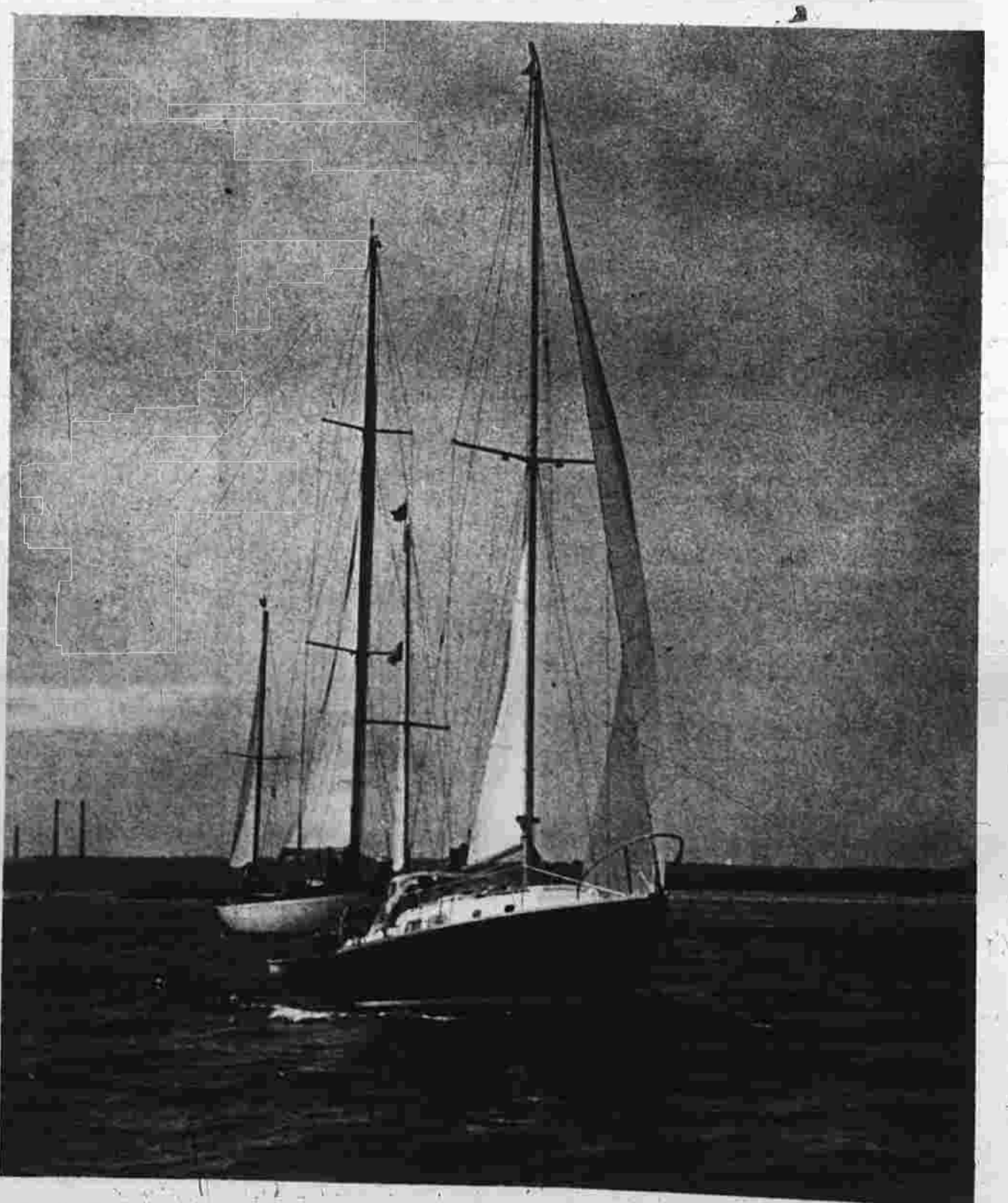
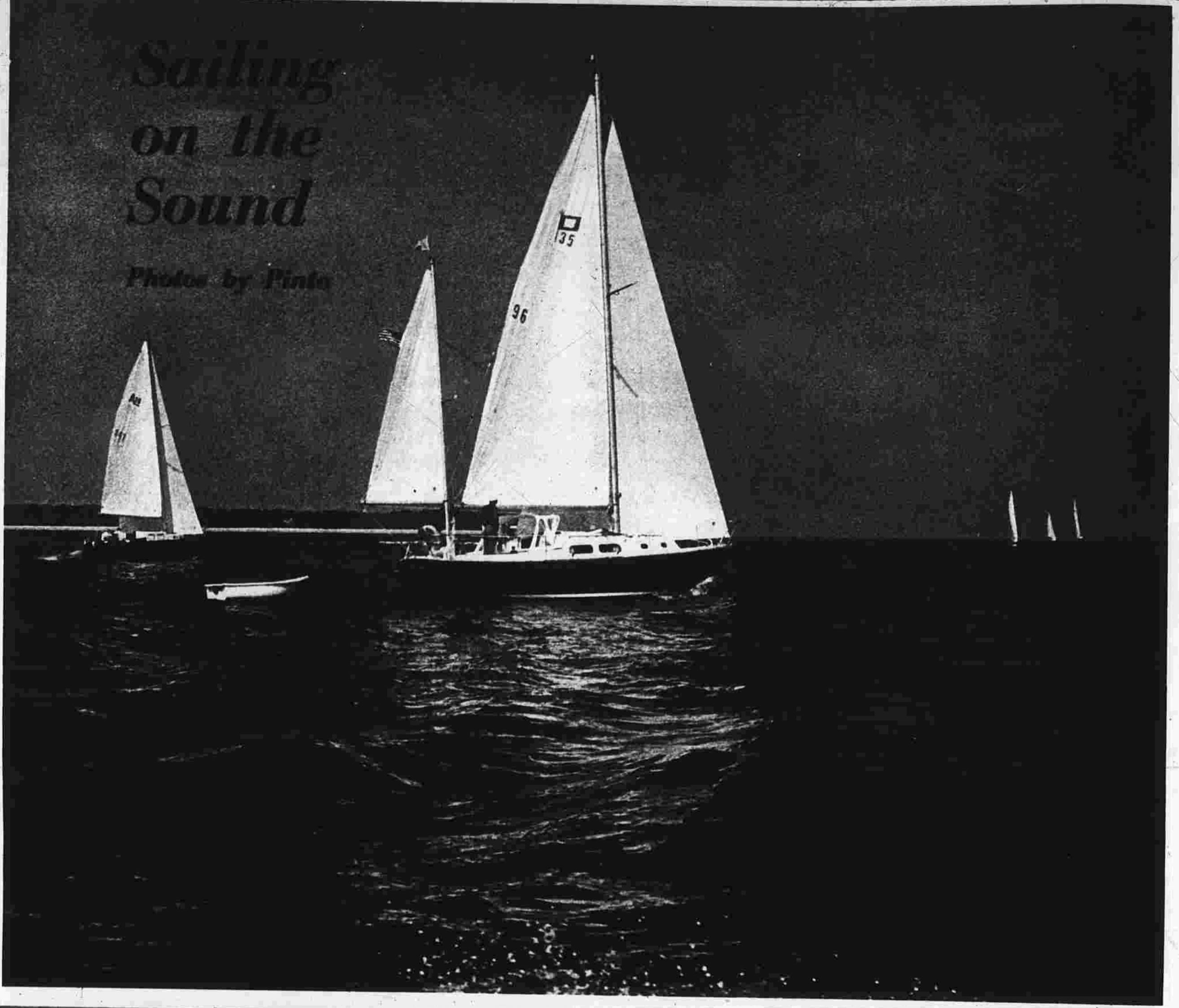

Ohio Guards Reduced In Relative Calm

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — A calm in Columbus's troubled near East Side led Ohio National Guards officers today to plan gradual reduction in the 1,200-man Guard force on duty here.

Armed policemen and Guardsmen continued to patrol streets in the area where violence erupted Monday night and continued early Tuesday.

There were approximately 100 arrests, mostly for curfew violations, but little trouble in the area Tuesday night. Arrests since the rioting began Monday totaled about 304.

The arrests have been taxing facilities at the county jail, and some of those arrested were lodged in the county workhouse. Few have been able to raise the \$1,000 bonds set for curfew violations.

Adjutant General Sylvester T. Del Corso, in command of the four Guard units, said Tuesday night was "reasonably calm."

"Everything is going real well and if it keeps up we will be able to release the entire force Thursday morning," he added.

About a quarter of the force is expected to be released during the day.

15 State Alarm Set in Kidnaping Of Buffalo Baby

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — A 15-state all points alarm has been issued by police for a woman who was reported to have kidnaped a one-year-old girl from a baby stroller Tuesday.

Police said Patricia Ann Martin, the youngest of two daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Murray Martin, was taken from the stroller around noon by a heavy-set woman who drove a yellow convertible Volkswagen.

The infant's eight-year-old sister, Shellee, who was pushing the stroller along a street near a park, told police the woman stopped her car, backed it into an adjacent parking lot and got out of the vehicle.

Police said the woman gave Shellee \$1 and asked her to go into a nearby store for some milk.

Upon returning from the store, the baby and the woman had disappeared, police reported.

"I can't think of any reason other than some frustrated woman wanting a child as a motive in this case," Buffalo Police Detective Chief Ralph V. Deghardt said. "The Martin family is not well-to-do so money isn't the motive," he said.

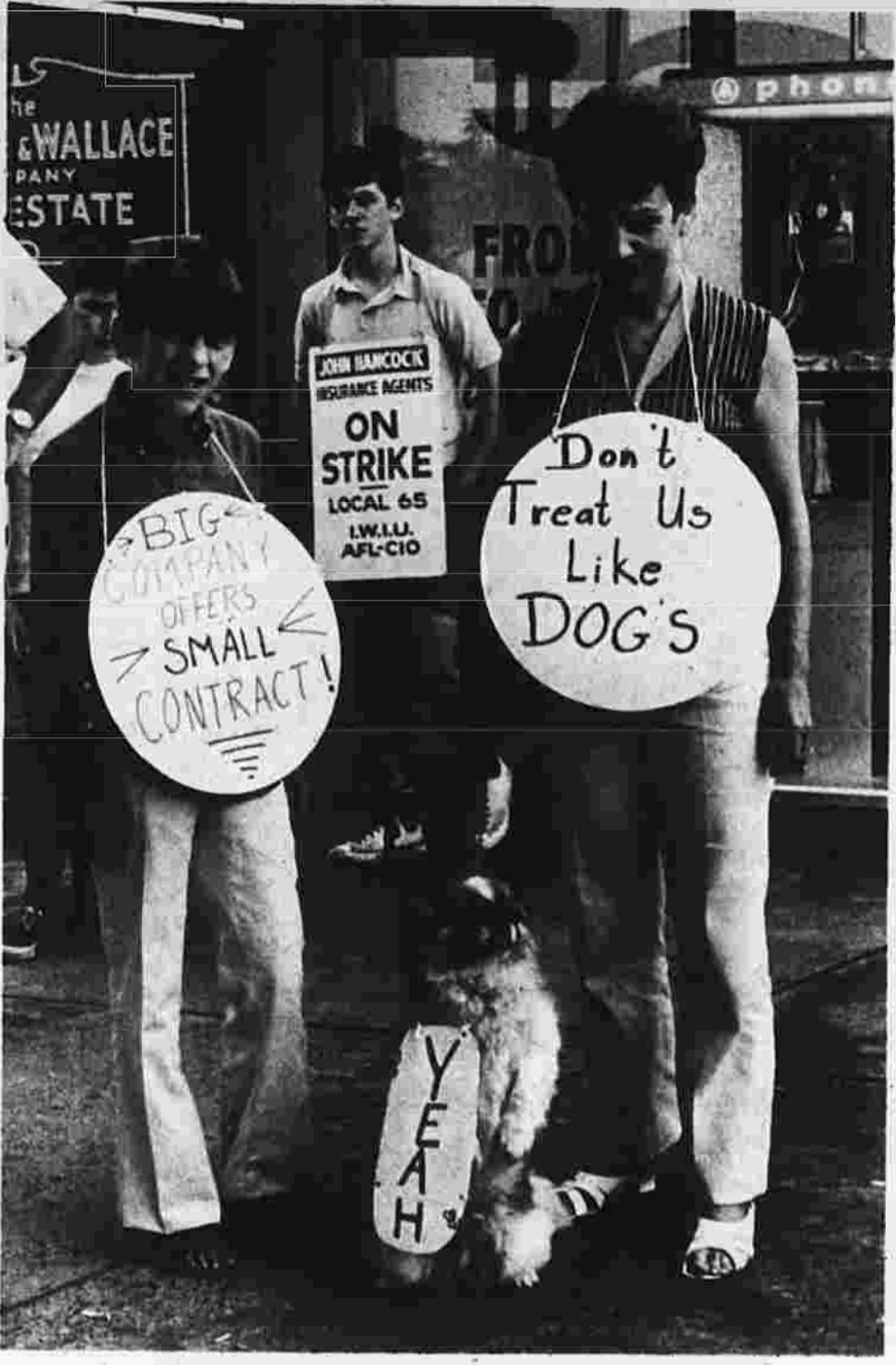
Mafia Members Indicted by Jury

WASHINGTON (AP) — Thirty persons, some described as members of the Mafia, have been indicted by a federal grand jury on charges of conspiracy and racketeering in connection with a loan from a Teamsters Union pension fund, Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell announced today.

Mitchell said the indictments were returned Monday by a federal grand jury in New York City, culminating a long investigation by federal agents in three states.

At mid-morning the FBI said nine persons had been taken into custody; three others had been ordered to surrender and one was being sought as a fugitive.

The grants from the Office of Education are to help pay the cost of educating the children of federal employees.

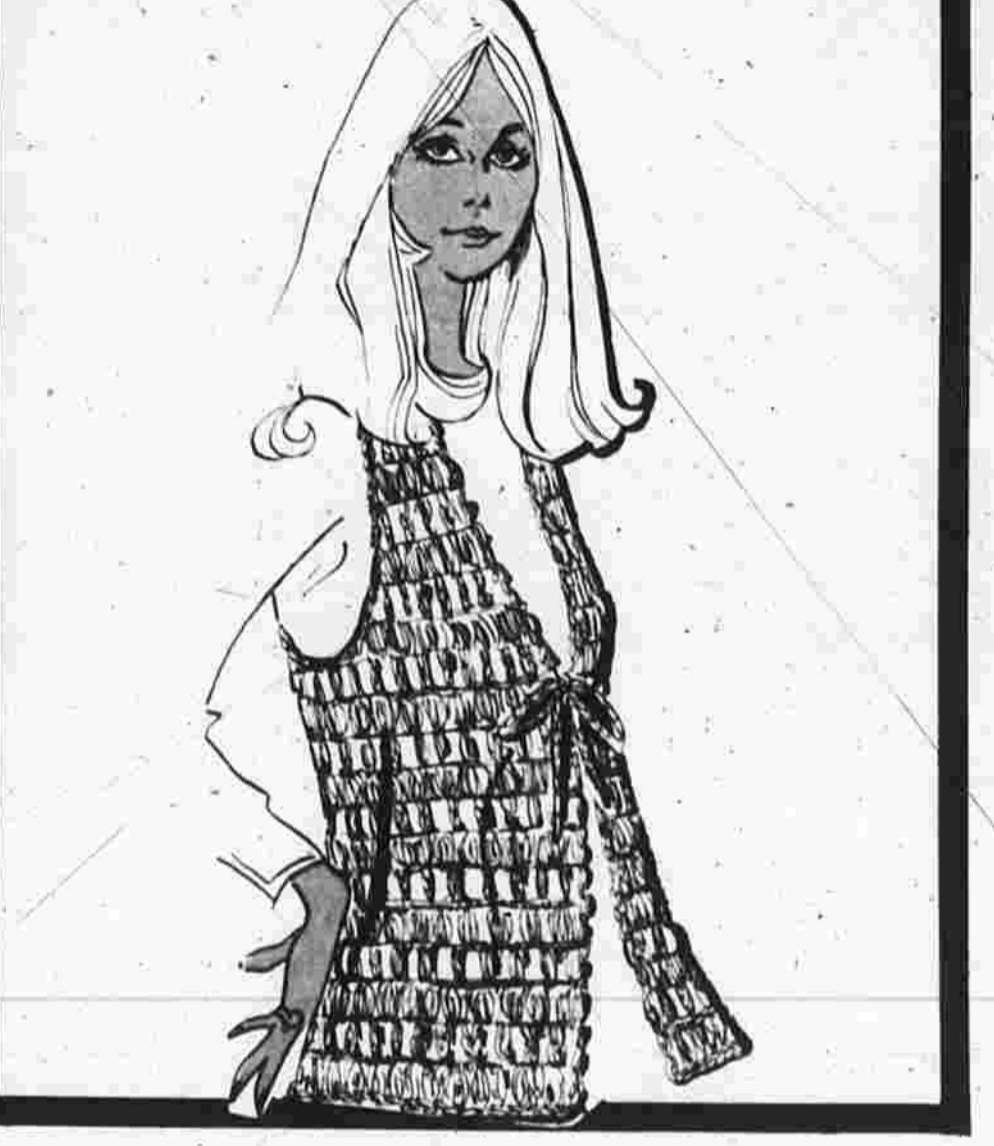

Tolland Town, Highway Workers Reach New Salary Pact

The Board of Selectmen last night announced a new agreement reached with the town highway personnel which provides for increases in salaries and insurance to be paid for the employees, but with the employer responsible for paying for the portion to cover his family.

Salary increases for laborers rose from \$2.25 an hour to \$2.65, and for truck drivers and light equipment operators from \$2.25 to \$2.55, while the crew chief remained at \$3.25 an hour.

Seven paid holidays are provided for, as are six days of sick leave and three days of personal leave per year.

Vacations are based on five days for the first year; 10 days after two years, and 15 days after 15 years.

When an employee uses sick or personal leave he will be required to notify the superintendent of roads, otherwise the time off will be considered leave without pay.

Vernon First Six-Month Phase Of C-DAP Program Ends

The first six months of the community development program for Vernon (C-DAP) will be completed the end of the next six months. To this date, the program has spent \$110,000. The next six months will be spent on the second phase of the program.

The breakdown of the \$110,000 is as follows: housing code inspector, \$24,244; housing code enforcement, \$10,000; recreation director, \$10,000; redevelopment director, \$10,000; housing survey information needed, \$10,000; Authority director, \$8,250; map survey analysis of the housing, or, \$4,125; and town planner, including apartments and site plan, \$2,000.

CONNECTICUT NEWS BRIEFS

Removal Ordered
HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—Gov. John Dempsey has ordered the removal of a Civil War relic from the ruins of the Capitol after Army engineers discovered it contained live projectiles.

Dempsey ordered that the cannon balls and projectiles embedded in the trunk of a tree cut from Smedley Hill, Tenn., after the Battle of Chancellorsville, Sept. 19 and 20, 1862, be removed and taken to a safe-looking area for final determination.

The governor's attention was first drawn to the possible danger posed by the relics in a letter from England from a person who had visited the Capitol about a year before.

Dempsey instructed the state buildings and grounds chief William J. Cahill to have the relics removed immediately. He said he had the full support of the State Historical Society in doing so.

Found Guilty
NEW HAVEN (AP)—Aaron Joyner Jr., 49, of Hartford was found guilty in Superior Court Thursday of misconduct with a motor vehicle, in connection with a fatal accident in May 1965.

He was sentenced to a year in the New Haven Correctional Institute. The sentence is to be suspended after six months, with Joyner, then going on probation for two years.

State police said Joyner had and was backing it up when it collided with an oncoming car in which Mrs. Ethel Boyd Kennedy was riding. New Haven County Coroner Nathan G. Sacha found Joyner criminally responsible for Mrs. Kennedy's death.

sensible conduct—not on the basis of any deal or reciprocal understanding with Communist China. Indeed, there is not much expectation, in Washington, that China will respond to these gestures on our part.

But what China does, and what kind of life China chooses to live, have never been as important, to us, as the question of what this country does, and how it chooses to live.

If China wants to live like a barbarian, totalitarian state, that is to be regretted, but it is no justification for having the United States put restrictions on its own citizens. When we meet totalitarianism in the world, we should meet it in the robes of freedom, not in any retaliatory imitation of its own chains. We should act free. We should not act slave because other nations do.

These, then, are gestures, under the attention-diverting mantle of our space exploits, which are in a good direction. Limited in nature, they are nevertheless symbolic of a very broad and necessary hope. This is the hope that we can at last get ourselves out of our long and anarchy at Cornell University. It is to be assumed that Communist China has to be our enemy because there is so much bad blood and history between us.

"We have no hostile intentions against Communist China," said the State Department spokesman announcing these policy changes. "We hope that Peking will come to realize that fact."

"Peking may realize it, eventually, if we ourselves do. But first we have to climb out of the theory that Communist China is the complete villain of the Asian scene, and out of our surly memories that, in the only really major victory ever attained against American arms, Chinese troops drove General MacArthur back from the Yalu.

That drive to the Yalu was what brought China into the Korean war, as any sane American calculation would have expected. And that has been the case in this situation, and that has been, somewhat illogically, the prime basis for our own classification of China as an aggressor nation.

It may be under President Nixon, who has not yet been accused, except by some John Birchers, of being soft on Communism, that the United States is going to liberate itself from what has really been a John Birch attitude and policy toward China.

Saving the French Quarter

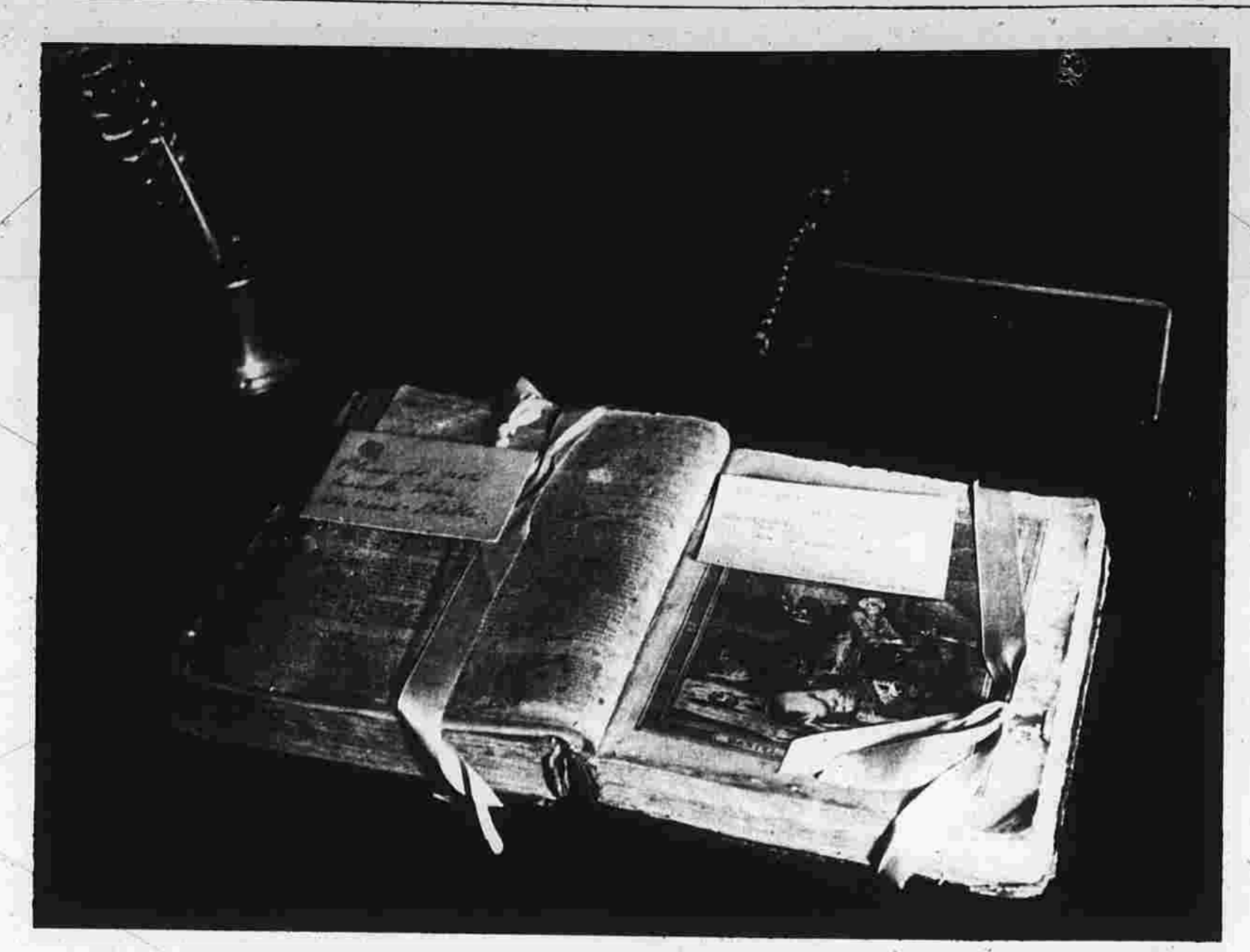
It is apparently the first time the federal government has withheld funds for a highway project on the basis of preserving a historic area, and that will be what all the applause is for.

We join the applause, but we also go on to point out that the day is now upon us, historic sites or no, when we must begin to deal realistically with the problem of locating our superhighways. Our dividends from such superhighways are continually reduced if the highways keep running and eliminating the very population centers they are supposed to serve. The choice is not always as clear and dramatic as that between having the French Quarter and having a highway; there it can be rather easily recognized that having a new highway serving that section of New Orleans may not be worth much if nobody any longer has any special reason for wanting to go to that part of the city.

But there are elements of such choice in almost every major highway project of the time. Highways theoretically are to serve people. But when concrete merely leads to more concrete, and the livable, usable strips and triangles in between get continually narrower and smaller until people are squeezed out of them, then the people have to move out to some other area, to which, sooner or later, more superhighways will have to be built to serve them, or perhaps and choke them again.

There are more and more sections of this crowded Eastern seaboard, in particular, which are getting to be just pieces our own highway systems have slobbered up.

Somebody there will be a veritable forest of hindsight wisdom which will tell us how we might have done it all differently, preserving what we intended to serve.

WASHINGTON — Summer preparations by student revolutionaries for another year of anarchy at Cornell University reveal black anti-Semitism, transferred intact from ghetto to campus, as a menacing new element in the college civil war.

The dominant tone is pursued by Cornell's black militants this autumn has an overt anti-Semitic tone. A charge that Jewish professors blocked the appointment to the faculty of an extremist black militant, an anti-Semitic slur, is a staple of anti-Semitic propaganda.

It is this isolated contagion, quarantined in Ithaca, N.Y. Thanks to the combination of a radicalized student body and a permissive administration, Cornell now rivals Berkeley as a national incubator of campus revolution. What happens in Ithaca today can spread nationwide tomorrow.

Exactly what the revolutionary leaders at Cornell in mind was spelled out in a campus speech June 29 by black student leader Tom Jones. After denouncing the April insurrection, Jones got to the point: The university's refusal last May to hire John Hatcher on the new Black Studies Center faculty.

The source of Hatcher's troubles, said Jones, was Allan Sandler, a distinguished liberal who resigned as chairman of Cornell's government department in protest over the April capitulation.

"Yeah, I'm going to be brutal with you now," said Jones. "Allan Sandler, in Jewish, some of the Jewish faculty members, like Allan Sandler, got on the phone, came over to the administration, told them over there that if John Hatcher was hired, they were resigning."

This was Hatcher painted as the martyred victim of Jewish professors. Hatcher's anti-Semitism, said Jones, was irrelevant. "I might think it's a right or it's a wrong," Jones added, "but that has nothing to do with his academic expertise and his competence to teach African history and African culture."

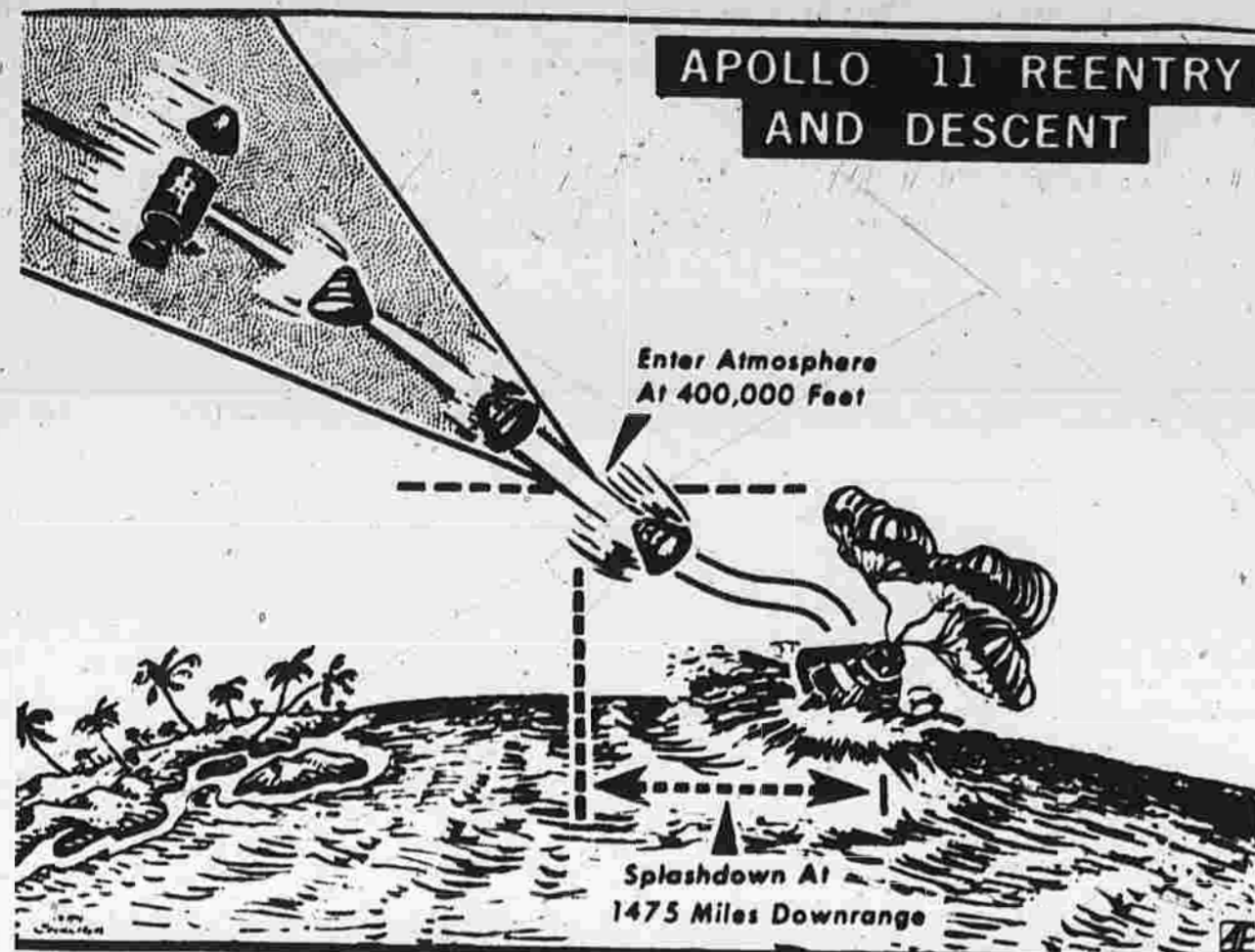

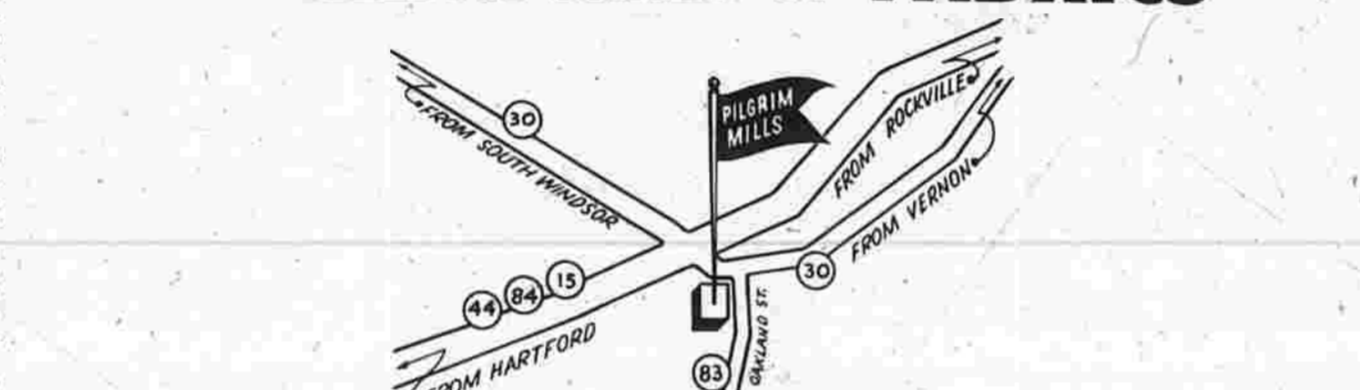

Moon Radio Net Boosts Net Prize

It involves NASA's huge communications system of land lines, ocean cable, radio, and communications satellites — all consolidated into one system and centrally operated at the Goddard Space Flight Center in Greenbelt, Md.

Computers there are programmed to sort about the equivalent of 200-page notes every second during Apollo missions.

Intermediate switching stations are located at Canberra, Madrid, London, Guam, Cape Kennedy and Honolulu.

This major system, called NASCOM, linked the Apollo 11 spacecraft with mission control in Houston through relay from 14 land stations, four tracking ships and eight instrumented planes.

Prime site for reception of television from the moon, however, was the Mars deep-space station, with its 10-foot antenna, at Goldstone.

The four ships deployed in the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans provided tracking coverage during the spacecraft's reentry. Earth orbit injection to lunar transfer phases and reentry.

The eight Apollo range instrumented aircraft are supplementary to land stations and ships. They were used in the lift-off and reentry phases.

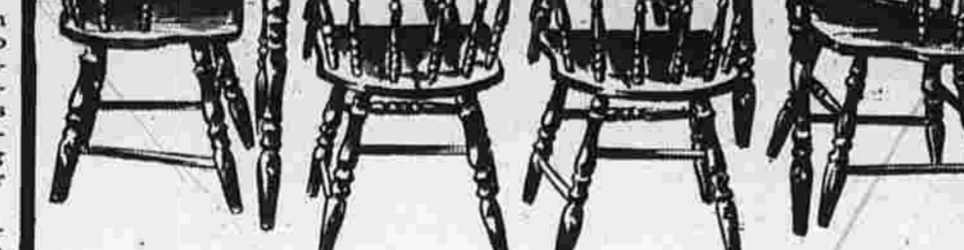
The flight network has 30 computers which accept, store and transmit data sent from the spacecraft and compute and transmit the data to the stations up to the spacecraft.

The USS Redstone, one of the four Apollo instrumentation ships, is home for nearly all the 80 crew members from the military sea Transportation Service and the 120-man technical staff from the ITT's Federal Electric Corp., under contract to the Air Force Western Test Range, Vandenberg, AFB, Calif.

Dr. Stroud Giving Up Practice For Residency at Smith College

By MALCOLM BARLOW

"Despite all the rewards to young men and their families, private practice is not enough to make life complete," according to Dr. William D. Stroud.

Dr. Stroud is leaving his 17-year-old general practice in Manchester Aug. 15 to become a staff physician at Smith College in Northampton, Mass.

He is now selling his large home at 89 N. Lakeside Circle and is selling many patients as he can about his leave. He admits to them that the leave is for his own and his family's good, but has gone to great lengths to make sure his patients are in good medical hands.

At the near 100-year-old Smith, he will be one of four physicians on hand for the school year to treat 150 teachers, other employees and over 2,000 students, including men for the first time in the fall. He expects his home to be within walking distance of his office.

"There's nothing more satisfying than practicing medicine," he said recently as he spoke about his decision to leave. "You take care of people's illnesses. You get very close to them."

"But if you don't have sufficient time for your wife and children, this cannot really be enough," he added.

Dr. Stroud is a Northville, Tenn. native and attended Murray State College in Murray, Ky., and Tufts College in Medford, Mass. He received his M.D. from Tufts Medical School in Boston in 1948.

While at Tufts, he came to Manchester several times with friends, and remembered it as a pretty town.

While an intern at Philadelphia General Hospital, he met a registered nurse and now has two adopted children, Rose, 4, and David, 10.

While serving two years in the Marine Corps, he looked for a town to start his practice. He got enough free time here, I don't think I could get it any where. The doctors have very good coverage for each other.

"I'm sure we need several new doctors in town. The problem is numbers. We've got to have more. Medical schools have got to increase their enrollment," he added.

He spoke of a doctor's pace. "I'm sometimes run ragged. It's hard to convey to someone what the pace is. I see my children every day. But they are very aware of my absence when I'm signed off and signed on. If I'm on, I've got to be ready to go at any minute. We cannot do anything."

"If a patient is critical in the coronary unit, being signed off doesn't mean being signed off in your mind. In February, we took a trip on a train. We had a ball. I completely forgot about the practice."

"This problem with pace is true of all doctors and of all people who are at great speed all the time. I was fortunate in office help over the years. They've been able to keep me on time. If we were ever more than 15 minutes behind, we got uneasy."

His reasons for going to Smith are complex but have a great deal to do with pace. "My practice is not dull. Every patient is a new problem, a new experience. I'm sure there'll be things about practicing medicine here."

"The hours are long. The responsibility is great. All the tea in China, doesn't make it worthwhile if you cannot look around you."

State Lists School Costs

A rough comparison of area figures from the State Department of Education shows that each child's education costs more in the country than in town.

It cost state towns \$402 million to run their schools in 1967-68, a 10.7 per cent increase over 1966-67. This is about \$2 million more than was spent the year before.

Manchester and eight area towns spent over \$22 million on a total of 42,845 students who live in the towns and go to their schools. This is \$540 per student, roughly.

When all the per student costs in each town are estimated, the most expensive start in the smallest towns and the least expensive are in the largest.

The main expense is Vermont. From most expensive to least, the towns are: Hebron, \$891 per student; Columbia, \$602; Toland, \$508; Bolton, \$502; East Hartford, \$484; Manchester, \$454; Glastonbury, \$453; South Windsor, \$450; and Vernon, \$350.

From least to most students, the towns are: Columbia, 600; Hebron, 415; Bolton, 602; Toland, 1,581; South Windsor, 4,021; Glastonbury, 5,274; Vernon, 6,091; Manchester, 9,821; and East Hartford, 12,472.

The report of the State Department of Education did not explain the dramatic differences except in the Hebron and Columbia cases.
