.

Five Democrats out of the 15 on the committee joined all 10 Republicans in defeating the surtax extension bill.

Nixon Wins Round

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon has scored a substantial gain in his drive for a full year's extension of the income surtax but opponents are continuing their effort to cut it back, if not in the House, then in the Senate.

The House Ways and Means Committee Tuesday gave its approval to the Nixon anti-inflation package, practically intact. It includes continuation of the surtax at the present 10 per cent rate through Dec. 30, with the rate halved for the last six months of fiscal 1970, tax relief for low income taxpayers, repeal of the investment credit and postponement of scheduled reductions in automobile and telephone excise taxes.

The House will vote next week on the bill.

**Stamps In the News**

Man has been tracking the stars and planets for thousands of years. Ancient navigators charted their courses via the heavenly bodies and now U.S. astronauts are going up there to take a firsthand look for themselves.

Two hundred years ago, however, the Royal Society of London commissioned L. James Cook to tour the Pacific and observe the transit of the planet Venus. In honor of that bi-centennial anniversary, Marlow's has issued a special stamp.

The new stamp, in partial shades of green and brown, shows a chart of the planet Venus in the center of the Pacific with the areas unknown at the time of Cook's voyage. The passage of Venus across a flaming sun at Tahiti is in the center of the stamp. In the upper left corner is a vignette head of James Cook copied from a Wedgwood plaque. In the upper right corner is a reproduction of a quadrant used by Cook in carrying out his observations.

The only official post office of the United States has been at UN headquarters in New York. Now another U. S. post office will be in operation at the Palais des Nations in Geneva, Switzerland.

To herald this agreement, the UN will issue eight new stamps in Swiss denominations. These postal items will be valid for mailing only from the Palais des Nations.

With the exception of the 30 cent stamp, the stamps are selected from designs currently in use at UN headquarters, New York, in United States denominations, but with different colors.

The 30 cent stamp depicts the south facade of the Palais des Nations in Geneva. The colors are green, blue, red and yellow.

Rowland Hill of England has been credited with inventing the first official government postage stamp, but, as with all inventions there have been other claimants to this honor. Hill, nevertheless, not only designed the stamps but devised postal reforms such as chargeable rates for mail according to weight rather than distance. Hill originated the idea that the sender, rather than the recipient, pay the postage, and that letters must be enclosed in envelopes.

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# They Pedaled to St. Louis

Two Manchester Community College teachers got on their French 10-speed bikes May 22 and pedaled over 1,100 miles in 18 days, stopping in St. Louis, Mo.

They are Robert E. Richardson Jr., chairman of the English department and Robert Dobson, instructor in the biology department. Richardson is an old hand on bikes and rides one to work every day. Dobson had not sat on one for years but kept in good shape with other sports.

The things they remember most about their trip are handling the bikes, talking to amazed natives, camping with mosquitoes and hoping for a tailwind. They left right after giving their MCC exams.

They picked highways to avoid backroads but could not pick major interstate highways. Lanes prevent bikes from using the major highways. "They're too dangerous, anyway," Richardson said. They started on Rt. 6 and 203 from Hartford. They passed through Bristol, Thomaston and Danbury before passing the state line. They crossed the Hudson River at the Bear Mountain Bridge.

We camped by the wayside where we could find a wooded lot. Sometimes we used private property. We kept pretty quiet about it," he said. They got through New York by various routes and came to northeastern Pennsylvania. "The most frequent question people asked was 'Are you guys doing this on a bet?'" Richardson said.

When they came to the Appalachians, they chose high ways which hit the mountain range diagonally instead of head on. Still, they made their worst daily distance of 48 miles. "We walked up plenty of mountains," he said. "Actually, the most difficult terrain was the Allegheny mountains in western Pennsylvania. The mountains were very short but frequent," he said. "I'd rather have the big ones."

They left Pennsylvania and came into Wheeling, W. Va. "The Pennsylvania coal high lands had dirt. It was so thick, you could cut it with a knife," he recalled. "We had been out 12 days there and hit our first motel to clean up." As the weather got warmer, the mice and mosquitoes bothered them more. "We got into our sleeping bags about 9 each night," Richardson said. "Then the mice would start running over our sleeping bags like crazy. I didn't know about them before."

"Occasionally, we'd have a bad night with them. I couldn't see them with my flashlight because they were running, really running." "One morning, Dobson woke up and found a mouse had five babies in his saddle bag." The weather was fair most of the time. "We only had two rain days," Richardson said. "That hot day was pretty rugged in Pennsylvania."

"We never had a tail wind. The weather pattern is mostly west to east," he said. "That really hurrts a cyclist." Part of their route led them into Kentucky where youths were the most surprised to see them. They were utterly amazed that anyone over age 12 would ride a bike," he said. "We met an other cyclist all the way," he said adding, "Bob Richards, the athlete and Wheaton man, publicized the beginning of his bike trip across the country. I was mistaken for him but we never saw him."

# Victor Harkin Is 'Baby Sitter' for 7 Billion Dollars

By WARREN WINTROBE Associated Press Writer FT. KNOX, Ky. (AP) — Victor Harkin, 61, is a billion-dollar babysitter—of billions, more or less.

He watches over a nondescript two-story granite, steel and concrete building about 30 miles southwest of Louisville. While the structure, which cost \$60,000 to build in 1937, is a two-level steel and concrete vault, divided into compartments and reachable only through a 20 ton door.

While the vault are about 800,000 gold bars. Each weighs 27 1/2 pounds, is 7 inches long, 3 1/2 inches wide and 1 1/2 inches thick. Each is worth about \$14,000. Harkin, who came from the U.S. Treasury mint in Philadelphia in 1961 to head Fort Knox, talks little about himself, but says little about length about the depository's history.

Fort Knox's military post—currently more than 110,000 acres—was established in 1918 and named for Major Gen. Henry Knox. A World War I artillery training center, the post was deactivated and until 1932, used only as a summer training camp. In 1932 Fort Knox became a permanent military post, and during World War II it reached a peak strength of 90,000 soldiers. Today the post is home to 37,000 military personnel.

Although it lies within the military post, the depository is owned by the U.S. Treasury Department and is controlled by the Director of the mint. Harkin says no one has ever attempted a robbery, and for good reason. Add to the building's construction, a high steel fence encircling it, machine gun-armed guards at each corner, the only way to get as far west as we could in 18 days," Richardson said. "We were satisfied."

"I don't know how many times we got stuck off the side of the road by the truck's draft."

In some of the diners, they met truck drivers. Everyone else they met was more than friendly. But the truck drivers said they did not like to see cyclists. "I followed Rt. 59 through the southern parts of Indiana and Illinois. It looks like a swift, firm and reasonable."

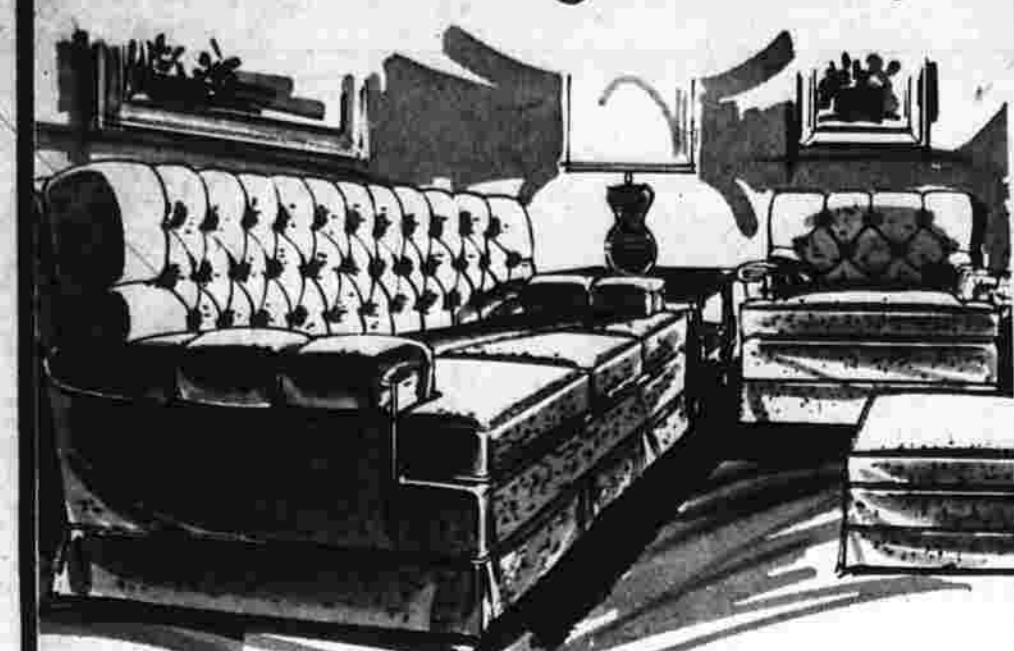

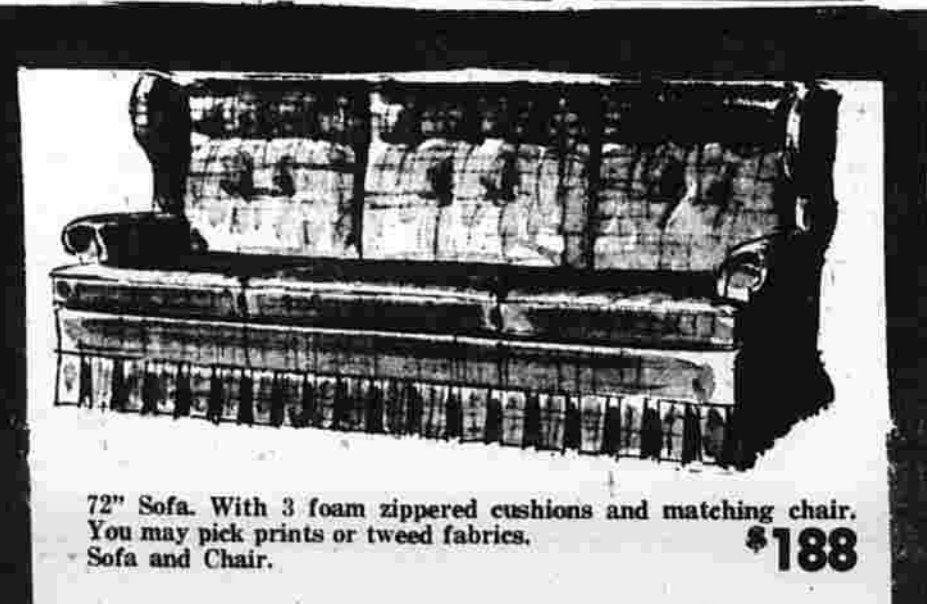

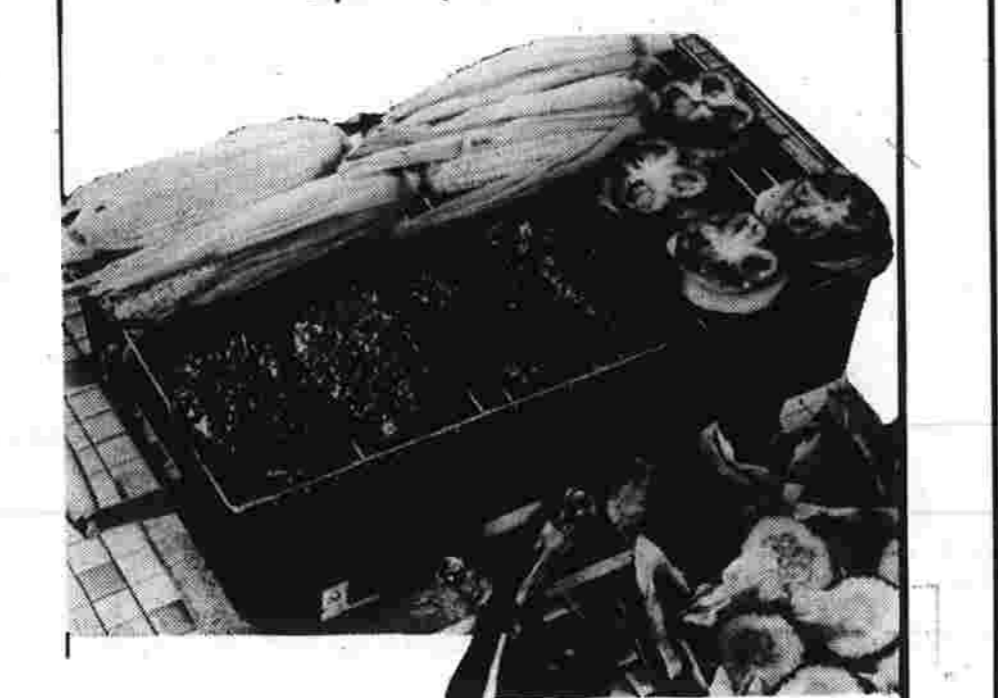

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## Senate Bill Would Affect Properties Like Nike Site

The U.S. Senate is presently in sharp disagreement over a bill which would make surplus federal property available to states and cities which have surplus and recreational facilities.

The 29.92 acres of the Manchester Nike Site are included in approximately 12,000 acres of federal surplus lands in 21 states, as reported by the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, an agency of the Department of the Interior.

Manchester has an application written into federal law by former Oregon Sen. Wayne L. Morse, such surplus properties are offered, in general, at 50 per cent of the fair market value, when to be used for park or recreational purposes.

Morse, who had fought "give-aways" of federal property, is protesting the new bill, stating that the measure is "a shocking example of shortchanging."

Wisconsin Sen. William Proxmire, who is the leading proponent of the bill in the Senate, has stated that local governments already are getting substantial subsidies under the present 50 per cent of value formula.

He called the new proposal "a non-economy measure which would allow windfall for states and cities, and a loss of valuable federal property that belongs to all taxpayers."

Sen. Henry Jackson of Washington, chairman of the Senate Interior Committee, drafted the new bill. He told the Senate that

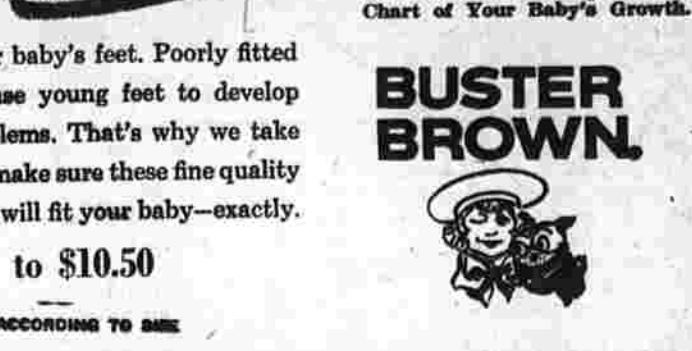

Science Group Lauds Review Of Bio-Chemical Warfare

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new organization of scientists criticized the nation's superpower chemical and biological warfare arsenal has reacted with unrelenting enthusiasm to President Nixon's order for a full review of all CW programs.

"I think that one of the best things that's happened in a long while," Yale University biologist Dr. Arthur W. Galston said after the White House Tuesday announced a sweeping review of whether involvement of scientists in biological warfare is necessary and proper.

From Secretary Donald L. Ziegler also announced that the 1925 Geneva protocol designed to curb chemical and biological warfare will be re-examined. The United States promoted the document 43 years ago but still has not ratified it.

Nixon's review, to be conducted by the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency and the State and Defense departments, came after a rising congressional and public outcry. The concern was spurred by the death of some 6,000 troops near a nerve gas testing ground in Utah last year and the Army's plans—since delayed—to ship 37,000 tons of obsolete chemical-bomb bombs ordered by train and dump them into the sea.

The congressional chorus of protest began as a one-man crusade by Rep. Richard D. Mottl, a Democrat from Buffalo, N.Y. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee then held hearings and Ziegler said the entire subject was explored in past National Security Council meetings.

The NSC will receive the results of the new study. General Smith, director of the arms control agency, wrote Mottl Tuesday the review will be detailed within the U.S. government, the control of chemical and biological weapons is a subject of major concern," he added.

McCarthy said he was pleased with the review and said he thought they would lead to a re-examination of the Geneva protocol, which he said the U.S. signed in 1925. He said 35 congressmen are requesting a revocation.

Scientists working about chemical-biological warfare formed the Scientist's Committee on Chemical and Biological Warfare last December during a professional meeting in Delaware. They do not have a most pressing objective should be to begin a comprehensive scientific study of the chemical and biological effects of the use of CW agents in Vietnam.

"The chemical warfare program in Vietnam has top priority," he said. Dr. John S. Naisbitt, said in a telephone interview Tuesday night. He is a professor of biochemistry at the University of California at Berkeley.

He also condemned the use of riot-control gases to flush the enemy from caves and tunnels in Vietnam, contending that substantial number of people have been killed because lethal amounts were used.

The Geneva protocol, he said, forbids the use of all gases, making no distinction between lethal and nonlethal ones. "We have therefore violated the Geneva protocol in Vietnam," he said.

He offered his group's cooperation in the Nixon review and said he personally hoped it would include Vietnam. There are other, philosophical warriors, too.

Fire Calls 'Charlie Brown', 'Snoopy' Personally Greet Astronauts

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — The greater of Snoopy and Charlie Brown came back to the first two Californians to orbit the moon.

The astronauts named their command ship "Charlie Brown" and called the lunar module, which dipped within nine miles of the moon, "Snoopy."

Reagan told a Capitol news conference—where he introduced the astronauts—that Cmdr. John W. Young was born in San Francisco.

Young and his fellow astronaut—Cmdr. Eugene A. Cernan—were in the Apollo 11 spacecraft when they landed on the moon.

The astronauts emphasized that the purpose of their trip around the country is to share tidbits with the people who helped make it possible—and to create some identification between the space program and the American people.

"I'm not sure we're the heroes and we're certainly not groomed to be heroes, but if heroes is what we need in this country today, then I think we're willing to take that role," Cernan said.

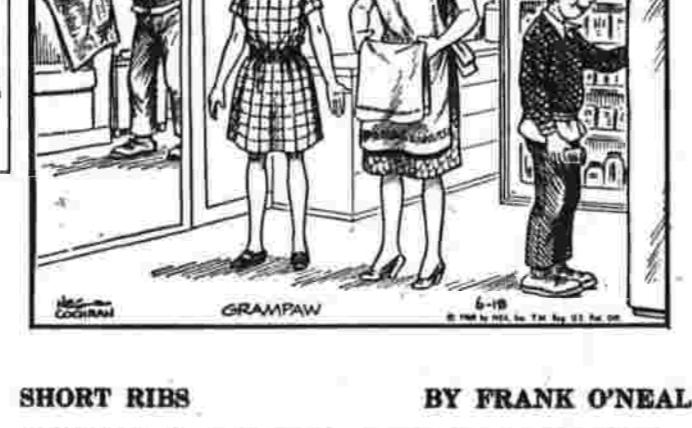
