They Hope Tweedie Will Return

Two boys were returning home from school last June 17 when they came upon a young bluejay flying in the grass. The boy thought it was just another bird, and as soon as it landed, they thought it would fly back to its nest.

But when the boys returned to the spot where they saw the bird, it was still there. They picked it up and found that it had an injured leg. So one of the boys, Mitek (whose real name sounds like Meechaw), Duszny, 425 Benedict Dr., Wapping, took the bird home.

Launch Date Anniversary Of A-Bomb

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Historians studying 20th Century civilization on Planet Earth will have two reasons to recall July 16.

Teen-Agers Indicted In Fire Deaths

PARKERSBURG, W. Va. (AP) — Two teen-agers have been indicted on 12 counts of murder each in connection with the June 8 house fire that killed their mother and father and their 10 brothers and sisters.

Susan Bailey, 15, and her brother, Roger, 13, originally were charged with murdering their father, but the Wood County grand jury Tuesday returned indictments charging the pair with 12 counts of murder each. They will be arraigned Friday.

Police said Susan and Roger admitted pouring gasoline throughout the Bailey's store-room, frame and tarpaper home and throwing a burning piece of paper through an open window to touch it off.

The fire, according to police, followed an argument between Susan and her father concerning her dating a first cousin.

The lone survivor of the blaze was Obbie Bailey, 64, grandfather of the accused teen-agers. He jumped from a bathroom window in order to save his life.

Girl Found Innocent In Liquor Delivery

Just how a 13-year-old girl became "royally drunk" in a Rockville apartment on May 23 was the subject of conflicting testimony in a circuit court trial yesterday in Rockville.

Miss Barbara Robbins, 18, of 84 High St., Rockville, was charged with delivery of liquor to a minor. The minor, Susan Desno, appeared as a witness and said that she became "drunk" after she was brought her and another girl, 11, to the High St. apartment shared by Miss Robbins and Miss Candice Austin.

The young girl said she was given whiskey, first by Miss Robbins, then by Clifford Ellingwood of Rockville, and later by others. She claims she had six or seven partially filled cups of it, and that she became "drunk." Ellingwood pleaded guilty last week to delivering liquor to a minor. He was fined \$15.

The 13-year-old's mother, Mrs. Ruth Desno of 227 Phoenix St., Vernon, testified that she was watching television and heard a car drive up between 11:30 and 11:45. On investigation she said she found her daughter passed out on the front steps.

Miss Austin testified that at no time did Miss Robbins hand the girl any liquor. She related that she and the defendant left the girls with Clifford Ellingwood and a boy she identified only as John. She and Miss Robbins left with other dates and later returned she said to find the girls drinking with "whole mess of other people."

She added that she saw the 13-year-old pour herself a drink from a bottle of liquor.

Judge William Ewing directed Miss Austin's testimony, saying she would be believed. He nevertheless found the accused innocent. He said, "I have no doubt that she (the child) was royally drunk, but she didn't see the accused pour a drink for her."

Four or five teenage girls had to be warned by police to quiet down during the short trial. When it was over they caused a minor commotion leaving and making noise outside the courtroom door.

This was Miss Austin's second court appearance. Yesterday she was fined \$10 after pleading no contest to a charge of peace charged stemming from an incident in which she allegedly "slapped" a 19-year-old girl in the mouth during an altercation between four girls. The 15-year-old was treated at Rockville General Hospital.

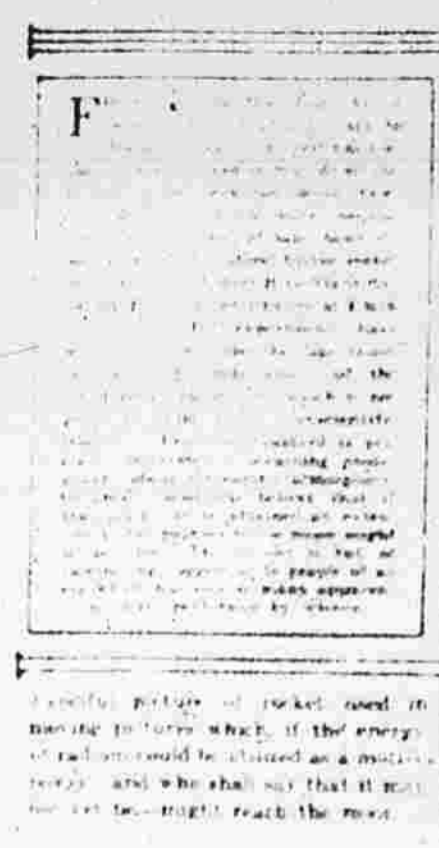
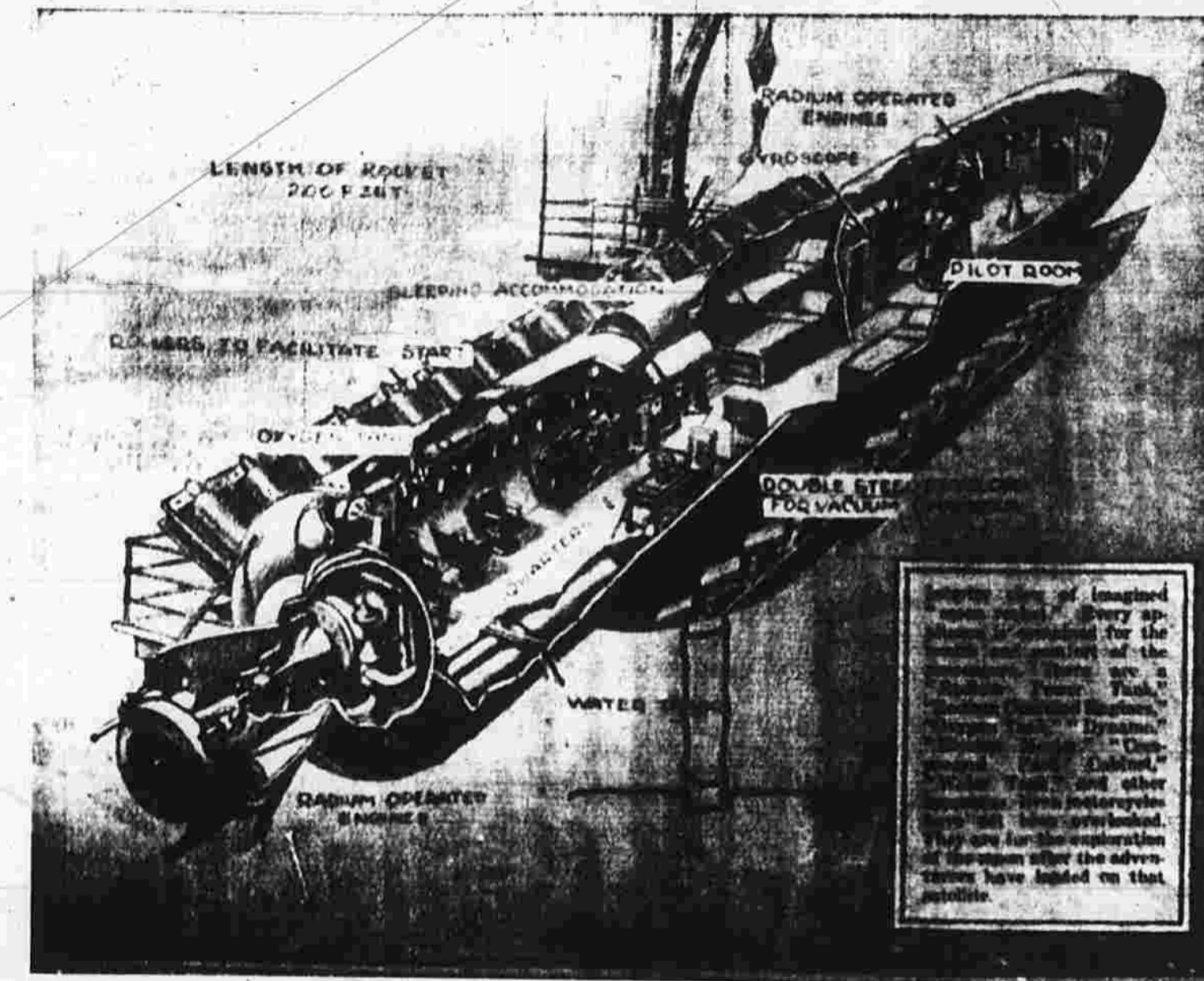


Illustration of a 50-Year-Old Moon Dream

Sunday's Late Spectacular: 'Live' Telecast from Moon

SPACE CENTER Houston, Tex. (AP) — America will be a country of sleepy people on Monday, July 21, and television will get the blame.

Man's first step on the surface of the moon will be telecast to earth and retransmitted coast to coast for home viewers. The first television show from the moon with live action will start at 2:12 a.m. on the East Coast and end at about 4:52 a.m., or perhaps later.

West Coast residents will have a little bit easier. The show will start at 11:12 p.m. Sunday and end at 1:32 a.m. Monday in the Far West.

That 2-hour and 40-minute television probably will have the poorest technical quality of any of the almost five hours of space television planned for Apollo 11. And it also will be the only portion in black and white.

The telecast will begin just before Neil A. Armstrong steps from a ladder on the moon lander to the lunar surface.

As he comes down the ladder, he'll pull a ring which will open the work bench in one side of the moon lander. The television camera is attached to the work bench and will start telecasting immediately.

The camera will catch a view of Armstrong's first step onto the moon, but the subsequent confirmation that the picture probably won't be top quality.

"I don't have high hopes that the picture will be nearly as

The lunar surface camera is a cigar box shaped device which operates on 6.5 watts and weighs less than two pounds on the moon. It is the only telecast in black and white.

Another Apollo television camera is on the command module, the mother ship which stays in a 69-mile orbit of the moon. This camera, the same type carried on Apollo 10, transmits in color and will be used for all of the Apollo 11 television except the moon, surface portion.

The telecast of the moon walk will be the longest space TV show ever, but it won't be the first telecast from the moon.

Some of the unmanned Surveyor spacecraft beamed television pictures back to earth.

The lunar surface television camera will be abandoned on the moon's surface and will be turned off before the launch from the moon. Officials said the television transmission is impossible during critical periods because of the large amount of critical data that must be transmitted during those periods.

Here is a tentative television schedule, with all times in Eastern Daylight Time.

July 17, 7:32:47 p.m.: transmits color and will be used for all of the Apollo 11 television except the moon, surface portion.

July 18, 7:32:47 p.m.: lunar surface, near the moon.

July 19, 4:00:41 p.m.: surface view of the moon from lunar orbit.

July 20, 1:52:22 p.m.: command module and lunar module flying close to each other after separation.

July 21, 1:57:07 a.m.: land-

Viet War Lull Holds As Wheeler Arrives

SAIGON AP — A lull continued today as Gen. Earle G. Wheeler, chairman of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff, arrived from Washington to assess the four-week-old slowdown in the war.

Wheeler came to Saigon for four days of conferences at U.S. headquarters and field locations, a command spokesman said. Adm. John S. McCain Jr., U.S. commander in chief in the Pacific, arrived shortly before Wheeler.

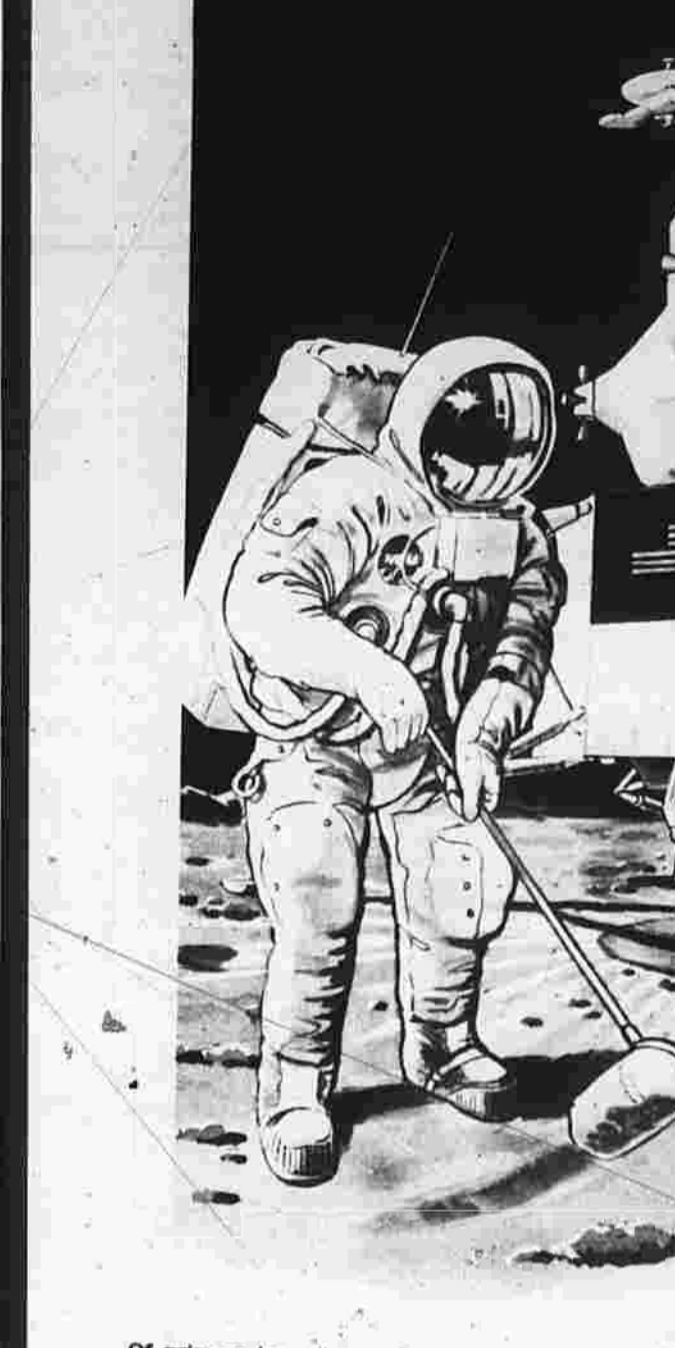
The U.S. Command reported its enemy shuffles during the night and an ambush of an American truck convoy north of Saigon. One American was killed and nine were wounded in the shuffles, and one was killed and six were wounded in the ambush, a spokesman said.

The command also reported the loss of an OH-6A helicopter, downed by enemy ground fire Tuesday near Phuoc Vinh, 37 miles north of Saigon. One American was reported killed in the crash, and two were injured. The report raised the unannounced total of helicopters lost in the war to 2,651.

A spokesman also clamped a tight lid on information concerning the status of Wheeler and McCain. 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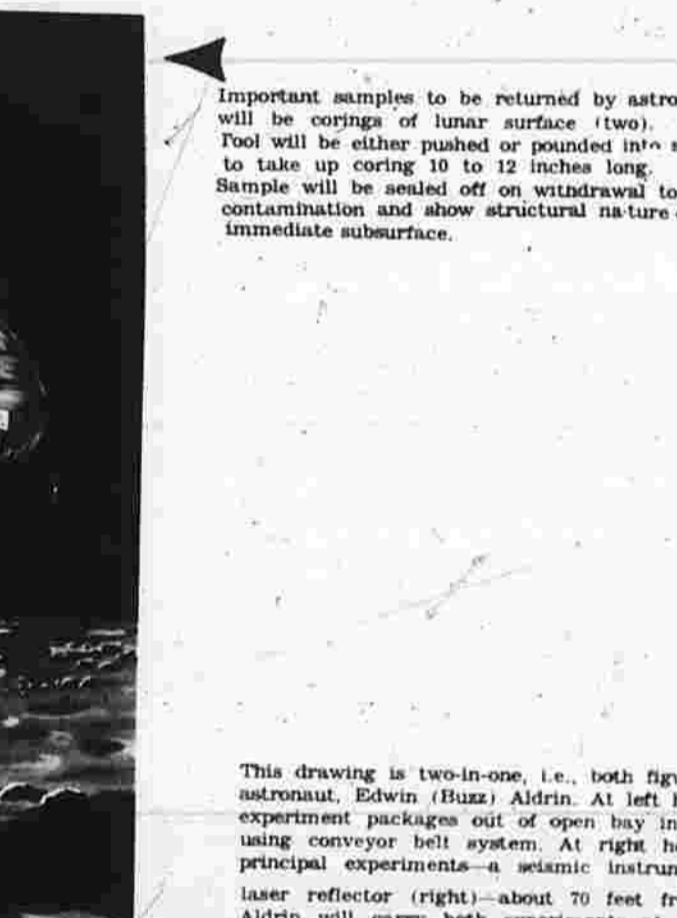

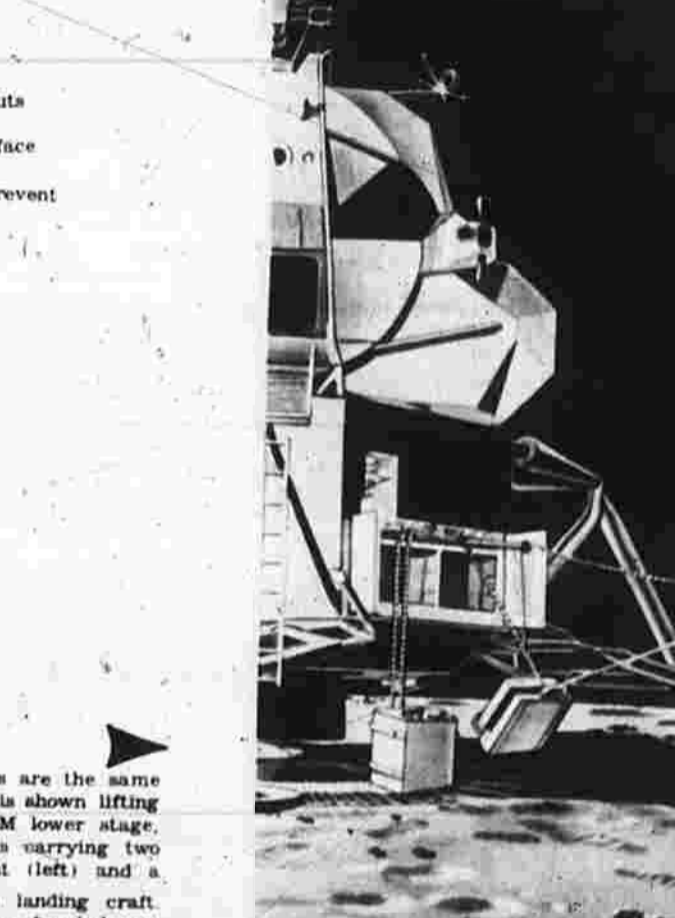

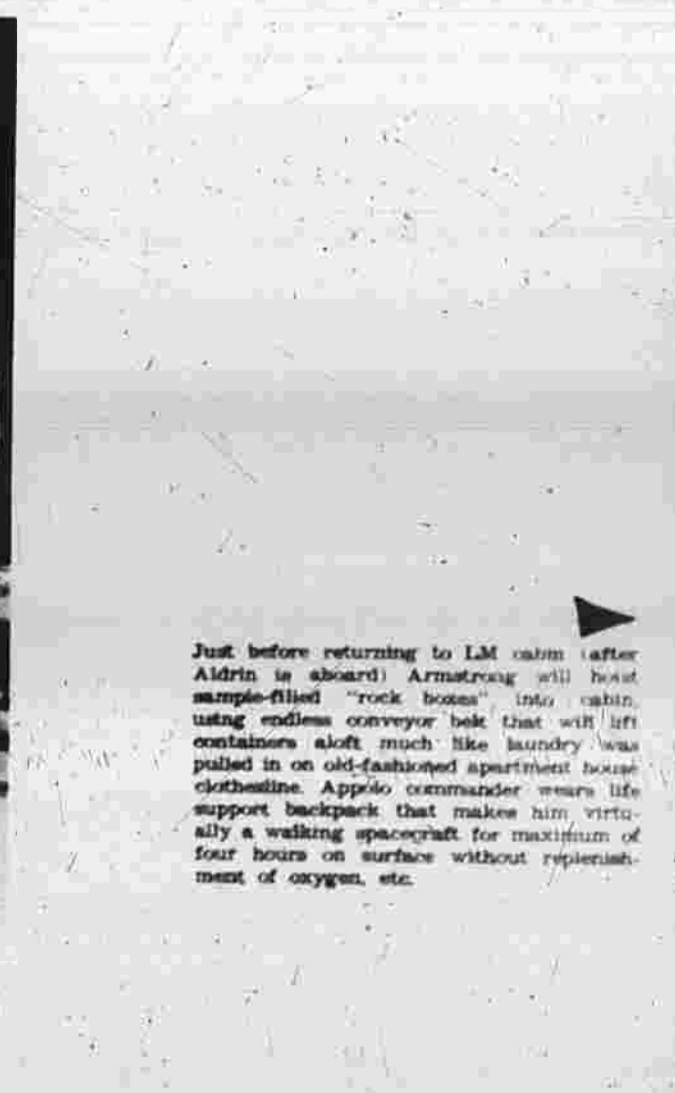

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Split-Week Living

Dr. Millard C. Fought, a Houston sociologist, has worked out a plan he calls "split-week living," which he believes can get us out of the urban crisis and the great American rat race.

Instead of the present five-day work week and two-day weekend, Dr. Fought advocates a three-day work week and a four-day "week end."

That is, we would all work three days and have four days off. Split-week living has many implications beyond the mere shortening of the work week and lengthening of the week-end. It would, Dr. Fought says, change the general quality of life.

As it is now, he points out, our leisure time is being used in a lot of leisure time, when you add it up on paper, but in reality it hardly exists.

What we call leisure time is so chopped up as to be all but useless. We can check some of it into watching TV, or reading, or working in the garden, or going out to dinner, or a movie.

But there isn't enough of it in our lives to permit us to really creative enterprise. Our leisure is in bits and pieces. And much of it is killed dead by driving time, the hours spent every day on the freeway.

Dr. Fought points out that under his plan the working man would have four days and five nights of uninterrupted leisure. No longer would it be mere time away from work, as we know it now. It would be an opportunity to experiment, to experiment, to grow and evolve as a person.

Dr. Fought has coined a word for this new kind of leisure. He calls it "timewealth."

The following will serve as a guide to the concept of "timewealth": First, he can afford to get out of the city and out of the rat race. On his three-day work week he will stay in the city, spending the two nights out at a dormitory near his job.

That he will have to drive to his job and back once every day. He need not live near his job. He can take a place in the suburbs, away from the urban chaos.

He can get to know his children. Many even his wife. At first, Dr. Fought concedes, the divorce rate might go up. There would be a lot of divorces, with a stranger around with a divorcee's name.

But in time the man who has timewealth will be a better father, a better husband, a better citizen.

Meanwhile, the national economy will spin on, more productive than ever, manned by two three-day work week teams. It will have a three-day work week.

For years I have advocated a similar plan—the seven day week. He would work five days and have two off, as now. But there would be seven weekends instead of one.

He would not only have the Saturday-Sunday weekend, but also a Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and so on.

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Space Treaty Gives Rights To Apollo 11

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Although the moon is international territory, there is no question about the legal rights of the Apollo 11 astronauts to land and explore it in the name of the United States.

The only major requirements are that it be done according to international law and for the benefit of all countries.

Legal experts say the 1967 space treaty clearly recognizes the right of individual countries in the exploration of celestial bodies even though it refers to astronauts as "envoys of mankind."

The 1967 pact, which deals specifically with the moon and other celestial bodies, guarantees the free access of all countries and declares there must be complete freedom of scientific investigation.

There is nothing in space law to prevent astronauts from displaying or planting their nation's flag. There is nothing to require them to carry any national symbols, such as the United Nations flag.

The Soviet Union, in fact, already has set a precedent by sending a Soviet hammer and sickle emblem to the moon to an unmanned capsule in a rocket launch on Feb. 3, 1968. At that time Soviet officials declared it had not claimed ownership of the area where the landing took place.

The space treaty says that outer space, including the moon and other celestial bodies, is not subject to national appropriation by claim of sovereignty, by means of use or occupation, or by any other means.

Not many other restrictions apply to astronauts. Neil A. Armstrong and Edwin E. Aldrin Jr. They must exercise care that they do not contaminate the moon or bring back substances which might have a harmful effect on the earth environment.

They must provide full information to other countries. And they must confine their activities to peaceful purposes.

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An AA Meeting

(Ed. Note: Alcoholics Anonymous is for people most closely affected by alcoholism. AA-teen is for the teenage sons and daughters of alcoholics. This story is about a meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous. On consecutive days, The Herald reports a typical meeting of AA-teen.)

Bad was an alcoholic and died from the disease.

Dick told Bud's story, days after Bud's death, to 16 alcoholics during a weekly open discussion meeting of the AA at the First Congregational Church in Coventry. Dick sponsored Dick when he first got into AA.

Dick started by saying, "My name is Dick. I'm an alcoholic."

He then touched on his own history. He father drank but never admitted that he was an

alcoholic. Two AA members once came to his father's house but he threw them out. He called them quacks and said he was no kind of bum and held a job.

Besides, his father told the boys, he drank beer.

"I thought that I would never drink," Dick said. "Because, I didn't want to be as miserable and mean as my father."

When Dick was 15, his father committed suicide in the same fashion as his father and his father before him. All three hung themselves.

Dick joined the Army and drank a few beers. Over time, he began to drink beer constantly. He liked the taste of it and what it did to him, he recalled.

Back home, he continued beer drinking. He was arrested once in a while for breach of the peace, but he paid his fine and forgot it each time.

He said he drove and drank, but was a "protective" driver. He met his wife, a nurse, and dated her every evening before he went on duty. After he said goodnight, he would go drinking. They got married.

"The police called the next morning and I went to bed," he said.

"I thought my drinking wasn't a problem and I could quit at any time," he said.

At age 24, Dick met Bud. They lived in the same apartment at the time. Bud asked him over for a drink, but when Dick brought his own six-pack into Bud's kitchen, his wife was pouring a bottle of liquor down the drain.

"You don't have the problem he has," Dick recalled her telling him.

"I picked up my six-pack and ran home. I didn't want to associate with an alcoholic," Dick said, to laughter from around the table.

Bud and Dick did associate. Bud was a periodic drinker. When he was sober, he would brag about his beer drinking and urge him to join AA. But then Bud would get drunk and Dick would be sure AA was no good.

Finally, Bud got Dick to go to an AA meeting in Vernon. Dick said he was sorry only all the "bottom" drinks joined AA. He would not go to another meeting for about a year and he drank.

"I'd tried to stop drinking. But it was humanly impossible," he said. "And I was drunk on the first."

He went to the Vernon meeting again. He came late, kept quiet, and left early. But he was able to keep sober for about a year and decided he did not need AA. Six months later, he was drinking again.

"I drank continuously every day. But I wasn't having the fun I'd had before," he said.

He felt pitiful and alone. He considered suicide.

Dick again went back to the Vernon AA. The first thing he heard was, "Hi Dick. How are you?" Soon he was attending three to seven AA meetings per week around the state. He went whenever he felt uncomfortable.

"AA shows me my thinking is typical alcoholic. But knowing more about myself, I can control my emotions. The program has shown me how to change my self," he said.

Apparently Bud could not get the AA program.

Bud was a great AA speaker. He got many alcoholics into AA and spoke at many AA meetings. But he could not seem to hear his own words.

had a seizure. Soon he was dead.

"Despite everything Bud had done," Dick said summing up. "He died in an AA home, with AA people. And he died sober."

Dick then asked each man around the table to make a few remarks. One or two passed, but everyone else had at least a few words to say. They included a bartender, a doctor, a social worker, a plumber, a mechanic, an engineer, a truck driver, and a musician.

They ranged in age from 27 to 72. About Bud, a man said, "The program does get complicated. We can forget what we are."

A man in his 70s said to Dick, "I always get a great kick out of seeing a young man latch onto this program with their whole lives ahead of them."

The older man said, "It's not about Dick's beer drinking. It's about the strength or quality of what we drink. It's what drink does."

Another man brought up a common figure on AA success and failure. About 50 per cent of the people who come to AA stay here all their lives. Another 25 per cent are in and out before they make it.

From the four corners of this country will appear on a new four-stamp set honoring the XI International Botanical Congress on Aug. 23 in Seattle. That's when some 6,000 botanists will convene for the first full international meeting ever held in the U.S.

The new stamps will be printed on the same sheet in the same way as the recent Beautification of America four-stamp set. Postmaster General Winston M. Blount said that he believes these four new stamps will be rated high on the list of the nation's most attractive postal issues.

The pane arrangement is as follows: In the upper left, the Douglas fir representing the Northwest; in the upper right, the lady's slipper from the Northeast; in the lower left, the cactus found in the Southwest; and in the lower right the Franklinia of the Southeast. The identifications are in Latin but on each stamp are the words: "XIth International Botanical Congress. The Post Office will honor requests for all positions or combinations on first-day covers. The conventional policy on plate blocks will remain in effect.

Collectors desiring first-day cancellations may send addressed envelopes, together with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster, Seattle, Wash. 98101. The envelope to the Postmaster should be endorsed "First-Day Covers Botanical Series." Requests must be post-marked no later than Aug. 23.

The Macabiah Games to be held in July at the Ramat Gan Stadium in Israel, will be commemorated with a special postage stamp, according to the Israel Post Office. The stamp is the first in a series of stamps to be issued in Israel. The seventh took place in 1965.

Previous issues commemorating the Macabiah appeared in 1950, 1953 and 1958.

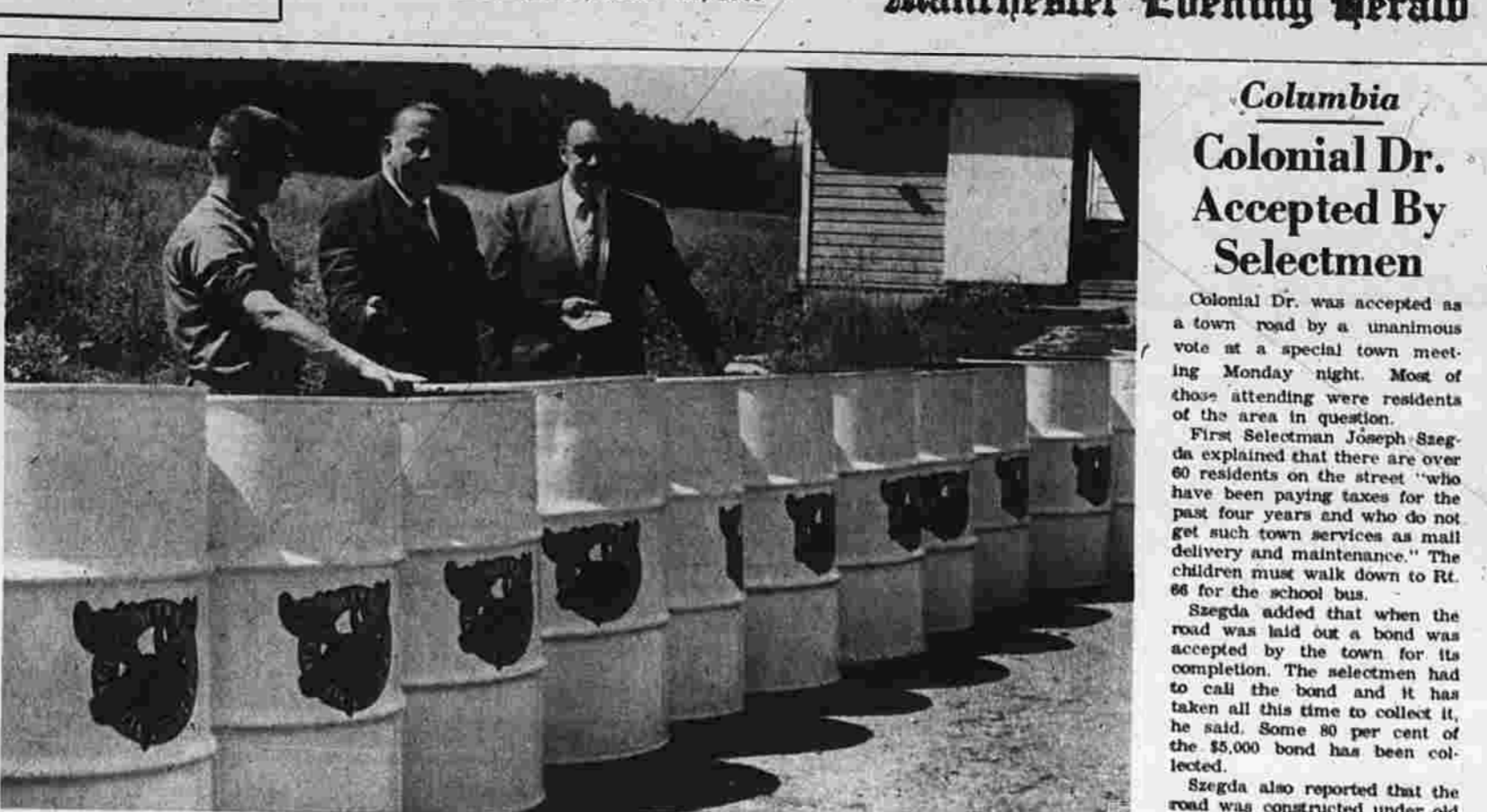

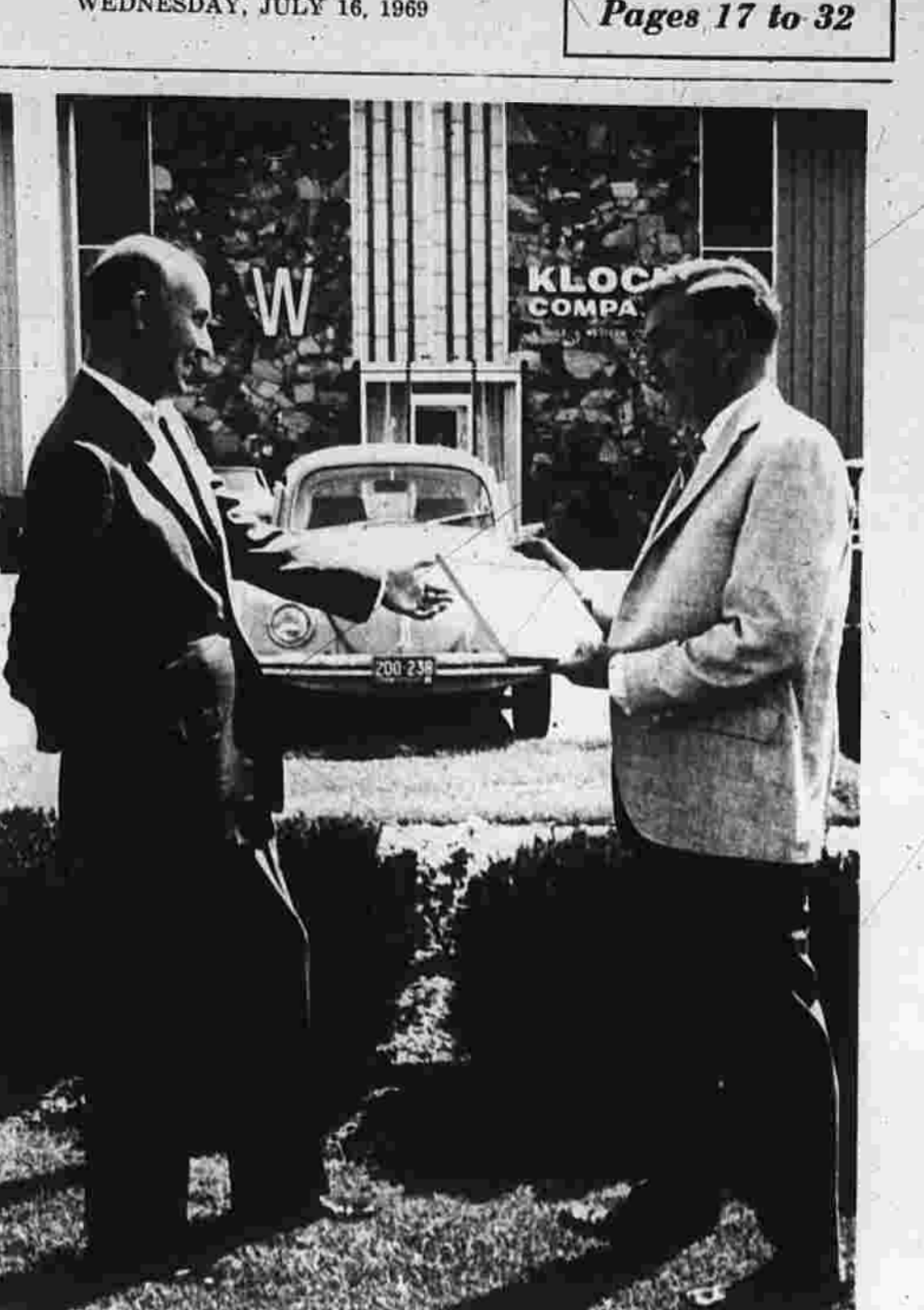

Status of Human Transplants

EARS
Human ear drums and the tiny bones of the ear are being transplanted from the dead to the deaf to cure a common form of deafness.

Ear specialists at the Royal National Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital, London, and Royal London Hospital have closed holes in the ear drums (tympanic) of 23 patients with grafts of paper-thin layers of cadaver tympanicum. Blood vessels grow from the edges of the graft to form new skin that usually covers the ear drums within two weeks. The problems of rejection, which bedevil transplants of heart, liver and other organs, do not arise.

So far 65 per cent of the patients have been able to hear after the hearing aids have been discarded. Others have found that for the first time a hearing aid will help them. The operation cannot help people with severe deafness because the condition known as otosclerosis.

Deafness from perforation of the drum is usually caused by otitis media, i.e. infection of the middle ear, common in childhood. Although 90 per cent of such infections can be cured with alpha drugs or antibiotics, the disease is still widespread.

As well as performing the ear drum operation, Dr. Van Rood has been busy with a bone marrow cell transplant.

Cupid Struck In Nursery

WETHERSFIELD, Conn. (AP) — On July 1, 1949, a newborn infant named John Axtor was placed in the nursery at Hartford Hospital next to another newborn named Shireen D'Altilio.

No one appeared to notice that the two babies, who shared the same room, giggled together. It was not until the mothers of the two babies, who shared the same room, giggled together, that the hospital staff noticed the babies were talking to each other.

John, now a 20-year-old junior at the University of Connecticut, and Shireen, a 20-year-old hair dresser (she's 16 years older than John), are being married Saturday.

"Cupid struck in the nursery," said Shireen's mother, Mrs. William D'Altilio of Waterbury.

Within eight hours the thymus was safely transplanted into the chest of one of the boy's abdominal muscles.

A report of the case in the medical literature involved says that within a week the boy had improved remarkably. His infection vanished, his blood count became normal, his antibodies soared and, significantly, a skin graft from his father which had failed to take, now took.

The link-up that restores hearing is completed at a second operation some months later. Numerous data from the various operations are being stored for later computer analysis to find what set of conditions make for the best results.

KIDNEYS
In London Dr. Van Rood is already operating a highly efficient organ transplant registry.

The new technique arose from three years of surgical experiments on rats by Michael Leurgans working at the orthopedic department at St. Mary's Hospital and the National Institute for Medical Research. Now he has operated on four children, aged 6 to 70, whose knee cartilage "conditions" had been eroded so that bone rubbed constantly against bone. All patients found their pain immediately relieved.

There are no ethical snags in the transplant as cartilage remains viable up to 48 hours after the death of the donor. As soon as a young "donor" with healthy joints becomes available, Laurence will continue the operation at the Royal National Orthopedic Hospital this month.

The method consists of cutting out the lower end of the donor's femur (thighbone) and the upper end of the corresponding tibia with a high-speed drill. Inside the femur is a cavity of an egg shell. It is left with a thin rim of bone with cartilage on top.

A chest is then used to sculpt the surface of the recipient's femur at the joint to enable the graft to fit like a cap. This procedure is repeated with the tibia of donor and recipient, and finally the joint is closed.

After the operation the rim of donated bone fuses with that of the recipient—although it is ultimately rejected and disappears. However, the remaining pads of cartilage are "immortal."

Nixon Watches As Rare Triple Play Is Recorded

Washington Times Tigers, Cullen's Blast in Orbit

NEW YORK (AP) — Tim Cullen's lunar probe made a soft landing in the visitors' bullpen — a feat the President of the United States off his feet. 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The victory, second for the Senators in the five game series in New York, moved them within one game of the three-place Tigers in the American League East.

First place Baltimore trimmed Cleveland 5-1 behind right-hander Tom Phoebus and led 14 games ahead of runner-up Boston, which split a doubleheader at New York, winning 7-6 before bowing to the Yankees 4-1. Oakland topped Seattle 6-2 and California beat Kansas City 5-2 in other AL games.

The Minnesota Chicago game was postponed because of wet grounds.

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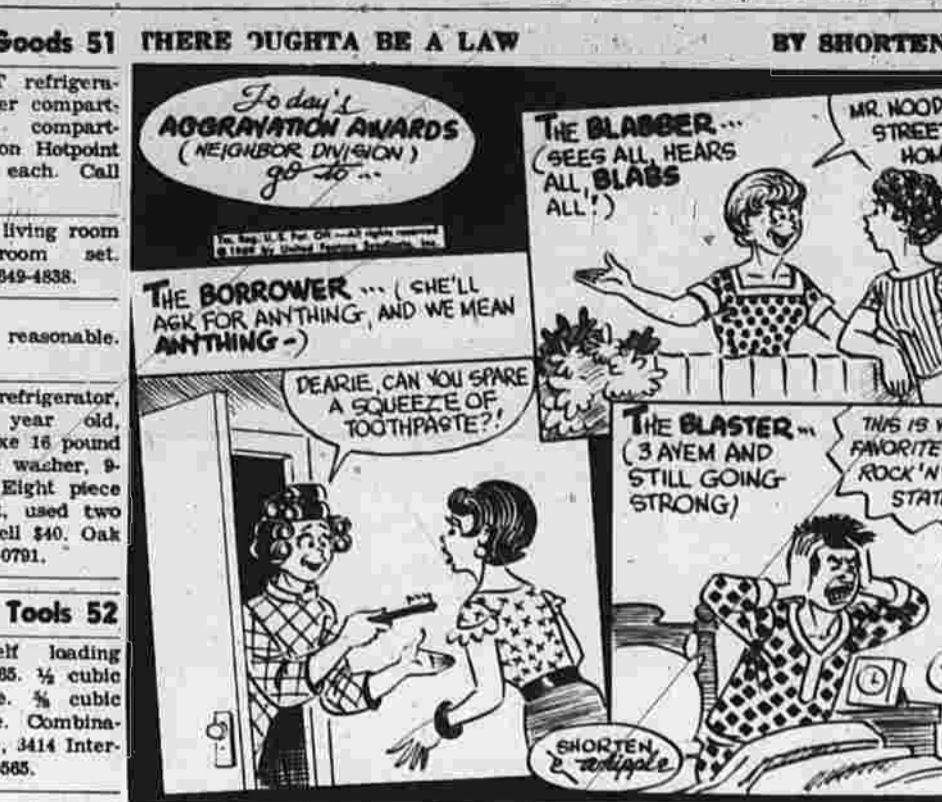

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Pfizer, Six Other Firms Face Drug Monopoly Charge

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Nixon administration, trying to curb rampant drug prices, has charged seven major drug firms with using a fraudulent patent to monopolize sales of a leading antibiotic.

The action marked the second time in a week Justice Department antitrust enforcers moved against drug patents in a concerted drive for more competition in the industry.

In Tuesday's suit, filed in federal court here, Pfizer was accused of obtaining a fraudulent patent in 1955 on the drug tetracycline, the nation's largest seller of broad spectrum antibiotics.
