Scheduled in 1972-73 Okinawans Said Anxious Over Reunion with Japan

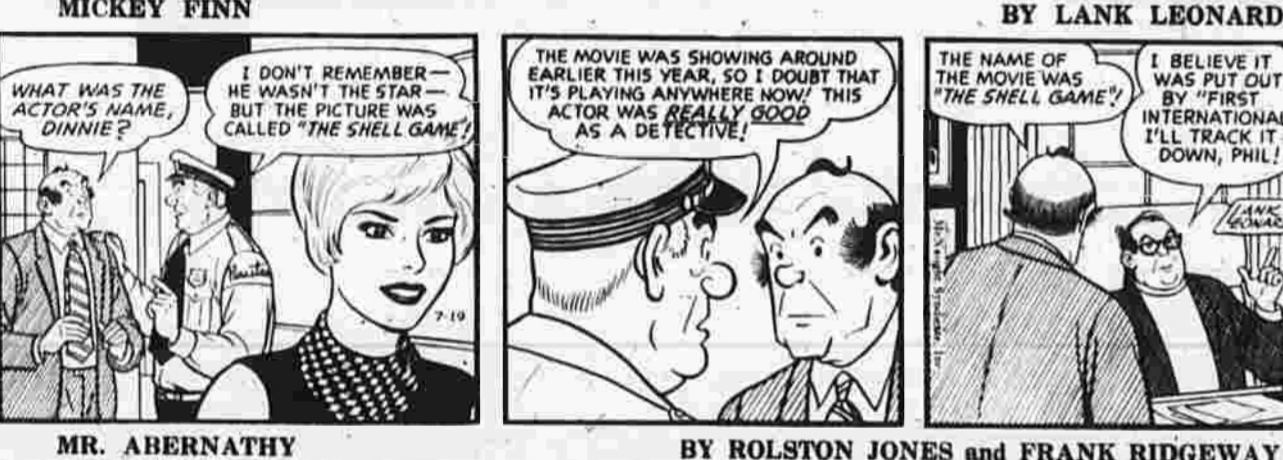

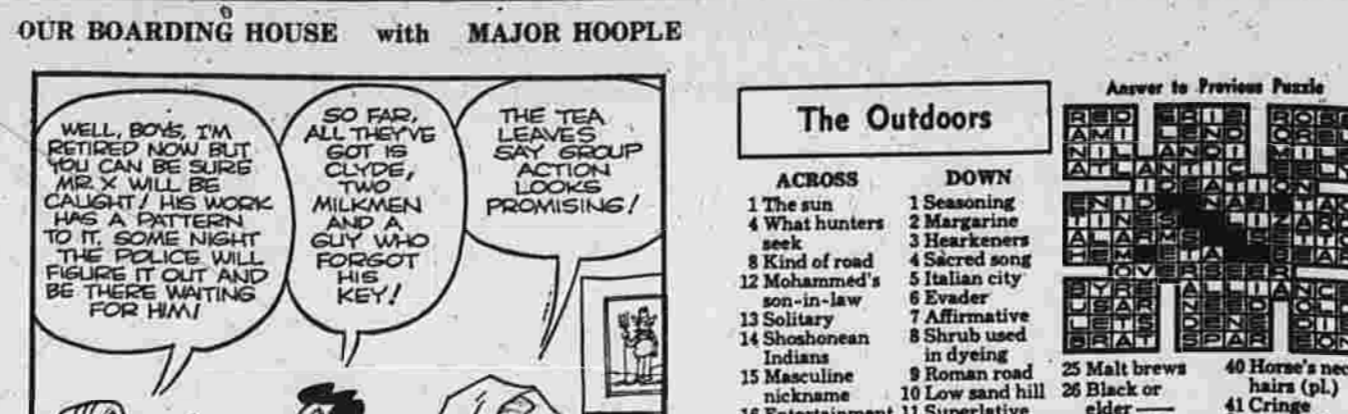

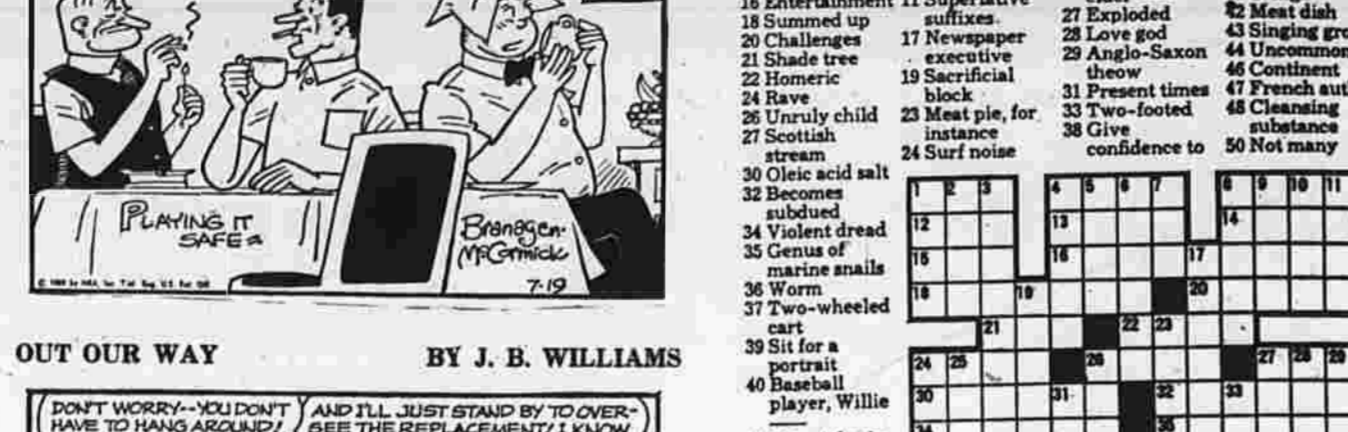

New Assistant Pastor Will Join St. Mary's

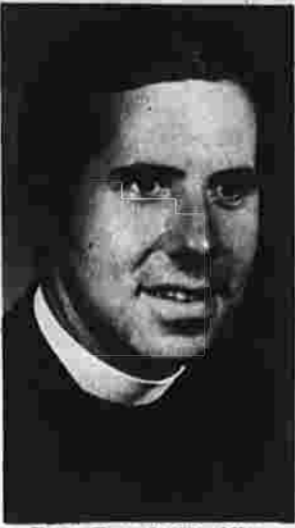

She'd Rather Giggle

 HOLLYWOOD (AP) — To get to Barbara Feldon's home you put the car into gear and aim it for the sky.

Barbara lives in a two-bedroom house perched at the top of the Hollywood Hills, in ear-popping, cliff-hanging drive up from the smoggy valley below.

Dressed in a black sweater and pants, Barbara was at the door and padded about the house in her stocking feet. Her dark hair was pulled back into a pony tail and bangs and she looked ready for a caper as Agent 99 on "Get Smart."

The series, which copped Emmies as the outstanding comedy show and for star Don Adams, was snatched up for next season by CBS when NBC dropped it.

Settling on the sofa, Barbara said, "It really was a shock, because our ratings were very good. It was a surprise, not a shock. I wasn't dismayed, however. I had a feeling of buoyancy. Suddenly, the whole horizon opens to you. Movies, my own series."

She laughed. "The next day CBS bought it and I felt that a great sense of security had settled back over me."

Barbara said she couldn't be happier with the life she leads. "We shoot in three days and that gives me four days free," she said. "On the set you're romping, wearing funny costumes. I love to put moustaches on."

"With four days off you can live, that's what you can do, which is what most actors complain about. I take guitar lessons on my day off. I can play tennis. I have friends in for a dinner a few nights a week."

Barbara was asked about reports that she and Don, her husband on the show, will have

twins early in the season in an effort to boost the ratings.

"That's what I've read in the papers," she said. "We did a show last week where I just told Don I was going to have a baby. My progress is going to be rather rapid. As you watch, folks!

"I was afraid when we got married last year that it wouldn't work out. But it opened new avenues for the writers," Barbara said. "They tell me they can handle the babies, too."

Standing on a tripod by the

sliding glass doors of the living room was a six-inch telescope. "I look at the moon, mainly," she explained. "I love to see the sun hit the tops of the mountains on the moon. You can get lost in that."

Barbara was asked what kind

of movie roles she wanted to play. "It would be easier to do the dramatic parts I trained for," she said, "but that leaves you feeling wrung out after a day of crying on the set. I'd rather giggle and laugh and joke and romp."

A Comedy About an Integrated School

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Room 222," an ABC series that proposes to take an honest look

at an integrated high school, goes before the cameras this week.

Before anyone thinks it will be a translation of the black headlines, it should be said it is a situation comedy. Or, as the creators prefer to call it, a drama told with humor.

"We're not going to do a social documentary," said Gene Reynolds, the producer at 20th Century Fox. "That's not the frame of reference. But any subject we undertake we'll do realistically."

"Our initial objective is to be entertaining. We are getting a lot of admonitions to keep it light, but we're not going to make it light if it hurts our story."

Jim Brooks, the writer-creator of "Room 222," said, "Take the story in which flu strikes the school and 50 per cent of the teachers are out. There's no reason why that can't be funny. But if the story is about the exploitation of a black athlete, it can't be funny."

Lloyd Haynes plays the black teacher whose classroom is Room 222. Denise Nicholas is the guidance counselor and his

love interest. Michael Constantine is the principal and Karen Valentine is the student teacher assigned to Haynes' room.

Haynes, whose handsome face has a quick grin, is a late starter as an actor. He didn't play his first role until 1961, when he was 26 and a production manager for a company turning out television game shows.

He enrolled in the Film Industry Workshop and it wasn't long before a director spotted him and got him a role in a series pilot that didn't sell. That led to a small part in "Star Trek" and his career began to orbit.

His picture credits include "Ice Station Zebra," "Madigan" and "The Mad Room."

He studied stunt work with Jock Mahoney, then took over the job himself. "It's teaching actors how to move and fall and fight. To become aware of their bodies and how to use them better. If you have difficulty moving your body you may stumble over a set."

"Some people, for instance, don't know how to get in and out of a car," he said. "They do it every day, but when they try it in a scene they can't do it."

Haynes, who is single, has put himself on a rigorous schedule for the show. "I get up at four o'clock in the morning and learn my dialogue for a couple of hours," he said. "I work out for half an hour, have breakfast and go to work. I get home at seven o'clock and zonk right out."

He admits he is excited about his first starring role. "There's so much going on in schools today," Haynes said.

He said he hopes the role stays honest. "When I say honest, I mean that they don't make him superteacher. He'll have hangups, but they shouldn't be negative ones."

The show's approach to problems—by which a problem will be examined through its effect on a character—also appeals to Haynes. "I like a one-to-one relationship," he explained. "That makes it easier to handle than a generalized approach."

TONY CURTIS HOST

Tony Curtis will be the host when circus artists from around the world perform their award-winning acts on "Timex Presents the All-Star Circus: The Official Circus Hall of Fame Awards Show," a one-hour program to be broadcast on Sept. 8.

It is scheduled to be taped at the famed Cirque d'Hiver arena in Paris early in July.
