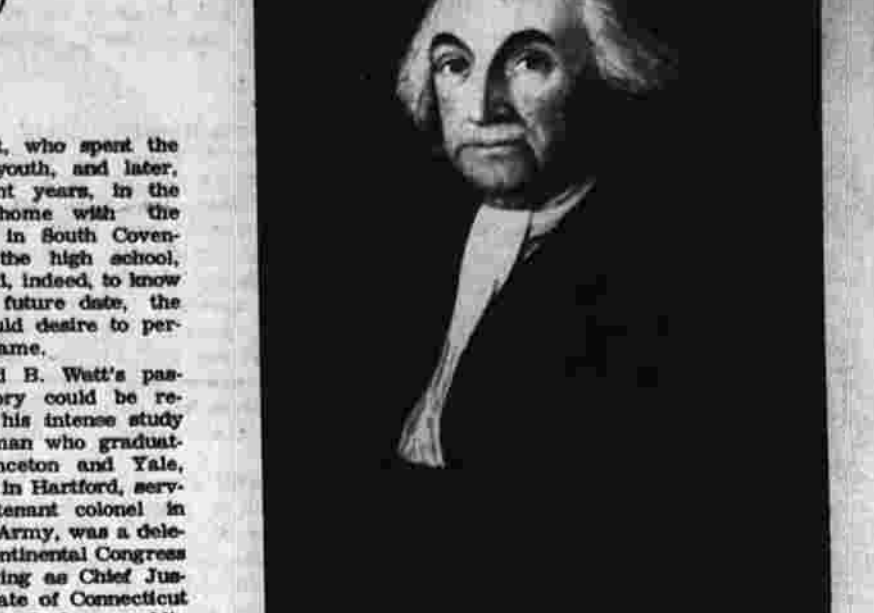

Funds for Case Mt. Study Sharply Hit by Genovesi

Among the many bonding items approved by the 1968 General Assembly is one for \$50,000, to study the feasibility of state purchase of 212 acres of Case Mt.

The word "feasibility" drew sharp criticism today from Manchester State Rep. Donald Genovesi, Rep.

Genovesi said that, in checking the dictionary, he found that "the word feasible is defined as 'capable of being done, executed or effected.'"

"The proposed purchase of Case Mt. has been studied for almost four years," he explained, "and now, with the state in financial trouble, \$50,000 has been pinpointed for another feasibility study is something study. What? What will it accomplish?"

He continued, "We have had Case Mt. studies and recommendations by town agencies, by state agencies, and even by the Capitol Region Planning Agency. And, we have had appraisals by the town, by the state, and even by the federal government. Now, the chairman of the legislature's State Development Committee comes up with a proposal for \$50,000 more for a study."

"I just can't understand it," Genovesi said. "Had the \$50,000 been earmarked for an option on the property, I might have understood it and I might have backed it, but \$50,000 for a feasibility study is something study. What? What will it accomplish?"

The \$50,000 item, to study the feasibility of state purchase of 212 acres of Case Mt. land, for state park purposes, was recommended by State Rep. Victor Tudor, Democrat of Windsor and House chairman of the State Development Committee.

He said three weeks ago that his recommendation came after consulting with Manchester Town Manager Robert Weiss.

Tudor's committee had considered a bill which proposed that the 212-acre tract be purchased for \$330,000, with state and federal funds, and that it be maintained as a state park.

A similar bill, in the 1967 General Assembly, died in committee. That bill proposed the purchase of more acres at less money—275 acres and \$425,000.

Manchester State Reps. Francis Mahoney and N. Charles Boggs, both Democrats, are members of the legislature's State Development Committee.

Wine Led to Flip' Uprise

HOLLYWOOD—A bottle of wine has started the decline of many a man, but in Flip Wilson's case it sent him flying on a career in comedy. He finds only his success intoxicating these days.

About 15 years ago, Wilson was bellhopping in a San Francisco hotel and during his idle moments would sneak into the rehearsals of a nightclub act appearing there. Noting there was a break in the act while the group made a change, Wil-

son suggested that they bring in someone to fill the time.

"Have a drunk stagger on stage, it'll hold the audience's interest," he told them.

Wilson immediately volunteered for the part.

"I bought a bottle of white wine, got a big hat and baggy pants and walked out between acts and just started talking. I don't remember what I said, but the audience kept on laughing.

"The next night, they couldn't get me off the stage," he said. "I wasn't coming off as long as those people were laughing."

Flip doesn't require any fortification when he goes on stage now, whether it be nightclubs, concert halls or "Laugh-In." He spent 15 years honing his act, studying comedy, hitting the tank towns and big towns from San Francisco to Miami.

The results have been phenomenal. His first big break in television came on the Johnny Carson show, where his acceptance has been so rich that Carson continues to employ him as a substitute host. Wilson has also made 13 appearances on "Laugh-In," and will continue as guest star as "long as there is a 'Laugh-In'."

But the richest reward of all is a long-term exclusive contract with NBC calling for him to star in a series of his own specials.

After relating his current good fortune (Wilson is a very positive person), he leaned back on a sofa and said, "It took me 15 years to develop. I made it on my own and I'm very happy. I have no kick at all."

Flip was in southern California to accept a new challenge in his professional life — dramatic acting.

The producers of ABC's new comedy series, "Love, American style," had tailored a script for him — "Love and the Pool Hustler."

"I know I can do it and I'm going to prove it," he promised.

"The script is so good, I only read it once. Once the camera

starts something happens with me — it has on every trip. I want to let it happen without being too involved with the lines."

(During the filming of the show, Wilson ad-libbed freely and the director left all of it in.)

Wilson has had no dramatic training, but he believes all good comedians are essentially actors.

"I was the extrovert in grammar school," he recalled. "They couldn't turn me off, I was always reciting poetry and begging to be in the little school plays."

"Once we did the story of Clara Barton and I played a wounded soldier. They couldn't shut me up. And when the Caucasian girl who played Clara Barton got sick, they let me play her part. Man! It really turned that play around."

There is a possibility that Flip will have his own series. Within a forthcoming NBC special, he will appear in a 17-minute dramatic sketch with Stepin Fetchit, which as Flip says "could be a pilot for something later."

Paul Brinegar

Who Wants to be a Superstar?

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. (AP) — By now, the myth should be dispelled that every character actor is simply waiting around until he can get the lead in his own television series.

Paul Brinegar scoffs at the notion of becoming a superstar.

"More and more we're finding out, particularly on television, that it's hard to top yourself week after week," said Brinegar, who is the bearded and irascible Jelly Hoskins on "Lancer" on CBS.

"I love the top character supporting role," he said. "You get as much money, the same glory and the rest you need. I only have to work about three days a week."

Brinegar is at the top of the oortie of character actors whose job is to add flavor to

television and the movies. Before joining "Lancer" at mid-season, Brinegar had popped up consistently in such shows as "Bonanza," "Iron Horse," "Perry Mason," and "Daniel Boone."

Perhaps he is best known for his eight years as Washbone on "Rawhide."

After "Rawhide" left the air, Brinegar briefly left character parts. The experience was one that re-confirmed his dedication to supporting roles.

"I shaved my beard," he said. "I thought I was going to make a million dollars as a handsome leading man. Not only that, I went on a toupe."

"I thought I was well enough known that I was just selling a new image. Well, let me tell you, I couldn't get a job. Without this beard, I couldn't have gotten this job."

Does he lose himself in the personality of the character he is playing?

"Hell, I don't lose myself in a character. I make the character fit me," he laughed.

Between takes on the 20th Century Fox lot, where filming is under way for the second season of "Lancer," he said, "In television, if you're going to

have any public appeal, you can't invent a characterization. It has to be real if the public is going to accept it.

"I make the character fit me so well there's no situation I can't handle easily," he said.

"Of course, a freelancer who goes from role to role can throw himself into a part because he doesn't have to sustain characterization," he added.

Brinegar contends that some television writing is so shallow that "you're lucky to be able to even get in and create a scene." Asked what talents a character actor needs most, he answered, "Flexibility is a necessity. If you can only do it one way, you limit your job."

Beauty Contestants Turned into Dancers

NEW YORK (AP) — Most of the beauties who will compete next month for the title "Miss Universe" know nothing now about dancing beyond the ballroom variety. In a little more than three weeks, the 60 or 70 girls from all over the world will be performing as a dance troupe.

Viewers tuned in on the finals of the contest July 19 will know they are not watching the June Taylor dancers or the Rockettes, but if Gene Bayliss' luck holds, the contestants will get through a big production number with a certain amateur charm and maybe even grace.

Bayliss, a director-choreographer with wide Broadway and

television experience, also teaches dancing to contestants for "Miss U.S.A. and "America's Junior Miss."

"Always assume there will be no dancers among the girls," he said. "I start out by encouraging them: If you can walk, run, jump hop and count to eight, you can dance. That is true."

He is already blocking out the "Miss Universe" number on paper.

"I use only the very simplest steps:—basic rumba, Cha-Cha and backside front," he continued. "I use a lot of follow-the-leader stuff. I work with geometric figures and put the girls into a moving pattern that will substitute for real dancing."

Bayliss will put the girls through a cram course before and during the hectic week of preliminary judging. He will rehearse them in groups of 15, also throwing in some instructions about moving gracefully when they are parading solo in swimsuits or evening gowns.

"We show them there ways to keep more or less together," he said. "I teach them to count, usually up to eight and then start again, as they take the steps. We choose music that is familiar to most of them so they can follow it. And, often, the lyrics help—they know that when the singer comes to the word 'moon,' it's time to turn left."

"It usually works, but of course, sometimes you're stuck with a girl who really has two left feet."
